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## Hedley Cotton Festival Is Planned For Oct. 8-9, Bogue Is Chairman

Hedley will have its annual Cotton Festival, Friday and Saturday, Oct. 8 and 9 with Louie E. Bogue as festival chairman.

The festival is sponsored by the Hedley Lions Club and fully sanctioned by the National Cotton Council of America, with the Memphis Compress Co. as a strong supporter.

A pre-festival show will be on KGCN-TV at 10:30 a. m. Saturday, Oct. 2. Clifford Johnson, publicity chairman, reports, Queen Kathy Painter Gilchrist, formerly of Hedley and now living in Memphis, will lead the festival's grand parade at 2 p. m. Saturday, Oct. 9, riding on a Fox-Motor Co. Ford.

Queen Kathy and the eight pretty girls competing for her

coronation will be on the TV preview of the Festival on Royce Bodford's Farm and Home Show.

American Legion Post of Memphis will furnish the Color Bearers, Color Guard and Firing Squad for the parade.

The Kiddies Parade will be at 10 a. m. that Saturday.

The Festival will run along the same lines as the past with the only added feature being a Junior High Band contest, judged during the grand parade. Trophies will be awarded to winning bands. High School bands are invited but will not compete for any prizes. All band members will be well fed and entertained.

## About 40 Riders Compete In Cycle Races Sunday

About 40 riders vied for trophies in the motorcycle track located on Whitten farm east of Plaska Sunday and a crowd of approximately 300 were on hand for the afternoon races.

Spectators saw a lot of action in the races, as each class competed in four, 3-lap events. Barry Ward served as flagman after he received a shoulder injury in pre-race practice rounds.

Trophies were awarded to the top three finishers in each class. Points were awarded the first five finishers in each race and the holder of the most points won the class.

In the open division, Bill Hotchkins of Amarillo had 20 points for first, Ray Hoak of Plainview had 16 points for second and Don Poston of Plainview had 11 points for third.

In the 250cc class, Randy Noei of Plainview took first with 17 points, Tommy Dameron of Plainview took second with 16 and Gene Dunn of Amarillo placed third with 15 points.

In the 125cc class Joe Godfrey of Weatherford, Okla., placed first with 18 points, while Dean Logan of Amarillo second with 15 points, and Otho Richardson of Amarillo got third with 8 by finishing better in the last race that Bill Lockhart of Memphis who also had 8 points. This class had the largest number of riders, and Benji Godfrey and Mike Liner finished tied for sixth place. Twelve riders competed.

In the 100 cc class, Dean Logan of Amarillo and Randy Whitten of Memphis tied for first and second with 17 points each, and Robert Fennell of Pampa tried. Whimpy McQueen of Memphis finished 4th and Mark McQueen of Memphis finished 5th in this class.

In the mini bikes, Robert Hodges took first place, Scotty Lockhart of Amarillo placed second and Tom Johnson of Giles placed third. Kyle McQueen of Memphis finished fourth.

It was announced that races at the track are being planned each month, but October will be skipped as two big enduro motorcycle races are scheduled for that month.

The Cottonboll Enduro will be held here Oct. 31.

## SCS Assists North Rolling Plains RC&D Plan Many Worthwhile Projects

The Soil Conservation Service is providing assistance to all units of local government in Hall County in the conservation and development of natural resources, according to Henry Gregory, local District Conservationist.

This assistance is provided through the North Rolling Plains Resource Conservation and Development (RC&D) project. The Memphis Work Unit office is the primary source of this assistance in the county.

The Memphis Work Unit receives some assistance in planning from Bill Brooks, project coordinator of the RC&D area. Brooks is headquartered at Wheeler, and usually comes to Memphis about once each month, however, he will come as often as he is needed.

The RC&D area covers seven and a half counties extending from Lipscomb County in the Northeast corner of the Texas Panhandle through Hall County and into that part of Briscoe Co., below the Caprock.

The idea of RC&D is to help local organizations seek out possible solutions to any kind of development problems they might have. It is particularly concerned with any project that will further, or develop, a better and more meaningful existence for the people.

Projects that are being considered over the RC&D area are: watershed protection programs; city parks and recreation areas; county parks and golf courses; sewage disposal systems; library facilities; hospital additions and nursing homes; improving Boy Scout camping areas, facilities and access; improved pasture grasses and pasture management; introduce new varieties of game birds and animals; rural highway systems; housing units for low rent as well as senior citizens; improve recreation facilities of public school systems; increase parallel terraces; planning for new community building; and many others.

For further information about available assistance contact the local Soil Conservation Service.

## Cyclone-Skyrockets To Meet Friday In Cyclone Stadium

### Chamber Meet Brings Forth Several Ideas During Monday Night Session

The "ideas" meeting of the Memphis Chamber of Commerce, to which all members were sent invitations to attend, attracted a small crowd, but a number of excellent ideas were brought out, President Lester Campbell said following the meeting.

"Those attending were quite enthusiastic concerning the work which was done, and several expressed the desire to call a similar meeting again within a few weeks," the president stated.

"The feeling is that the attendance will increase with each such meeting in the future."

Four areas of work of the chamber were discussed in this first meeting. A. L. Gailey gave a brief run-down of the organization's activities concerning agriculture in the past; John Fowler brought out industrial activities, and Dick Fowler told of retail merchants activities.

Following the brief outline in each category, timed "brainstorming sessions" were held, and each person around the two tables of those attending expressed their ideas of what can be done. The meeting was held to less than one and one-half hours, by way of using the timed discussion sessions.

Agriculture—programs to combat cotton wilt, promote diversification through educational programs, help farming interests to eradicate boll weevil, encourage deep well irrigation, and recognition of importance of local service for farmers and such needs be met in machinery, irrigation, fertilization and seeds.

Tourists and Highway—assist Highway 287 Assn., promote work facilities along with city, assist in promotion of Panhandle, promote Hall County Museum, assist in getting Ualo Duro Scenic Road, assist in reactivation Highway 256 project east of Memphis, assist in getting Highway Department office enlarged.

Retail trade—develop more interest and participation in this area in "sidewalk" sale, semi-annual and quarterly, use childrens gimmick for attracting people to town, flea market, Santa Claus Day, pajama sale, red tag sale at end of month, crazy costume sale, recognition of local people.

Industrial—acquainting merchants with local industry at a school to boost Memphis, highway signs with local industry listed, industrial brochures be made available, promote erection of rodeo grounds and sponsoring rodeos for youth and adults alike.

The Memphis Cyclone will be hosting the Wellington Skyrockets in Cyclone Stadium at 8 p. m. Friday night, and the ball game promises to be a continuation of the traditional battle between teams of these two neighboring schools.

The Cyclone, of District 2-A, will be facing a tougher, bigger, and more experienced Skyrocket team than the local ball club defeated last season.

Also, the Skyrockets have broken their losing streak, with an impressive 14-0 victory over a tough Gruver squad last Friday night.

The stage is set for the Skyrockets to invade Cyclone Stadium with renewed momentum coming off their first victory in two seasons and revenge in mind over Memphis' defeat last year.

The Cyclone, on the other hand, has bounced back from the opening season loss of White Deaver to claim on-sided victories over Chillicothe and Paducah.

The Skyrockets' line is the biggest Memphis has faced averaging 180 lbs. per man from end to end, while the Cyclone's offensive line weighs in with a 173-lb. average.

The Rockets' backfield is led by a talented lad, No. 12, Denny Carter, at quarterback, a real passing and running threat. At 155 lbs, Carter likes to tuck the football and run with it. Cyclone scouts reported to Cyclone Boosters.

With Carter, Wellington has F-B Louis Gonzales, No. 40, 140, or No. 44 FB Randy Vaughan, 170, and halfbacks No. 25 Bruce Oney, 140, and No. 21 Jay Thomas, 150.

Cyclone Coach Clyde McMurray reports that the Cyclone defensive unit must be on its toes this week to stop Wellington as the Rockets have ample speed and a lot of talent in their backfield.

The Cyclone has made a few defensive adjustments this week to try and cope with Wellington's running and passing attack out of the T formation sets, straight T, winged T and flanker T.

"I fell we've got to play mistake free football if we win this one. Our line has got to get off quickly on the snap in order to off-set the weight advantage Wellington has. It's just going to be a tough, physical contest for us," he said.

"We have played our easiest opponents," Coach McMurray said, "now we face Wellington, a AA ball club which we feel won't finish last in Dis. 2-AA this season. They showed remarkable improve at Gruver, after the way they played against Wheeler."

Workouts this week have gone well with the local squad. Larry Jeffers was able to shake off a knee injury and returned to contact Tuesday, the coach reported. Larry Johnson is taking some treatment this week but the local coach said he will see action against Wellington.

Coach McMurray cited Ronald Canida and Mike Browning for their play against Paducah on offense and Chris Liner and Jim Dixon for doing a real good job on defense.

Memphis B team hosts Wellington B here at 7 p. m. tonight, and local freshmen play McLean's B team at McLean at 7 p. m.

Memphis 8th grade first team hosts Clarendon at 6 p. m. in district action, and the second 8th grade team goes to Wellington to play at 7 p. m. The Memphis 7th graders play Wellington there at 6 p. m.

The Memphis B team played Quannah last Thursday in rain and mud and did a fine job despite the 8-0 loss. These two teams had a scrimmage session which Quannah won by 4 TDs. Memphis coaches had high praise for both local teams.

In the first game at Quannah, the freshman tied Quannah 8-8. Coaches said the freshmen did a fine job against Quannah.

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## EDITORIAL

### Bloopers, Hostages, And Wash Day!

It could have been lucky that Edmund Muskie made his "bloopers" when he did.

His remark about the inadvisability of choosing a black man as his running mate wasn't intended for publication, and after it got out, the President of the United States and Democratic opponents of the senator gleefully took the opportunity to observe that Americans would, too, vote for a ticket with a black man on it, and how dare Senator Muskie imply that the populace was filled with bigots.

Funny thing about bloopers these days. In an age when so many people think everyone is lying to them, a man burts out the truth could become a rare hero.

It is possible that Muskie will suffer for his remark. But it bred an interesting positive reaction: What the senator said was perfectly true, it has been observed, and how "refreshing" that he said it.

Now don't ask me whether Edmund Muskie is really any more honest than the next fellow. And don't ask me to accuse Richard Nixon of outrageous hypocrisy because he tried to capitalize on a remark by a potential opponent, or because he indulged in some transparent flattery of the voters. Politics has always been full of such things, and it has nothing really to do with what is constantly described as the credibility problem.

The real problem reared up a few days after the Muskie remark, in a couple of quite different ways.

First, there were those contradictory reports about how the Attica prison hostages died. Somebody was lying, or somebody simply goofed—giving out information before he really knew what he was talking about. The result was confusion, but more than that; there has been another enlargement of that ever-growing segment of the public that thinks nothing anybody says can be believed any more. The confusion has nothing to do with the basic questions raised by the Attica disaster, but any further official report about the incident is sure to be greeted with skepticism.

The Attica headlines obscured somewhat another manifestation of the credibility problem. In Washington, Federal officials advised American housewives to resumm using phosphates—yes, phosphates—in their washing machines. It seems that the alternatives to phosphate detergents held more immediate peril to human beings than the phosphate products themselves. For the vast number of women who have dutifully turned to phosphate-free products, the news must have been perplexing indeed. Why bother to pay any attention to the advise of environmentalists—official or otherwise.

In fact, no one was lying, and the menace posed by phosphates to streams and lakes apparently remains real enough. It's just that in the initial rush to counter one hazard, others were shoved out of mind.

So it was in such an environment that Muskie committed his blooper, and the word is now out that credibility will be a major campaign theme for the senator from Maine. With all the pressing issues of the day, and despite historical evidence to the contrary, it is interesting to contemplate that a man might get elected by virtue of candor alone. There ought to be better reasons, but who can blame him for trying.

#### A Retail Businessman

In case you didn't know, a retail businessman is the chump who pays all kinds of state and federal taxes, levies and fees, and is even forced to do the government's bookkeeping, otherwise referred to as red tape—of which there are miles and miles. He makes weekly, monthly quarterly and annual reports on everything in his business... from income to industrial safety to fire extinguishers to commodious conveniences.

# Memphis Overruns Paducah 55-0 Fri.

The Memphis Cyclone, taking advantage of ideal football weather on a sunny Saturday afternoon, rolled up 55 points and denied the Paducah Dragons any scores and only four first downs, to stretch their season mark to two wins and one loss.

The Cyclone defensive unit was most impressive, holding Paducah to only 60 yards total offense, intercepting three passes out of the six attempted, and recovering three Paducah fumbles.

Offensively, the Cyclone was awesome also, grinding out 252 yards rushing, 180 yards passing and picking up 24 first downs. Mike Browning passed for 180 yards in six completions out of 11 attempts, and three went for touchdowns.

The Cyclone got on the scoreboard early following a pass interception by Charlie Slaughter who was dropped on the Paducah 20. From here, on the first down, Right Halfback Paul Fowler took a pitchout, found running room to the right and went all the way for a TD. Mike Browning missed the point after TD, the only one he missed all afternoon. Browning possibly set some sort of school place kicking record in this game, kicking seven of eight. Center Matt Thompson and Holder Mark Stevenson also executed assignments well.

The Cyclone's second TD came on a 23-yd. drive in two plays. Memphis got the ball when Larry Jeffers recovered a Dragon fumble. QB Browning hit End Larry Johnson for 13 yards moving the ball to the 10-yd. line. Then, Left Halfback Louis Davis swept right end, shook off one tackler at the scrimmage line, and raced into the end zone for the TD.

The Cyclone came into possession following a Paducah punt on the Memphis 32. Paul Fowler on two consecutive carries up the middle made four yards. Then, on a play-action pass, QB Browning laid the football into the waiting arms of Larry Johnson on the west sideline, and Johnson broke tackles as he rambled 64 yds. for the TD. Browning's kick was good and the score was 20-0.

The Dragons, aided by a 15-yd. penalty, and gambling on a fourth and one situation, got the best field position they had all day, a first down on the Memphis 32. But here, Larry Jeffers met Steve Jones for a one-yard loss. On the next play, Paducah QB David Sweeney was dropped for a 2-yd. loss by Donnie Carroll. On the next play, Chris Limer came up with a fumble recovery and the threat was over.

This started another drive for the Cyclone. The drive started off shaky, despite a big 8-yd. gain by Browning on the first down. A minor penalty, and a completed pass play nullified by offsetting penalties, left Memphis facing a third and long yardage, but Louis Davis on a play up the middle gained ample yards for the first down.

In the next series, two incomplete passes left a third and 10 situation, but again HB Davis picked up the yardage on a 14-yd. carry to the Paducah 33. Davis also carried in the next series, picking up 8 yards, and 15 more yards were added when Paducah was cited for hitting after the whistle. From the Paducah 10, Browning passed to Tight End Terry Wynn for the TD and added the point after.

With the score 27-0, the first quarter ended.

The Cyclone came into possession of the football on the Memphis 13 following a long Paducah punt. The Memphis offense moved the ball 87 yards in seven plays. Staying on the ground with Fowler and Davis carrying the football, Memphis moved for a first down to the Paducah 41.

On the next play, QB Browning hit Flanker John Carmen. He put a good move on a defender and won the foot race for a 59-yd. touchdown. Browning booted the point after.

Memphis scored again, before the half, as the Cyclone moved on two screen passes, one to Terry Wynn and the other to Larry Jeffers to the Paducah 6. Ronald Canida plunged over from the 1-yd. line for the TD.

Memphis continued the defensive pressure after the half, as on the first play from scrimmage, John Carmen intercepted a Paducah pass giving Memphis good field position. The Cyclone, however, began the second half with an all new offensive unit on the field and the unit was a little shaky at first, to take advantage of the situation.

But the second possession saw Memphis with the ball on the 41. QB Mark Stevenson got things rolling as he gave to Ronald Canida on two consecutive calls, moving the ball to the Dragon 48. Jim Dixon carried for nine yards. Paducah grabbed a Stevenson pass but officials called the Dragons for pass interference giving Memphis a first on the 37-yd. line.

Carries by Canida and Stevenson moved for a first to the 27. Canida and Dixon in three plays moved the ball to the Paducah 4. The Dragons defense stiffened at this point, but Canida nudged the ball over on a fourth down for the TD.

The Cyclone and Dragons continued a see-saw battle throughout the third and most of the fourth quarter. Browning tried a 31-yd. field goal in the fourth quarter but the ball was slightly off line.

One drive was stopped when Memphis lost the ball on a pitchout on the Paducah 3. Late in the final quarter, Memphis rushed the Paducah punter hard, forcing him to get off a bad kick with Memphis getting the ball on the Paducah 23.

Paul Fowler was dropped for a seven-yard loss on the first down. Then, Fowler caught the pitch from QB Browning and rambled for 16 big yards to the Paducah 14. Ronald Canida carried around right end on the next

play and crashed into the end-zone for the Cyclone's final score. Browning kicked his final PAT.

Louis Davis carried 7 times for 65 yards. Fowler carried 11 times for 54 yards, Canida carried 16 times for 70 yards, and Dixon carried 8 times for 25 yards. Browning carried 4 times for 17

yards. Mark Stevenson carried 2 times for 25 yards, and James



### Cong. Purcell Gets Truck Exemption Added To Tax Bill

WASHINGTON — Tax relief for purchasers of farm trucks has been won by U. S. Representative Graham Purcell (D-Tex.) it was announced last Friday.

The House Ways Means Committee, chaired by Congressman Wilbur Mills, is presently drafting a new tax bill. At Congresswoman Purcell's request, the Committee has written into its proposed measure a provision to exempt all vehicles of a gross weight up to 7500 pounds from the 10 per cent federal excise tax now affecting all trucks. The bill will also allow the Administration recommendation to remove the 7 per cent excise tax from passenger cars.

"This is the culmination of a long fight to see that farmers and other purchasers of light trucks are not burdened with this tax," the veteran member of the House Agriculture Committee reported.

"The Administration was unfavorable to removal of the excise tax from any motor vehicle other than passenger cars. However," Purcell continued, "working closely with Chairman Mills I have succeeded in getting the Ways and Means Committee to include light trucks in the exemption."

The Texas Democrat said that he had hoped to convince the Committee to cover all farm trucks. "In view of the Administration's resistance," he stated, "I am pleased we were able to get this much. Under the circumstances, this is the best I think we can do."

The House Committee is presently meeting in executive session on the final draft of the tax bill and is expected to introduce its proposals to the House of Representatives early this week. The Purcell provision will be retroactive to midnight, September 22 of this year.
