## Zack Fisher To Join Staff Of Sen. Tower

Zack Fisher announces that he has accepted a position as an agricultural adviser on the staff of U. S. Senator John Tower, and will move to Alexandria, Va., with his family around the first of June. Fisher will work in Washington, D. C.

He also announces that he has joined into partnership with James Brown of Memphis, formerly overseer of the Postex Mills, Hall Plant, and Mr. Brown will operate the partnership insurance agency here.

Fisher and Brown announced the insurance agency will remain under the same name for the time being.

Fisher moved to Memphis in 1965 to manage the Hall County

Farm Bureau. After leaving the Farm Bureau in 1969, he established his own agency, Fisher-Red River Insurance Agency.

Fisher said, "I'm extremely pleased to have the opportunity and I naturally appreciate the Senator's interest in agriculture. I grew up in a farming community and realize the importance of agriculture not only to the Panhandle, but to all of Texas."

Fisher reported Wednesday morning after returning from Washington, that they had found suitable housing in Alexandria, Va., and the family will be moving there the last weekend in May.

# Const. Amend. Election Is Tues.

## Straw Vote Set For Tuesday On Hail Suppression

Hall County citizens are being urged when they go to the polls Tuesday, May 18, to vote in the Constitutional Amendment Election, to also cast a straw ballot in the Hail Suppression Election being conducted at the same time.

Four boxes concerning the Hail Suppression canvas will be set up in the same immediate area of the election boxes in the Constitutional Amendment Election for citizens to express their opinion on hail suppression.

Roy Gresham, chairman of the Hall County Rain Assn., met Monday with Hall County Commissioners Court and received permission to set up the boxes in the four polling places.

"We want all citizens to take time to cast a ballot in the Hail Suppression Election at the special boxes to be set up. Ballots will be available at each of these four boxes over the county," Gresham said.

The ballot states: "Do you favor the Hail Suppression Program?"

"Are you against the Hail Suppression Program?"

The Hail Suppression program is being conducted by Atmospherics Incorporated on the South Plains. The firm conducted the program last year and despite opposition by many farmers and ranchers in Texas Panhandle counties opposed to continuing the program, the Texas Water Development Board granted another one-year permit for hail suppression to Plains Weather Improvement Assn., the group which employs Atmospherics Incorporated to conduct the seeding operations.

The vast majority of farmers and ranchers in this area are opposed to the program.

## Cyclone Band To Have Pops Concert May 15

The Memphis Cyclone Band and Director Carol Blain extend a hearty invitation to the general public to attend a free "pops" concert beginning at 8:30 p. m., Saturday, May 15, in the Memphis Community Center.

"The concert will be an informal one, with the audience enjoying items from the concession stand, sandwiches, slices of homemade pie, soft drinks, which will be on sale," Miss Blain said.

As for the music, all three Memphis bands, beginners, Junior High and High School, will perform.

The Cyclone Band will play two concert numbers, which Director Blain said would be recorded in the final taping to be submitted for UIL Honor Band competition.

Besides these two numbers, the band will perform seven "popular" numbers including McArthur Park, Aquarius, Green Eyes, Impossible Dream, and Those Were the Days.

"We want the audience to enjoy themselves, eat and listen to the music," she said.

The concert will be recorded, or at least portions of it, and these will be made into records which the band will sell at no profit to the organization.

Sweepstakes Band

The Cyclone Band is considered one of the top two bands of the state in Class A, and is competing for the No. 1 designation as state honor band.

Miss Blain reports the band took two Division I ratings at the Southwestern Music Festival in Amarillo recently, one of two of

the 10 Class A bands receiving these marks.

Following are some of the judges' comments on the band's performance:

Thielman, New Mexico State Univ.—"Excellent brass, the band has a great sound and plays with fine precision. A fine band . . . the school and community should certainly be proud, they are certainly fortunate to have you as a director . . . a really unbelievable job, especially for a school this size, you play like you were in a much higher classification, congratulations."

Jacobson, TCU—"I enjoyed the authority with which this band played."

Janzen, U. of Ark.—"This is a nice group which shows good training and represents a strong band program."

Miss Blain said that all the judges commented that the Cyclone Band played like a band of much higher classification.

## Rains Measure Up To 3 Inches In Plaska Area

Much of Hall County was blessed with rainfall last Saturday and early Sunday morning, as amounts up to three inches were reported.

Heaviest rains were in the Plaska area where amounts measured approximately three inches, while in the northern portion of the county about one-half to three-quarters of an inch were reported.

The heaviest rainfall appears to have fallen along a line from Turkey, where two inches were reported, across Red River through the Plaska area, on a northeastly path.

In the Newlin area amounts measured one to one and a half inches, while one rain gauge measured 1.30. Good rains were reported in the Estelline area and into Childress County.

Memphis received .70 of an inch according to Rayford Hutcherson, official weather observer.

Hall County voters will go to the polls Tuesday, May 18, to decide the fate of four proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution.

Only two persons had voted absentee in the election with absentee voting ending today at the county clerk's office.

Indications are there will be a light turnout of voters to express opinion on the proposed amendments; however, the importance of the issues being voted upon is vital.

No. 1 on the ballot is the amendment of state ethics commission plus legislative compensation; constitutional amendments in called sessions is No. 2; No. 3 is the welfare amendment; and No. 4 is the water bonds amendment.

Four polling boxes will be set up in Hall County, one each at Memphis (court house), Estelline, Lakeview and Turkey. These will be held in the regular polling places in each place. Polls open at 8 a. m. and close at 7 p. m.

Voters are urged to go to the polls and vote in the amendment election next Tuesday.

T. B. Rogers has resigned as executive director of the Housing Authority of the City of Memphis, it was announced this week.

The resignation was effective April 30, 1971, and O. S. Goodpasture was sworn in as executive director on May 1.

# Postal Rates To Increase To 8c On Sunday, May 16

Postage rate increases will take effect Sunday, May 16, Postmaster Gene Lindsey of Memphis announced this week.

Most postage rates will take effect May 16 as the new United States Postal Service begins its task of achieving self sufficiency as required by the Postal Reorganization Act, he reported.

General postage rates have not been increased since 1967, Postmaster Lindsey said, when Congress passed what was to become its final legislative act in this respect.

Lindsey explained that the new increases—authorized on a temporary basis until the newly created Postal Rate Commission can make recommendations to the Governors of the Postal Service on permanent changes—will raise first class letter rates from 6 to 8 cents an ounce, and airmail letter rates from 10 to 11 cents an ounce. Post cards will go from 5 to 6 cents each and airmail post cards will go from 8 to 9 cents each.

The increase will be borne more by business than by individuals, the postmaster pointed out, since about 75 per cent of first class and air mail is from commercial mailers.

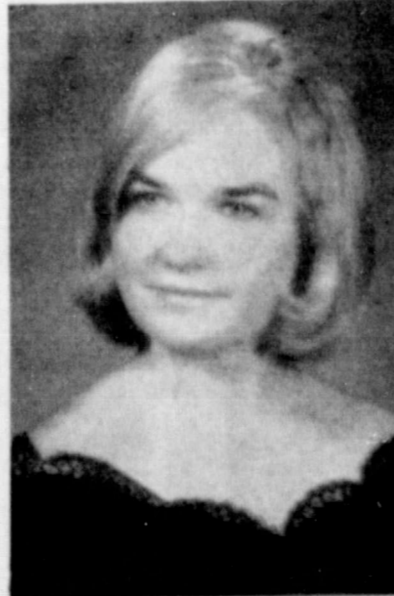
In addition to increases in

first class rates, second and third class will also go up on May 16. However, the full increases proposed by the Postal Service will not be put into effect on a temporary basis, in second and third class, since the postal reform legislation contemplates that such increases be phased over 5 years—or 10 years for non-profit organizations—provided Congress appropriates the necessary funds to ease the transition to full rates.

Because of the phasing provision, the increases to become effective May 16 for second and third class will generally be only 1/5th of the total increase which has been proposed by the Postal Service.

No changes are made in the rates for parcel post, which is the principal component of fourth class mail. However, initial increases will be made in the "book rate" which is classified as fourth class.

Recently the Rate Commission confirmed that it will not be able to make a decision within 90 days, and Sunday, May 16, was selected as the date on which the rates would become effective.

### Purcell Seeks True 'Parity' Of Farm Income

"Parity," which is defined by the dictionary as "equality," would be made meaningless if U. S. Department of Agriculture efforts to substitute a new figure, the "ratio," are successful, according to U. S. Representative Graham Purcell of Wichita Falls.

The Wichita Falls Record-News quotes Purcell as saying he has introduced legislation calling for a full investigation into what he termed USDA attempts to make farm income appear higher than it actually is.

Parity, as applied under existing law governing operation of USDA, is a level of income providing a farmer and his family a standard of living equivalent to that afforded persons in other occupations.

It takes into consideration the relationship between what a farmer pays for items going into production, and prices he receives for his crops and livestock.

Purcell, chairman of the livestock and grains subcommittee of the House Agriculture Committee, was joined by other farm state congressmen in introducing the bill. Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey, D-Minn., simultaneously introduced the bill in the Senate.

"Farmers are already well aware that they are not getting a fair shake from the Nixon administration," Purcell said. "A prime example is this new method of reporting parity." He said the new term appears to boost parity 20 points or more.

In January, farmers' incomes were at a parity of 67. According to the new formula, "suddenly, as if by magic, they appeared to have become one of the most favored economic groups in the U. S., with incomes at a parity 'ratio' of 90," Purcell charged.

#### Shades of Ben Franklin!

Remember Benjamin Franklin, the guy with the kite? Ben is in trouble today.

Take a look at the cancellation mark on your letters. It could read "U. S. Postal Service, N. H. 032."

There was a time when you could look at the cancellation and tell where the letter was mailed. Post Office people tell me that you can still have the local cachet put on what you mail, but you'll have to put it in a special box.

Mostly though they give advice. They suggest, if you want people to know you mailed the letter, that you have name and address and zip code number printed on the envelope. As printers, we could be expected to like that, but we don't. It's just another service that is deteriorating, another work we're paying some goddam organization to do for us.

Do you get a feeling of power when you spin your telephone dial and get your cousin in Peoria? Power it may be, but the telephone company has conned you into doing its work.

Now comes the Postal Service, doing the same thing. It's not the first time. The whole zip code bit was invented to get publishers to sort the mail the post office used to sort.

Ben Franklin's spirit should be troubled, though because the mail system he created as a public service has fallen prey to the demand that it earn a profit. He thought of it as a service because he could look ahead and understand how important it is for human beings to exchange information, or ideas, or presents or even medicine. He was concerned with getting the mail delivered on time.

That seems to have gone out of style now. Congress seems not to care whether the mail is delivered on time, as long as the Postal Service earns a profit.

Would you believe that there are Americans still living who can remember when there were two mail deliveries a day, one in the morning and another in the afternoon.

We're not advocating that, though. Since three-quarters of our mail is junk mail, once a day is enough.

But there's poor old Ben Franklin, the man many consider the greatest American who ever lived, and this great service he created is crumbling, while it raises its rates.

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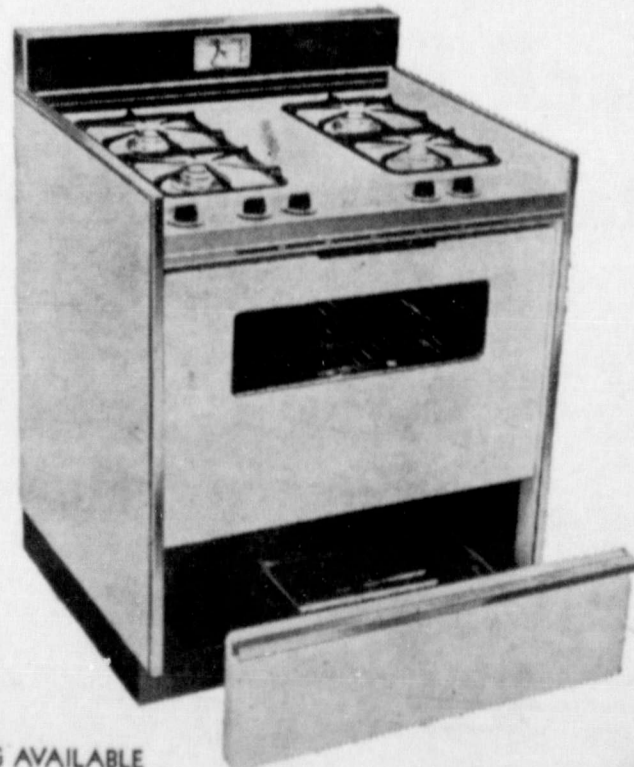

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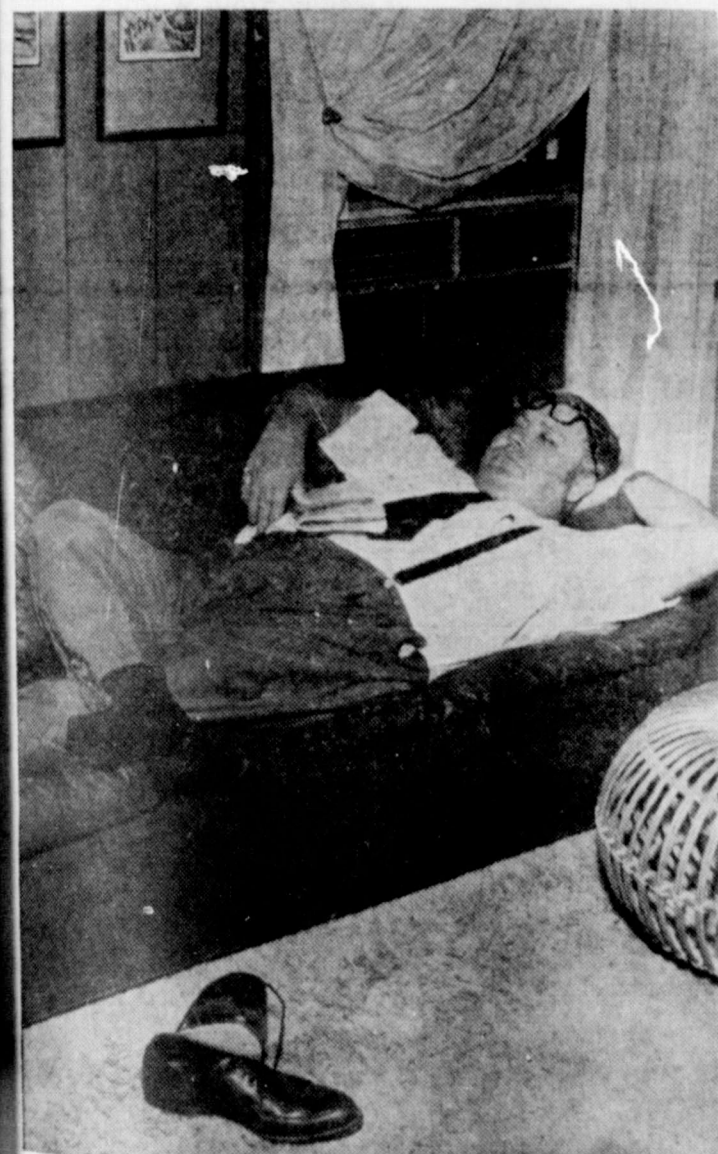

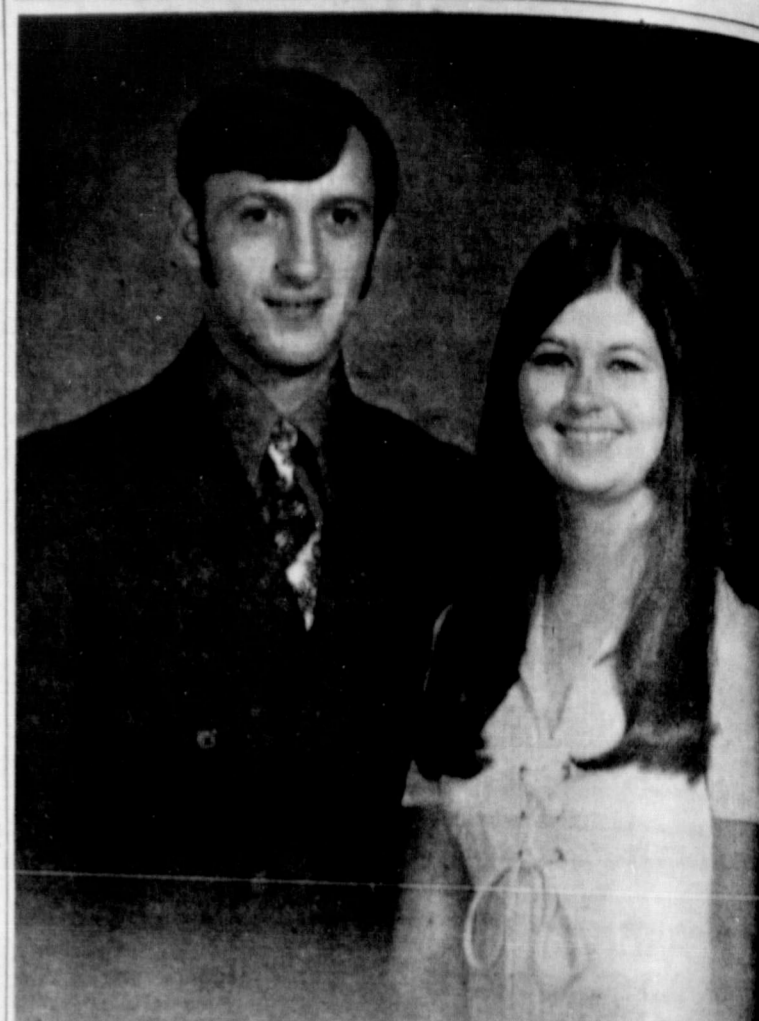

James and his wife, Becky, have two children, Amy and James.

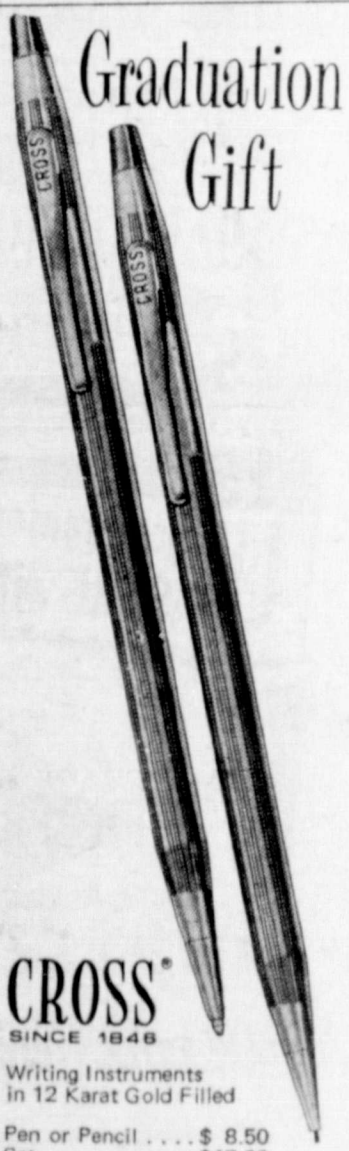

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# B. B. Shots

A few weeks ago I had an inquiry on a person in Memphis, but could not locate this person here. I consulted with our local post office for information in the Memphis, Tenn., directory. We did find a man in Tenn. After getting the name accomplished, I asked Postmaster Gene Lindsey to check the directory for a man that I knew from school here about 1912. He did find a Willie Litton listed and only clue on this party was J. Litton listed, and I did write a letter to this party to see if it was the right one. But this letter was six months late for Willie as he passed away Nov. 1, 1970. We all have good intentions sometimes we wait too late to write a loved one or a friend. The last time I saw Willie was about 30 years ago when he came by the store and I recognized him as soon as he came in with his smile he always carried with him. The past week I received a letter from Mrs. Litton I had never met, but I feel I know her now after reading the letter as she seems to have a feeling for Willie's friends. I quote a part of this letter as it is several around here in the 70's that would remember he was in the Methodist Hospital at Memphis, Tenn. On Sunday, Nov. 1, he was eating his dinner and in trying to swallow a piece of meat, it hung up in his throat and he could not get it up or down and he suffocated at once as he was so weak. The doctor told his wife that it was better for him to go on than to suffer with the malignancy that had just discovered. He did not know what his trouble was and was suffering from intestinal all the time. They celebrated their 54th wedding anniversary, Sept. 3, 1970. They had two sons, one son, Jack William, died in Knoxville, Tenn., June 1966, and one daughter, Alice Lancaster who now lives in Florence, Ala. She has four children and her oldest child, Barbara, has two children. As to Willie from Texas, he attended the Business College and after graduation, he kept books for a mill in the delta but chills never ran him away and he went to work for the California Growers Assn. Now it is

called Sunkist. He worked for these people in Atlanta, Ga., for 24 years and then back to Memphis, Tenn., and all told, he worked for Sunkist a total of 44 years and retired in 1960 when he was serving five states. His wife, Katie Costley Litton, was born and raised near Natchez, Miss. Katie says in closing her letter, that "It would not be complete without telling you that our marriage of 54 years were years of much love and great happiness." At the time Willie attended school here, he lived at the corner of 13th and Brice Streets. He and his grandmother, Mrs. Eden, lived with the Joe Creager family. Joe was express agent here in the early days and I believe it was Wells Fargo then. Mr. and Mrs. Creager had two sons, Earl and Jack. Earl died a few years ago as a retired colonel. Jack is now in the Wichita Falls area operating a ranch. Joe Creager died 12 years ago. His wife, Frances, is now living in Vernon. The home where the Creagers and Mrs. Eden lived was in a two-story frame house where Mr. and Mrs. Hollis Boren now live. After Hollis bought the property, he modernized it and made a brick home where has lived since the Creagers left here.

ition showed a very colorful field of Blue Bonnets with California poppies dotting the field and along the highway.

In checking up on our local airport from our chairman of this, Eddie Foxhall, we find that we have here locally about 14 or 15 pilots, so it seems that we are pretty well air-minded for our size town. If any of you away from here want to fly in here, you will find three thousand feet of lighted runway. We will be looking for you!

In looking over our fire fighting equipment the past Saturday, it made me go back in my thinking many years ago when the first fire department consisted of men and buckets who drew water from a well. This was called the "Bucket Brigade". The next fire department I remember here when we had the two wheel cart with some garden hose hanging on the side of the cart and we did not have any kind of pump as the tires were not inflated. The next modern fire fighting equipment was the fire wagon pulled by two white horses and the fire station was on the corner on 7th St. where Jim Vallance now lives. Pritchett Montgomery was the driver of these fast horses and when the fire bell started ringing, you could

hear these horses pawing the floor all over town until the chain was dropped and away they went to the fire. They could smell the smoke. I think it was about 40 years ago that we thought we really had progressed in our fire department. J. M. McKelvey (deceased), Bascom Davenport and I were on the fire committee from the City Council when it was time to buy a new truck. After several weeks of horse-trading, getting some new hose and fire boys raincoats, we finally traded for the old La France and it was tops then. In Fire Chief Kenneth Dale's report that we have really passed the antique stage in our fire department and I think we must be ahead of progress with all the rolling equipment now and 24 efficient volunteer fire boys. With this kind of operation, it helps property owners thousands of dollars in insurance.

Well, it was a sad day when they ran our last passenger train through Memphis. I can remember that before we had television, museums and sports, one of our main sights was to take our guests and kids down to the depot to see the train arrive and depart, waving at the engineer and conductors. Now it seems that all of the passenger trains that will run will be by

"Amtrak" (American Tracks) which was taken over by them on May 1 and a lot of our passengers had their last ride on April 30. We have the honor of having one of our Memphis citizens taking one of these last rides. Mrs. Clyde McMurray gave me this on this trip, "A Sentimental Train Ride". She and her children decided to ride the last C and O-B and O train from Washington D. C. to Cincinnati, Ohio and to St. Louis, Mo. on April 30. And on Friday at 4:35, they boarded the C and O at the Union Station at Washington D. C. Many of the passengers who had been riding this train for many years were commenting that this was their last ride. After making many stops through the night, the train pulled into Cincinnati, Ohio, about 7 a.m. Saturday morning, May 1, and the conductor came through and said, "All passengers Off". Janet said she had been told in Washington that their car would go through to St. Louis and she knew Clyde, her husband, would be in St. Louis waiting to meet them on this train. She asked the porter when the train would leave out and he replied that there would be no trains out of Cincinnati that day. Finally a con-

ductor boarded her car and said, "Little lady, because you bought your ticket in Washington yesterday, we are going to run this train for you to St. Louis." For a time, Janet, Tom and Susan were the only passengers on this "Janet McMurray Special" running from Washington D. C. to St. Louis. Some people would get on and ride from station to station with their families and make pictures. The crew on this special train ride consisted of two engineers, two conductors and a porter. The engineers invited them to ride in the engine cab as they pulled into St. Louis Union Station at 2:35 C. S. T. on May 1. Tom and Susan got a thrill out of this. Janet says sentimentally, "The children and I can always say that we rode the last C and O-B and O passenger train." When we hear those old songs about the "Wabash Cannon Ball", we will remember Memphis was represented. As the last train run was a special for Janet, Tom and Susan McMurray. Janet is the wife of our coach, Clyde McMurray.

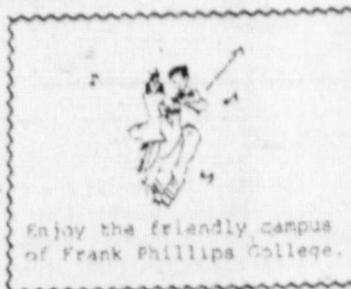
