Election Laws Changing!

Several major changes in Texas election laws enacted by the 60th legislature . . . some of them implementing Constitutional changes approved last November by Texas voters . . . are now in effect in the state, and voters should be getting familiar with them.

One big improvement, we think, is the provision of the law which will now make it possible for Texans to vote "for" a candidate instead of "against" his opponents . . . by placing an "x" or a check mark in a box opposite the name of the late of his choice instead of scratching off all but one

name among the cadnidates for each office. It's a small maiter, perhaps, but the "scratch" method has always seemed a back-handed method of choosing an office holder . . . sort of a "lesser of several evils" choice which

might be realistic but isn't good psychology. Other major changes in the election law, as listed by the

Secretary of State, include these: Counties may use electronic voting machines on approval

of the secretary of state.

Those who have not yet met state voting residence requirements may vote for president and vice-president. Those who have moved from county to county within six

months before an election can vote for statewide officials. Some city election dates will be changed from the first

Tuesday in April to the first Saturday in April. Election officials will get a pay raise from \$1 to \$1.25 an

Voters in bond elections will be required to sign affidavits

they own property and to identify the property Write-in votes will be outlawed in primaries except for party

offices, like county chairman

Only opposed candidates will have to file campaign ex-

pense statements. Voters again must register between October 1 and January 31. All voters must sign up (including citizens over 60 in cities of less than 10,000 population.)




