After a steady increase in the statements of condition figures of the three Hall County banks for the past four years, the peak was reached in December a year ago, for a decline is noted in the Dec. 31, 1969, figures released last week by the county banking institutions.

Total assets of the three banks figured at \$18,551,304.39, or approximately \$200,000 below the peak of last year when the total assets were reported at \$19,750,000.00.

Looking at the total deposits figures, the county recorded a greater decline. At the close of business Dec. 31, 1969, the three Hall County banks had on deposit \$16,843,448.61. On the same date a year ago the total deposits were \$17,295,628.30. This is a decline of slightly over \$450,000, or nearly a half million dollars.

The only item higher than last year is the loans and discounts total of the three banks, which is \$9,173,369.20. This is an increase of \$335,233.68 over the loans and discounts figure as reported last year.

The statements of condition of the Peoples State Bank of Turkey, First National Bank of Memphis, and the First State Bank of Memphis were published last week.

It is the consensus of opinion that the shortness of the 1969 cotton crop and the national movement to curb inflation with high interest rates to bring about a "tight" money situation are the primary reasons of the decline in the financial picture in Hall County.

### Senator Hightower Is Candidate For Reelection

State Senator Jack Hightower of the 30th Senatorial District announced Saturday that he will file as a candidate for reelection in the Democratic primary. Hightower stated that he planned to visit each of the 21 counties in the district between now and the filing deadline in order to personally file with the Democratic chairman in each county.

Senator Hightower, 43, was first elected to the Senate in 1964, having previously served in the House of Representatives and as district attorney. Widely recognized as a leader in state government, Hightower serves as a member of the Agricultural Committee of the Southern Council of State Governments and as a Texas member on the Multistate Tax Compact Commission. His special interests as a lawmaker have been in the fields of law enforcement and education. During the year 1969 he was honored by the Vocational Agricultural Teachers Association of Texas and the State Bar of Texas with the Distinguished Service Award of each organization.

Senator Hightower stated that he would make a formal announcement at a later date.

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## EDITORIAL

### Cherish Your Right To Vote!

The deadline for the citizens of this state to make themselves qualified voting citizens is fast approaching. Voters are required to register each year in the office of the County Tax Assessor-Collector in the county of their residence on or before January 31. There is no fee required, it just takes a little time to become an eligible voter if you meet the age and length of residence requirements.

Texas Governor Preston Smith and Secretary of State Martin Dies, Jr., and all public officials in Texas on the State, County and City levels of government are concerned when citizens do not take advantage of their privilege to vote.

Governor Smith stated recently in a proclamation urging Texans to register to be eligible voters: "The right to vote is one of the most important rights guaranteed under our Federal and State Constitutions."

"The rights and privileges of citizenship cannot be valuably exercised unless each qualified citizen has the opportunity to be a part of the decision-making process of our government."

"This right can only be secured for each qualified citizen of Texas by his registering to vote before the end of the voter registration period, January 31."

"We can only insure good, representative government of the people by securing for each qualified citizen an opportunity to vote."

We want to join with public officials in urging our citizens to become qualified voters because 1970 is a most important election year.

The first step in a citizen's responsibility is becoming a qualified eligible voter. The second step is the studying of the candidates and issues of the election. The third step is going to the polls and voting for the candidates or issues of your choice. And the fourth, final, and possibly the most difficult responsibility is abiding with the decision of the majority, and being more concerned with the state of the union than with personal preferences, selfish interests, or ideologies.

Good government, whether at the local, state or national level, is not accidental. In a democracy it is the result of dedicated citizens who have one principle thought in mind when they ask: "How Goes The Union?"

### Your Hometown Businessman!

Scarcely a day, week or month passes but that it is dedicated to someone or something: from national ditch-diggers day to national hot-dog week to hire a hobo month.

Last and all but forgotten in all this maze of remembering is the small or moderate-sized businessman . . . that unsung individual who made his second mistake (assuming that he is already married) when he decided that he wanted to be his own boss at the store since he obviously wasn't boss at home.

As far as we know, there isn't a day, week or month set aside for the businessman. If there is, it is sadly neglected and under-publicized.

A businessman is the chump who pays all kinds of state and federal taxes, levies and fees, and is even forced to do the government's bookkeeping, otherwise referred to as red tape . . . of which there are miles and miles.

He makes weekly, monthly, quarterly and annual reports on everything in his business. . . from income to industrial safety to fire extinguishers to commodious conveniences.

A businessman is the guy who doesn't have a sufficient quantity of, sizes or kinds of anything that the public may want (except

at inventory time). He overcharges his customers and underpays his help (a standard allegation) and the fact that his own wages figure out to about 73 cents an hour is never mentioned.

A businessman, at one time or another, contributes to the support of a board spectrum of the community; widows, under-privileged kids, organizations of all kinds, groups, lodges, clubs, tramps, sets and shyders.

A businessman is the first one contacted for a donation to help get industry. He sponsors students clubs, sports teams and groups of every kind; he is expected to donate to all causes, worthy and otherwise; and not one charity misses him when the annual campaign rolls around.

His donations help publish cook books, catalogs, and school annuals.

A businessman is expected to look the other way when a civic organization sells something in direct competition with him. He might even be asked to help in the sales campaign or provide the goods or items at cost.

A businessman is the sucker who sells something at cost to a non-profit volunteer organization so it can help poor and under-privileged families so the state tax division can descend upon him for not charging sales tax.

After all this, a businessman is expected to show a profit so he can contribute to the welfare of his own family, his mother-in-law, his church and himself.

And to heap ridicule upon this unfortunate individual, he must also cut the weeds around his store or building to keep from being dragged into court and fined.

And you say, son, that you want to grow up to be a businessman?

Going to war by capsule!  
If it were not such a serious matter, the drafting of young men

by fishbowl lottery would have a lot in common with the games of chance they play at street-corner carnivals on hot Saturday nights in July.

Indeed, recruiting soldiers on the basis of birth dates chosen from 366 capsules in a bowl may seem a little primitive in an age of computer technology.

But the fact remains that the lottery conducted last month to determine the order of induction during 1970 is the fairest way yet devised to apportion military obligations in this country.

Now comes a flurry of criticism from politicians and statisticians who contend the capsules weren't properly mixed. How else, they ask, could so many dates from the end of the year be chosen so early in the lottery?

Thirteen young men in Wisconsin are challenging the selection process in court. And a judge has agreed to hear the case.

It should be pointed out, of course, that no one is being accused of purposely "rigging" the Dec. 1 drawing. The only issue is whether the drawing resulted in a truly random selection of dates.

Nor is it valid to argue that because men born in December tended to be hit harder by the lottery than men born in March, the whole thing was a fraud.

After all, a random selection is just that. The lottery for 1971 may very well produce a similarly uneven result between April and November, or between June and September.

In fact, if a lottery resulted in an even sequence of selections from month to month, the public would be justified in wondering whether the picks had been doled out ahead of time.

Students of mathematical probability may theorize about the randomness of any lottery. In fact, it seems that in this case the capsules were not mixed as thoroughly as they might have been.

But whatever the "mix," the order of calling up men for military service still was done by chance—and that was the whole idea.

## Quivira Girl Scout Council Buys Campsite North of Clarendon

The Quivira Girl Scouts Council has acquired a campsite near Clarendon to be developed for Scout use, Mrs. Richard Stowers, council president, has announced.

Mrs. Stowers said the purchase price for the site was \$26,000 and was financed by sales of Girl Scout cookies and interest accumulated from that money. Girl Scouts from this council have been selling cookies for more than ten years hoping to buy their own camp.

Formerly owned by the Clarendon Country Club, the campsite includes two buildings, a 10,000-gallon swimming pool, outdoor barbecue and picnic tables, Mrs. Stowers said. It is located about 10 miles north of Clarendon.

Projected improvements for the site include a filtration system for the swimming pool, a lodge and dining hall, unit sites and the development of nature trails, she said.

Included in the Quivira Council are the Panhandle counties of Donley, Hall, Roberts, Hemphill, Gray, Wheeler, Carson, Hutchinson, Armstrong and Collingsworth.

### Hall Countians Need To Have Veh. Inspected

"With approximately three months left until the April 15 deadline for obtaining inspection stickers, only nine percent of the registered vehicles in Hall County have been inspected," stated Major C. W. Bell, Regional Commander for the Texas Department of Public Safety.

"This will be the last year for an April 15 deadline as the Texas Motor Vehicle Inspection Program has gone to a year-round inspection program. The new stickers will display the number of the month in which the vehicle was inspected and will be valid through that month of the following year," added Major Bell.

Two items have been added to the inspection list - the exhaust system and the exhaust emission system. A car must now have a muffler and it must be free from leaks. All cars manufactured in 1968 or later coming from the factory equipped with the emission system (commonly known as the smog device), still must have the device connected and in working order.

Hall County now has seven official inspection stations that are ready and capable of handling the inspection of vehicles in this area if owners will not wait until a few days before the deadline.

The money will be used for the purchase of equipment, it was announced.

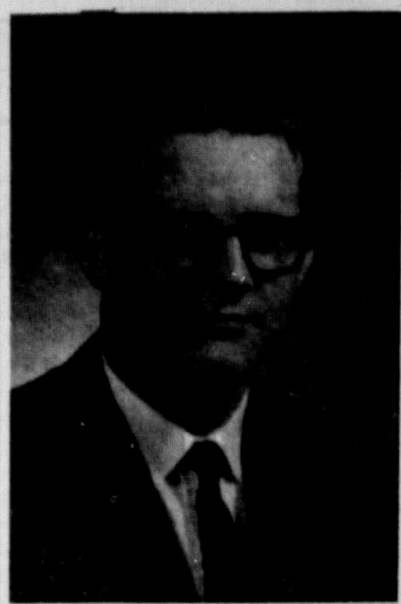
The Texas Farm Bureau Insurance Companies pay volunteer fire departments this amount when the department works at a fire in rural areas, involving property insured by them.

The petition was signed by 28 people who submitted it to the county judge, R. A. (Bob) Dunbar, who ordered the election, which carried and the city was incorporated June 18, 1906. The first mayor of Memphis was Mrs. Ace Gailey's aunt, Lucille Wright's father, A. W. Read's daughter's grandson's sister's great grandfather was the first mayor of Memphis - A. J. Kinard, father of the late D. L. C. Kinard, J. L. Gamble was the first City Marshall and the first aldermen were W. J. Sanders and J. F. Bradley, J. W. Noel, J. C. Wilson and A. W. Read.

City Prisoners at that time prayed for rain as in dry days they had to work and were allowed 50c a day on their fine. When it rained and the weather was too bad to work, they stayed in and were allowed \$1.00 a day on their fine. The city's first injunction was filed in 1919 against the wagon yard, feed yard and breeding stable. Declared as a nuisance. Ordinance No. 149, passed in 1919, prohibited drilling for oil or gas in the city limits. Ordinance No. 72 assessing a fine on any person who shall immoderately ride or drive or carelessly ride or drive any animal of the horse species on the public square or streets of Memphis. There were also instructions as to how you parked your horse. There was an ordinance pertaining to the coming of the horseless carriage. The breakneck speed was set at 8 miles per hour, but later raised to 12 miles per hour. Then you had to have a bell or horn that could be heard 300 feet away and if you met a horse traveler, you had to pull off the road or street and let him get by first before starting up your motor.
