The Simmons-Noel Post of the American Legion, helping with the project, is setting aside Saturday, June 5, as its big day with plans to clean up the Memphis City Park. The legionnaires and city officials are calling on all clubs and organizations to cooperate in the effort, share in the sponsorship, and do their part in making the clean up week success-

This newspaper holds to the opinion that in order for the clean up to be successful, private property owners must do their part by cleaning up their own property and putting trash and debris into containers for city crews to carry off.

Especially was this the case on many vacant lots over Memphis.
