Tourism, Bright Future Business For Texas!

Citizens of this area last Thursday night, at the annual Chamber Banquet here, were introduced to a lively topic by Frank Hildebrand of Austin, Executive Director of Tourist Development Agency of Texas. The topic was tourism and its future to Texas economy.

Texas citizens have heard more about tourism in our state the past three or four years than during anytime in their history. Possibly because the state's written and unwritten law in the early days was "let's keep Texas for Texans," this kind of thinking developed after the Civil War when most "furriners" were Carpet Bagger, or, at the best undesirable who had been run out of other states. The State of Texas had a "Carpet Bagger Clause" on its statutes for years which would not allow state money to be spent on encouraging travel across state lines. This law was repealed in the 1930's but the state did little to encourage tourism until 1962 when the Tourist Development Agency was set up by the State Legislature at the request of Governor John Connally.

Texas has begun telling the vacation land story throughout the nation, and within the next two years, more tourists will come to this state than at anytime in its history. The major reason we can expect more tourists is the HemisFair which will run for six months in San Antonio in 1968 and the 1968 Olympic Games to be held in Mexico City that year. Also Mr. Hildebrand hinted at the possibility of having one or both of the National Political Conventions in Houston's Astrodome in 1968.

What do these things mean to Memphis, or Hall County, or to the Texas Panhandle, or to West Texas? It means that more and more tourist cars will be on our roads, stopping at our motels, our service stations, our cafes, and business establishments.

What will they find in Texas? They will find warm hearted friendly West Texans, that's for sure, and reasonable prices.

One thing, however, is pointed out that we need to do if Texas is going to capture a place, annually, in the race for the tourist dollar. This is providing interesting sights for tourists to see while in the state.

Mayor H. J. Howell of Memphis and many other leaders here and throughout the Texas Panhandle are enthusiastic about a scenic road up the lower end of Palo Duro Canyon, the nation's second largest canyon. Mayor Howell and Mr. Hildebrand talked to some length about this project and Hildebrand assured our citizens the Texas Tourist Development Agency would do all in its power to see this project brought to reality.

It is this type of planning and vision that will attract more and more visitors to the Panhandle of Texas, in future years and allow more of our citizens to reap the harvest of the tourist's dollar.

Texas in 1966 had 18 million visitors who spent one billion dollars in this state. Actually, the State of Florida had 18 million visitors and they spent three billion dollars. The reason for the additional revenue going to Florida is the elaborate tourist facilities of that state, which have been developed for years and advertised as some of the finest in the world. This is the competition our state must meet in attracting vacationers to Texas.

During 1968, Hildebrand estimated, Texas can expect from seven to ten million additional visitors to attend the HemisFair alone during its six-month running. Many of these visitors will travel by car and will pass through the West Texas area enroute to and from San Antonio.

If Memphis or any community in our area has any plans for future tourist attractions, then the next two years can be expected to be the best opportunity in our history to make the plans become a reality, for the eyes of the nation and the entire world will be focused on our state and the way we treat our visitors will go a long way in encouraging them to come back.

We have one prediction. There are very few Texans who can boast that they have really seen Texas in all its entirety. It is big and it would take a tourist many months to see all the sights of the state, which are certainly worth seeing. In this area, we should certainly encourage tourists to see Palo Duro Canyon and tell them about the canyon.

Our citizens left the banquet hall with renewed enthusiasm for it was pointed out that in Memphis today, 5,000 cars are traveling on U. S. 287 and State 256 through Memphis. If two per cent of these tourists were stopped to eat and stay over night, they would spend \$3,000 per day and increase our local economy by one million dollars annually.

It certainly behooves our citizens to take a long serious look at tourism in our area as an additional source of economic diversification so we can be ready for the big year of 1968.

Regional Development

The West Texas Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring a regional approach to economic development which calls for a cooperative and concerted effort on the part of metropolitan centers and their satellite communities.

Several meetings and programs have occurred in regard to the future of West Texas through the big metropolitan areas working with the smaller towns surrounding them.

There was such a meeting at Tulla last week. It was the first of a series of six which will be held over the western portion of the state.

We can agree with James R. Bradley, from the economic research division of Texas A&M who spoke at Tulla that it is important that we work together as a region.

We agree that we can work together as a region for a progress in competition with other regions of the United States.

But, we can't agree on helping the big metropolitan cities to engulf the smaller communities through taking away business within these area communities.

It sorta leaves us cold to enter into an effort to help make Lubbock, Plainview and Amarillo larger . . . at the cost of less population and business in Floydada.

Now, if the big metropolitan cities are really concerned about the region as such, it seems that they would be working for the smaller towns around . . . exerting an effort to strengthen the region through stronger area towns.

We look at Floydada . . . we understand and know its growth and progress potentials better than any other "small town around the metropolitans" and we can list several ways that the big city can help us grow as a regional factor in the economy.

They can direct some of the industries our way.

They can send us some doctors, so our hospitals will be successful.

They can send us house builders to take care of the increased population . . . and more people to build business firms here.

Yes, we're left just a little cold with the metropolitan — small town bedfellow situation . . . if it is designed to make the big city larger and the small city smaller.

We'll warm up to the idea if and when the area metropolitans go to work to help us progress with the region.

It goes on in this territory, and many farm families are also sufferers when the current fails due to such acts. It is expensive to the electric cooperative in material for replacement and the time consumed in making the repairs. There is one thing that should be mentioned, the damage is not as great in this system as it is in other sections of the state, according to J. W. Coppedge, manager.
