# Top Golfers Are Expected For Inv. Tourney Here May 29-31

The Memphis Country Club's Annual Invitational Golf Tournament will be run off Saturday, Sunday and Monday, May 29-31, with qualifying and entry deadline set for late Friday afternoon, Don Cockrell, chairman of the tournament committee, announced this week.

The Memphis Invitational Golf Tournament over the past few years, since the club changed the date from late season (September) to early in the season, plus the addition of several features which golfers enjoy, has become one of the top amateur tournaments in this area.

The tournament, due to the size of the nine-hole course, has had to be limited to four flights, with the bottom three flights containing 16 men, and the championship flight varying, according to how many top flight golfers enter the tournament.

Barry Ward, who has been ramrodding the tournament plans, reports that some of the Pan-

handle's and Southwest's top golfers are indicating they will enter the Memphis Country Club tournament this year, including defending champion Max Hickey of Pampa, two-time winner of the tournament here.

Ward said, "we have a full schedule of activities planned for Friday night, Saturday night, and the big barbecue dinner Sunday night. Barbecue tickets are \$1.50 each for those not entered in the tournament.

The entry fee is \$17.50, and all golfers entering will be given a barbecue dinner ticket, and other special gifts as has been the practice here in past years.

Golfers will be vying for irons, woods, and golf bags as flight prizes, and all will have a chance of winning a new automobile—if, during regular tournament play, a hole-in-one is made on a par 3 hole, No. 8, being selected as the key hole this year.

There is little doubt at this time, according to reports from

members of the tournament committee, with almost 25 early entries already signed up for the tournament, that a full field will be on hand.

Championship will be 54 holes, medal play, with the field being cut following Sunday's 18-hole round. Golfers cut will go into the president's flight.

Lower flights will have 18-hole matches, Saturday and Sunday, with the finals being played Monday morning in 18-hole medal play for the survivors, to determine first, second and consolation winners.

Monday afternoon, the championship flight finals will be played, and there will be ample room on the course for spectators.

The Memphis Country Club course this year, though showing some signs of the drought on several fairways, is in excellent condition, with local golfers reporting the greens in the best condition in several years.

Citizens from all over the area are expected to be in the Memphis City Park at 7 p. m. tomorrow night (Friday) for the formal opening of the park season as the Memphis Lions Club sponsors its 16th Annual Park Opener.

The Memphis Cyclone Band will provide special entertainment for the occasion, and all will enjoy jumbo hamburgers and the ranch-style beans.

Those attending are invited by the club to stay for the drawing of cash prizes following the serving of the meal.

Tickets are on sale by Lions Club members at \$1 each, which entitles the holder to the meal and a chance at the five cash prizes, including a \$50 prize to a lucky winner regardless of whether he or she is present or not, and four prizes, \$25, \$10, \$10, \$5 for lucky winners present at the drawing.

Advance ticket sales for the affair have been running slightly behind schedule; so tickets will be available at the City Park Friday evening for those who might not have been contacted.

The Memphis City Park Opener is one of the Lions Club's biggest projects each year, and local members, under the overall chairmen, J. M. and John Ferrel, have been busy preparing for the annual event.

Profits from the affair go toward civic projects of the club.

Phillip Lillard, who is managing the Memphis City Park swimming pool, announced this week the pool will be open for the regular season on Wednesday, June 2, at 1 p. m., and swimming will be offered from 1 until 7 p. m.

The pool will be closed at 7 p. m., but private parties can be arranged for the evening hours by appointment, he said. Season tickets are \$10 at the pool.

## EDITORIAL

### Clean Up Week May 31-June 5

Memphis Mayor Kenneth Dale officially proclaimed the week of May 31 through June 5 as Clean Up Week for Memphis.

The City of Memphis crews will be making a special effort during the week to give assistance to property owners in Memphis in an effort to clean up the city.

The Simmons-Noel Post of the American Legion, helping with the project, is setting aside Saturday, June 5, as its big day with plans to clean up the Memphis City Park. The legionnaires and city officials are calling on all clubs and organizations to cooperate in the effort, share in the sponsorship, and do their part in making the clean up week successful.

This newspaper holds to the opinion that in order for the clean up to be successful, private property owners must do their part by cleaning up their own property and putting trash and debris into containers for city crews to carry off.

Memphis, in years past, has had outstanding cooperation from citizens, volunteering their services and equipment in behalf of civic organizations to load trucks and do their part in cleaning up unsightly spots all over town.

But, some private owners abused the circumstances of the clean up drive, demanding that messes be cleared from their property which by right should have been done by the property owners themselves. Some even demanded that trees be trimmed, dead trees uprooted and hauled away, and landscaping done, far exceeding the purpose and intent of the Clean Up project. Especially was this the case on many vacant lots over Memphis.

If private property owners will clean up their own property, placing trash and debris into containers and place the containers in the alleys, things will go smoothly.

Larger items should be hauled to the city dump by private means.

Cleaning up a town is of vital importance to the looks, health, and enjoyment of the community for everyone. Citizens living in a clean community have pride in the community.

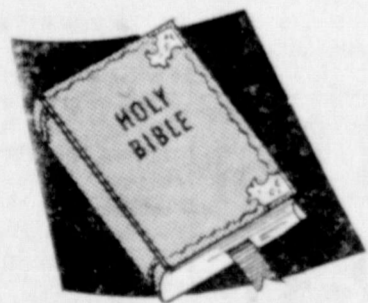

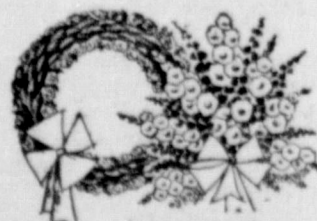

### Nature's Helpers

At this time of year, many a reluctant husband has been sent outside by his wife to do the spading and puring and digging that goes along with yard work.

As these husbands complain, they may take heart by the news from the world of science which point out that plants, trees and shrubs not only bring beauty to the world of man, they may even save his life.

Man can live for weeks without food, for days without water, but only minutes without oxygen. Plants produce oxygen through a process called photosynthesis. The plants absorb carbon dioxide from the air, convert it to plant food and release oxygen in the process.

Plant life is, therefore, a wea-

pon in the fight for environmental quality.

While autos, factories and jet planes release pollutants, the plants are absorbing them and releasing life-giving oxygen.

It is said that the average lawn on a home built on a 50-ft lot releases enough oxygen for a family of four during its growing season.

A home surrounded not only by green and growing grass, but also by leafy trees, is also being supplied with oxygen as the busy plants convert plant food and carbon dioxide into life giving oxygen.

Since plants, both on land and in the sea, provide man's only source of oxygen, it appears they are the ultimate weapons in the

war on pollution.

Rather than destroy as many plants as we do in order to lay down paving, buildings and other signs of progress, we should be planting more. Our very existence may some day depend upon it.

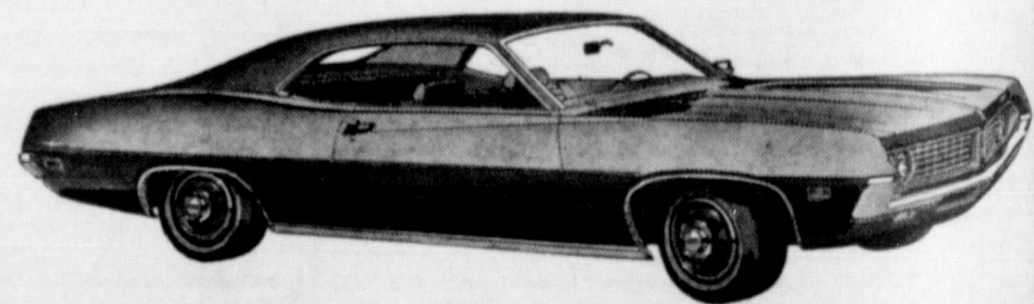

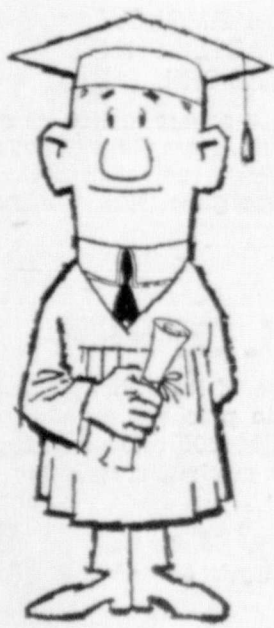

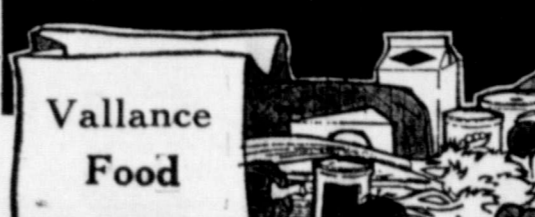

He headed it up until his graduation. Then he married Pauline Trippett, a co-ed from Fort Worth, and got a job with Associated Press. He stayed with AP for 16 years heading bureaus in Minneapolis, Albuquerque and Phoenix until 24 years ago, he came executive editor of the Phoenix newspapers. He went from there to the top of the Republic-Gazette organization and played a major role in building those newspapers into two of the best in the nation. Harry has had many honors in and out of the trade and has become nationally known and respected. He is retiring as of July 1 but will remain as an advisor to the Republic and Gazette newspapers of which he had served as associate editor. Herschel Montgomery now with the Times Herald in Dallas is the brother of Harry's and at one time, Herschel was a partner of the late J. C. 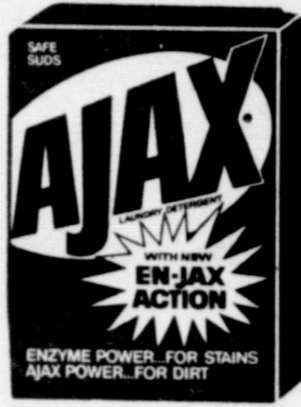

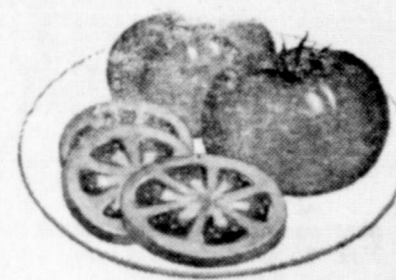

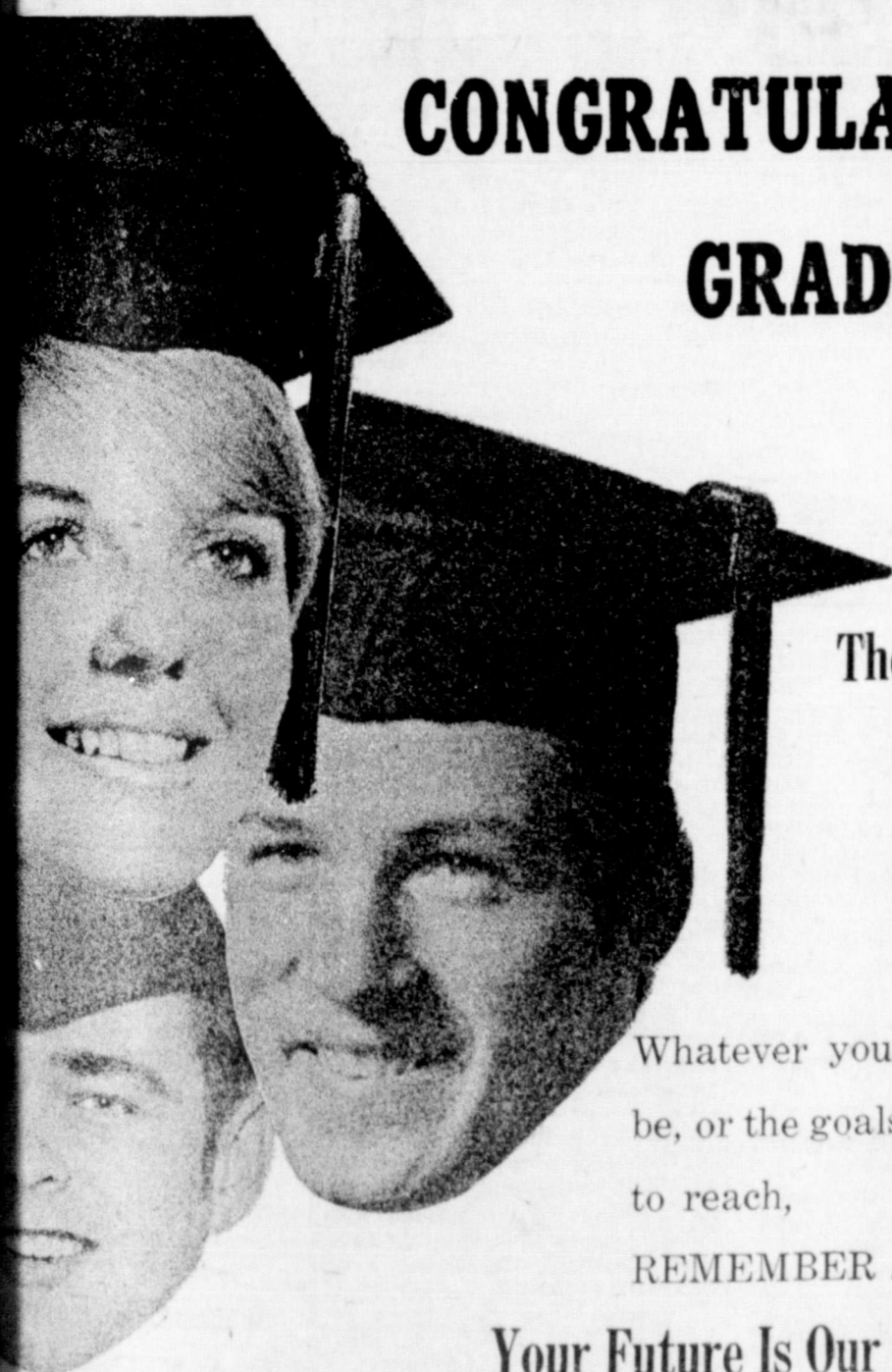

Current interest rates on emergency loans are four and seven-eighths per cent, repayable as soon as possible consistent with the financial ability of borrowers, Futch said.

Applications for loans should be made at the county office of Farmers Home Administration, located in Memphis, Texas.
