### What Does The Future Hold!

The 79th birthday celebration of Hall County has passed, and we feel all those who worked on the different aspects of the celebration deserve a pat on the back. The activities Saturday were most entertaining and the food at the picnic Sunday was delicious. Many stood in rain to fill their plates, but some others let the rain interfere with plans to attend the picnic. -Isiah 55:3




If we are promised "sure mercy", does this mean that anything we do shall be forgiven? Or, is "sure mercy" instead mercy that is tempered with justice?

Many of us are inclined to anticipate forgiveness. This is wrong. We belittle the consequences of a wrong deed when we assume that we need only ask to be forgiven.

In the courts of law, we find mercy. If circumstances warrant, charges are sometimes filed away; leniency is evident in the sentence passed upon a first offender. And yet, the courts insist that justice be done, that justice will be served.

We should not attempt to determine the real meaning of "sure mercy." What we should remember always is that God is merciful; that God is just; and that a sure judgement awaits every man.


