### Hall County Industrial Foundation Negotiates Contract For New Industry

An agreement and contract has been negotiated with Montgomery Homes, Inc., and the Hall County Industrial Foundation to build and equip a mobile home manufacturing plant in Memphis.

This information was released Wednesday morning by John Fowler, president of the Hall County Industrial Foundation, and J. B. Scott, president of the Memphis Chamber of Commerce. It was announced that a few minor details were being worked out this week.

Remodeling has been done to the main building, which makes it more convenient for bathers to enter the pool area from the front. The sermon will be delivered by D. Gregg Whitacre, minister of the Church of Christ. His sermon topic will be "Love In".

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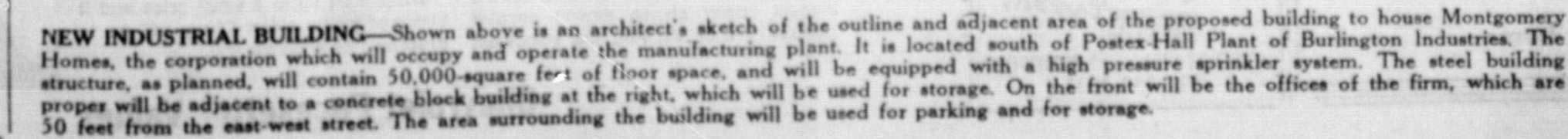
Twirling try-outs were held Thursday to name girls to serve as twirlers of the Memphis Cyclone Band during the 1969-70 school year.

It is located south of Postex-Hall Plant of Burlington Industries. The structure, as planned, will contain 50,000-square feet of floor space, and will be equipped with a high pressure sprinkler system. The steel building proper will be adjacent to a concrete block building at the right, which will be used for storage. On the front will be the offices of the firm, which are 50 feet from the east-west street. The area surrounding the building will be used for parking and for storage.

### Unearthly Tactics

On two recent Sundays, the fashionable Riverside Church in New York was invaded by James Forman, who claims leadership of the "National Black Economic Conference," and a small group of his followers.

In the first instance, Forman broke up the church services by taking over the altar area and reading a list of demands on the congregation. Among other things, he demanded of this church — and at other times others — \$500 million in "reparations" for Negroes who had been persecuted, exploited and killed.

Specifically he ordered the Riverside congregation to turn over 60 per cent of church income from investments, a proportion of all church assets, a rent-free office and free phones for his band of "militants," use of the church radio station and classrooms for Harlem residents.

A Negro member of the church asked this question: "Do these tactics open men's hearts or close men's hearts?" The answer is self-evident.

As Bayard Rustin, a veteran Negro civil rights leader, said in comment on the college students who accompany their "demands" with force:

"A multiple society cannot exist where an element in that society, out of its own sense of guilt and masochism, permits another segment of that society to hold guns at their heads in the name of justice."

The closed minds of the Formans and their ilk will never open either the minds or hearts of those he assaults.

Q. What vehicles are required to carry flares?

A. No person shall operate any motor truck, passenger bus, or truck - tractor upon any highway outside the city limits at night unless there shall be carried at least 3 flares, red electric lanterns, or three portable red reflector units capable of reflecting a red light clearly for a distance of 300 feet.

Q. What is the minimum amount of liability insurance required to satisfy the safety responsibility law?

A. \$10,000.00 each person, \$20,000.00 each accident and \$5,000.00 property damage each accident. This is commonly referred

Q. What is a provisional drivers license?

A. A provisional drivers license is any original license issued since Jan. 1, 1968 to anyone who is under 21 years of age. The license will be clearly marked across the front with the word provisional. The holder of the license, when convicted of two moving traffic violations within a 12 month period will be subject to a suspension.

## COUNTY AGENT SAYS YOUR

**Fertilizer Can Help Insure Pasture Crops**  
"Adequate fertilizer on pasture crops can help good production — whether wet or dry," County Agent W. B. Hooser says. Research has shown that pasture crops receiving amounts of fertility can produce a ton of forage on four inches of rainfall. In many areas of Texas, this means that five tons of forage per acre is possible and up to 10 or more tons in much of the high-rainfall areas, the county agent emphasized. Most soils in the pasture area of the state are low in nitrogen, phosphorus, sometimes potash and other nutrients, and Hooser adds, an adequate amount of fertilizer is needed to produce good tonages of good - quality hay in grazing crops. Hooser warns that plants which starve have a weak root system, and are unable to obtain nutrients from the soil. "Start with a soil test," is a rule to remember. Tests will help determine the amount of fertilizer needed throughout the season

to maintain high production of good quality grazing.

### CROP ROTATION IS BEST MEANS OF ROOT ROT CONTROL

"Cotton Root Rot is one of the most troublesome cotton diseases, but can be controlled to a large extent", says County Agent W. B. Hooser.

A combination approach of crop rotation and deep plowing is one of the most effective means of control. Rotating cotton with grain sorghum and small grains is effective since fibrous rooted plants are resistant to root rot. Also, their residue has an adverse effect on the root rot organism when turned under. The grain sorghum is harvested in plenty of time for planting the small grains.

"Chemical controls are now being tested. Fungicides, which are normally used for the treatment of nematodes, give some control, and fungicides can be applied as seed treatment, or in - furrow treatments. Nearly all chemical treatments are expensive and troublesome to apply but work is currently being done to simplify the application and to find more effective chemicals," Hooser said.

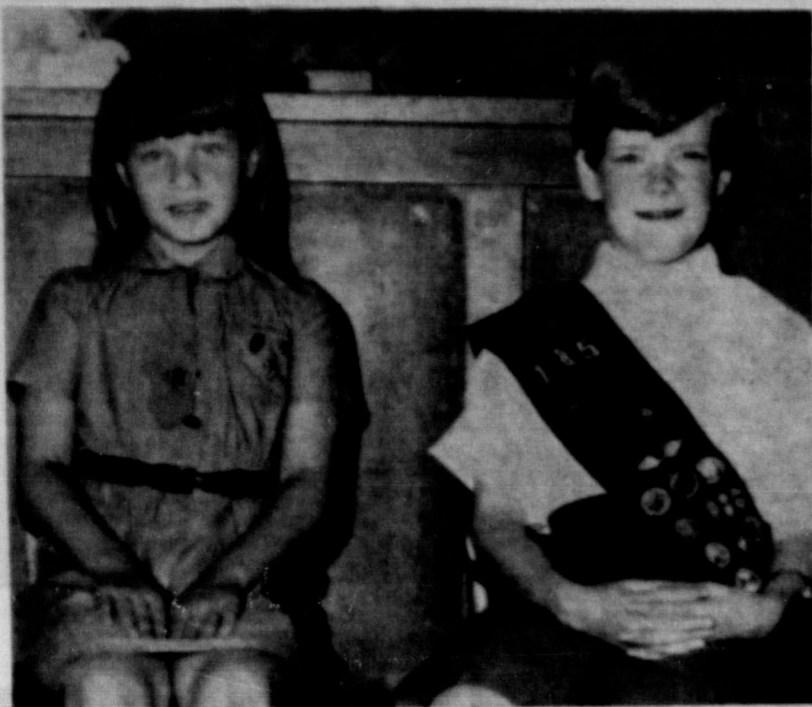

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 24, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 24. The Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall each receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed one-half the annual salary of the Governor..."

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (HJR7)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 64 to read as follows: "Section 64. All other provisions of the Constitution notwithstanding, bonds issued pursuant to constitutional authority shall bear such rates of interest as shall be prescribed by the issuing agency, subject to limitations as may be imposed by the legislature."

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 51-d, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 51-d. The Legislature shall have the power, by general law, to provide for the payment of assistance by the State of Texas to the surviving spouse and minor children of officers, employees, and agents, including members of organized volunteer fire departments and certain organized police reserve units with authority to make an arrest, of the state or of any city, county, district, or other political subdivision, who, because of the hazardous nature of their duties, suffer death in the course of the performance of those official duties. Should the Legislature enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature."

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (HJRs)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 5, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 5. The Legislature shall meet in regular session each year at such time as may be provided by law and at other times as convened by the Governor. When convened in odd-numbered years in regular session, the Legislature shall hold its first thirty days of the introduction of bills and resolutions, acting upon emergency appropriations, passing upon the confirmation of the recess appointees of the Governor and such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided that during the succeeding thirty days of such session the various committees of each House shall hold hearings to consider all bills and resolutions and other matters then pending; and such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor; provided further that during the following sixty days the Legislature shall act upon such bills and resolutions as may be then pending and upon such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor."

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (HJR50)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 50b-1 to read as follows: "Section 50b-1. (a) The Legislature may provide that the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, or its successor or successors, shall have authority to provide for, issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) in addition to those heretofore authorized to be issued pursuant to Section 50b of the Constitution. The bonds authorized herein shall be executed in such form, upon such terms and be in such denomination as may be prescribed by law and shall bear interest, and be issued in such installments as shall be prescribed by the Board provided that the maximum net effective interest rate to be borne by such bonds may be fixed by law." (b) The moneys received from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited to the credit of the Texas Opportunity Fund created by Section 50b of the Constitution and shall otherwise be handled as provided in Section 50b of the Constitution and the laws enacted pursuant thereto. (c) The said bonds shall be general obligations of the state and shall be payable in the manner and from the same sources as bonds heretofore authorized pursuant to Section 50b. (d) All bonds issued hereunder shall, after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under this Constitution. (e) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment such acts shall not be void because of their anticipatory nature. (f) The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on August 5, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to provide for annual legislative sessions."

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (SJR6)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 2, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 2. All occupation taxes shall be equal and uniform upon the same class of subjects within the limits of the authority levying the tax; but the legislature may, by general laws, exempt from taxation public property used for public purposes; all real and personal property owned by a nonprofit water supply corporation which is reasonably necessary for, and is used in the operation of the corporation in the acquisition, storage, transportation and sale of water as authorized as its sole legal purpose; actual places of (or) religious worship, also any property owned by a church or by a strictly religious society for the exclusive use as a dwelling place for the ministry of such church or religious society, and which yields no revenue whatever to

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (HJR9)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section 49-d-1 to read as follows: "Section 49-d-1. (a) In addition to Texas Water Development Bonds heretofore authorized to be issued by Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III of the Constitution, the Texas Water Development Board is hereby authorized to issue \$5,500,000,000 in aggregate principal amount of bonds. No part of such additional bonds shall be issued prior to approval thereof by the vote of two-thirds of the elected members of both houses of the Legislature. (b) The proceeds from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited in the Texas Water Development Fund. (c) The bonds herein authorized and all bonds authorized by such Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III shall bear such interest and mature as the Texas Water Development Board shall prescribe subject to the limitations as may be imposed by the Legislature. (d) The Texas Water Development Fund shall be used for the purposes heretofore permitted by and subject to the limitations in said Sections 49-c and 49-d and in addition thereto for the purposes of developing water resources and facilities for the State of Texas, both within the State and without the State. (e) The Texas Water Development Board may receive grants and, in addition, execute contracts with the United States or any of its agencies, other states of the United States, foreign governments and others, for the acquisition and development of such water resources and facilities for the State of Texas. Such contracts when executed may be secured by such bonds, but such contracts shall not constitute general obligations of the State of Texas in the same manner and with the same effect as Texas Water Development Bonds. If facilities are acquired for a term of years, such contracts shall contain provisions for renewal that will protect the state's investment. The aggregate principal amount of Texas Water Development Bonds authorized herein and in said Section 49-d shall be reduced by the aggregate of principal payments committed under such contracts constituting general obligations of the state. The provisions hereof shall not be construed to limit the authority of the Texas State for these purposes, then and in that event the Legislature is specifically authorized to prescribe such limitations and restrictions and enact such laws as may be necessary in order that such federal matching money will be available for assistance and/or medical care for or on behalf of needy persons. (f) Nothing in this Section shall be construed to amend, modify or repeal Section 31 of Article XVI of this Constitution; provided further, however, that such medical care services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of those human eye, and fitting of prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision. Nothing herein shall be construed to permit any person or to administer or to prescribe any drug or physical treatment whatsoever, unless such optometrist is a regularly licensed physician or surgeon under the laws of this state. (g) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory character. Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on Tuesday, August 5, 1969, at which election all ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment broadening the powers of the Texas Water Development Board and the purposes of the Texas Water Development Fund; eliminating the interest limitations on Texas Water Development Bonds; raising the authorized amount of Texas Water Development Bonds by \$5,500,000,000; extending the maturity schedule of Texas Water Development Bonds; eliminating the procedures for curtailment and the curtailment date of financial assistance to be provided by the Texas Water Development Board."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (SJR8)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 51-a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows: "Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by general laws, to provide, subject to limitations herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be deemed expedient, for assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws as they now read or as they may hereafter be amended, providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, to accept and expend funds from the Government of the United States for such purposes in accordance with the laws of the United States as they now are or as they may hereafter be amended, and to make appropriations out of state funds for such purposes; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to or on behalf of any needy person shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; provided that the total amount of such assistance payments only out of state funds on behalf of such individuals shall not exceed the amount of Eighty Million Dollars (\$80,000,000) during any fiscal year. (2) Supplementing legislative appropriations for assistance payments authorized by this Section, the following sums are allocated out of the Omnibus Tax Clearance Fund and are appropriated to the State Department of Public Welfare for the period beginning September 1, 1969 and ending August 31, 1971: Three Million, Six Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$3,600,000) for Old Age Assistance, Two Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000) for Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled, and Twenty-Three Million, Nine Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$23,900,000) for Aid to Families with Dependent Children. Such allocations and appropriations shall be made available on the basis of equal monthly installments and otherwise shall be subject to the provisions of currently existing laws making allocations and appropriations for these purposes. (3) Provided further, that if the limitations and restrictions herein contained are found to be in conflict with the provisions of appropriate federal statutes, as they now are or as they may hereafter be amended, to the extent that federal matching money is not available to

## YOUR COUNTY AGENT SAYS

**PECAN TREES SHOULD BE SPRAYED NOW FOR PECAN CASEBEARER**

Now is the time to spray your trees for the pecan nut casebearer, says County Agent W. B. Hooser.

Extensive tree banding in the past few weeks indicate pecan nut casebearer larvae are now emerging. Pecan trees should be sprayed in order to prevent the larvae from entering the nutlet, causing extensive nut loss.

The pecan nut casebearer is the number one pest of pecans in Texas, says Hooser, and thus becomes a determining factor in producing pecans, whether on a few trees or in large groves.

To effectively control the pecan nut casebearer, it is necessary to provide thorough insecticide coverage of the nutlet clusters during the period when the larvae are hatching. This will prevent nutlet damage and poor pecan production.

The first generation larvae of the pecan nut casebearer feed on

and cause the shedding of the small nutlets about the time of pollination. A single larvae frequently destroys all the nutlets in a single cluster.

Timing the insecticide application has always been the key to effective control. The greenish-white eggs are laid on the nutlet tips. Eggs assume a reddish appearance in two to three days and hatch in 4 to 5 days. The young larvae feed on buds for 24-48 hours before entering the leveling nutlets. To be effective, recommended insecticides must be applied before the larvae enter the nutlets. Timing insecticide applications has been based on finding eggs on the nutlet tips.
