Public Notice Laws Need Changing!

A bill has been introduced in the state legislature which would take away some of the power of the courthouse bulletin board and make public notice in a newspaper mandatory before a mortgagee could sell a person's home. We are heartily in favor of passage of this bill.

Whenever dissemination of public notices through newspapers is advocated by the state press, it is said that the press is seeking to create forced business for its own profit. However, dissemination of public notices was the reason for the start of newspapers originally in the early days of our Republic, and that reason exists in even greater importance today. People look to their newspapers for such information and look to their legislators to see to it such policies are made a mandatory part of our lives.

This may sound like much ado about a minor point of law, but in recent years there have been more and more instances whereby a home owner, who gets behind in his payments, finds out that his home has been sold and the first he knows about it is when the new owners demand possession.

He is presumed to have been notified when a notice is posted on the courthouse bulletin board. That is all the notice the law requires. Of course, this situation demands correction.

A public notice bill has been introduced at Austin (House Bill 343) that deserves the attention of the full House, and should not be allowed to die in sub-committee without at least being given close perusal by all the Legislature. This legal notice bill is designed to make mandatory the advertising of Baker, aided and abetted by supsales of real estate under deeds of trust. Evidence was presented in the preleminary hearing that many a home has been taken away from the owners by unscrupulous lenders, aided and abetted by archiac laws.

Present procedure is for the lender to post a notice on the courthouse door or bulletin board (once payment on the loan becomes a few months delinquent) which "legally" places the property up for sale by the sheriff without further adieu. This has been done more than once without homeowners knowing much waith in our fellow man a thing about the sale. And it is perfectly legal under existing Texas laws, because all that is necessary to fill the law's requirements is that a notice be posted in three public places . . . and that could be a winter-closed summer park, a tree or a

Under terms of House Bill 343, adequate notice to the owner would be required, giving him three weeks to round up the necessary funds with which to pay the delinquent payments. did it apply to this writer's family Then, if the property has to be sold to satisfy the lein, publica- and as for ourselves, we aren't tion of this fact would increase the sale price of the property, much faith in our fellow man because it would build up the buying audience and increase body competition for the property. It is a common occurance at anything too bad, so we weren't such sales for no bidder to appear except the mortgagee who in that category either. can then bid the property at the balance due on the mortgage. or some figure far below acutal market price.

In days gone by when people hung around the courthouse all day awaiting news, posting was important and really served a purpose. But this is not true today, for news is brought to the people via their home town newspaper. Every city or town of any size, especially county seat towns, has one or more newspapers, for by actual county, there are 100 dailies and 556 weeklies in Texas.

Today, unless they are being sued or have other legal business, the great majority of the people visit the courthouse only once or twice ayear . . . to pay taxes, buy a license, or register to vote. Even then very few ever stop to read the bulletin board, and we'd wager that not more than one out of 10 even know the basic procedure for conducting a sheriff's sale.

Confiscation without proper notice is unfair, unkind, and actually dishonest. Certainly a posted notice is far from adequate, as is even a registered letter directed to the attention vine, Carrellton . . . even in a of the owner.

The only proper notice is a printed notice, distributed as

widely as possible among the general public.

Cost of such notice would revert back to the property owner, and would not have to be paid by the lender nor the county. House Bill 343 has been sent to a sub-committee of the House Judiciary Committee, which as a whole, is composed entirely of lawyers, and unless the people of lexas demand some action along this line, that's where it will probably stay.

Public notice by means of the courthouse bulletin board is as out-of-date as public notice by means of the town crier. Let's families and live good, wholesome get some changes made in the law.
