"Do not mail back to Austin your License Plate Renewal Application Form, which you have received from the Texas Highway Department," Melissa Anderson, Hall County tax assessor-collector, stated this week. "Bring it to our office in the courthouse, and we will process it for you."

Feb. 1, 1970, is the first date to register vehicles, she stated. This comment was made after Mrs. Anderson received the following publicity release from the Texas Highway Department:

"Easy-to-follow instructions are printed on the three-part form." That must be a mistake—because a lot of motorists haven't been following instructions. And mistakes generate confusion.

This is the first year that the Department has gone to the new system, which includes an order-by-mail program for obtaining 1970 motor vehicle license plates.

But just to make sure that motorists do understand the easy-to-follow instructions, they are:

1. Each motorist whose vehicle was registered last year has or will receive in the mail a long, narrow envelope with a printed message on the front reading: "Important—This is your License Plate Renewal Application."

2. The envelope will contain a three part form. Do not separate the three parts.

3. You may renew your motor vehicle license registration during January and February by mailing the three-part form (intact) and your check to your county tax collector. Add \$1.00 for postage and handling charges for each vehicle. License plates will be mailed Feb. 1 and thereafter.

February 1, 1970, is the first date for registration, Mrs. Anderson pointed out.

The release continued with: 4. You may renew your motor vehicle license registration during February and March by taking the three-part form (intact) and your check to the tax collector's office or substitution.

That's it! Now see if you are one of the seven million-plus Texas motorists who can follow those easy-to-follow instructions.

voluntary diversion of feed grain acres. The maximum payment

will be: for corn, 60 cents per bushel; for grain sorghum, 55 cents per bushel (not hundred-weight); for barley, 45 cents per bushel.

2. Price-support loans and payments—

National average price-support loan rates on all feed grains will be the same as in 1969. However, corn loan rates, while unchanged, will be at \$1.08 per bushel, "No. 2" basis—which is equal to the 1969 level of \$1.05 for average quality.

The National loan average loan levels of the other feed grains will be: grain sorghum, \$1.61 per hundredweight; barley, 83 cents per bushel; oats, 63 cents per bushel; rye, \$1.02 per bushel. (Price-support required by law for oats and rye, but there are no provisions for acreage limitations.)

Price-support payment rates will be: corn, 30 cents per bushel; grain sorghum, 53 cents per hundredweight; barley, 20 cents per bushel. Price-support payment for a farm is arrived at by multiplying the per bushel price-support payment times the farm's projected yield times the smaller of the planted acreage or 50 per

cent of the farm's feedgrain base.

3. Small farm provisions—  
A farm with a feed grain base of 25 acres or less will be able to qualify for payment on the first 20 per cent of its diverted acreage, with the payment rates based on 20 per cent of the total county support rate times projected yield. For the remaining diverted acreage on small farms, the diversion payment will be based on the 40 per cent payment rate, subject to the maximum limitation.

Producers with feed grain bases of up to 125 acres will have the option of temporarily reducing their base to 25 acres to become eligible for the small farm provisions. In such cases, no corn, grain sorghum, or barley is to be planted for harvest on the farm and the temporary 25-acre feed grain base must be put to conserving uses.

4. Other program provisions—  
Soybeans planted in lieu of feed grains will not earn price-support payments.

Malting barley will not be exempt from diversion requirements in 1970 since supplies are more than adequate to meet the

needs.

Substitution provisions relating to wheat and feed grain will continue as in previous years.

Announcement will be prior to sign-up time on portion of substitute crops diverted acres.

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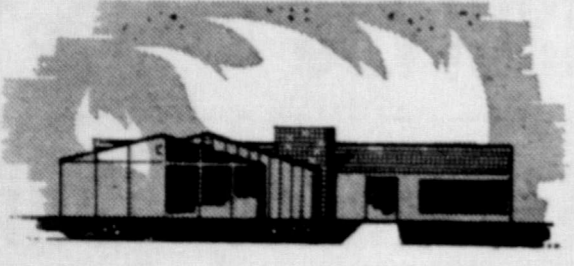
