Memphis-Clarendon Open Season Friday

The 1967 football season will get underway Friday night with the Memphis Cyclone, under the guidance of Coach Bert Glascock, playing host to Coach Clyde Nonkester's Clarendon Bronchos at Cyclone Stadium. Game time is 8 p. m.

The game this year promises to be a real tough one for both teams as Clarendon is a top-ranked Class A ball club and Memphis one of District 3-AA stronger teams.

The Memphis-Clarendon gridiron rivalry spans many years, and is traditionally a fine, hard-fighting contest. This year, the game promises to be a real thriller with the outcome unpredictable.

Clarendon will bring Quarterback Don Mooring as the pilot of a talented backfield of possibly Phillip Longan (190) and a speedster, Reese. Clarendon's backfield will average somewhere in the neighborhood of 160 pounds, while their line will average about 170.

Clarendon has some fine linemen in Monroe Everett, Larry Green (178), Pat Perkins (195) and Ends Larry Kidd and Monte Land. Monte can also play in the backfield and wears No. 32.

Coach Nonkester's Bronchos not only are favored in District 3-AA of which they are defending champions, but also have the reputation of playing aggressive football.

The Cyclone, on the other hand, is the defending champ of District 3-AA and will field a larger, but more inexperienced bunch Friday night. The Cyclone's offensive line will average around 180 pounds per man. In the backfield, however, the Cyclone will average only about 150 pounds.

In the speed department, the Bronchos will probably have the quicker line play, although the Cyclone has a certain amount of quick speed in the backfield and defensive secondary.

"Clarendon is ready for us and we are going to have to be ready to play hard and alert football to win this one," Coach Glascock said.

The coach added that the team which wants the victory the most will probably win since both are well matched.

Coach Glascock said he was disappointed in the first unit's scrimmage with Wellington last Friday night. The coach also gave no indications as to who would be starting on offense or defense against Clarendon.

This week, with cool weather, the Cyclone's workouts have been sharp and snappy with the team showing a lot of fire. It appears the local lads will be ready for the contest with Clarendon.

EDITORIAL

Gridiron Time Is Here!

Friday night, Hall County football teams will go into action for the first games of the 1967 football season, and with the season opening upon us we should start the season off right by making some sound decisions about the activities. The football season calls for many miles of travel, most of which is done at night, plus a lot of emotional excitement on the part of players and fans alike.

We, the staff of The Memphis Democrat, want to take this opportunity to wish all the athletes in uniform good luck during the upcoming season. May you play your best and represent your schools in the highest tradition.

To the fans, we would urge a certain amount of restraint in many aspects of the season. For one, let us drive our automobiles at a safe, moderate speed, allowing plenty of time to arrive at the game, and to return home after the game.

Another place we should exercise a little good judgment is in the grand stands, especially when breaks or official decisions go against our favorite team. Good sportsmanship should include both players and fans alike, on both sides of the field.

It is also important for fans to give encouragement and praise to our athletes and not be critical of mistakes. High school athletes should not be judged on the same bases as college or professional performers on the gridiron. Any criticism should be taken to the coaches who are always ready to discuss their boys and listen to constructive criticism.

In conclusion, our citizens should attend as many ball games as they can in support of their favorite team. Gate receipts go into the schools' athletic funds and help to purchase new equipment and serve to help the school systems finance all athletic programs offered in the schools. When we attend, we are just helping our schools, and our own boys. Be a good supporter and fan.

Election Laws Changing!

Several major changes in Texas election laws enacted by the 60th legislature . . . some of them implementing Constitutional changes approved last November by Texas voters . . . are now in effect in the state, and voters should be getting familiar with them.

One big improvement, we think, is the provision of the law which will now make it possible for Texans to vote "for" a candidate instead of "against" his opponents . . . by placing an "x" or a check mark in a box opposite the name of the candidate of his choice instead of scratching off all but one name among the candidates for each office.

It's a small matter, perhaps, but the "scratch" method has always seemed a back-handed method of choosing an office holder . . . sort of a "lesser of several evils" choice which might be realistic but isn't good psychology.

Other major changes in the election law, as listed by the Secretary of State, include these:

Counties may use electronic voting machines on approval of the secretary of state.

Those who have not yet met state voting residence requirements may vote for president and vice-president.

Those who have moved from county to county within six months before an election can vote for statewide officials.

Some city election dates will be changed from the first Tuesday in April to the first Saturday in April.

Election officials will get a pay raise from \$1 to \$1.25 an hour.

Voters in bond elections will be required to sign affidavits they own property and to identify the property.

Write-in votes will be outlawed in primaries except for party offices, like county chairman.

Only opposed candidates will have to file campaign expense statements.

Voters again must register between October 1 and January 31. All voters must sign up (including citizens over 60 in cities of less than 10,000 population.)

What Other Editors Say

Do inciters mean to help?

There are grave implications to the stepped up training of the National Guard in riot control techniques stressing the principles of war.

One is that violent upheavals in the large Negro neighborhoods, which some black power advocates have styled "the Negro rebellion," have reached such a scale that they must be treated as just that.

Most of the Negroes' grievances are justified. In an atmosphere of

peace, it would be possible to redress many of them, though probably not on the instant terms that many Negroes seem to demand. But no nation can allow its cities to be burned and looted, its law and order to be totally disrupted. The violence must be stopped.

The Guard's strategy will be to "meet force with force, but avoid bloodshed." Considering the type of force presented by the rioting mobs, however, the appli-

cation of greater force will in many instances result in inevitable bloodshed.

That raises a second implication. It is that the lives of many Negroes stand to be sacrificed in a cause that could be won—and was in the rapid process of being won—without such sacrifice. This justifies the question raised concerning the motives of those who are going about the country inciting Negro people to violence.

Since they obviously aren't helping the Negro, is it really their intent to do so? Or do they merely want to weaken the United States by creating internal disorder and wreck its prestige abroad by staging situations that could culminate in large scale bloodshed?

Miss Marcene Stephens, daughter of Mrs. Mildred Stephens, returned Saturday just in time to start school after a summer traveling and visiting.

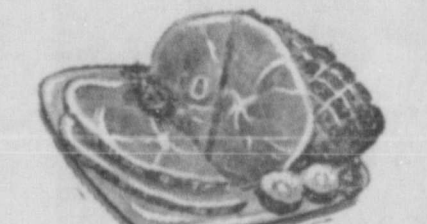
