## Sidewalk Sale To Be Held Saturday

Memphis merchants are going all out for the first summer "Sidewalk Sale" of the year with the event scheduled for all day Saturday, June 26.

Merchants, through the Memphis Chamber of Commerce Retailers Committee, cooperated in two highly successful sidewalk promotion sales last year and enthusiasm for the sale Saturday is running high.

Last summer during the sales motorists on the square in Memphis had to proceed cautiously due to the large number of shoppers overflowing the sidewalks in front of stores participating in the event.

The event Saturday promises to be even bigger than last year, as more local merchants are participating, as advertising in this week's issue of The Democrat reveals.

Due to the wide variety of merchandise offered, this year's June sidewalk sale should attract women and girls, men and boys, as there is something for all members of the family on sale at real price savings.

John Fowler is chairman of the retailers committee of the chamber, the committee which handles the cooperative efforts for the sidewalk sale.

This year's sale promotion appears to be well organized as local merchants are getting more experienced. Merchants expressed an additional sideline to the sale by saying they enjoy the whole affair, despite the added workload.

Actually, merchants have been "hawking" their wares, "haggling" over prices, and in general recreating the old market place concept of selling merchandise.

One newcomer to Memphis observed that the Memphis Square is just like a big, open air mall.

Some merchants this Saturday are extending their sales operation to inside their stores, as well as sidewalk activities.

The real drawing card is that shoppers, near and far, can come to Memphis in a relatively short time, shop for savings with many different stores, all having promotions simultaneously.

This type of cooperation by merchants is why the sidewalk promotion is such a big attraction. Also, a one-day sale allows merchants to offer exciting buys on merchandise.

### Estelline ISD Lowers Tax Rate

The Estelline Independent School District has lowered its tax rate from \$1.77 per \$100 valuation to \$1.63 per \$100 valuation. Supt. Aubrey Spear announced this week.

The superintendent announced that the new rate of \$1.63 was broken down into \$1.50 for operation and maintenance, and \$.13 for bonded indebtedness and interest and sinking.

The maintenance portion of the tax rate remained the same, Supt. Spear said, while the indebtedness portion of the rate was reduced from \$.27 to \$.13.

"The reduction of the tax rate was made possible in the Estelline School District following the re-evaluation of taxes last year," he said.

Services will begin at 7:30 p.m. and the public is invited.

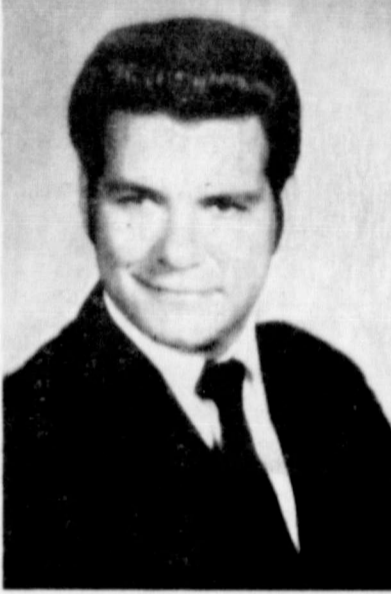
Speaker Friday evening will be Wayne Butcher, a former member of the notorious band of Hell's Angels in California and a former dope addict.

Interment was in Fairview Cemetery under direction of Spicer Funeral Home.

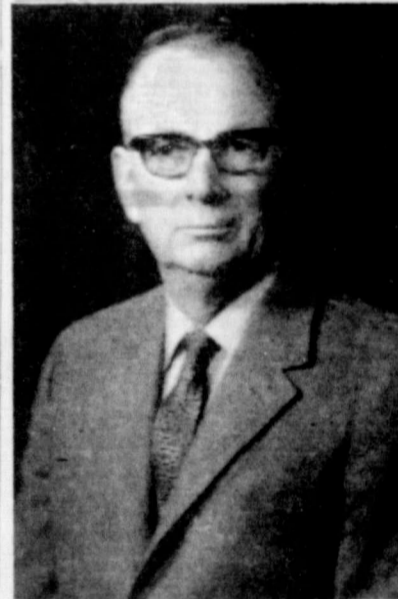
Mr. Aduddell passed away at his home Tuesday morning.

## EDITORIAL

### Can Rural America Recover In Time?

Michael A. Carson, in the Congressional Quarterly, Washington, asked the question, "Can rural America recover in time?"

He quoted Rep. Lee H. Hamilton, D. Ind., who recently told a bipartisan caucus of U. S. Representatives, "It is no secret that rural America has been declining for many decades. Rural poverty and powerlessness are facts of our time."

The caucus was organized to discuss what one member termed "the sickest part of our economy, the most basic industry in this nation — agriculture."

Somewhat belatedly, the 92nd Congress is focusing increased attention on the problems of rural America. A growing militancy can be detected among America's rural population, as farmers conclude they are not sharing equitably in America's prosperity.

"Last year farm people got 78 percent as much income as non-farm people . . .", Sec. of Ag. Clifford M. Hardin has told the Joint Economic Committee of Congress. "Income from nonfarm sources is becoming a larger and larger component of the net incomes of farm people."

Rep. John Melcher, D-Mont., told the House farm caucus, "In 1970 . . . we produced 30 per cent more food and farmers were paid \$800 million less net for producing it than in 1950—20 years before. And what they were paid was in dollars of far less purchasing power than 1950 dollars."

"The best rural development program we can adopt is a program to boost the income of family farmers. They are the economic and social base for a strong rural society," he said.

The low level of parity is a very common economic complaint among farmers today. Farm parity percentages compare prices of farm produce to prices farmers must pay to buy non-farm products.

Parity levels during the Nixon administration have slipped downward from the Johnson years. During the 1968 campaign when Nixon promised he would "do better than the Democrats on the parity issue," the parity level stood at 74. On April 30 of this year, the Agriculture Department announced that the farm parity level was 69.

Population growth patterns reflect significant migration from rural to urban areas, about half of all counties in the nation, most of them rural, lost population over the decade of the 1960s and another one-quarter grew slightly.

"Since 1945, there has been a net migration from rural America of 25 million making it . . . a major reason for urban crisis. Each year over 500,000 people from farms and rural communities migrate to big cities," said Rep. Clarence E. Miller, R-Ohio.

"We must begin to realize that today's rural problems are the urban problems tomorrow and that better balance between the rural and urban sectors is required," he said.

The underdevelopment of rural America has resulted in rural poverty, high unemployment, substandard housing, inadequate health services and poor educational systems.

"In cities, one person in eight is poor; in the suburbs, one in 15; but in rural America, one in every four is poor . . ." Rep. Hamilton told the House farm caucus.

Several major rural development bills have been introduced in the Senate during the 92nd Congress:

—An Administration bill would establish \$1.1 billion revenue-sharing program for rural development.

—A bill sponsored by Sen. John L. McClellan, D-Ark. and 39 co-sponsors would provide incentives for a more even geographic distribution of industrial growth.

—A bill sponsored by Sen. James B. Pearson, R-Kan., and 49 co-sponsors would grant tax incentives to encourage the development of new job-creating industries in rural areas.

These bills have been undergoing hearings. Rural America's plight continues to worsen every time it is announced that the cost of living index climbs, which makes the rural dollar even less valuable. The problem is stated well in Carson's article. The solution should be keeping the lights burning late in the Halls of Congress.

#### Firsthand Knowledge

A young, former Communist has told, in copywright story in Campus Life magazine, how, as a member of a German branch of the Students for a Democratic Society, he helped to form mass demonstrations. He pointed out that the trick is to get a few trained, hard-core people with an understanding of mass psychology, till they have to march.

As soon as the crowd is confronted by police, the hardcore throw rocks or molotov cocktails, then disappear to the back of the crowd and cheer them on. If the communist organizers are lucky, the police will fine on the crowd and kill one innocent bystander just what the hardcore organizers want. The tragedy gives them an opportunity to profess great sorrow for the victim and make an issue of police brutality. They cynically work on the sympathies of the mob while staying safely back from the firing line. As a former participant in such demonstrations, the young ex-communist said the pattern was reminiscent of the incident at Kent University in the United States.

The youthful former communist lost interest in the communist philosophy when he discovered many of collagues were merely in the movement for fun or profit. He mentioned one who sold his memories at a fat price and became a capitalist after which he would have nothing to do with his former companions. It is sickening to conjecture how much strife and how many broken lives, injuries and deaths have resulted from these mob-arousing

tactics described by a youth who speaks from first hand knowledge. —The Claude News
