#### Texas Voters See Results Of Approval

The State of Texas, in response to the passage of a constituitonal amendment by Texas voters last November, announces a \$10,000,000 state bond sales has launched a new "opportunity plan" designed to bring college education within the financial reach of all qualified Texas youth.

Many times, citizens of our state voice opinions of disinterest in voting in constitutional amendment elections because they see no result of their voting. A perfect example in direct contrast to this kind of thinking can be seen in this action.

Action by the Coordinating Board set in motion the loan plan approved by Texas voters as a Constitutional amendment last year. Amendment authorized a total of \$85,000,000 in bonds to provide funds for students unable to continue education beyond high school without financial assistance. Initial \$10,000,000 sale is believed to be more than adequate to carry the program through the first year.

Ceiling on available loans is \$1,000 a year for undergraduates and \$1,500 for graduates. Although a six per cent interest rate Thoughts For Thursday is authorized, the U. S. government will pay all interest while a student is in school, and half of it afterward for borrowers eligible for federal interest subsidy.


Never again will students of this state be denied higher education because of lack of funds," commented John E. Gray of Beaumont, chairman of the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System.

Blurred Line Between Right And

A recent message from J. Edgar Hoover, director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, outlines one of the principal sources of operations of law enforcement officers on every level-the concept we have of the diffrence between right and wrong.

"Unfortunately, the concept of right over wrong is not as clear and strong in the hearts and minds of present day America as it was in the hearts and minds of our orefathers. Acts that are wrong, illegal and immoral are condoned or ignored by much of our society. Many persons have no compunction about committing illegal acts because they feel secure in the knowledge that if detected they stand an excellent chance to escape punishment through legal loopholes or technicalities," Mr. Hoover says.

The increase in youthful crime leads to the inescapable conclusion that many of our young people are not being taught, either by word or example, the simple difference in right and wrong, Mr. Hoover believes.

Law enforcement officers, how ever strong, will continue to face problems of increasing violations and growing indifference to law for so long as a clear distinction between right and wrong are distorted, especially to impression








## **Cotton Boll** Weevils, Worms On Increase

Populations of boll weevils and boll worms have increased during the past week in Hall County. Boll worm infestations are building up and first generation boll weevils Okla. continue to emerge from squares

Bollworm activity continues to increase in Hall County with reports of medium infestations in some fields. Damage to two to four percent was observed in several fields in the county.

Control measures for bollworms should begin when bollworm eggs and four to five young worms are found per 100 terminals or five percent of the small squares and bolls have been injured by small bollworms. Control measures should be applied at five day intervals or less. Fields should be checked closely two to three days following each application to insure effective control.

Wayne Hutcherson, five miles southeast of Memphis, has .5 percent square Phillips, two miles southwest of Memphis, has one percent square and boll damage.
