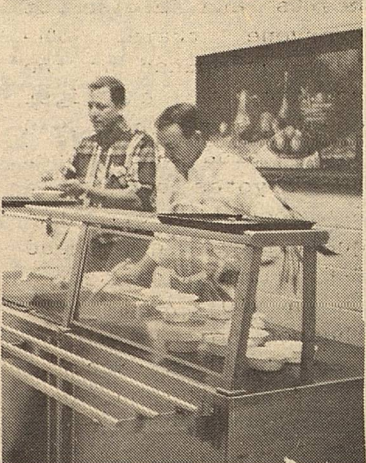

# COYOTE FOOTBALL



## COYOTES END SEASON IN THRILLER

The Borden County Coyotes hosted the league leading Sands Mustangs. The homecoming crowd was treated with a thriller from start to finish. The Coyotes trailed on the score board 36-30, but they had won the hearts and praise of everyone there. The Mustangs opened up the scoring on a first quarter run. Their 6-0 lead disappeared when the Coyotes used only 6 seconds of the quarter to go ahead 8-6. Jimmy Rios scored on a 10 yard run. Shannon Smithie kicked the PAT. After exchanging punts the Mustangs scored again to regain the lead at 14-8. The Coyotes failed to score on their next possession, and they were forced to punt. The Mustangs scored again to extend their lead. With only 1:32 seconds left in the half, the Coyotes scored. Patrick Herridge started the sweep play to the left and ran about 6 yards before being hit very hard at the 9 yard line. The ball shot out and rolled into the endzone where Jimmy Rios fell on the ball for a touchdown. Shannon Smithie kicked the PAT to bring the score to 20-16.

After an exciting halftime show that saw Julie Harris chosen as the Football Sweetheart, the Mustangs opened the scoring again to push their lead to 28-16. It only took a little over three minutes for the Coyotes to score. Jimmy Rios finished off the drive on a 13 yard toss from Brian Bond. Shannon Smithie kicked the PAT to move the score to 28-24. The next seven minutes provided a lot

of excitement, but no scores. With 7:26 left in the game, the Mustangs scored on a 3 yard run. The score was made possible because of an offside call on a Coyote lineman. On that play which was a fourth down try from the Coyotes 6 yard line, Brian Bond and Jimmy Rios came up and forced the Mustang's big tailback out of bounds on the 3 yard line. After gaining another try on the penalty, the Mustangs scored their last score. They used over four minutes to move 60 yards for their last score. The 11 play drive was capped off by a 1 yard run by Jimmy Rios on an option play where the ball was faked to fullback Cody Cooley and then pitched to Jimmy Rios. The defense stacked up inside, but no one took Jimmy. The snap was low and the extra point try failed. The Coyotes tried an onside kick, but the Mustangs recovered the kick. After three running downs, the Mustangs lined up in punt formation only to pass for a first down. With the Coyotes using all of their time outs, all the Mustangs had to do was to snap the ball two times and down the ball.

The Coyote defense played one of its better games of the year. They gave up 305 total yards of offense, but there was a lot of hard hitting on both sides. Brian Bond was the Coyotes leading tackler with 19 assisted tackles. Brian was playing linebacker on the left side, which was Sands favorite side to run. Defensive end James

Lewis also collected 15 tackles from the left side. He had 1 unassisted tackle. Safety Jimmy Rios and right side linebacker Shane Kemper had 18 tackles apiece. Jimmy had 5 unassisted tackles and Shane had 3. Middle linebacker Patrick Herridge had 16 tackles, 4 of which were unassisted. Defensive right end Jeff Lewis had 6 tackles, one of which was unassisted. Lance Telchik who also played defensive end had 2 assisted tackles. Cody Cooley and Cole Vestal had an assisted tackle each. Patrick Herridge knocked down a quick out pass inside the 10 yard line, and Brian Bond and Shane Kemper almost came up with two big interceptions.

The Coyotes offensive line did a good job creating holes for the running back. Senior James Smith centered the ball for both the regular and unbalanced formation. Senior James Lewis, Junior Cole Vestal, and junior Paul Sturdivant played ends for the regular tight formation Cole had 2 catches, one of which set up a Coyote touchdown. When they ran out of the unbalanced set, seniors Lance Telchik and Cody Cooley went in for extra blocking power. When they were in their

## Courthouse News

The Borden County Commissioners' Court, sitting in Regular Session, Monday, November 13th, 1989, after receiving a certified petition, ordered a Local Option Election to be held on December 9th, 1989, in Justice of the Peace Precinct Number 2, which is a County-Wide Precinct.

The proposition will be: For or Against, "The legal sale of all alcoholic beverages for off-premise consumption only."

Van L. York, County Judge, stated, "By law, the County is required to hold an election when a petition is presented and has been certified with the proper number of signatures of resistered voters."

County Clerk, Dorothy Browne said, "Absentee voting will begin in

my office on Monday, November 20th and will continue until Tuesday, December 5th during regular office hours. Anyone wishing to vote absentee by mail will be sent an application for a ballot upon request either by mail or telephone.

"The reasons to vote by mail are: 65 years of age or older; Religious belief; confinement in jail; disability; or expected absence from the County on election day and during clerk's regular office hours for the remainder of the absentee voting period. Application must be submitted from outside the county if the reason given for voting by mail is expected absence. The last date for mailing a ballot to be voted by mail will be Dec. 1, 1989.

Proffitt was born. He died there on May 8th, 1973. Later that year Johnie came to Snyder, Texas, to live near her sister, Zadie Mae. She then moved to the Miller Ranch in Borden County where she lived until 1987 when she went to Dolores, Colorado, to be near her son, Milton Proffitt.

Survivors include a daughter, Charles Mae Harmonson, Visalia, Calif., her son, Milton, a granddaughter and foster child, Judith Edgmon, Monterey Calif., grandsons, Mathew & Mark Proffitt and John King, Neva King, granddaughter, and several great grandchildren. Her sister, Zadie Mae Miller, Snyder, Tex, Edna Clark Miller, Borden County, Willie Clark Russell, Duncan, Okla., also survive.

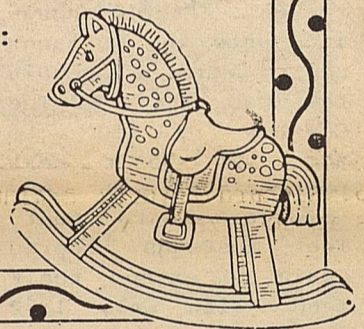

When asked about his work, Mr. Copeland replied, "I enjoy, and always have enjoyed working with young people."

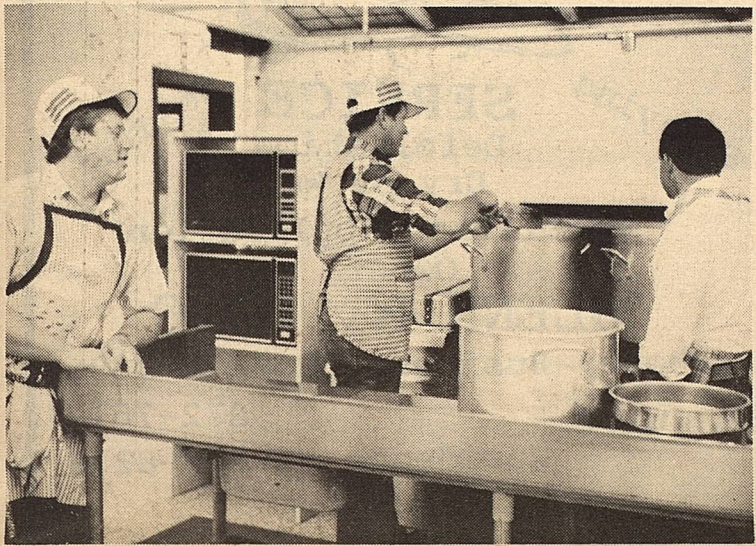

## PUBLIC NOTICE

Texas Utilities Electric Company ("TU Electric") hereby publishes NOTICE that, pursuant to the provisions of the Public Utility Regulatory Act and the Public Utility Commission's Substantive Rule 23.23(b)(2), it has filed an application on November 14, 1989, with the Public Utility Commission of Texas seeking authority to refund to its customers a prior over-recovery of fuel cost revenues in the amount of \$64,161,736 as of September 30, 1989, including applicable interest.

TU Electric has proposed that the refund be made effective with customer billings beginning in the first billing month following five days after entry of a Commission Order authorizing such refund. 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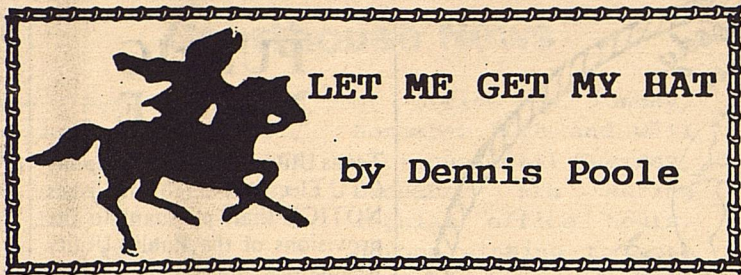

### Insects Seek Winter Homes

Insects are beginning to look for a place to spend the winter.

Most of the insects are just looking for a place to overwinter and are not establishing permanent residences.

These insects will be a nuisance and most of them do not present a great danger to the homeowner.

It is not uncommon for insects to enter attics or garages through cracks in the foundation, open windows or spaces around doors.

Mechanical control is possible by caulking all cracks to prevent

insect entry. Caulking also makes the structure more air-tight and should help lower heating costs.

Store firewood away from the house to help eliminate hiding places for the pests.

Homeowners should store firewood as far from the house as possible and take only the amount needed for immediate use into the house.

Firewood stacked beside the house may be handy but as the wood warms, spiders, scorpions and other pests may leave the wood and escape to other areas of the house.

### Practice Firearm Safety

Hunters and other sportsmen should make firearm safety a top priority.

Accidents with firearms don't just happen. They are caused by haste, carelessness or disregard for safety rules.

With hunting season at hand, hunters should review and practice firearm safety rules.

Remember these guidelines for firearm safety:

- ° Treat every gun with the respect accorded to a loaded gun.

- ° Watch that muzzle. Be able to control the direction of the muzzle even if you should stumble.

- ° Be sure the barrel and action are clear of obstructions and that ammunition is of the proper size for the gun you carry.

- ° Be sure of your target before you pull the trigger. Know the identifying features

of the game you hunt.

- ° Unload guns when they are not in use. Take down or have actions open. Guns should be carried in cases to the shooting area.

- ° Never point a gun at anything you do not want to shoot.

- ° Never climb a fence or tree or jump a ditch with a loaded gun; and never pull a gun toward you by the muzzle.

- ° Never shoot a bullet at a flat, hard surface or water.

- ° When target practicing, be sure your backstop is adequate.

- ° Store guns and ammunition separately beyond the reach of children and careless adults.

- ° Avoid alcoholic beverages before and during shooting.

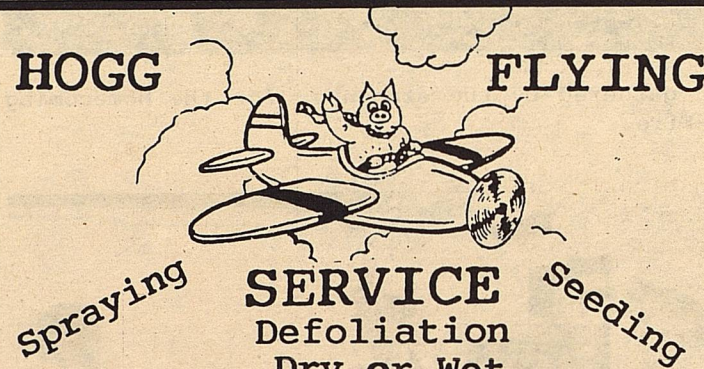
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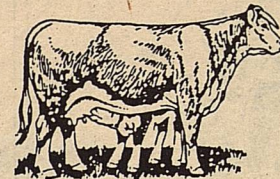

### 9-1-1- FOR BORDEN COUNTY

Borden County EMS President, Nelva Jones and

### RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, the 911 Emergency Telephone Number is a dedicated nationwide emergency number for police, fire and ambulance which provides major life saving advantages to citizens and public safety agencies; and

WHEREAS, Article 1432f, of the Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes, as amended, authorized the establishment of the Advisory Commission on State Emergency Communications and implementation to Enhanced 9-1-1 Emergency Telephone Systems in Texas; and

WHEREAS, Article 1432f, authorized the implementation of 9-1-1 through the development of regional plans and allows for counties having a population of 120,000 or less and cities within those counties to participate in the plan by resolution of their governing bodies; and

WHEREAS, Article 1432f authorizes the Advisory Commission on State Emergency Communications to establish in areas participating in the plan, a 9-1-1 service fee of not more than 50 cents a month per local exchange access line and a 9-1-1 surcharge on each customer receiving intrastate long-distance service of not more than one-half percent; and

WHEREAS, the Permian Basin Regional Planning Commission has developed a plan for establishment and operation of 9-1-1 service throughout the region it serves which has been presented to considered by this governing body; and

WHEREAS, the County of Borden authorizes the Permian Basin Regional Planning Commission to administer the 9-1-1 system and serve as the governing body.

NOW THEREFORE, BE RESOLVED by the County Commissioners of the County of Borden, Texas:

1. That the County of Borden, Texas, hereby agrees to participate in said plan for establishment and operation of 9-1-1 service throughout the Permian Basin Regional Planning Commission region:

## THINGS ALCOHOL DOES FROM A MEDICAL POINT OF VIEW

The brain is most affected by the presence of alcohol. Alcohol depresses the central nervous system, thus reducing the activity of the brain. Alcohol arrives in the brain almost as soon as it is consumed. The blood stream carries alcohol to the brain. It keeps circulating through the brain until the liver has had time to change (oxidize) all of the alcohol into carbon dioxide and water for release from the body. (The liver can only break down one-half ounces of pure alcohol per hour). During this period, the brain remains intoxicated. Exactly how soon the brain becomes affected depends on how quickly the alcohol passes from the stomach into the small intestines. Alcohol affects the higher functions of the brain--judgment, learning, and behavioral control. It then affects vision, coordination, and speech.

Alcohol use can lead to liver damage. Cirrhosis is the most severe, most often fatal, form of liver disease. All functions of the liver begin to fail. The excess alcohol kills the cells and they are replaced by scar tissue.

Large amounts of alcohol interfere with digestion, and cause irritation to the esophagus and the stomach lining.

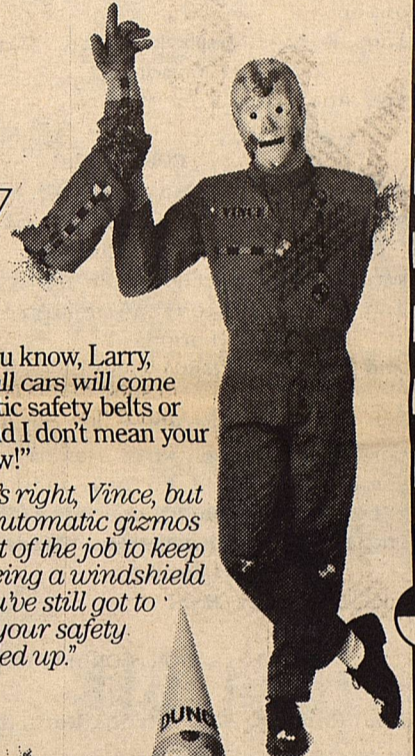

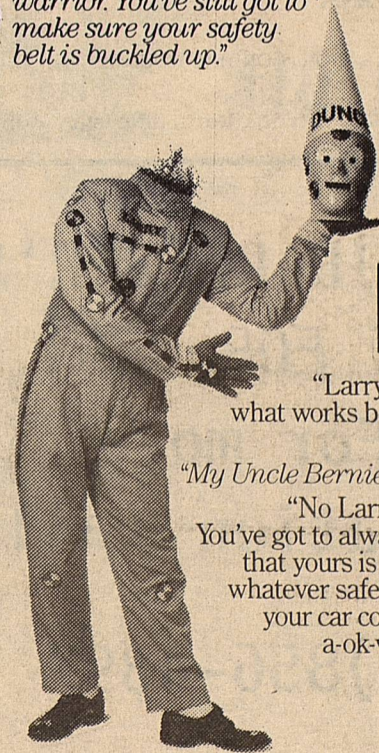
