Hall County Receives \$92,000 Each Month In Social Security Benefits

Social Security benefits paid to residents of Hall County total \$92,000 a month as 1969 ended. Travis C. Briggs, social security district manager, reported to

Local Boys State Delegates Return

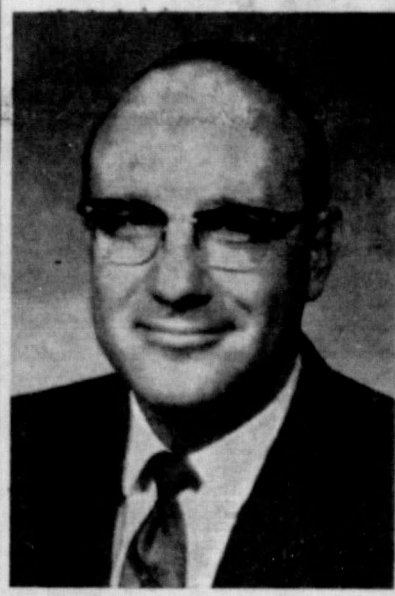
Memphis' three Boys State delegates returned Saturday from the campus of the University of Texas where they have been attending the 1970 session of Boys State. The program, sponsored by the

LL Giants Are First Half Winners

The Giants emerged as the first half winner of the Memphis Little League after a three-way tie playoff last weekend which saw games end with only one run determining the winner. The Indians and Tigers were engaged in an overtime tussle Friday night after tosses of coins determined which of the three teams would have a bye the first round. The Giants won the favored spot by luck of the coin.

The Indian-Tiger game ended with the Indians holding a 16 to 15 edge in extra innings, Friday night.

Then Saturday afternoon, the Indians met the Giants, and the game ended last tied during regulation play and extra innings were begun. The Giants captured a one run edge in sudden death to win the game and the first half crown.

Due to the necessity of the playoffs, last Thursday night games, which began the second half of play, had to be cancelled so make-up games have been set for Friday night, beginning at 6 p. m.

Tonight, the second night schedule of games will be played at the regular time.

With three of the four teams running neck and neck in the race for League Title, every game in the second half is of vital importance. Should the second half winner be a different team from the first half winner, then a season playoff will have to be held.

The Little League season here began early enough so that a definite conclusion can be reached before players are involved in All-Star competition, it was explained.

For farmers and ranchers in almost all portions of Hall County, 1970 is proving to be a bad year for agriculture.

Although the storm clouds have given forth lightning and rolling thunder many times this spring, raindrops have been few and the 1970 row crop picture in most of the county is far from ideal.

In other portions, if it doesn't rain within the next few days the hope for a cotton crop is fast fading, according to information received.

As much as 40 per cent of the cotton fields in this area are barren due to inadequate moisture and the result of the sand storm of last Thursday and the extreme hot weather of this week.

Tuesday the temperature in Memphis hit the 108 degree mark and was followed by 105 degrees Wednesday. The young cotton which survived the blasting sand is not surviving the hot weather with no evening showers to aid it along.

The Lelia Lake and Hedley area received good rains and some damaging hail yesterday.

Indications from the Estelline, Pliska, Lakeview, Lesley and Brice areas are that cotton prospects are the worst in years for this time of the year. Late cotton has much less chance of maturing without damage by insects and freeze.

Which Are 5-Brake Horsepower?

Texas DPS Release List Of Motor Bikes For Restriction 9 Riders

Due to the numerous inquiries being received by Law Enforcement Officials concerning the "5-brake horsepower restriction" on motorcycle operator's licenses, Chief of Police Mike Smith this week released the listing obtained from the state of Texas, Dept. of Public Safety.

Citizens are also reminded that before all the requirements are met to operate a motorcycle on the public roads and streets, the vehicle must be licensed, and inspected, and the operator must have a valid motorcycle operators license and is operating a bike size (powerwise) according to the restriction code listed on the license.

Law enforcement officials report that certain two-wheelers are not licenseable. Among this category is the so called Mini-Bikes. These vehicles, like go-carts, and others, do not meet the standard safety requirements and equipment requirements which make them registerable to operate on public roads.

The most questionable restriction, however, is concerning Restriction No. 9 on the motorcycle operator's license which states, "Motorcycle only not to exceed 5-brake horsepower."

Motorcycle models meeting the 5-brake horsepower or less requirement are as follows:

- Benelli — Automatic, Dynamo Compact, Fireball and Trail; Bonanza—H-25, HS-40 and H-10; Bridgestone — Series C323 and C313; Bronco — 354vZKW and 351nP; Capri Scooter and Capriolo.
- Also, Cemat — S-50, C-50, C-100 and ST-100; Ducati — Brio Scooter, Cadet, Falcon 50, Falcon 80 and Mountaineer; Carelli KL-100; Gilera — Scooters G50, G50T and G80; Harley-Davidson — M-50, MS-50, M-65 and MS-65; Honda — Ace 90 and Ace 100.
- Also, Honda — C-100, C-102, C-110, C-200, CM-91, CT-90 CT-one brother, Bob, of Pecos. 200, L-90, P-50, S-65, and S-90; Jawa 05; Kawasaki — J1, C2, James Skinner, Carroll Fowler, Road Runner, G355 series GA and Quilla Clark, J. O. Adams and G3TR series GA; Lobito T — J. W. Hatley, Jr.

Food Stamp Program To Begin Soon In County

The Hall County Commissioners Court early this month signed papers with the Texas Department of Public Welfare for the establishment of a Food Stamp Program for this area in cooperation with other counties in this section.

County Judge E. (Gip) McMurry said that the exact date for the program to begin has not been announced by the U. S. Department of Agriculture and the Texas Department of Public Welfare. According to a news release from Food and Nutrition Service, USDA, Dallas office, which was released last Friday, a Food Stamp Program will open in the eight West Texas counties.

Grocers and banks in eight West Texas counties will be contacted by a U. S. Department of Agriculture representative during the next few weeks in preparation for the opening of the Food Stamp Program in the area.

Garza, Dickens and Borden counties are scheduled to begin issuing food coupons within the next few weeks, along with the Panhandle counties of Armstrong, Briscoe, Collingsworth, Donley and Hall.

John J. Slaughter, southwest regional director of the Food and Nutrition Service, the agency administratively responsible for USDA food programs, made the announcement.

James Montgomery, a career official with USDA's Food and Nutrition Service, will be meeting with wholesale and retail grocers and bank officials to explain how the Food Stamp Program will operate. Commissioners in these counties recently signed agreements with the Texas Dept. of Public Welfare, which directs the USDA food programs in Texas. State welfare caseworkers in the area will accept food stamp applications from low income families

which to participate and determine which are eligible.

The Food Stamp Program is intended to improve diets of low-income families and to increase consumption of farm-produced foods. Participating families buy food coupons for the amount they normally spend for food, and USDA provides "bonus" coupons without charge. The coupons are spent like cash at food stores authorized by USDA to accept them, and redeemed at cooperating banks through the Federal Reserve System.

Mr. Montgomery has had broad experience in the Food Stamp Program, having worked in the Food and Nutrition Service field offices in New Orleans, La., and Houston, two of the largest food stamp operations in the southwest region. A native of Houston, he attended Texas Southern University there.

Where Are The Bragging Texans?

In the days of shoot 'em up bang, bang, westerns there grew in the minds of "our fellow Americans" the idea that Texas and its citizens were gun slingers and cattle rustlers. Texas towns were like old San Antonio and Laredo and the only law in the State came out of the end of a .45 in the hand of a Ranger, Texas that is.

Because of this utter misconception, Texans when they were in company of other of "our fellow Americans" tried to improve on this image and so the term Texas Brags came about. Most of this was built entirely around our agricultural economy which sees Texas leading the nation in beef cattle, cotton and grain sorghums, and a good producer in vegetables, citrus, wheat, rice, hay, swine, wool and many others.

But according to the Texas Industrial Commission, Texas has earned another No. 1 position. This one is even recognized by a recent Dun & Bradstreet survey which shows Texas is now number one in industrial growth, and this is a figure we can all brag about.

Our 901 new plants located in Texas in 1969 was 42 percent greater than second-best California.

These statistics put us in an enviable position says the commission. It simply means that the pioneering Texas spirit has gone to work to show many industries that our Texas brags are true—we have more size, manpower, natural resources, etc.—and therefore, somewhere in this great state, we probably have what that industry needs to grow.

The Texas Industrial Commission also pointed out that our state alone can't get us new industry. It is up to individuals in our communities and cities to take advantage of the guidance offered by the Texas Industrial Commission and find our own future.

The Industrial Commission has developed a unique computer program that will help us find out just what industries are best suited for this area. The service is free for the asking. How vital is industry to a community? The Commission released the following statistics which answer that question.

When a manufacturing facility brings 100 new employees into town, data compiled by the U. S. Chamber of Commerce shows it means addition of:

- 296 more people
- 112 more households
- \$590,000 more in personal income
- \$270,000 more in bank deposits
- \$360,000 more in retail sales per year

That's pretty impressive evidence about how important an investment industrial development is to the growth of a community.

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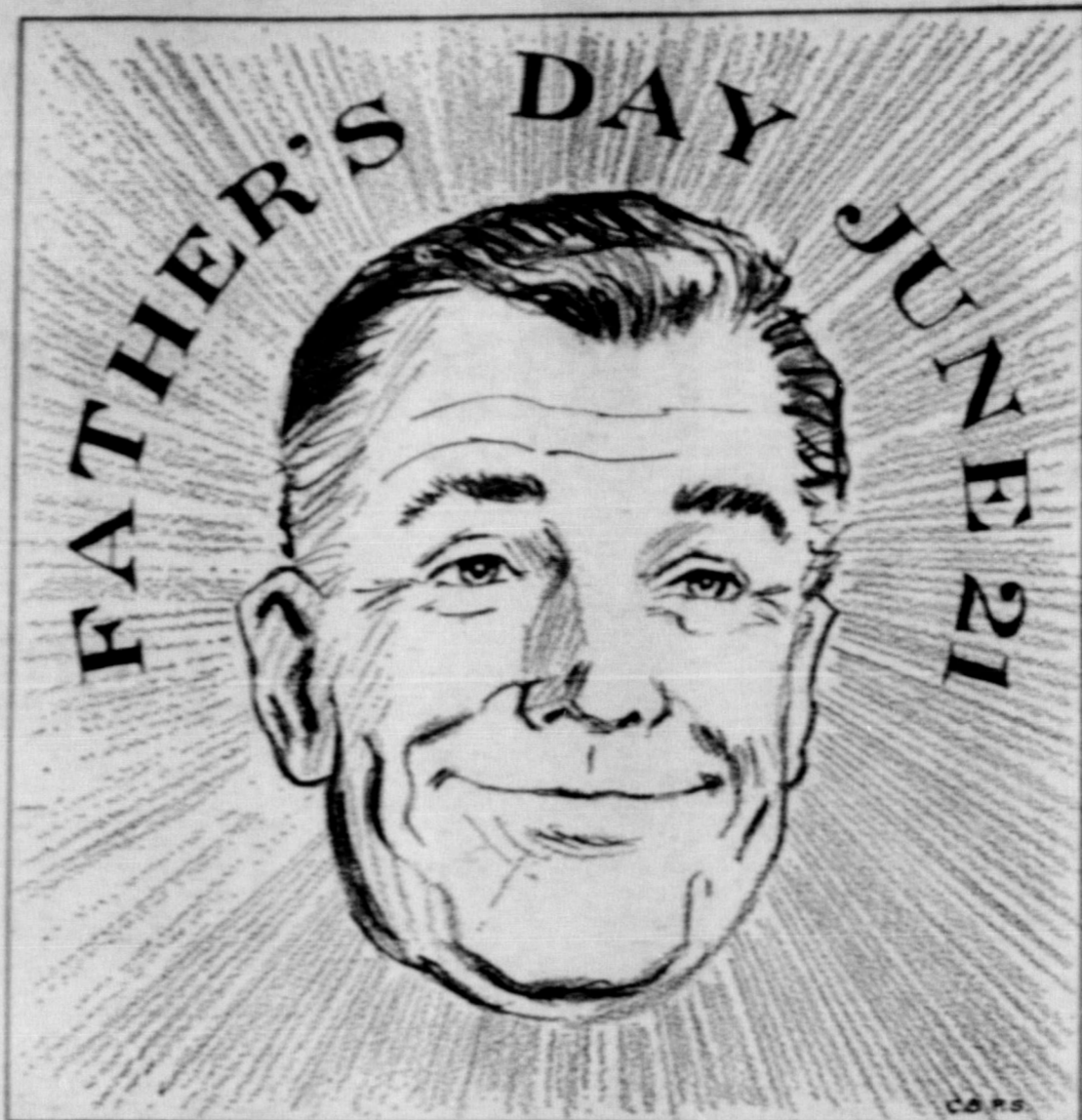

Legal Remedy
 An unusual suit was filed in Columbus, Ohio a couple of weeks ago, a damage suit asking \$1 million from student strike leaders on the Ohio State University campus.

The suit was filed by nine OSU students who were angered by a campus shutdown resulting from violent demonstrations. These students said they enrolled in this university to get an education and that the student radicals who were rioting and setting fire to buildings had disrupted the university to the point where it was shut down, thus preventing the claimants from receiving the education to which they are entitled.

This is a new switch. We read all the time about some radical group filing suit against those in authority, claiming their rights have been violated. This suit is one of the first indications that the law abiding students also have rights that need to be protected.

The suit lists nine strike leaders, including a professor, and three activist groups on the campus. The students bringing the suit specify that these activist groups deliberately set out to bring the campus to its knees and that the issues they used as an excuse for setting fire to campus buildings had nothing to do with the real issue which was to close down the university.

At the initial hearing, the students who filed the suit sought a declaratory judgment on whether students, parents and taxpayers have the right to insist the university enforce rules to maintain order on campuses.

The suit contends that unless the court enjoins activist leaders, they will continue to motivate demonstrators and mob crowds and threaten the safety of the university's 44,000 students.

We hope the courts use reason in this suit and realize that those bringing the suit are entitled to a judgment. The only

wonder of it is that such a suit should have had to be initiated. Why couldn't the administration clean out the campus of those radicals bent on destroying it?

Practicing Christianity
 The Editorial Writers for the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal usually make pretty good sense. However, about three weeks ago in a Sunday issue one of their writers "lived as to how church, people should contain their activities to the inside of the church walls. I disagree with this idea 100 percent.

I have always felt that church people who confined their witnessing, praying, worshipping to the church buildings have missed

the philosophy of Christianity.

I had the privilege of hearing noted Fort Worth author, writer, minister Gaston Foote speak in Abilene last week and he said, "church people at church are sorta like a football team in the huddle. The huddle is necessary before going out and making the play . . . and church people must get out of the huddle to take Christianity out into the world with their service and witness."

In my opinion he couldn't be more right and the Avalanche Journal writer more wrong. Anyone who has read the Bible at all knows that Jesus Christ was out where the action was . . . He was administering to the people's needs . . . and I believe He is still the best example we have to go by in this day and time.

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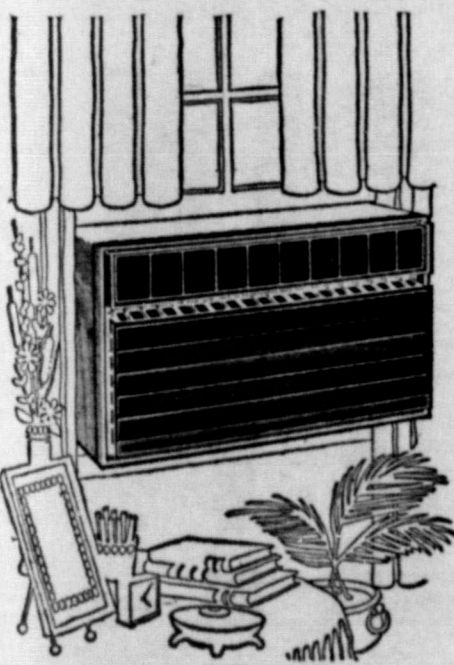

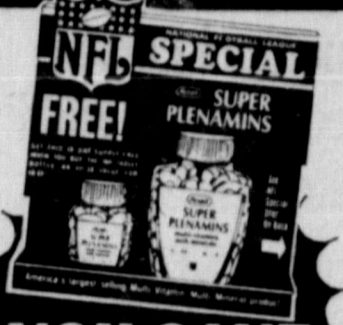

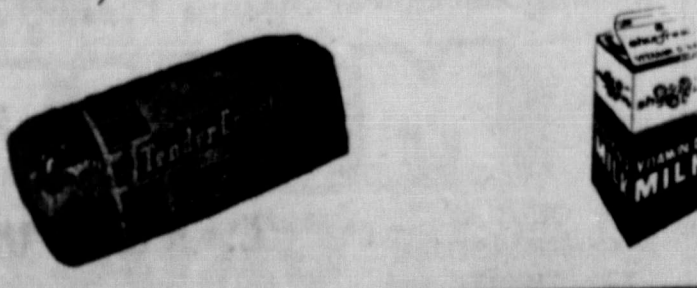

The business session was conducted by the president, Susie Coleman. Faye Maddox offered prayer.

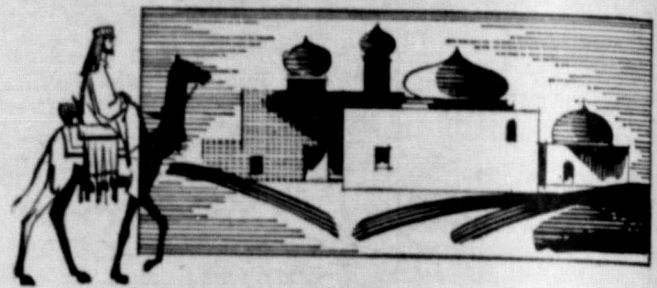

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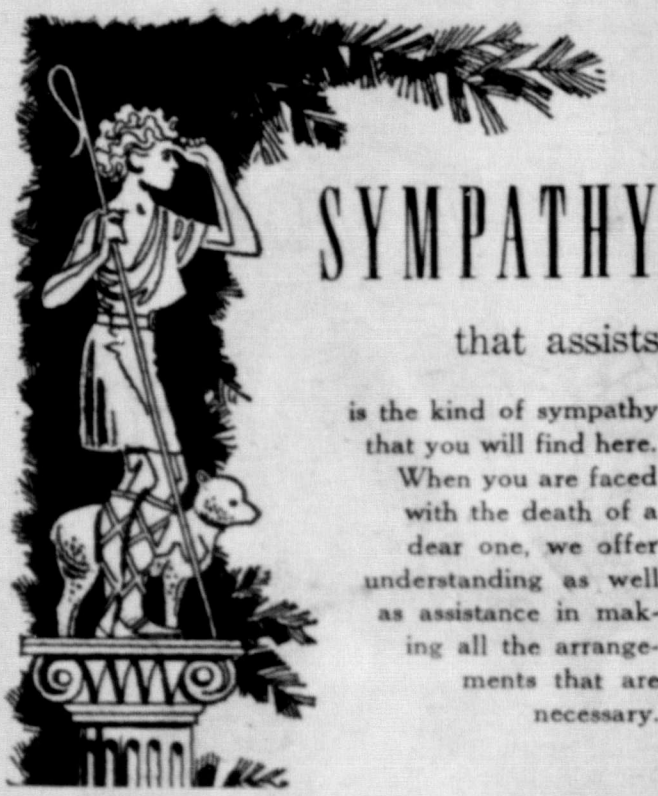


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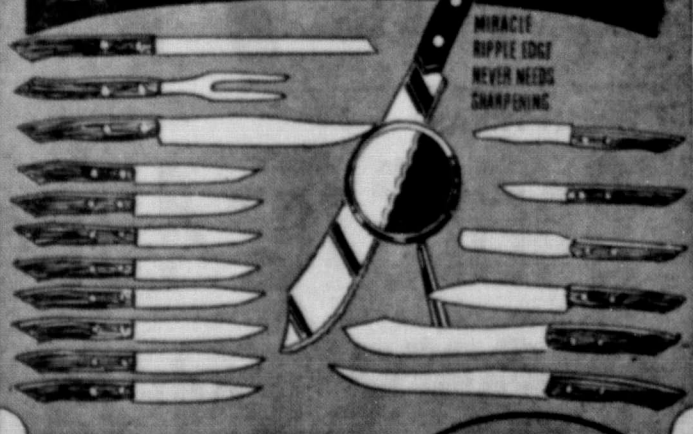
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B. Shots

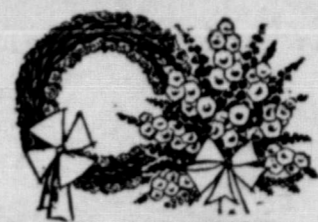

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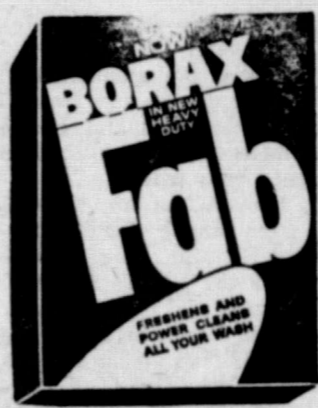


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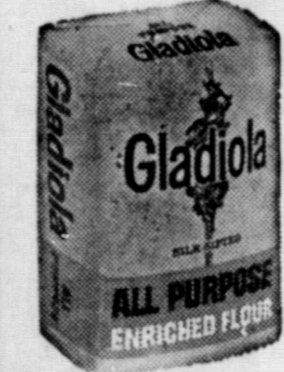
