## Memphis Athletes To Report Mon.

Football workouts for the 1969 Memphis Cyclone football season will begin at 9 a. m. Monday, Aug. 18, as Head Coach Bert Glascock and his four assistants meet with the boys for the first time.

The boys will be meeting a new assistant football coach in Harold Gouge, when they report Monday morning. At this meeting, the team will vote on what time to hold two-a-day workout sessions, Coach Glascock said.

Coach Gouge has had 10 years coaching experience since he graduated from West Texas State University in 1958. He played football for the Buffaloes from 1954 to 1957. He played his high school football at Borger High.

The new Asst. Coach has coached at Shamrock, Littlefield, Clarendon, Crane and Santa Anna.

Rounding out the coaching staff is Asst. Coach George Langley, who begins his second year on the Cyclone coaching staff, Asst.

Coach and Head Basketball Coach Denzil Lacy, who is beginning his third year here, and Asst. Coach and Head Jr. High Coach George Berry who has been with the Memphis Schools for a number of years.

These five coaches spent most of last week at the Texas High School Coaches Assn. Coaching School in Dallas, Aug. 3-7.

In an interview this week, Coach Glascock said the members of this year's team would begin picking up their shoes Wednesday. The Cyclone will have two returning starters and 11 returning lettermen, the coach said.

The team will have two-a-day workouts until school begins and two practice scrimmage games are being planned, the coach said. He said plans now call for scrimmages with the same two teams as last year, Spearman and Stinnett.

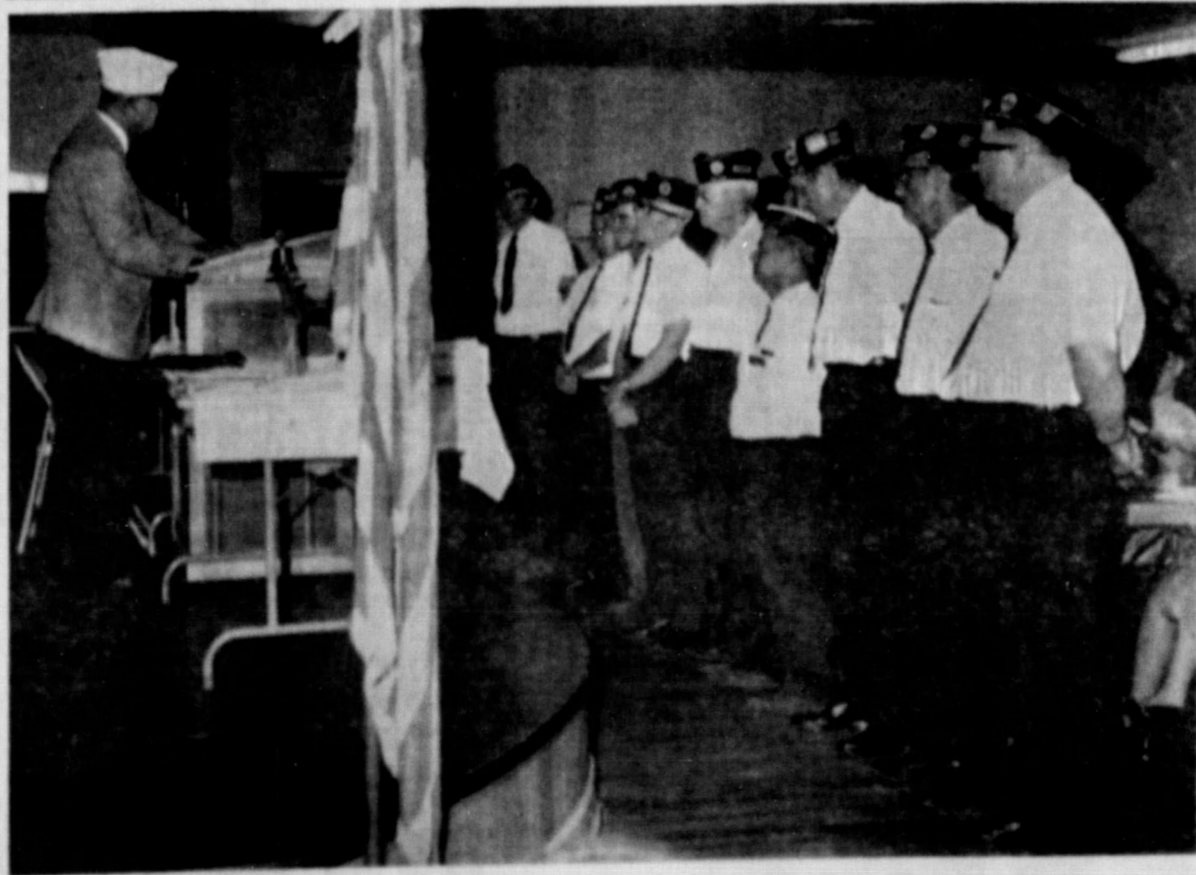

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## EDITORIAL

### Changes In Texas Traffic Laws!

This newspaper has devoted more editorial space to the problem of safety on our roads and highways than any other issue in the public realm. It appears that the problem of traffic accidents is still growing despite efforts of news media and law makers, law enforcement personnel, safety organizations and insurance companies, and all defensive drivers to put the brakes on this public menace.

No one will argue that something has needed to be done for a long, long time to make our highways safer. Well, this year, the Texas Legislature has taken action to pass new laws governing certain aspects of the motor vehicle law. These changes in the State's traffic law will become effective Monday, September 1, which is Labor Day, so it behooves Texas drivers to pay close attention.

If our readers will watch the inside columns of this newspaper for the next few weeks, we are publishing a five-part series explaining the different changes in the Texas traffic laws. These articles were written by members of the Texas Department of Public Safety and are most informative, dealing with specifics.

In general, the measures range from one establishing new motor vehicle inspection procedures to allowing the owner of a parking lot to remove cars parked on the lot without consent. The most important is the new "implied consent" law covering breath testing of drivers. Under the terms of this law, a motorist is "deemed to have given consent" to a breath test if arrested for any alleged offense arising out of his actual operation or physical control of a motor vehicle while under the influence of intoxicating liquor. Refusal to take the breath test may lead to suspension of the suspect's drivers license for up to one year.

Another new law is the right-of-way statute which sets out four rules governing the right-of-way at intersections. All drivers are urged to review the rules closely, and note the instances in which they must stop, yield and grant the right-of-way. Drivers at intersections controlled by stop, yield or traffic control devices must obey the signs. Drivers of vehicles on a single lane street or roadway consisting of two traffic lanes, upon approaching an intersection not controlled by signs of a divided street or a street or roadway divided into three or more marked lanes, must stop, yield and grant the privilege of right-of-way to vehicles on the larger street.

Drivers of vehicles on unpaved streets intersecting a roadway that is paved must stop, yield and grant the right-of-way to vehicles on the paved street. Drivers of vehicles on streets of equal size and size and paving must stop, yield and grant the privilege of immediate use of such intersection to any other vehicle which has entered the intersection from such driver's right, or is approaching such intersection from the driver's right in such proximity as to constitute a hazard.

Slow-moving drivers who drive on the inside lanes of divided highways may find themselves in trouble after September 1. The new state law requires that vehicles traveling at less than the normal speed of traffic be driven in the right-hand lane, or as close as practicable to the right-hand curb or edge of the roadway, except when passing.

Still another new law provides for the adoption of a "slow-moving vehicle emblem" for display on certain types of vehicles. The measure requires that all machinery, tractors, or other vehicles which operate at a maximum speed of 25 miles per hour or less must display a triangular emblem approved by the DPS on the rear of the vehicle. Operators will have until Jan. 1, 1970 to obtain emblems approved by the DPS and mount them as prescribed by law.

The most sweeping changes ever to be made in the State's Motor Vehicle Inspection Act will become effective September 1, according to Col. W. E. Speir, director, Texas DPS. The amended act will place Texas on a 12 month inspection period. This new law also requires the study of motorists because the new law specifies that all vehicles subject to inspection must be taken to an approved motor vehicle inspection station between Sept. 1, 1969, and April 15, 1970. Upon satisfactory completion of the inspection procedure, the mechanic-inspector will remove the old sticker and affix the new one.



The new sticker will expire 12 months from the date of inspection, and will contain a large number tab showing the month of expiration.

It appears that the stiffest part of the new traffic law is the "Implied Consent Law". The Department of Public Safety plans to conduct schools to train city and county officers in the operation of the Breathalyzer, and currently has Breathalyzer instruments located at central points in 90 Texas counties. As quickly as possible the DPS plans to have units in each county in the State.

While the law, like all others, is dependent for its effectiveness on enforcement, it does remove one of the major obstacles which has hampered conscientious officers in their campaign against drunk driving... the difficulty of establishing proof when the suspect is cautious enough to refuse voluntary tests.

There is some urgency in the campaign. Drinking drivers figure in 40 to 50 per cent of the fatal road accidents in Texas last year and accounted for 3,481 deaths.

#### High Interest

Raising the prime interest rate four times in four months provides some sort of evidence that the surtax has failed to stem inflation, if anyone had any doubt, after a recent trip to the grocery store.

With the prime rate now pegged at 8.5 per cent, the highest in history, a suspicion is beginning to jell that perhaps the old dogma about how to control a complicated economy no longer apply.

Tight money and high interest make it difficult for a businessman to expand, for a manufacturer to grow, but those who want to borrow seem to be willing to pay more interest, anyway.

Tight money and a high interest rate is holding up the develop-

ment of two more cattle feedlots in the Perryton area, a development which not only calls for a substantial amount of money to build facilities, but a ton of money in working capital to operate

a business venture this size.

Tight money and high interest rates no doubt have caused people in Perryton to postpone or cancel plans for building a new house right now. The same basic cause is probably cutting down on some plans for new business or expansion.

But across the country, people seem to be taking the rise in interest rates in stride and are not even concerned with Rep. Wright Patman of Texas when he charges that the policy of boosting interest merely builds in a guaranteed profit for banks and lending institutions.

It appears that the nation has become so accustomed to credit buying that the interest rate is not seriously considered.

The question still is: "How much down and how much a month?" Not, "what is the interest rate on the loan?"

A total of 29 boys have been working out for football this morning and evening this week under the leadership of Coach Howle, new Memphis head coach.

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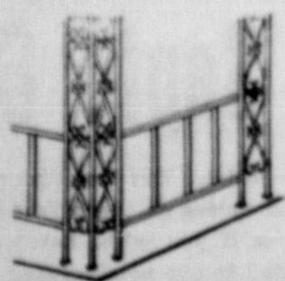

# Implied Consent Law' For Taking Alcohol Breath Test Is Explained

**Part 2 of 5 Parts**  
**AUSTIN** — Colonel Wilson E. Austin, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said today that the State's new implied consent law which becomes effective September 1, 1969, gives enforcement a much needed tool to combat drunk driving. The law, which may run for as much as one year, is subject to appeal to a higher court.

The implied consent law allows the person detained the right to have a test of his blood alcohol taken by his own physician, qualified technician chemist or registered professional nurse, if taken within two hours after his arrest.

The law also places the responsibility with the Texas Department of Public Safety to certify breath testing equipment and persons authorized to administer breath tests.

Consistent with its policy of assisting local authorities whenever possible, the DPS will offer at least three schools to train city and county officers in operation of the Breathalyzer. These schools, which will be conducted at the Law Enforcement Academy in Austin, will be limited in enrollment to key personnel from localities which now possess, or plan to obtain, breath testing instruments.

Currently, the DPS is utilizing breath testing equipment in a voluntary program. The Breathalyzer instruments are located at central points in some 90 counties, and are operated by DPS officers who have completed an intensive training course. The instruments are checked and serviced weekly by qualified DPS chemists.

"With the advent of the new law, we hope to obtain at least one breath testing instrument for each county, and plan to train additional personnel in their operation," Speir noted.

Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said today that effective September 1, laws passed by the Texas Legislature will establish new rules of right-of-way and new rules for following too closely.

The right-of-way law sets out four rules governing the right-of-way at intersections. Speir urged all drivers to review the rules closely, and note the instances in which they must stop, yield and grant the right-of-way.

Drivers at intersections controlled by stop, yield or traffic control devices must obey the signs.

Drivers of vehicles on a single lane street or roadway consisting of two traffic lanes, upon approaching an intersection not controlled by signs of a divided street or a street or roadway divided into three or more marked lanes, must stop, yield and grant the privilege of right-of-way to vehicles on the larger street.

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Drivers of vehicles on streets of equal size and paving must stop, yield and grant the privilege of immediate use of such intersection to any other vehicle which has entered the intersection from such driver's right, or is approaching such intersection from the driver's right in such proximity as to constitute a hazard.

# Burlington Gives \$1.5 Million To Education Aids

Educational grants totaling a record \$1.5 million were awarded during the 1968-69 school year by the Aid To Education program administered by the Burlington Industries Foundation.

Among the recipients were 500 colleges, universities, secondary and preparatory schools in 36 states. More than 400 children of Burlington employees shared in the Company's educational loan program.

According to W. S. Markham, Jr., executive director, the Burlington Foundation has channeled more than \$5 million into education from a total of over \$8 million given educational, health, recreational, cultural and social causes since 1964. Most of the donations center in the 92 communities in 15 states where Burlington operates manufacturing plants.

The Company's Aid To Education program is designed to help individuals and institutions and to encourage contributions from Company employees. For example, last year the Foundation matched \$118,000 in employee gifts to 249 educational institutions.

In the past school year, 50 students selected by 18 educational institutions were recipients of Burlington - sponsored scholarship and fellowship awards totaling \$31,000.

Burlington also makes grants annually to various state and national associations promoting higher education. The largest such grant in the 1968-69 school year was \$50,000 to the United Negro College Fund.

The following too closely law, as amended, will require drivers to maintain an assured clear distance between the vehicle ahead, exercising due regard for the speed of the vehicles and the traffic upon and conditions of the street or highway. Drivers must be able to bring their vehicles to a stop, using these guidelines, without colliding with the preceding vehicle, or veering into other vehicles, objects or persons on or near the street or highway.

# Jack Boney, Jr. Is Member Of Charolais Assn.

Jack Boney, Jr. of Estelline has been accepted for membership in the American - International Charolais Assn., Houston, Texas, the nation's fourth largest and fastest growing beef breed, J. Scott Henderson, executive secretary, announced last week.

Originated in France more than 200 years ago, Charolais has become well established in this country because of the breed's greater weight-for-age, greater feeding efficiency and improved carcass values that produce a greater ratio of quality lean meat to fat than other breeds, Henderson said.

Registrations of purebred Charolais during the past year totalled 22,191 animals, a 39 per cent above year earlier figures. Transfers of cattle also rose 89 per cent as more and more new breeders enter the production picture. Membership increased to 7,872 members, a 38 per cent over new members the previous year.

Activities by junior breeders also showed a sharp increase during 1968, with 380 new members, 40 per cent more than the number of new junior breeders added to the roster a year earlier.

There are now approximately 82,091 purebred and 231,094 recorded animals in the Association's herd book and appendix, for a national herd of 313,185 animals.

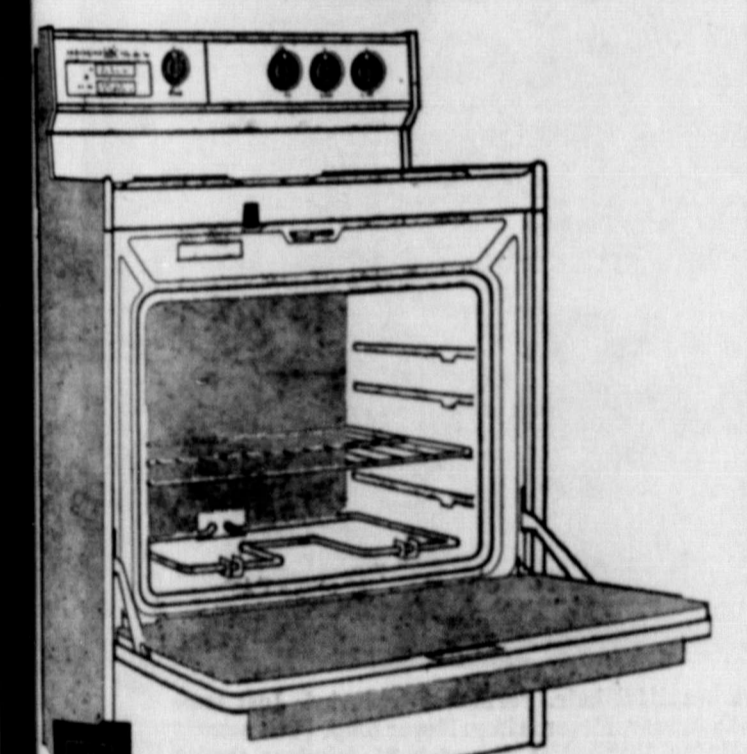

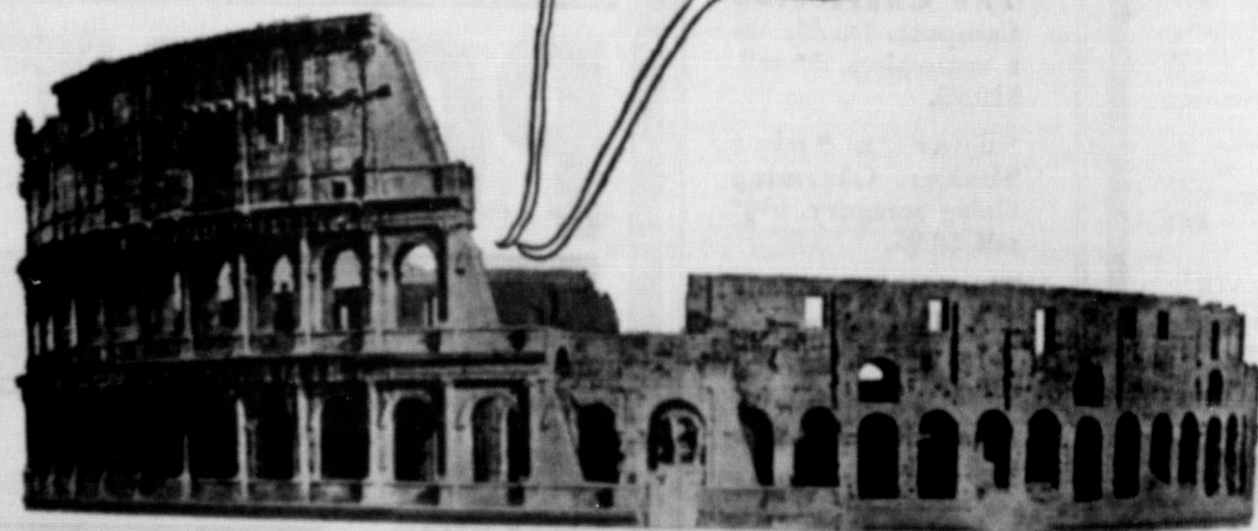

Shankle was a cotton buyer here when the farmers hauled the cotton on the square and the buyers sampled it and bid on each bale separate as to strength and quality.

The above contributions make all eighteen towns outside of Hall County to date that have a part in Heritage Hall.

The Hall County Picnic is the third Sunday in Sept. and hope these out of county donors can be here and see what they have helped establish. I believe they would approve of their investment. We still need about 100 more discarded glass show cases to balance it out.

Another old-timer, we would call him, made the rounds in Heritage Hall last week, Milton Orr, longtime resident of Lodge and Plaska. I believe Milton said he arrived in Hall County in 1901 and he was three years old. We can guess his age.) Milton is a lot of farming through the years and took a lot out of the

soil and re-invested a lot of it in humanity in helping others besides his own family in making Hall County a better place in which to live.

Reed Orr studied for dentistry and Dr. Reed Orr maintained an office in Wellington until a few years ago and his nephew took over with him, Milton said.

The Orr boys have one sister living here now, Mrs. A. Giddon. She says there are only two more living here that graduated in her class. Milton Orr can tell you about a good badger fight they had in the early days on the northeast corner of the courthouse square.

Had a letter a few days ago from Mrs. E. A. Pressley (the lady who made her wedding dress 60 years ago). Mrs. Pressley will be 87 her next birthday. Her husband, J. A., died six years ago at age 86, and son Bob who was a rancher near Abilene died three years ago.
