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

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## EDITORIAL

Graduation Time Again

The 1966-67 school year will shortly come to a close, and the 1967 graduates will make the traditional walk across the stage to receive their high school diplomas. For these graduates, the first major change in their lives is upon them.

The four school systems in Hall County will have graduation exercises for the next three Friday evenings, May, 12, 19, and 26. The night these seniors receive their diplomas will be a night they will long remember for they have earned the diplomas by devoting 12 long years of study in the Public School

This newspaper is publishing special salutes to the graduating classes of Lakeview, Turkey, Estelline and Memphis this month and the Editorial Staff and Publisher would like to extend editorial congratulation to the seniors of all four Hall County Schools for making the sacrifice of staying in school until all requirements have been met and the diplomas earned.

The graduates of 1967 were born in 1948 or 1949, several years after World War II and most cannot remember the Korean War. What they know of World War I and II, and the Korean Conflict is what they have read in history books and what their elders have told them. To them, the fighting in Vietnam is a real war, and one they feel personally involved in, for almost all of the male graduates have registered with the Draft Board.

The graduates of 1967 will decide within the next few months, whether or not they will further their education by attending a trade school, college or university, or whether they enter the military service of the nation, or the labor market, putting to use some of the skills they have already acquired. Regardless of the choice, each and every graduate, young man the law. or young woman, will have to continue learning and furthering his education.

Our graduates have attended approximately 2,088 days of things, however. It assumes acschool and spent 14,616 hours to meet the requirements of graduation. They have learned much since their first day in the first grade when they couldn't read or write. Some students during the 12 years of education, have felt the diploma was not worth the effort, and have dropped out of school. This is an unfortunate situation and we would urge the drop-outs to do what they can to further their education, to develop their

## **Baptist Pastor Lists Alternatives** To Liquor Bill

"If you're really interested in more control and more moderation, liquor-by-the-drink is certainly not the answer," Rev. Leroy Gaston, pastor of the Travis Baptist Church, said Tuesday. He is moderator of the Pan-

handle Baptist Association. Rev. Gaston advocated other alternatives which would incorporate liquor controls without increasing availability, and raise much more needed tax revenue, in his statement.

"Advocates of liquor-by-thedrink claim that they are interested in tight controls, in more enforcement, and in moderation. If this is true, they should be in favor of these alternatives which would raise liquor taxes, beer taxes, and private club taxes without increasing liquor consumption," Rev. Gaston pointed out.

He reported that Rep. Bob Bass of DeKalb has introduced House Bill 1159 which would tax private clubs 15 per cent and the Dean's Distinguished Honor raise liquor license costs.

"Nine out of every ten letters have received have been against liquor-by-the-drink. My proposal would raise the needed state revence without making liquor more accessible than it is right now,"

Memphis Democrat-Thurs., May 11, 1967 Rep. Bass said. "My bill would probably bring in around \$20 Sunday School Report million more than the Connaly's proposal without encouraging increased consumption of alcohol."

House Bill 1149 by Rep. J. M. Simpson of Amarillo and Rep. James D. Cole of Greenville would incorporate the strong controls of the Connally liquorby-the-drink bill, but without the liquor, Rev. Gaston said.

"If their motives are as pure as their words, champions of the liquor-by-the-drink would be behind HB 781 by Vernon Stewart of Wichita Falls. This bill would crack down on sale of liquor to minors. They would be behind HB 953 by Rep. Delwin Jones of Lubbock, which would increase beer tax and raise an additional \$59 million in revenue; or HB 1015 by Rep. Neil Caldwell of should be a boon to barbers. Angleton, which would increase the tax on beer from the present \$4.30 per barrel to \$6.30; or HB 1030 by Rep. Bill Clayton of Springlake, which would increase beer tax to \$10.00 a barrel," Rev. Caston said.

"It's not as if there were no alternatives," Rev. Gaston added. "There are lots of alternatives, but they don't have the might and money behind them the liquor bill does. The liquorby-the-drink bill is a wolf in sheep's clothing," he said.

Rev. Gaston is asking the people to write their representatives, urging its defeat.
