Hall County Hospital To Raise Room Rates

The patient room rates at Hall County Hospital will be increased effective Sunday, March 1, it was announced this week by the Hall County Hospital Board.

Hospital Administrator Don Curl said the room rates effective March 1 will be: \$25.00 for semi-private, \$29.00 for private in old wing, and \$34.00 for private in new wing.

It was announced that regulations requiring increases in salaries and the rising cost of materials, supplies and operation necessitates the increase in the daily room rates.

Administrator Curl said he had received recently from the American Hospital Assn., Hospital Administration Service Program, of Chicago, Ill., a comparison of hospital charges in Hall County Hospital with the median (middle) figures from other state and national hospitals of the same size as Hall County Hospital.

"The hospital board examined this report and felt it would be beneficial for the general public to know. We make a quarterly H. A. S. (Hospital Administration Service) report each quarter to the American Hospital Association, as does hospitals of all

Public School Week, 1970

Public School Week, 1970, will be observed next week, March 2-6, throughout our state. This is the 116th anniversary year of the establishment of public schools in Texas. Citizens are encouraged to pay a visit to their schools during this special week.

This is the 20th year that the Masonic Lodges of Texas have sponsored a Public School Week observance in our state.

The Public Schools System of Hall County is planning to observe this week. All extend an invitation to patrons to visit the schools and observe their children in classroom work.

In Memphis Schools, an hour has been set aside Tuesday night, March 3, from 7:30 to 8:30 p. m., for parents and patrons to come visit the schools and visit with teachers and students. Supt. C. L. Chambliss said that the faculty will be ready to receive the patrons of the district that evening in a special open house of the schools.

The Memphis Rotary and Lions Club will have their regular noon luncheons at the Travis Cafeteria, Tuesday and Wednesday, respectively, as guests during Public School Week. The clubs will pay the school for their meals at regular cafeteria rates. The elementary students of Mrs. A. L. Gailey will give programs for the civic clubs.

Friday, March 13, will be a holiday for school children of the Panhandle area as most schools will be closed by their school faculties attending the District 16 Conference of T.S.T.A., to be held in Amarillo.

Texas Governor Preston Smith said this about Public School Week Observance:

Special observance of increased emphasis on our education system has been marked annually for 20 years by Public Schools Week in Texas.

"During this period, parents are encouraged to visit the public schools, and all citizens are urged through special programs to recognize the tremendous importance of our system of education. Our goal is to make Texas public schools the finest in the Nation, and to achieve this our citizens are urged to take an active interest in the school systems and to cooperate with their school boards, superintendents, principals and teachers.

"Never before in our history has there been a greater need for educated leadership. As we rush to train young people in science and technology to keep pace with world events, it is also important to remember that our public schools will furnish our tomorrow's leaders with the basic human, moral and spiritual foundations necessary for more advanced training and knowledge." Gov Smith said in the official memorandum proclaiming the week.

What makes Texas schools so special? They're special because Texas Public Schools educate your children, and that should make them important to you. Make it your business this year to show an active interest in your child and his school — and to find out first hand what your tax dollars are doing for the education of your children.

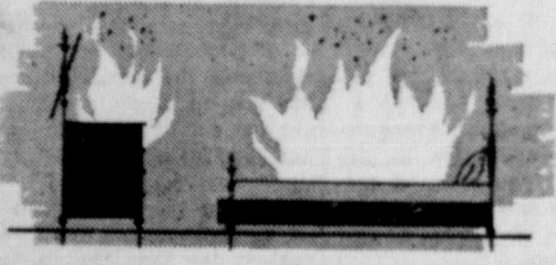

We are beginning to wonder just how many "White Houses" are to accommodate President Nixon for recuperation and relaxation. It is a matter of public record that our President does acknowledge a need for uninterrupted pause for reflection. That's all well and good.

However, just how many hide-aways does one need? As of now, we have a San Clemente, Calif., "White House" and a Key Biscayne, Fla., "White House," to both of which the decision-makers have to "hold up" for top level decisions.

Other Presidents, we recall, have gone elsewhere to get away from it all, which is understandable; but not so frequently did they travel to the farthest continental limits of the country, intermittently west and east, with a complete entourage to crystallize the "command" decisions.

What's wrong with THE White House in Washington as the site for all these deliberations? It has a certain symbolic dignity which should never be "watered down" with other "White Houses" all over the nation.

Washington is the home of the federal government and the 'home office' used to run the nation's business. This is the place the chief executive should spend his time.

With both an East and West Coast 'White House' in existence already, first thing we know the mid-section of the nation will be asking for "equal time".

About A Farm Program!

I attended the "rural survival" meeting of farmers and businessmen at Ralls last week and learned a lot about the farming business. I learned that the farmer is in a rough spot for financing another crop.

I learned that he can't look too far ahead, because he doesn't know if there will be a farm program next year.

Many aspects of thought entered into the meeting... there were political jabs.

One person said everybody should be for Ralph Yarborough because he had always voted for the farmer. This same person said that Congressman Mahon was not for the farmer. This same per-

son also said that city congressmen were for the farmer.

I just don't believe that Congressman Mahon is against the farmer. I have always felt he is doing his best for us... especially the Plains farmer. I also don't believe that city congressmen are for the farmer. I think city people are telling their congressmen that "we don't want to pay tax money to give the farmer."

There were some overtones of Farmers Union people against Farm Bureau people.

One farmer was evidently unhappy with the business man. He stood up and said, "I just wonder where you businessmen are going when the farmer goes broke!" A businessman from Floydada replied that he planned on going to the coast.

As I sat there and observed the cross-fire of ideas I could see why Congress had such a hard time working out a farm program. There is just a little group of some 200 farmers and businessmen, it was hard to get them all together on a plan.

Finally, there was 100 percent agreement that a continuation of the present program was desirable. However, this almost went under when discussion arose about the \$20,000 limitation of farm payments.

After it was decided that the group would go on record favoring an extension of the 1965 Farm Act, the question arose about how to inform all the congressmen of their desire. Think, they finally agreed upon the use of a telegram or several telegrams.

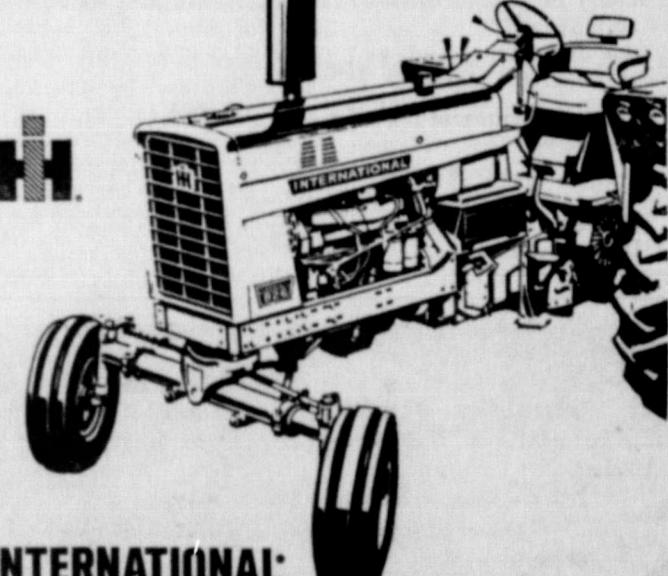

New 1970 Camero Now On Display At Ward Motor

A totally new "second stage" Camero is being introduced by Chevrolet dealers today, and is on display at Ward Motor Co. in Memphis.

Innovations in design and engineering make the new Camero different from any car now offered by Dennis Ward, local dealer, and this week.

Ward called the car "a significant second stage" in the concept of a personal, four-passenger package of excitement that has drawn 650,000 Camero buyers since its introduction in 1967.

The 1970 Camero comes in a single 2-door hardtop model. It is larger, wider, lower and has wider front and rear treads than the previous Camero but continues the highly maneuverable 108 inch wheelbase.

Wide choice to tailor a Camero to a customer's personal taste is continued. A Rally Sport version includes a different grille and front end treatment while Camero and Z-28 versions include high-performance engines and special chassis components. Chevrolet's multitude of options and accessories are also available.

The silhouette has a smooth, international flavor—longer hood, steeper windshield slope, swept-back roofline and Corvette-type rear with twin taillights. The car is 1.1 inches longer, .4 inches wider and 1.1 inch lower than the previous Camero.

A silver-finish V-shaped grille frames the engine. The full-length bumper wraps around fenders behind single high intensity headlights which emphasize the car's width. Wide parking lamps are mounted outboard beneath the bumper.

The Rally Sport version has a special grille with silver accents, accented by a resilient color-etched frame. A vertical resilient shock bar protects the center of the grille.

Rally-styled parking lamps are mounted on either side of the RS grille. Split bumpers mounted on the lights complete the design.

Concealed windshield wipers are optional on Camero, standard on the RS and SS versions.

The new body is stronger and quieter. Double steel roof panels give added strength. Protective features such as the side-guard door beams, energy absorbing windshield pillar moldings and cargo-guard luggage barrier, first introduced in the full-size Chevrolet, are now incorporated in Camero's unitized body.

The antenna is mounted in the windshield on all factory installed radios, replacing the mast antenna for greater body smoothness.

The low-stance, road-hugging qualities of Camero's chassis are improved for even more responsive handling.

Front disc brakes are standard for the first time on Camero. The wheel hub and disc rotor is of a new integral cast design. Power brakes are optional.

The base six cylinder engine in the new Camero is increased to 250 cubic inches. The 307 cubic inch V-8 remains the base V-8.

There are also three optional 350 cubic inch V-8s, and a 396 cubic inch V-8. The horsepower range on Camero is from 155 to 360.

Texas Using 170,000,000 Pounds Of Pesticides Annually, Dept. Reports

AUSTIN — Texas is using 170 million pounds of pesticides annually, and the amount is increasing at a rate of 10 to 12 per cent per year, according to Ken Jurgens, administrator of technical programs for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

In a recent statement to the Senate Committee for the Study of Land Use and Environmental Control, Jurgens termed the use of pesticides, particularly those of a "hard" or persistent nature, "an environmental problem of great urgency" because of their effects upon fish and wildlife.

Jurgens said fortunately about 84 per cent of the pesticides used are the less persistent types such as the organophosphates and carbamates, which are not of great concern in causing environmental problems.

"The remaining 16 per cent," he said, "... are persistent chlorinated hydrocarbons, and it is these which are causing serious problems. In aerial application of chlorinated hydrocarbons as little as 50 per cent may actually reach the intended target. Aerial drift, codistillation with water, volatilization from soil surfaces and leaching from heavy rains are some of the means by which they move from the point of application into the aquatic environment and thence to the estuarine and marine environments."

Jurgens said Department studies made in cooperation with Federal fisheries and wildlife studies have shown that the oyster may contain residues up to 70,000 greater than the amount found in water.

According to Jurgens, random samples of flesh-eating birds indicate unusually high residues of DDT metabolites. For example, a peregrin falcon contained 56 ppm DDE in the liver and eight ppm

in the brain. A white pelican, which eats nothing but fish, contained 84 ppm in body flesh, 120 ppm in the liver, 18 ppm in the brain, 31 ppm in the heart and 16 ppm in the kidney, plus two ppm of dieldrin in some body parts.

Jurgens said estuarine areas adjacent to areas of intense agricultural activity are in danger of decreased productivity as a result of the use of pesticides.

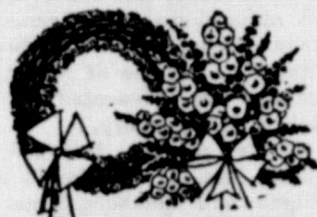
"Examination of juvenile fish data revealed as much as eight ppm of DDT residue in gonads of spotted sea trout," he said. "Also, there has been a steady decline in numbers of juveniles of this species since 1964. Where 80 juveniles per acre were taken in routine monthly sampling consisting of 10 seine hauls by biologists in 1964, only seven juvenile trout were collected in 15 acres in 1969, and 200 sampling efforts over two months were required to collect this small number."

The problem with persistent pesticides is their biological magnification in the food chain and their apparent effect on species' reproduction and survival, according to Jurgens.

"... It is entirely possible that chlorinated hydrocarbon pesticides will cause serious declines in fish and wildlife, and, in some cases, species extinction could result," he said.

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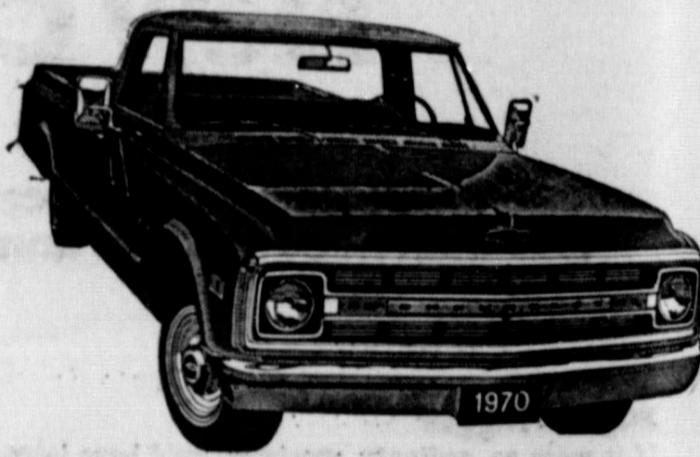

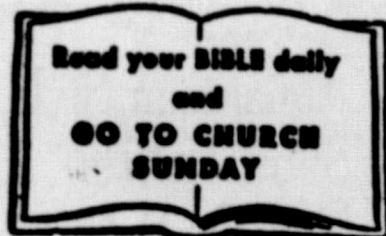
Mercy Forever
