Turkey Lions Club To Sponsor Big Talent Show Next Tuesday Night

Turkey Lions Club is to sponsor a big talent show beginning at 8 p.m. Tuesday, March 28, in the Turkey High School Auditorium.

"At this time, outstanding talent has been lined up from Turkey and several area towns including Quitaque, Hedley, Clarendon, Lakeview and Matador," Paul Hawkins, publicity chairman for the show, said.

Master of Ceremonies for the event will be Dee Fletcher of KVII-TV in Amarillo. Dee is a former entertainer himself and will do much to keep the show moving and enjoyable.

Special attraction for the event will be a "go-go" contest for girls both in the grade and high school divisions.

Admission for the show will be \$1.75 for adults and \$.35 for students. No entrance fee or admission will be charged to contestants entered in the show.

The Turkey Lions would like to extend a special welcome to everyone in all area towns. "We are entertained as these kids possess a great deal of talent. If you haven't seen or heard some of these youngsters then you will be in for a pleasant surprise," Hawkins said.

"It is time for our committees to be meeting and working on activities for this year," President Wayne Goodrum of the Memphis Chamber of Commerce and Hall County Board of Development told the directors and committee chairmen at a meeting here Monday. "We need to get our people more interested and involved in our work."

One of the upcoming events the organization is planning for is the 10:30 a. m. visit Wednesday, March 29, of the Annual U. S. 287 Caravan South, which will arrive in Memphis and stay about 30 minutes.

The eight-day caravan, which promotes the benefits of traveling Highway 278, will cover a total of 1,381 miles, and will start in Amarillo at the convention headquarters at the Trade Winds Motor Hotel.

A one-day convention is planned at Amarillo for Tuesday, March 28, with a 7:30 p. m. banquet concluding the convention that night.

The caravan will lunch in Childress Wednesday, and travel on to Tallahassee, Fla.

American Cancer Crusade Workers To Meet At Community Bldg. Monday

The 1967 education and fund-raising Crusade of the Hall County Unit of the American Cancer Society will be launched Monday night, March 27, Roselyn Williams, president of the unit, announced this week.

A meeting for all board members, crusade captains and volunteer workers will be held in the community building at 7:30 p.m. Monday. All chairman and workers are urged to be present.

The meeting Monday is to prepare volunteer workers for the 1967 crusade which begins nationwide on April 1, Miss Williams stated.

A quota of \$1379.00 had been assigned to Hall County for the 1967 crusade.

More than one-third of all funds contributed to the American Cancer Society is invested in research — over \$15 million in 1966.

By 1970, the Society hopes to be able to "close some of the critical gaps in cancer research" with "a minimum annual expenditure of \$20 million for sound projects."

"The urgency of the fight can be stated simply: Statistically, it is estimated that one of four of the 7,707 people in Hall County will be faced with cancer personally if present rates continue. One out of three of those stricken will die of the disease. Almost 100,000 persons in the United States will die in 1967 from cancer unless we can reverse present trends and bring these patients to physicians in time for earlier diagnosis and treatment."

"Education — one of the major objectives of the Crusade — can help save many lives from cancer," the chairman stated.

County S.W.D.C. Joins In National 'Wildlife Week'

Conservation districts, the Soil Conservation Service and other agencies are joining with the National Wildlife Federation to observe National Wildlife Week, March 1925, according to Ernest Rea, chairman, Hall County Soil and Water Conservation District.

The theme, "This is Your Land," emphasizes the responsibility that all citizens have in protecting and improving the land and other natural resources, thus benefiting wildlife, Chairman Rea stated.

For years, the SCS has helped landowners through local conservation districts apply practices that benefit wildlife. These include stripcropping, grassed waterways, field borders of grasses and shrubs, woodland management, range and pasture development, farm ponds, watershed protection and flood prevention.

SCS biologists, conservationists, and other specialists assist farmers and ranchers to make decisions in the proper use of their land. Measures to improve wildlife cover were applied on nearly 200,000 acres of Texas lands last year, Rea added.

Cousin Of Local Man Killed In Vietnam Thurs.

Travis Simmons, Jr., of Childress, who is a cousin of Dewey Simmons, was killed in action Thursday in Vietnam, according to information received by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Travis Simmons, who have been making their home in Midland for the past two years.

Simmons, 24, was a medic with the U. S. Marines, and is the first Childress County serviceman to be slain in the Vietnamese War.

Funeral services are pending the arrival of his body from Vietnam and burial will be in Childress.

All Farmers Invited To School Pesticides

County Agent W. B. Hooser in-structed all Hall County farmers, growers, pesticide dealers and applicators to attend the Southern Regional Pesticide Application School, the first of a series of nine schools dealing with the use of chemical use for the 13 Southern Region which will be held in Wichita Falls on April 10 and 11.

The school is designed to in-crease the efficiency of the applicator in the use of chemical and the safety aspects of pesticide use. The list of speakers includes recognized authorities in the following areas: Dr. C. Edwards, "Resistant Soils"; Dr. R. White, "Pesticides and World Needs"; Dr. Harry Hayes, "Regulatory Control"; J. A. Riley, "Cultural Meteorology"; G. M. D., "Health Aspects of Pesticides"; Dr. Morris, "Herbicides for Brush Control"; Dr. Edwin Lloyd, "Utilization of Volume Ground Application"; Bill V. McFarland, "Regulatory Activities — FDA".

The general session will include a discussion of mutual interest in the use of pesticides in the control of weed, plant disease and agricultural pests, and the effects of pesticides and other chemicals on humans and other animals. Following the general session, three programs will be presented concurrently dealing with the specific problems of aerial application, ground application, commercial pest control (structural, pest, insect, disease control, etc.).

The program has been made possible through a grant to the Agricultural Extension Service and should provide information of real value to Extension personnel, farmers, ranchers and others. This training and information will be most useful in the conduct of county programs and activities dealing with the application and efficient use of pesticides, Hooser stated.

Hooser encouraged interested persons in the county to make plans to attend the meeting which will be held in the Ramada Inn in Wichita Falls, since only two of the nine schools will be held in Texas, one in Wichita and another in the Rio Grande Valley in 1968.

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Kingdom Hall Of Jehovah's Witnesses Is Dedicated Here This Weekend

The dedication of the newly completed Kingdom Hall of Jehovah's Witnesses at 507 N. 8th, Memphis, was held over the weekend with 73 in attendance.

Guests from Childress, Pampa, Amarillo, Hamilton, Silverton, Flomot and Elk City, Okla., were present to hear Mr. C. A. Stoermer give the address of dedication Saturday night.

Speaking on the subject "Faithful To Our Trust," Stoermer pointed to the fact that those who are exercising their faith in God will praise JAH when they use the expression 'Hallelujah' or literally praise Jehovah.

"By praising him we become a worshiper," Stoermer indicated. "Some start to build a place of worship but turn to other things. Materialism or building themselves up in this system of things causes them to turn from praising God. Other features of the evenings program included a talk on the growth of Jehovah's Witnesses world wide by Mr. Rex Tiffin along with color slides that were shown by Ed Regal of the world headquarters in New York and the educational facilities of the Witnesses at their world headquarters.

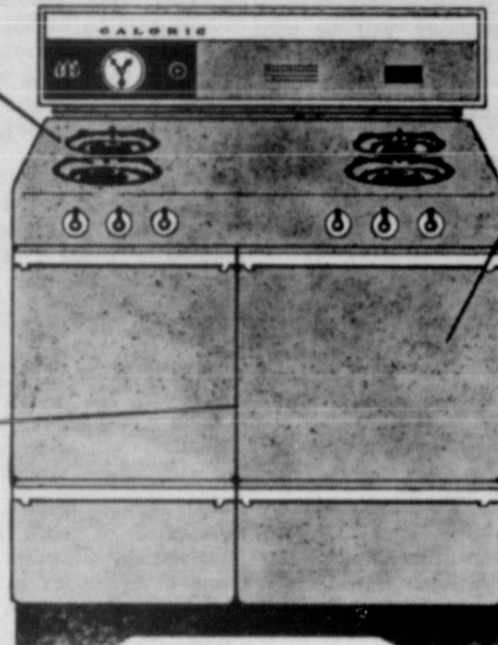

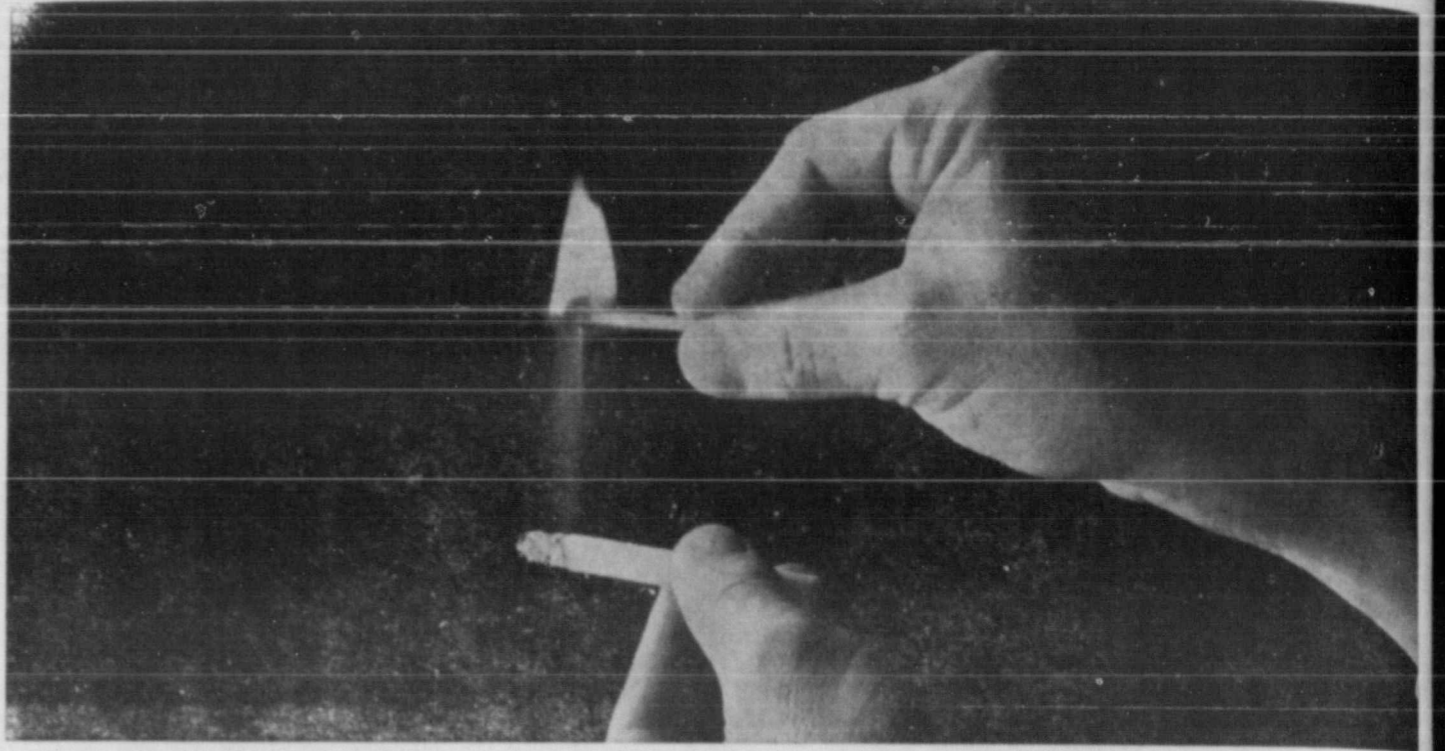

"We need now to find out if users of ash are utilizing the type found here, and if there is a ready market for it," Boone said. He explained that an additional \$1,500 will be necessary but definite plans to raise the funds has not been completed as yet.

Other projects discussed Monday was the beautification program which was so successful last year, the work of the "Idea Committee" and a "Promote Cotton" program. What action the committees handling these and many other projects will recommend will determine the extent of the work accomplished by the chamber this year.
