

1989 DISASTER PROGRAM

Congress has passed and the President has signed the Disaster Assistance Act of 1989 which provides a disaster payment for failed crops for the 1989 disaster payments shall be eligible for 1989 disaster payments. To qualify for the 1989 disaster payments a producer must have suffered: a 35% loss if they had crop insurance for 1989 on participating program crops, 40% loss on participating program crops without crop insurance for 1989; and a 50% loss for nonparticipation program crops and nonprogram crops.

Signup for the 1989 Disaster Program began September 15 and will end April 2, 1990. The 1989 disaster payments shall be issued in CCC-6 certificates, if the amount is \$200 or more. Payments shall be made as soon as producers provide all the necessary information which includes:

- A. ASCS -578, Report of Acreage This establishes the planted, prevented, and failed acreage of the crop for 1989.
- B. ASCS -574, Application for Disaster Credit - This establishes the basis for considering the crop loss to have been caused by an eligible disaster condition
- C. ASCS-658, Record of Production and Yield-If there was production harvested on the farm, this form documents the quantity.
- D. CCC-441, Application for 1989 Disaster Benefits-This is the basic application on which you certify your compliance with program provisions and agree to the division of disaster benefits with other producers on the farm.
- E. CCC-440, Certification for Crop Insurance-If crop insurance was available for the crop for 1989 this certification of crop insurance coverage and indemnity is needed so that we can determine the applicable disaster loss and payment.
- F. AD-1026, Highly Erodible Land Certification-This is your certification of compliance with the lag ghich prohibits payment of benefits to a producer who "sodbusts".

DISASTER AFFECTED CROPS

Please remember that you must report all failed acreage to this office and we must make a field visit before you destroy or make other use of the crop. History and payment benefits can be lost on acreages that are destroyed before they are certified and/or failed.

HIGHLY ERODIBLE LAND (HEL)

All producers who wish to participate in the 1990 farm programs must have on file, by the end of this year (Dec. 31, 1989), a conservation plan on all HEL for which they have a farming interest. It will be the responsibility of each producer to furnish this office with a conserva-

tion plan at the time of sign-up. It is also the responsibility of each producer to make sure that every farm which he operates, that has HEL, has a conservation plan on file with SCS by the end of this calendar year.

MEASURING SERVICE

The county has completed flying and measuring services are being completed as soon as possible. If you plan to begin harvest please notify us in time for the measurement service to be completed timely.

If you are required to make adjustments remember the 5 day limit. Also remember the tolerance is only on the adjusted acreage when adjustments are required.



bizarre looking who strut to birds show off and will eat anything in sight quickly becoming a popular alternative crop for Texas farmers and ranchers. Partners Haney and Pat Carlton, farming outside Angelton, expect hatch between 100 and 150 eggs this season, and Haney says the birds have steadily risen value.

"When started years ago, you could buy chick a \$500 for to \$700, and that was at eight weeks old," Haney "Now, you can chick eight weeks old for somewhere the neighborhood of \$3,000 apiece. Normally, a breeding start laying at about two years old. They'll lay about 30 eggs; three years old, about 40; and on up until they're about 10 years old. That's when they peak out, and some of them peak out at 100 eggs."



Haney noted that the ostrich market is primarily a breeder's market, but added is not difficult "You break into. can buy chicks eight weeks old start from there, and you can buy a dozen and leave them in pen for a good while. they get older, need you to branch out into pens," more he said.

Birds imported from Africa recently were infested ticks carrying various diseases. Texas-born usually birds don't have ticks. making these birds more attractive to buyers. Ostriches are strange and funny looking birds, which will likely Texas keep breeders laughing all the way to the bank for years
