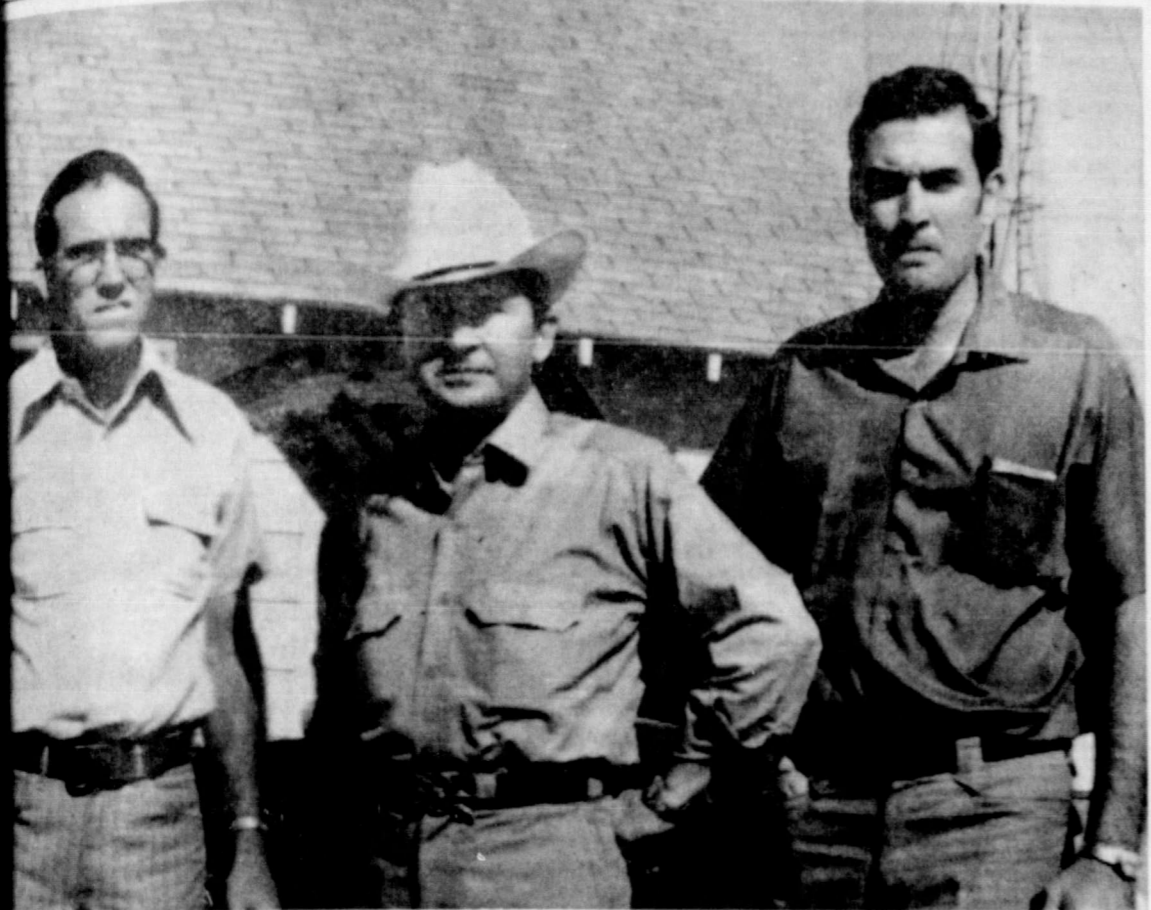

County Agent Gives Answers From Veterinarian On VEE

BULLETIN—According to Veterinarian, Dr. Jack Fowler of Memphis, there have been 200 horses vaccinated against VEE, by himself, since vaccine was made available to him. The Memphis Veterinarian also said that he has available the vaccine he needs to vaccinate horses in this area. Dr. Fowler has been picking up vaccine at 5 a. m. and working hours.

(Editor's Note: The following information was received early Monday morning and released by County Agent B. Hooser to answer most questions which owners of horses are asking pertaining to a quarantine order regarding the serious threat of the disease VEE (Venezuelan Equine Encephalomyelitis).

According to Dr. Pitcher, a local veterinarian at Austin, a live vaccine for use in horses has been approved for wide use. The quarantine issued by state officials is an on-premise quarantine and no equines will be permitted to move off premises until they have been vaccinated against VEE and two weeks have been allowed to allow them to develop immunity.

The following questions and answers of interest to horse owners have been worked out by Dr. D. Maurer, associate dean of the A&M University Veterinary College, in cooperation with Dr. Pitcher, federal veterinarian, Austin.

Q. Will the vaccine currently available in the U. S. to protect against VEE and EEE protect against VEE?
A. No, these three diseases are caused by immunologically different viruses so that a separate vaccine must be used for each disease.
Q. Is there a safe and effective vaccine available against VEE?
A. Yes, there is a safe and effective vaccine available in Texas which will protect against this disease providing horses are vaccinated at least 10 days before exposure to the virus. This is an experimental attenuated virus vaccine developed by the U. S. Army for human use, but it has been used with excellent success in some two million horses of South and Central America. As soon as current tests are completed, it is expected that it will no longer need to be classified as experimental.

FHA Has Helped 118 Farmers Secure Loans

The rural economy of Hall County is stronger because loans from the Farmers Home Administration have helped 118 farmers finance real estate or operating expenses, James E. Chappell, county supervisor of the Farmers Home Administration said today.

These loan programs supervised by the rural credit arm of the U. S. Department of Agriculture will be repaid, with interest, Chappell said.

The farmer programs are one part of a three-point attack on rural problems by the Farmers Home. The other two, also operating in Hall County, include loans for home ownerships and for water and sewer systems.

During the past year 12 families here have secured loans that will enable them to move into modern new homes.

The agency's wide range of services added a record \$2,283,000 to resources available for housing, farming and community facilities in this county last year. At year's end, the outstanding loan total in the county had climbed to \$5,709,318.00 and was providing direct benefits to 226 families in the area.

Farmers Home Administration loan services are extended through a statewide system of local county offices, usually located in county seat towns. Housing loans are made for homes in the rural countryside and rural towns of not more than 10,000 population. Community facility projects may serve rural towns of not more than 5,000.

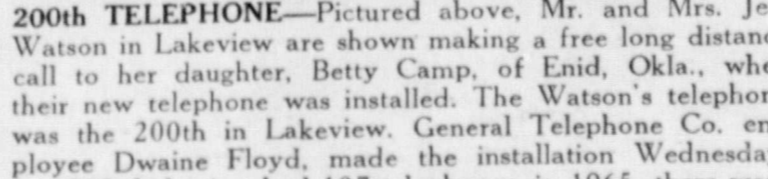
