Football Sessions To Begin On August 16

The Memphis Cyclone football camp will assemble on August 16, and Coach Clyde McMurray reported this week that over sixty boys are expected.

The 1971 high school football squads have promising seasons and it appears now that there will be one of the largest numbers of boys in recent history out for

football. In announcing the beginning of workouts, Coach McMurray said that shoes will be issued five days prior to practice sessions which will begin Monday, Aug. 16.

All participants will be required to get a physical examination, from the coaches or at the Doctor's offices. "Our boys can start getting their physicals now as this will make it easier on the Doctors," Coach McMurray said.

Workouts will begin August 16 and that week the schedule calls for two-a-day workouts. The B teamers will work out from 8 a. m. to 10 a. m. and from 6 p. m. to 8 p. m. each day that week.

Varsity boys will work out from 10 a. m. to 12 a. m. and from 8 p. m. to 10 p. m. that week. Boys reporting should plan to attend both workout sessions each and every day, at the time their respective teams are practicing.

Coach McMurray said he wanted the boys to understand that during the week of two-a-day, the boys are required to attend both morning and evening practice sessions.

Coach McMurray also urged all boys coming out for football to begin running now to make it easier on themselves in fall drills.

There are 30 new helmets for members of the varsity squad the coach explained. "According to the manufacture representative, these helmets have to be 'sweated in' before they fit properly. In other words, they will fit tight until after several practices, therefore a short hair cut will make it easier for this head gear to fit properly."

Federal Emergency Drouth Help!

Recently this newspaper received a copy of a pamphlet entitled, "Guide to Federal Emergency Drouth Help available in Texas." The pamphlet was prepared by the Federal Interagency Drouth Committee Office of the President, and is being distributed through government agencies.

The pamphlet is to answer such questions as: What kinds of federal assistance are available to farmers, ranchers, farm workers, small business men, and others hit by the severe drouth in parts of Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico?

Answers in general terms, have been consolidated in a 16-page pamphlet prepared in English and Spanish. Copies are available at county offices that handle U.S.D.A. drouth assistance programs and information, including County Agents, ASCS (FHA, and SCS.)

The information in the pamphlet is general because not all counties qualify for all programs, the Interagency Drouth Committee points out.

Individual farm operators or owners who need assistance through the federal government should discuss his needs with his county ASCS, SCS, or FHA office. These offices which programs operate in each county and can request for additional assistance that may be needed.

One thing that is being done is disbursement of FHA loans to drouth affected farmers and ranchers. Another is that the federal government has been subsidizing the purchase of feeds grains to assist drouth-affected stockmen in the three-state area. Also hay has been transported with two-thirds of the transportation costs—up to \$20 per ton—paid for by federal funds.

Emergency conservation program has been initiated with the government to pay up to 80 per cent if costs of such practices as water development, deep plowing, pipeline installation and water facility construction.

The government has tried a one-month Texas Weather Modification Experiment, conducted by the Bureau of Reclamation in cooperation with the Air Force and private contractors.

One thing that is being urged by farm organizations is the modification of the regulation in the cotton program which reduces payment yield when a cotton farmer loses a crop because of a drouth disaster. This provision, presently in the law, would be discriminatory when applied to areas which do not produce a crop because of the drouth disaster.

Sec. of Agri. Hardin has announced to Cong. Bob Price that cotton farmers hit by the drouth are being offered greater income protection by the manner in which their cotton yields will be computed for program payment purposes in 1972. An adjustment in the farmer's actual 1971 cotton yield up to 90 per cent of his 1971 yield—instead of the previous level of 80 per cent—will be permitted where this year's yield is reduced by adverse natural conditions.

What Other Editors Say

Slanted News Harms Everyone

Vice President Spiro Agnew has leveled harsh criticism of "the press," and judging by public response, there are many who agree with him. What bothers us is that some of the "establishment" papers, while condemning the Vice President, seem to go out of their way to prove him right.

Case in point: last summer Associated Press dispatched a story which read: "Birmingham, Ala. - An all-white jury has decreed the death penalty for a Negro convicted of robbing a white girl of \$30 and a wrist watch.

"The seven women and five men of the Circuit Court jury deliberated less than three hours before returning the verdict against John Henry Jones, Jr., 23."

The AP story then went on to relate the 18-year old girl testified that Jones forced his way into her car at gunpoint; that the maximum penalty for armed robbery under Alabama law is death; all death sentences are appealed automatically to the state Supreme Court; and that Jones still faced two counts of criminal assault, one of abduction and one of assault with intent to murder.

One of the big-city dailies published only the first two paragraphs of the five-paragraph story, and headlined it: "\$30 Robbery Brings Negro Death Penalty."

What were the facts?

On a September, 1969 Saturday afternoon, Rose Marie Campisi 17, was reported missing, last seen at a local hospital where she had taken her brother for treatment. Search parties were organized and throughout the following day the search continued. One Sunday morning, the members of the church, mostly young teenagers, organized a search party under the direction of the church priest. Approximately 4 o'clock that afternoon, her car was found at the bottom of a 100 foot ravine. The young girl was found locked in the trunk compartment, disrobed, raped, beaten and very seriously injured. She remained several weeks in the hospital and suffered permanent injuries.

When Jones was arrested, he had the pawn ticket for the victim's watch. He was identified by the shop operator as the person who pawned the watch, taken from the victim at the time of the rape. Rose Campisi testified that after the defendant abducted her at the hospital, he drove her to an isolated area, stopped the car, dragged her seventy feet into the woods, stripped her of her clothing, beat her with his fists, kicked her, raped her, dragged her back to the roadway where he tied her hands and feet together, placed her in front of the car and ran the car over her. She further testified

that the defendant then put her in the trunk of the car, slammed the trunk door on her, and drove the car over the precipice. She remained in the trunk for twenty-four hours before being found, miraculously alive. It was further found that an attempt had been made to set the car on fire before it had been run into the ravine.

Clearly, the AP story did not accurately report the dastardly nature of the crime that had been committed. The clear implication of the dispatch was that the defendant, being black, was given a maximum penalty sentence for a minor crime against a white girl; a "black lie" in the truest sense.

Such obvious, blatant distortions bring discredit to everyone in the field of journalism. As members of that profession, we resent such of the news far more than does the Vice President or anyone else, and we think it should be stopped.

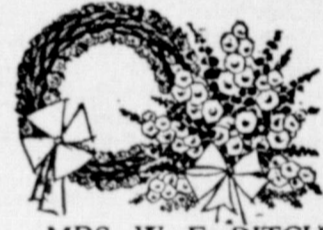

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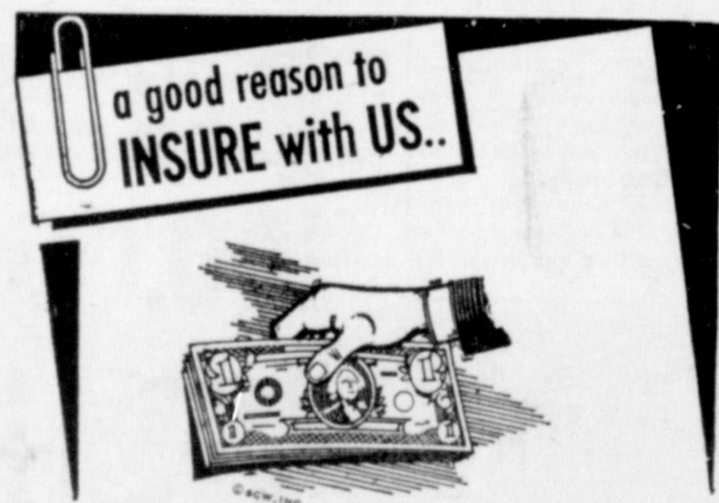
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William Watson Joins SCS Unit Staff Here

His wife is an art-English teacher, and she plans to join him in the near future.

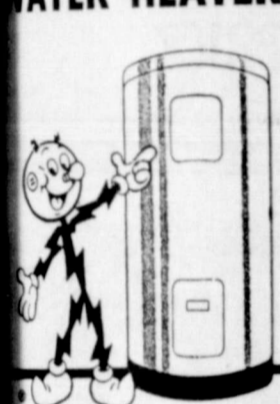

Local Citizens Are Asked To Control Mosquitoes In Statewide Effort

Considerable publicity has been given to Venuequan equine encephalomyelitis and its impact upon Texas, and potentially the nation's horse industry.

Since mosquitoes are considered to be the prime vectors of this serious disease which attacks horses and, in a milder form humans, Federal, State and local officials are marshalling their forces in determined efforts to provide large-scale mosquito control where these pests are a problem.

Area control programs consisting of larviciding, spraying and fogging can effectively reduce mosquito populations. Individual homeowners, says County Agent W. B. Hooser, can help greatly to destroy mosquitoes and possibly prevent the spread of VEE by eliminating mosquito breeding areas on or near their own premises.

Mosquitoes cannot hatch unless they are in water, so all standing water should be eliminated. Mosquitoes frequently breed in commonly overlooked containers such as old tires, tin cans, jars, tubs, bird baths, unused fishponds, evaporative coolers, or even on a flat roof where water accumulates.

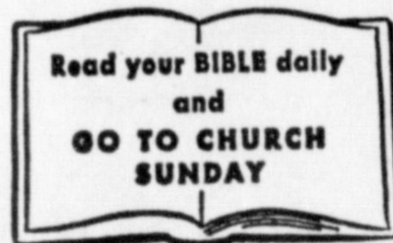
