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EDITORIAL

The Great Silent Majority!

President Richard Nixon's appeal to the Great Silent Majority of Americans to rise up in defense of his stand in Viet Nam and other actions is typical of what is being given today instead of concrete action promised to the American voters over a year ago.

It appeared to us last year before the November election that if LBJ could have ended the Viet Nam conflict then the Democratic party would have won the election. The mood of the American people at that time was "this conflict has gone on long enough, let's get it settled, one way or another." Many voters turned to the Republican candidates because these candidates were promising to end the Viet Nam conflict or at least reduce our involvement in it.

The great Silent Majority, if in reality there really is such a thing, is known for dragging its feet on everything. This group doesn't go to the polls to vote, doesn't engage in public activities, doesn't care enough about anything to ever make their concerns heard in this land. It's the 50 per cent of voters who don't go to the polls at election time... its complacency is only shattered by truly great things like great depressions, major wars, and truly national calamities.

The trouble with the "silent majority" is that its made up largely of citizens who don't care about anything that happens in public affairs as long as it doesn't affect them directly, or adversely, or too stringently.

Now, the Viet Nam war effort is effecting every American, one way or another. It is directly causing the inflationary spiral which is causing prices to soar, the American dollar to shrink in value, taxation to be higher than ever, and some economists to tell us that a recession is coming.

The Viet Nam conflict is even eating at the roots of American morality, the consciences of the American soldier, and giving those enemies of Democracy and the Free Society of the United States of America ammunition for their propoganda guns.

We feel the vast majority of the American people are in favor of this country serving in the role of world policeman, defending the rights of small countries against those larger aggressors who would "conquer the world". Also, we feel that our nation cannot effectively serve in the policing role without taking the necessary action whenever aggressors move to enlarge their own boundaries.

What the American people want is a "live and let live" agreement, making peace which will serve the best interests of all concerned. That's what President Nixon wants to do.

North Viet Nam and South Viet Nam are both enjoying the attention of the world's three largest powers, China, Russia, and the United States. Unless these three world powers agree on a peace settlement, then none will occur and the Viet Nam conflict will continue on and on, unless one side or the other stops supporting the effort.

We enjoy our freedom in America because our citizens have been ready to pay the price for this freedom. The price has been high at times, in lives, wealth, prestige, and time. The real heroes are our servicemen who are risking their lives each day serving as policemen in far off lands. These men are paying the price in 1969 for freedom won in the late 1770's.

Accepting the terms offered by North Viet Nam and the Viet Cong would be like surrendering, ignoring our responsibility of denying aggressors the spoils of war, as we did in Korea in the 1950's.

The little country of South Viet Nam is not the spoils in this conflict. The spoils are S. Vietnam, Laos, Cambodia and Thailand.

President Nixon introduced this issue into the political race before he was elected. He has had the ball now for 11 months and so far he hasn't gotten to the line of scrimmage. When he starts running with the ball and forgets about playing politics and pleasing the silent majority which he calls the great silent majority, then maybe we'll see something done. As far as Viet Nam is concerned, we've had a 11-month drought.

Wall Street versus Main Street
Rep. Carl Albert, Democrat, of Oklahoma, warned in a major speech the other night that the Nixon Administration is leading America into an economic recession just as previous Republicans have done.

And, Congressman Albert, the House of Representative majority leader, emphasizes, "It's the same old dog fight: Wall Street versus Main Street."

The Oklahoma lawmaker, in a speech before some 450 top-ranking Democrats in Welch, Va., took out after GOP stands on education, tax reform, medicare and coal mine safety.

Particularly on the subject of the GOP's alleged tax reform stand was Albert vehement. He said Nixon asked Congress for a strong tax reform measure, one that would aid the "silent American," but when the measure came up for Congressional consideration "his Wall Street supporters were heard from and we were told 'No.'"

The resulting bill, Albert pointed out, "helped the poor down-trodden corporations of America and cut the tax break for the middle income family. This is typical Republicanism," he concluded.

Carl Albert said unification of the Democratic Party is the way to avoid economic disaster.

Young fellows nowadays have heard war stories covering three generations and yet there seems to be no waning of interest. A veteran of a war, any war, just naturally likes to get to telling about it after it is all over. Those who have never had that experience missed something.

However, it comes as a sort of shock to realize that the World War I veteran, the man of the trench warfare in France, now averages 74.7 years of age and thus his stories have to be told to grandchildren.

There are some 6,000 Spanish American War veterans still around, with tales of what is actually an obscure war.

To the vast majority of Americans these wars are ancient history. But to many millions World War II and the Korean Conflict seem like they happened just yesterday.

It may come as a bit of a shock then to realize that the average age of the 14.6 million World

War II veterans is rapidly approaching 50, it's 49.7 to be exact. And the 5.8 million who saw service during the Korean war have now passed the magic age of 40.

When we were a kid we listened to our dad and his buddies talk over tales of World War I. At the time this seemed like ancient history even the war was at that time only about 10 years or so behind us.

No wonder the kids today think that World War II is ancient with its 25 years behind us!

They say that time marches on, but the step gets less quick and more ragged.

The fellow who tries to impress the sweet young thing with his tales of wartime exploit had better think twice.
In telling these stories, he'll be giving away his age.

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Great Plains Conservation Program Extended For Another 10 Years

President Nixon has signed into law a 10-year extension of the Great Plains Conservation Program, according to E. Wayne Chapman, area conservationist of the Soil Conservation Service.

Chapman states that the extension of the program in this area exceeds the funds allotted. The year's funds released on the program have already been obligated for all but Hardeman and Cottle counties in this 10-year area. About 450 contracts for 600,000 acres are in effect and 550 have already completed their GP contracts, Chapman said.

Those wishing to use this program to apply their conservation should make application at the Soil Conservation Service office now, Chapman said. They will work up their plans and be ready to sign contracts when they become available which will be around July 1, 1970.

The new legislation, clearly the responsibility of Soil Conservation Districts, authorized an additional \$150 million for the extension of the program from Dec. 31, 1961, to Dec. 31, 1981.

The Great Plains Conservation Program is now in use in 424 counties of the 10 Great Plains States—Colorado, Kansas, Montana, Nebraska, New Mexico, Oklahoma, North Dakota, South Dakota, Texas and Wyoming. In its recent summary, the Soil Conservation Service reported that 24,662 farmers and ranchers entered the program since it was started in 1957. Their landings cover 62,240,420 Plains acres. Cost-share obligations total \$121,696,629, with about \$30 million of this still to be paid as they proceed with work. Seedling suitable cropland back to permanent vegetation is the lead-

ing practice—nearly two million acres representing over one-fifth of the cropland is involved.

Over 5,800 farmers and ranchers in the 424 designated counties have applications on file awaiting action.

Extension of this program is another milestone in the renovation and conservation of lands in this region which are highly susceptible to erosion damage.

Bob McMurry Is V. Pres.-Cashier Of Amarillo FNB

Bob McMurry, vice president of First National Bank of Amarillo has been promoted to vice president and cashier, according to Gene Edwards, president of the bank last week.

McMurry is the son of Judge and Mrs. E. (Gip) McMurry of Memphis.

McMurry was formerly affiliated with the First National Bank of Memphis before going to Amarillo in October 1952 to work for the FNB of Amarillo.

He was elected assistant cashier in 1956 and became vice president in December 1964. As vice president and cashier he will assume duties of chief operations officer.

W. B. Lawrence, formerly the vice president and cashier at the bank, has been promoted to the office of executive vice president. He had held the previous position since Jan. 1962. Lawrence has been affiliated with the Amarillo bank since August 1928.

One of the biggest armies of hunters in Texas history — some 700,000 — will be in the field this year, and safety should accompany them.

The gun-toting brigade will be in search of game ranging from mourning doves to javelinas on a battleground stretching throughout the length and breadth of Texas.

Many of these hunters won't return from the hunt — victims of their own mistakes or the mistakes of other trigger-happy hunters. Many will die of heart attacks, brought on by strenuous exercise to which their bodies have become unaccustomed during the past year of inactivity. Thousands will come home with head colds and flu, the result of a variety of conditions including wind, rain and cold weather and over-exposure to the elements.

Thousands of hunters will get away with mistakes, but about a hundred a year don't survive these mental errors.

For example, who would ever climb an unfamiliar tree in the dark, carrying a loaded gun — except on the first morning of deer season?

Or, who would ever snake his

waythrough a barbed wire fence, waggling a loaded rifle behind him — except during deer season?

Who would ever put a loaded gun in the hands of an untrained teenager, admonish him to be careful and turn him loose in the woods — except during deer season?

When would you ever choose a loaded rifle or shotgun for a companion around the campfire or over a hot cup of coffee — except during deer season?

And, who would put a loaded weapon into a car filled with others — except some careless hunter during a hunt?

Planning preparedness and thoughtfulness would eliminate many unnecessary hunting fatalities. Unloading your rifle before you climb up or down a tree takes

only a few seconds, so why waggling a few seconds against your life?

It's playing with pretty high stakes when you carry a loaded weapon through a fence instead of first putting it through the fence — and laying it on the ground — before you go through or over the fence. Never lean a gun against a fence; it might fall and discharge.

Never point a gun at anyone — even if you know it's unloaded. You might forget another time. And when you shoot, be sure of your target. If a youngster wants to hunt, prepare him before you take him out. When you take that coffee break or a meal, unload your gun. A loaded gun is a dangerous companion.

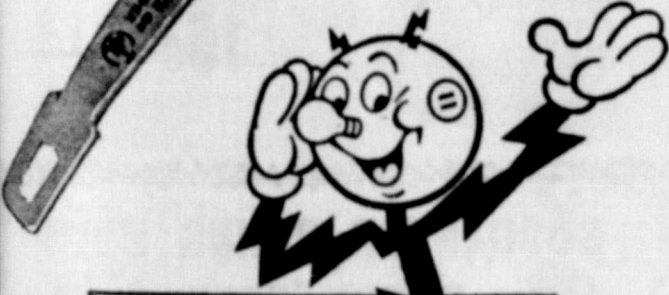

Also said Heritage Hall was something to be proud of and reminded him of the one in Riverside, Calif., except not quite as large. Coz Roberts was commander of the CCC camp here in 1937, and while here met his wife Margaret Garrett Morgan.

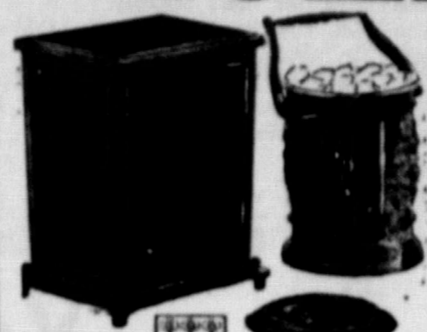

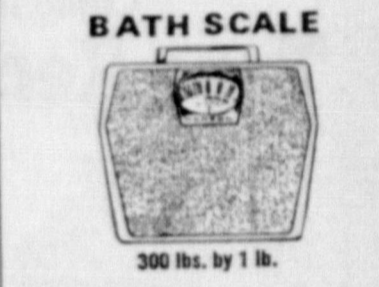
