ASC Office To Give Information

All residents of Hall County obtain answers to questions on operation and interpretation of the Presidential Order of Aug. 1971 on prices, rents, wages and salaries from the Hall County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) office, according to Larry B. Rogers, executive director of the office.

County ASCS offices throughout the United States have been given as information centers to answer questions from all citizens on President Nixon's Executive Order which is designed to curb inflation and strengthen the national economy.

The Hall County ASCS office is receiving official answers to questions concerning the President's action, and any person in the county who wants or needs more information should get in touch with the County office, Rogers said.

The Hall County ASCS office is located on the corner of 6th and Noel Streets, and the telephone number is 259-2534. The office has a staff of seven persons.

Our and all ASCS offices throughout the nation, will function as information centers in all areas outside of highly urbanized areas," Rogers said.

County ASCS offices are not to handle complaints or appeals, Rogers said. They will serve only to provide official information. Persons with complaints will register with the most convenient district or sub district office of Internal Revenue Service.

Neither will interpretations or answers be made by ASCS county office people. They will answer those questions for which answers have been supplied. If they don't know the answers to a specific question, they will refer it to the district office. If a member of the public wants the county office to answer the question by phone or mail to the district IRS office," Rogers said.

Normal functions of ASCS offices are to administer farm acreage programs of the U. S. Department of Agriculture on the local level. ASCS service to farmers will continue without interruption.

The three new committeemen will serve on the committee with 35 other cotton leaders in the nation.

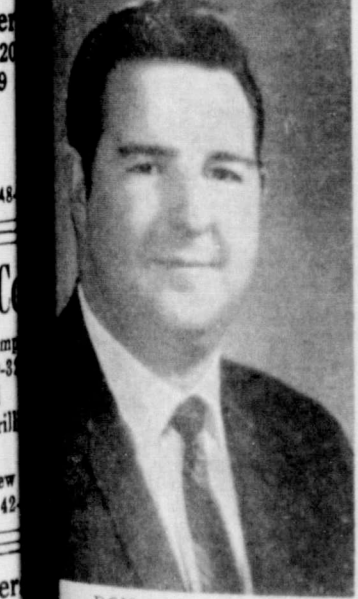

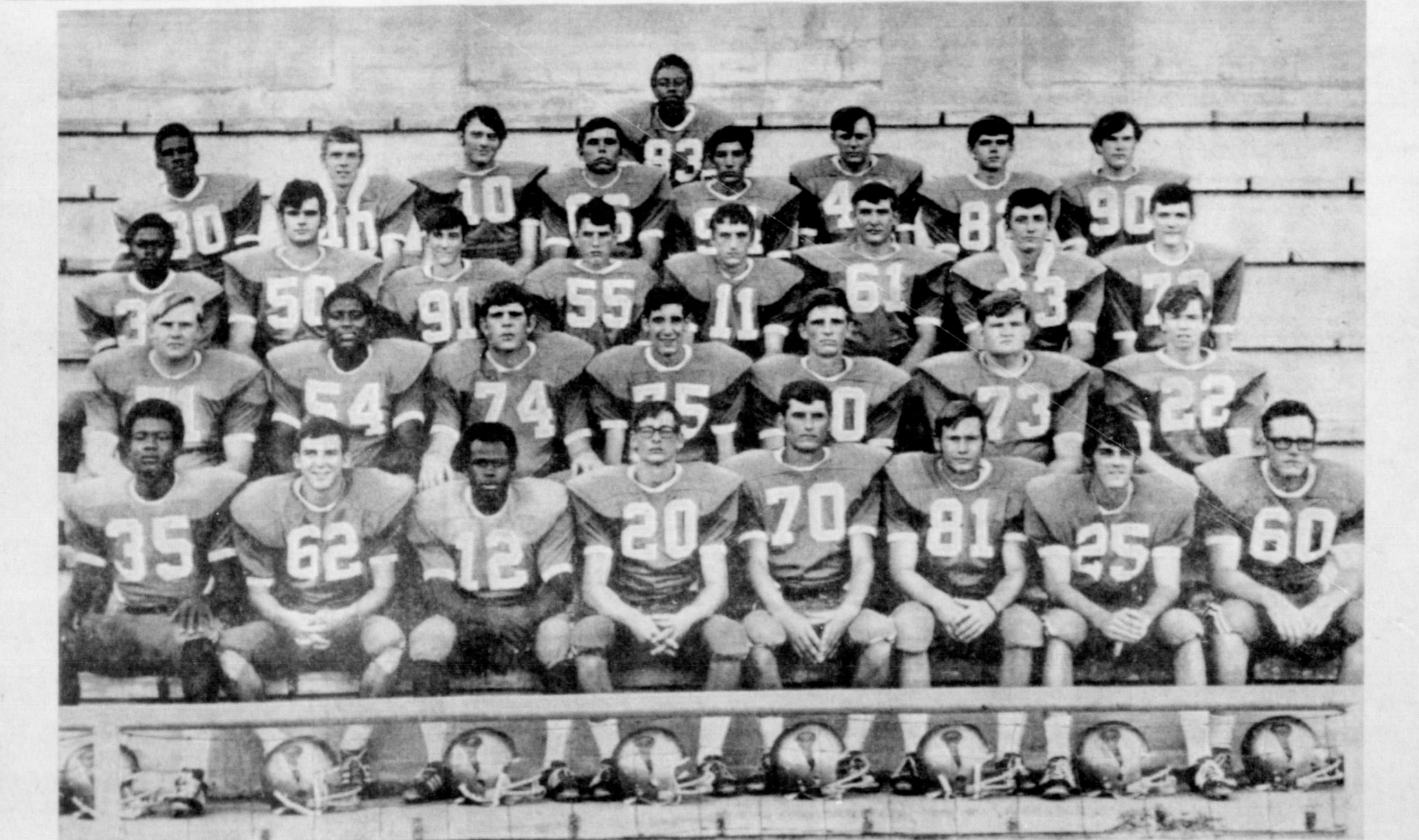
Don Moore Is Music-Youth Min.

Friday night is the big night in High School football as stadium lights will go on all over the state, and thousands of young men will anxiously put on their football gear, try to settle the jitters and silently hope they will be able to perform well for their school, their team and, most importantly of all, themselves.

Here at Cyclone Stadium the Memphis team, like all the others, has gone through many hours of practice and preparation. The old problem of "getting in shape" is long past... but now the test is more of a question of the skill and conditioning, and reaction.

Memphis' opener is with White Deer, a real strong Class A ball club, with size, experience, power and talent. Memphis is not expected by prognosticators to win the game. But games are not played by prognosticators, nor news writers, nor even coaches, but are played by 11 young men at a time pitting their skill, speed, strength, and courage against one another, in a battle against time, where one mistake can be so costly it loses the whole show, or where one tip of the football can mean the game.

For the local team, a lot of things are going for them this season. But of these things, the most noticeable was evident in the Memphis-Quannah scrimmage, and that was enthusiasm and spirit. This quality in a ball club is a most valuable asset.

The first test will be the White Deer Bucks, their solid line and star-filled backfield. In the Cyclone camp this week, spirits were high, workouts were excellent according to the coaches despite the hot temperatures. The game with White Deer has been considered like all season openers, a place to begin. Ten games are on the schedule and the local boys will play all 10 of them. The last five are against district opponents and these are the important ones.

Cyclone Boosters were warned Tuesday night not to adopt a defeatist attitude about White Deer. The Memphis team is going on the field to give a good accounting of themselves and let the victory go to the squad that does best. "We're not making a season on this game, but our bunch wants a victory to start off right," Coach McMurry said. Words of condolence has arrived from all over the Panhandle about the tough opener Memphis has to play. This feeling is not present in the Cyclone camp as the local boys in black and gold are looking forward to the contest with anticipation.

Feeling sorry for poor Memphis... Memphis has a good team on paper... and other ideas of this nature crop up regularly. The test is there, the challenge issued.

After the past losing seasons, Memphis squadmen need encouragement, loyal, rooting fans, a town and school behind them.

Cyclone Boosters are reminded that the meeting will be at 7:30 p.m. Monday night, instead of Tuesday, next week only.

Fans, when you go to a High

School football game, the young men out there are not getting paid to play. Only a select few ever get chosen to play on college teams. They play the game all the way, win or lose, for the excitement and thrill of it.

A victory for White Deer would be an expected thing. A victory for Memphis would shock the entire state, throw ratings in a tail spin and make nine other opponents on the Cyclone schedule "real shakey." "To get on top you have to beat the good ones, and to stay there you have to improve." I read one time in a history book about gun fighters. I mention this because of the many slogans decorating the walls in Allen Field House.

New Applications Must Be Submitted By Retail Grocers

Retail grocers in the state of Texas who participate in the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture's Food Stamp Program will be required to submit new applications.

The grocers will need to re-apply due to automation of the processing of redemption certificates (deposit) slips retailers use in redeeming food stamp coupons they have received for eligible food) and the need to update information maintained on all participating retailers, according to Martin Garber, southwest regional administrator for the Food and Nutrition Service the agency administratively responsible for USDA food programs.

Forms needed by the retailers to reapply were mailed to them on Dec. 1, 1971, and new authorization codes will be assigned to authorized retailers. Mr. Garber said the grocers who fail to submit new applications and receive new authorization cards will not be authorized to accept and redeem food stamp coupons after Nov. 30, 1971.

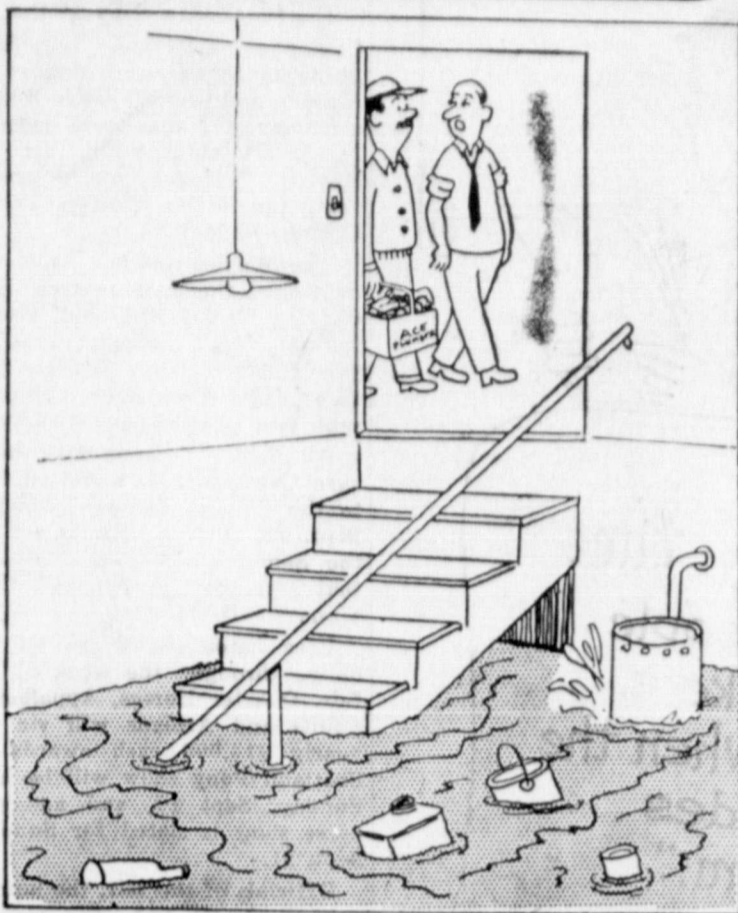

Tri-State Fair Opens Sept. 20 At Amarillo

Headline attractions at the 48th annual Tri-State Fair, Sept. 20-25, in Amarillo are the Wayne Newton and Charley Pride Shows, a display of Moon Rocks supplied by NASA at Houston, the Bill Hames Carnival, and a special show for Senior Citizens of the Golden Spread.

He quoted as follows: "I was not an enterprising merchant but I was a good neighbor." More than one occasion. For instance when Miss Rainey's Millinery Shop at the southwest corner of the square caught fire, it was in water to spread on top of the roof and help squelch the flames. He was one of the first fighters in Memphis. Also he noted that the first men's quarters in the Presbyterian Church was composed of B. F. Denny, Scott Montgomery, J. G. Noel and J. S. ...

den. Thanks for the pictures.

We had a visit with one of the early residents of Hall County, Mrs. J. H. Wright of Estelline had visiting with her the past week her son, Lee, and her grandson, Mike. Mrs. Wright is the daughter of the late L. D. Stout who moved to Hulver in 1905 and passed away in 1947. J. H. Wright passed away in 1948. Lee attended school at Hulver and Estelline where he graduated in 1941, attended West Texas State and graduated from State University at Austin in 1958. He served 20 years in the Navy and Air Corps and is now retired from the service and living at Fort Neuces, Texas. Virgil is the brother of Robert A. and they are the sons of the late Mr. and Mrs. Hill Wells who first came to Hall County in 1910. 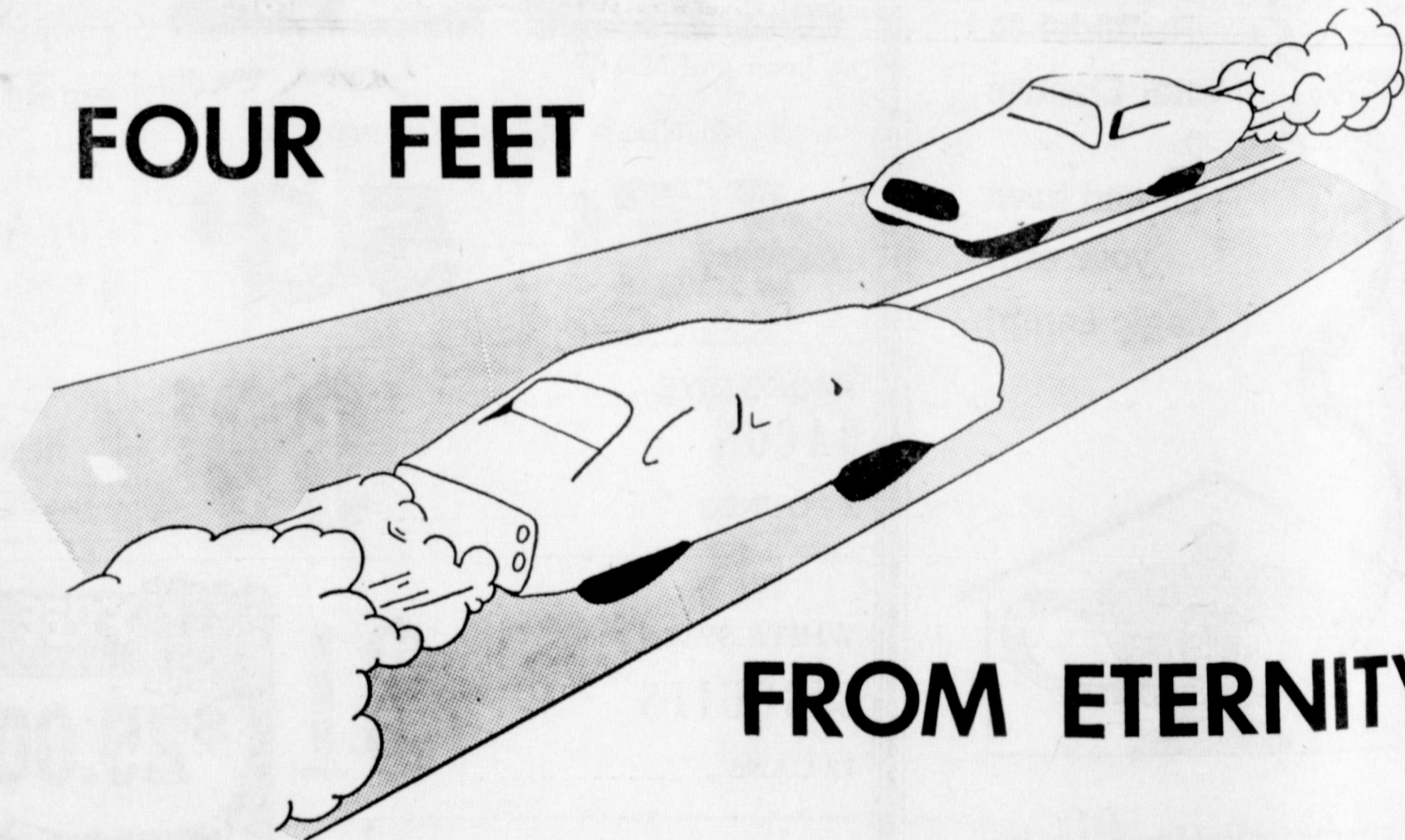

Tony Pounds To Play in OSU Pokes Opener With Mississippi State Sat.

OSU Cowboys open their season against Mississippi State at 10 p. m. Saturday in Stillwater, Okla. Lewis Stadium, but Cowboy coach Floyd Cass is remaining committed on who will be starting quarterback for the team.

Coach Cass says, "I don't know which quarterback will start but we can bet we'll play 'em both the opener."

This means that Memphis' Tony Pounds will see action against Mississippi State. Cass must choose between Tony Pounds (6-0, 172), a year's starter, or sophomore member Brent Blackman (5-11, 172).

In the pre-season scrimmages,

Pounds has hit 22 of 43 aerials for 396 yards and Blackman has winged 15 of 32 for 216 yards. The rushing figures had Pounds with 43 yards in 19 carries while the elusive Blackman gained 153 in 28 tries and three of these netted touchdowns.

"The good thing about it is both Tony and Brent want what's best for the team, and they've both worked real hard," Coach Cass said about the quarterbacking situation at Oklahoma State University.

The game with Mississippi State appears to be a real tough one for OSU, as the visitors have many returning lettermen back from last year, including all defensive regulars which held the Cowboys to 81 yards rushing last year.

Good Feeder Pig Practices Needed In Spite Of Price

The use of additives in swine feeds has enabled producers to increase feed utilization and the growth rate of pigs in addition to increasing today's production systems by controlling disease.

County Agent W. Hooser, the use of additives is a real pressure and the final cost rests largely with swine producers. All feeds containing antibiotics or additives must be labeled, showing the number of days the material of materials must be withdrawn before the pigs are sold for slaughter.

Producers, says the county agent, should carefully read the warnings on the tags attached to a bag of feed or on the invoice that accompany each load of bulk feed. Then, make sure feeding recommendations are carefully followed.

The withdrawal is made necessary since some antibiotics and growth stimulants are deposited in the animal's body tissue. The withdrawal periods allow ample time for the excretion of these materials to the point that the meat will not contain levels above those accepted by the U. S. Food and Drug Administration, explains Hooser.

The county agent also notes that the FDA has increased its vigilance of drug residue in meat and that producers should be doubly sure the pork they place has been fed in accordance with tagged recommendations.



Salmonellosis is an illness which loves to go on picnics, to banquets and parties where foods are prepared well in advance, and even to family functions in homes.

Commonly called food poisoning, it may show up anywhere it receives an invitation. Sometimes it is credited by individuals with being a 24-hour virus.

The food infection symptoms may range from mild nausea and abdominal discomfort to a full-blown case which also involves fever, vomiting and diarrhea. When you get it, you're sick. And, it can be fatal, says the Texas State Department of Health.

Salmonellosis is used to refer to infections caused by any of the numerous members of the genus Salmonella. Some 900 varieties are known and they may inhabit most species of warm-blooded animals and many cold-blooded vertebrates. Major reservoirs of human salmonellosis are in domestic livestock, swine and poultry. Organisms may be transmitted to man either directly from animals or through contaminated products of animal origin. Humans also may spread the infection.

Recently, outbreaks of Salmonellosis were traced to pet turtles. And, the Communicable Disease Center in Atlanta reports a

case in a 19-month-old child caused by a parakett.

The most dramatic and highly-publicized aspects of Salmonellosis are the food-borne infections which occur in large groups of persons who have consumed a contaminated food. In this type of contamination, food is prepared and held in such a manner that the bacteria has opportunity to multiply.

The State Health Department is so concerned with the problem of food-borne infections it is planning a special seminar for sanitarians in September. The tailor-made course will equip local sanitarians with the knowledge to teach classes in food-borne disease control to food handlers in their own communities.

In a way, food-borne illness is a matter of chance. Five factors must come into play to produce it. You must, of course, have bacteria present, and you need growth-supporting temperatures, suitable food, time and moisture. Improper sanitation or improper refrigeration

are the main causes of food poisoning of humans. Almost without exception in food poisoning cases, the food was contaminated after having been cooked and was allowed to stand at temperatures which encouraged bacterial growth. Bacteria thrive at temperatures ranging from 45 to 140 degrees Fahrenheit. Keeping food just barely cool or warm doesn't help.

Time is important between fixing and eating picnic foods. The shorter period the better. And remember to keep foods hot, keep them cold, or don't keep them at all.

Use Smooth Rod Guides

Check the guides on your fishing rods occasionally. Rods that have been used for a long time frequently wear sharp and are almost like a knife blade in cutting your line, especially when you are hauling in a big fish. Worn line guides should be replaced rather than sanded.

Telephone Co. And Union Agree On New Contract

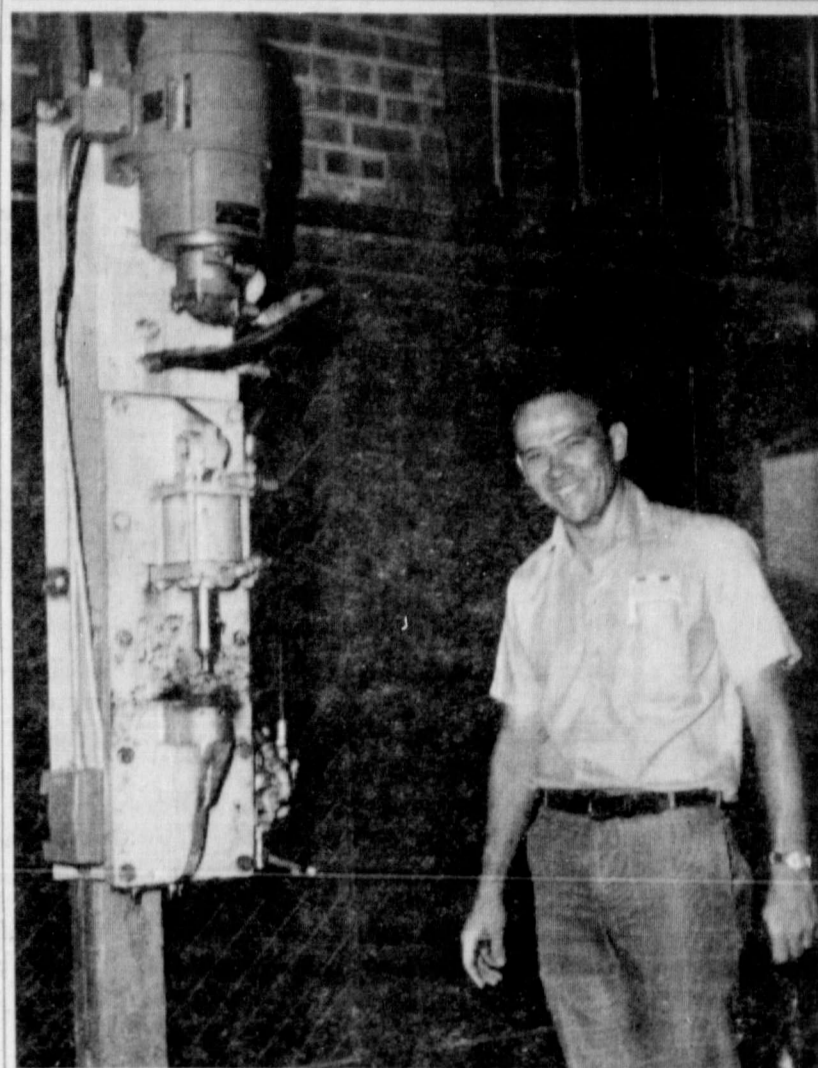
