Skip-Row Cotton Farmers May Get Some Relief

Hall County cotton farmers using skip-row practices may receive some relief in the form of an increase in projected yield income payable to farmers under an announcement released last Friday by the United States Department of Agriculture.

The Texas Farmers Union, elected representatives from Texas, the Rolling Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. and many others, have worked hard since Oct. 7, 1966 when certain inequity penalties were seen in projected yields in 1967.

The USDA announcement has the effect of saying that a total of 20,503,296 additional pounds of cotton have been granted to Texas to take care of various inequities in projected yield in 1967, according to a RPCG interpretation.

The RPCG interprets this to mean that 90 per cent or more of these pounds will go to the 32 counties in the Rolling Plains who have lost pounds because of skip-row penalties. According to a table drawn up by RPCG, Hall County had a loss factor of 49, the largest of any of the 32 counties and a total pounds lost for county of 4,490,703. The total of all the counties were 34,785,537 pounds for the 32-county area.

Farmers Union President from Texas, Jay Newman of Waco, in a release this week said, 'The possible \$2 million dollar increase in projected yield income payable to cotton farmers under the announced additional reserve allotted to Texas resulted from the refusal of Farmers Union and Texas members of Congress to give up in their efforts to get USDA to correct errnoeous projected yield allocations for certain skiprow pattern counties for 1967.

As nearly as we can tell, the Texas ASCS committees will determine how the pounds will be distributed, but it is expected that most of this will go to Rolling Plains counties.

A close examination of the additional pounds of cotton which have been granted to Texas, slightly over 20 and a half million, that it is about two-thirds of the amount asked for. Not all of the loss will be corrected in this action.

The RPCG and other cotton grower groups were elated are not necessarily ignorant peoat the decision by the USDA. The ultimate goal being sought after is that of returning to measuring a stalk of cotton in the Rolling Plains of Texas just like a stalk anywhere else in the progress is necessarily limited. We have known for several years that many of the problems of cotton in the United States are administrative or legislative problems which have developed into certain inequities far beyond that of most people to producers. A recent study showed that the average American reads on the seventh grade level and only aout half the adults in the country ever read any books at all.

This is a distressing statistic and has caused concern among the educators of the nation, and tion period and those long week- for the coming summer. well it should.

Reading is the key to knowledge, and while illerate people

If a person reads a book week throughout his average adult life of 50 years, he would read about 4,000 books in a lifetime. This figure, while impressive and cumulated knowledge contained own Perry Memorial Library.

The fact is, of course, that very few people read a book a week. A great many people don't even read a book a year.

This is too bad, because reading is essential. The ability to read and reason is a requirement for an informed electorate that keeps our free form of government alive and healthy.

We will admit that we live in an age when there is an intense competition for reading time, and many people have surrendered their precious reading time for other pursuits. When they do this, they cheat themselves out of one of life's greatest joys, because only reading gives us a link with our past, a comprehension of our present, and a fleeting glimpse of the future.

A good reading program must be founded on reserving a certain period of each day for reading, even if it is only an hour a day. That reading period, whether it comes late at night or early in the morning, should be jealously guarded and surrendered only to the most urgent demands.

In earlier days, books were precious and the ability to read them was a mark of the educated man. In this day of mass education, the right to read is carelessly accepted and casually used. -Ochiltree County Herald.



Q-When do you have to file the long form 1040 instead of the short form 1040A?

A-The general rules are that the short Form 1040A cannot be used if: (1) deductions are itemized; (2) income was \$10,000 or more; (3) more than \$200 of income was not subject to withholding; (4) special tax status or tax credits are claimed; (5) a fiscal year or accrual accounting method is used; (6) the return is der. Q-When does the law on direct filing with service centers go into effect?

Q-What state and local taxes are deductible on my federal tax tax return?

A-State and local income taxes, general sales taxes, state and local gasoline taxes, annual ad valorem personal property taxes, and real estate taxes levied for the general welfare are deductible. Oeductions are not allowed for: drivers licenses, state and local taxes on alcoholic beverages, tobacco and certain miscelaneous taxes. Also, the cost of auto tags are deductible only to the extent it is base on the value of your

QHave you got any publicaon that goes into more detail than the 1040 instructions?

A-The publication, Your Federal Income Tax provides additional information on tax filing. It may be obtained for 50c at any IRS office.

Q-Where should you file your return, in the district where you live or the district where you have your legal residence?

A-Tax returns should be filed in the district where you legally reside. For the majority of taxpayers legal residence and actual residence are identical.

A-Under some circumstances that is correct.

Cases like this usually arise when several members of a family contribute jointly to support another member. When the other tests for claiming a dependent are met, and when several people together have provided more than membership now stands at 518. they may agree to permit one of them to claim the exemption.

To do so, the person who takes the exemption must have contributed over 10 percent of the support and the others who contributed over 10 percent must sign a declarations that they will not claim the exemption for that year. These declarations must be filed with the return of the one claiming the exemption.


