

Now is the time to spray your

Extensive tree banding in the past few weeks indicate pecan nut casebearer larvae are now emerging. Pecan trees should be sprayed in order to prevent the larvae from entering the nutlet, causing extensive nut loss.

The pecan nut casebearer is the number one pest of pecans in Texas, says Hooser, and thus becomes a determining factor in producing pecans, whether on a few trees or in large groves.

To effectively control the pecan nut casebearer, it is necessary to provide thorough insecticide coverage of the nutlet clusters during the period when the larvae are hatching. This will pre-

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
