FOCUSES EFFORTS ON DRUG PREVENTION OCT. 22-29

"Join Me--I'm Drug Free" is the theme of the Texas Medical Association (TMA) and Auxiliary (TMAA) efforts to encourage teens to choose a drug-free lifestyle during Drug Free America Week in Texas, October 22-29.

Sponsored in conjunction with the national Drug Free America Week and National Red Ribbon Campaign, TMA and TMAA will feature locally-based educational and awareness events across the state.

Activities include working with local

schools, youth groups, hospitals, businesses, and others to promote a healthy, drug-free lifestyle. "Physicians see the terrible physical and mental effects of drug abuse. Doctors and others in the community can set a drug-free example for our children to encourage them to choose a healthy lifestyle, particularly during the difficult teen years," declared TMA president Dr. Max C. Butler, a family doctor from Houston.

"It is vitally important that teens understand that they

can lead a happier, more fulfilling life when they are drug-free," said TMA Auxiliary president, Betty Haisten of Beaumont.

Red ribbons will be worn by the medical community during Drug Free American Week signifying the commitment to a drug free Texas. The Red ribbon Campaign originated when Federal Agent Enrique Camarena was murdered by drug traffickers in 1985. The campaign started in California and last year was expanded nationwide.

Cable channel 31, previously an extra channel used to broadcast the daily television schedule has recently become an Educational Access Channel. This means programs or events happening in the community can now be aired over this station. Bryan High School, as well as Texas A&M Univeristy, decided to take full advantage of this opportunity.

The media tech class was designed to get students involved in their community and to train them in the field of television. The teacher is Darrell Taylor, who moved to Bryan this fall from the La Joya school district. He said plans are in the works for more media projects.

Taylor worked in radio before he started teaching. He directs technicians and camera men.

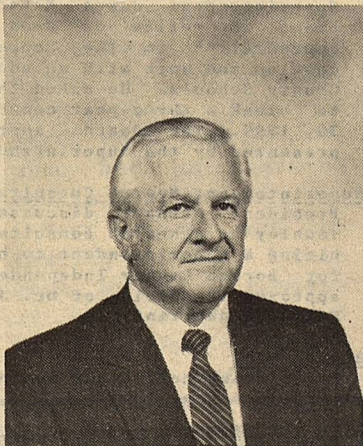

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Teenage Motor Vehicle Accident Facts

As both drivers and passengers, teenagers are disproportionately involved in motor vehicle crashes, compared to people of other ages. Even though they drive less than older people (except those 70 and older), teenagers have very high numbers of motor vehicle crashes and crash deaths, as evidenced from the statistics below:

- Teenagers comprised 10% of the U.S. population in 1988 and 15% of all motor vehicle deaths.

- More than 40% of the vehicles are involved in more deaths than any other group-35 per cent. to pg. 5
- More than twice as many male teenagers as female teenagers are killed in motor vehicle crashes.
- Male 18-19 year-old drivers of passenger

The Borden County Coyotes opened the 1989 district play at Loop last Friday and spoiled their homecoming for them. The Coyotes sputtered on their first possession, but then they got things rolling to take a 12-0 first quarter score. Patrick Herridge scored two of his four touchdowns in the first quarter on runs of 3 and 4 yards. Both kicks for extra points failed. In the second quarter Cole Vestal took over the scoring as he caught two passes for touchdowns. His catches from Brian Bond covered 17 and 35 yards. His 35 yard touchdown came on play where the safety moved in to break up the play, but instead the ball popped up and Cole was able to haul it down and race into the endzone. Brian kicked one of the two extra points to give the Coyotes a 26-0 half time lead.

The Coyotes cooled off after the long, half time homecoming activities and only scored 6 points. Patrick Herridge capped off a 64 yard drive with a 1 yard run. The extra point was blocked and returned for 2 points for the Longhorns. They had also scored in the third quarter to bring the score to 36-9. That was all the scores that the Coyotes would allow even though the benches were emptied by the Coyotes. In the fourth quarter Patrick Herridge scored his fourth touchdown on a 44 yard run. Lance Telchik scored the extra point on a pass from Brian Bond. The Coyote defense only allowed 1 first down in the fourth quarter,

so when the Coyotes took possession following a Loop punt, quarterback Brian Bond moved to running back. After taking a pitch from Klint Kemper, Brian raced 70 yards for a touchdown. Kirk Jones ran the ball over for the extra point. The Coyotes final score came as the clock ran out. Freshman Clint Wills took a pitch from Klint Kemper and started to sweep to his left. He then reversed his direction and scampered 38 yards for his first varsity touchdown. The extra point try was not attempted.

Patrick Herridge rushed for 207 yards on 19 attempts and scored 4 touchdowns. He also had 13 assisted and 2 unassisted tackles. Brian Bond had the 1 carry for 70 yards and a touchdown. He also had 4 assisted and 5 unassisted tackles and an interception that he returned to the 4 yard line. John Paul Harris rushed for 49 yards on 11 carries. He also had 8 assisted, and 5 unassisted tackles, and a fumble recovery. Clint Wills had 40 yards on 2 carries. Cody Stone had 26 yards on 7 carries. He also had an assisted tackle.

Marc Latimer was the leading tackler this week. He had 15 assisted and 4 unassisted tackles, one of which was a quarterback sack which caused a fumble. Marc also recovered the fumble. Cole Vestal also had a good defensive performance with 8 assisted and 2 unassisted tackles. He also deflected a pass that fell incomplete. Shannon Smithie made 3 assisted and 2 unassisted tackles. 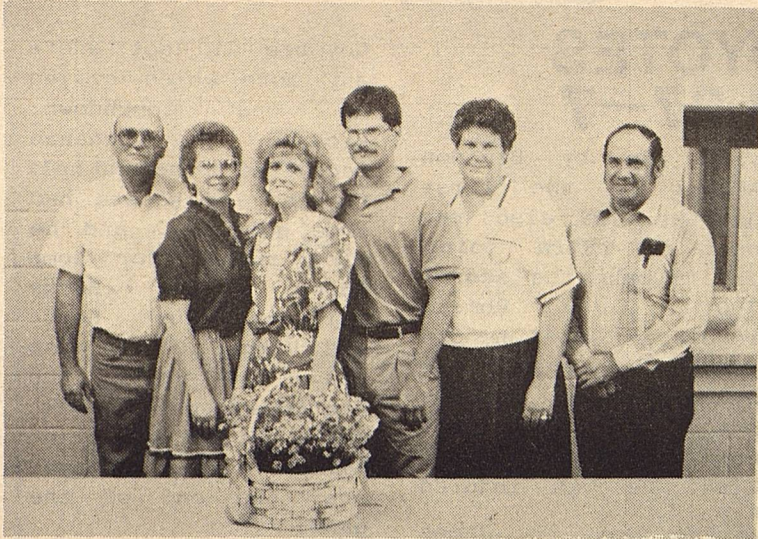

OCTOBER 4, 1989

The Borden County Jr. Livestock Association, Inc. Officers and Directors met on October 4, 1989 at 7:30 p.m. at the Borden County Courthouse.

Those present were: Kenny Hensley, Scott Clayton, Jerry Stone, Monte Smith, D.M. Parks, Danny Stone, Mike Herring, Dennis Poole, Buddy Wallace, and Ben Miller.

MINUTES: The minutes of the September 26, 1989 meeting were read. Monte Smith moved to approve the minutes. D.M. Parks seconded the motion. Motion Carried.

TREASURERS REPORT: Jerry Stone gave the treasurer's report including a report on the 1989 Coyote Opry. The Coyote Opry proceeds will be approximately \$1600 after the outstanding bills are paid. The Current bank balance is \$5192.43 including the proceeds from the Coyote Opry. Monte Smith moved to accept the treasurer's report D.M. Parks seconded the motion. Motion carried.

3) Barrows-proposed rule changes.

a) Change the minimum number of entries needed to make a class from one entry to four entries, of the four recognized breeds-hampshire, cross, duroc, and other pure breeds - of the Borden County Junior Livestock Association, Inc.. Any less than four entries will go to the other pure breeds class.

4-9 entries = 1 class
10-17 entries = 2 classes
17 & over entries = 3 classes

b) If there is at least 10 entries in the OPB division of a particular breed, they may be separated as a breed division when there is a minimum of 10 barrows left in the other pure breeds division.
