Long Time County Resident Dies



O.D. JACKSON

Services for O.D. Jackson, 71, of Snyder were held at 11 a.m. Saturday in Bell-Cypert Seale Funeral chapel.

Jackson died at 9:14 a.m. Thursday in Cogdill Memorial Hospital after a sudden illness.

Burial was in Gail Cemetery under direction of Bell-Cypert-Seale Funeral Home.

O.D. was born Feb. 28, 1918 at the Jackson homestead south of Gail. When Grape Creek School consolidated with the Gail School in the early 1920's, O.D.'s dad bought a house in town so his mother and he and his three brothers and

sister could live there during the school term. They would return to the farm on weekends and during the summer months to help with the farming.

In 1927, O.D.'s dad rented out the farm and moved his family to Alpine, where his children completed high school and attended college. To support his family, he did carpenter work until the depression ended the demand for carpenters and sent the Jackson family back to the farm in 1933.

After high school O.D. helped his father

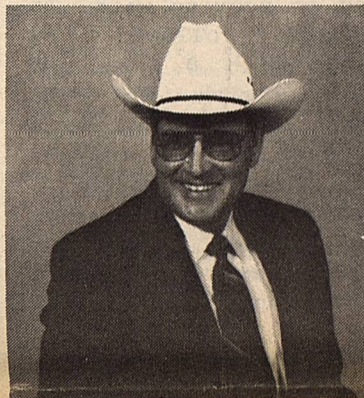
farm and did ranch and farm work until he got a job with the Agricultural Adjustment Administration in Gail in late 1937 and worked there until his father died. At that time O.D. returned to the farm to help his mother and brother operate the place. He farmed until December 1941 when he entered the Air Force. In the next 34 months, he participated in seven overseas battle campaigns. He received the EAME Campaign Metal with 7 bronze stars; Good Conduct Medal; Distinguished Unit Badge; American Theater Campaign Medal and a Bronze Star.

After the service, he returned to Borden county to resume raising crops and livestock. O.D. and Jessie B. Patterson, who was County Clerk, were married March 7, 1947. She died in 1979.

O.D. served on the Board of Trustees for Borden County I.S.D. from 1955 to 1965 and was the first County Auditor for Borden County from 1956 through 1958.

He married Lois Greathouse on Nov. 26, 1979 in Borden County. After owning and operating the place his parents bought over eighty years ago, he retired and moved to Snyder. He was a Mason and a member of the Church of Christ.

Lady Coyotes Win Tournament

By a average winning margin of 32 points, the Borden County Lady Coyotes won the Borden County Tournament this past weekend. They opened up the tournament with a 53-21 win over the Lady Wildcats of Wellman, followed with a 58-32 win over New Home, and completed the sweep Saturday night in the finals with a 60-22 win over Loop.

In Thursday's win over Wellman, Borden held a slim 14-10 first quarter edge and extended the lead to 12 by halftime, 26-14. The second half is where the Lady Coyotes dominated as they outscored their opponents 27-7 for the win. Wellman was held to two free throws in the last quarter. Lisha Sternadel led in scoring with 23 points followed by Amanda Anderson with 9. Randi Woodward had 8 points followed by Rachel Romero with 4, Leslie Fryar with 3, Amy Lewis, Kristi Adcock, and Shara Dee Woodward with 2 each. Shara Dee led in field goal percentage hitting her only attempts for 100% followed by Randi with 75% and Lisha with

55%. Rachel Romero led in free throw percentage with 100%, making both of her tries. Lisha, Kristi, and Rachel all had 4 steals, but trailed Shara Dee who led with 5. Amy led in rebounds with 6 followed by Lisha with 5. Kristi and Rachel tied in assists with 4 each.

Friday's game saw Borden fall behind the first quarter 8-9 but stormed back with aggressive defense to take a 19-11 half-time lead. The second half was all Lady Coyotes as they outscored the Lady Leopards 17-8 in the third quarter and 22-13 in the last to take their closest win of the tournament 58-32. Again it was Lisha who led in scoring with 26 points followed by Randi with 8, Amy and Leslie with 6 each, Kristi and Amanda with 4 each, Rachel with 3, and Shara Dee added 1 to the total. Kristi and Rachel tied for honors in field goal percentage with 100% each as each hit their only attempt. They were followed by Amy with 75%, Lisha with 63%, and Randi with 57%. Kristi and Amanda each hit 100% from the free throw line and were followed by Lisha with 86%. Shara led in steals with 4 and also led in assists with 7. Randi and Amanda tied for honors in rebounds with 8 each followed by Kristi and Lisha with 6 each.

In the finals, Borden met Loop, a team they had earlier in the season defeated by 11 and 12 points. This time it was not near as close as the Lady Coyotes jumped out to a commanding 29-11 half-time lead and extended it with scoring edges of 19-6 in the third quarter and 12-5 in the final quarter for the 60-22 win. Lisha duplicated her scoring output from the previous night as she again hit 26 points. She was followed by Leslie who hit four 3 point goals for 12 points. They were followed by

Shara with 6, Randi with 5, Amy and Amanda with 4 each, Kristi with 2, and Rachel hit 1. Shara Dee led in field goal percentage with 75% followed by Leslie with 67% and Lisha with 58%. Lisha, Rachel, and Randi all hit 50% from the free throw line. Lisha led in steals with an excellent total of 10 followed by Rachel with 5 and Kristi with 3. Kristi and Amy tied for honors in rebounds with 7 each followed by Lisha with 5. Amanda led in assists with 5 followed by Rachel with 4.

The J.V. girls also played in the Borden Tournament, as a replacement for Jayton who had to drop out due to football playoffs. The J.V. responded well as they defeated Westbrook's varsity in the first round of the tournament 40-38. The biggest difference came in the first quarter where Borden outscored the Lady Wildcats 14-6, and still held a half-time lead of 25-20. The two teams traded even in the third quarter 6-6 before Westbrook made a comeback in the fourth quarter to make things too interesting. Borden was led in scoring by Kristin Kilmer with 13 points followed by Kelly Jo Ogden with 12 and Shayne Hess with 9. Kristin Monger and Jacquelyn McPhaul each hit 3 in the win. Also playing was Heather Armstrong.

The next day, Borden J.V. met Loop in one championship semi-final as they dropped a close 35-32 decision to the Lady Longhorns. Loop hit a shot at the buzzer in the first quarter to take a slim 10-9 lead and extended it to 3 at half-time, 16-13. A cold third quarter shooting by the Coyotes damped their chances of winning as Loop outscored them 6-2. Things then heated up in the final quarter as Borden scored more in the one quarter than they did in the other three put together.

As Borden pulled to within one, Loop hit a streak to pull away in the final seconds. A last second three point attempt by Borden was just off the rim to end their title hopes. Shayne led in scoring with 13 points followed by Kristin Monger with 8 and Kelly Jo Ogden with 7. Kristin Kilmer had 4 to round out the scoring.

In the third place game, Borden came out flat and New Home came out hitting everything they threw at the basket as the J.V. lost 66-34. The Lady Coyotes did make a small comeback in the second half as they outscored New Home in the third quarter 14-13 and closed even closer until New Home connected on 12 free throws in the final minutes to pull away. Kristin Monger led in scoring with 12 points followed by Shayne Hess with 10. Kristin Kilmer hit 8 points before fouling out, and Kelly Jo Ogden hit 4 to round out the scoring.

Girls consolation was won by Klondike, who defeated Westbrook 50-36. Westbrook defeated Sands the day before to reach the consolation final and Klondike defeated Wellman. Four new records were set or tied in the girls division as Lisha Sternadel broke the individual high score for three games in a tournament with 75 points. She erased the record of 68 set by Borden County's Teri Billington set in 1985. New Home broke the total 3 point goals in one game with 8 in their opening game with Klondike. It erased the total of 7 set by Borden last year against Wellman. Tobi Timmons tied the record number of free throws in one game with 11 which is co-held by Cindy Slone of Wilson set in 1979. The lady Coyotes added to their own record of most Borden Tournament Championships with 7, having won championships in 1979-80-83-84-85 and 88.

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Lady Coyotes Dominate New Life

New Life Academy of Lubbock came to Gail last Tuesday night and left with a through understanding of how country girls play basketball. In all fairness though, New Life, a small private school with an enrollment of about 50 students, was forced to use many of their Jr. High ball players to field a team. They are not affected by any U.I.L. regulations and therefore could more or less play who they wanted. Everything they had was not enough as Borden emptied their bench early in the first quarter and held a 30-0 lead after one quarter of play and extended it to 59-2 by half-time. Borden led 81-10 entering the last quarter before narrowly missing the century mark in the 99-18 win.

Lisha Sternadel led in scoring with 30 points followed by Shayne Hess with 20. Leslie Fryar had 14 points followed by Randi Woodward with 13, Amanda Anderson with 10, Kristi Adcock with 6, Rachel Romero hit 4, and Shara Dee Wood-

ward made 2. Lisha led in field goal percentage with 71% followed by Shayne with 63%, Amanda with 57%, and Randi with 55%. Randi and Amanda each hit 50% from the free throw line. Lisha led in steals with 5 followed by Randi and Shayne with 3 each. Amanda led in rebounds with 16 followed by Kristi with 10, Randi with 8, and Lisha with 7. Shara Dee led in assists with 7. Amy Lewis and Julie Harris, usually starters for the Lady Coyotes, sat out the game due to illness and injury.

The win raises the Lady Coyotes record to 9-2 on the season. They return to action after the Christmas break when they travel to Jayton for a rematch with the Lady Jays. The January 2 basketball game will begin at 5:00 with the J.V. boys, to be followed by the Lady Coyotes at 6:30. On Friday, January 5, they host Roby, a regional semi-finalist from Region 2 last year. It will be a great warm-up week before starting district play the next week.

Board members present were: Jack McPhaul, Jon Monger, Joel Dennis, Scott Clayton, Kenny Hensley, and Tom Ed Vestal.

Administrators present: James McLeroy, Superintendent.

Minutes

Minutes of the previous meeting were read. A motion was made and seconded to approve the minutes. Motion carried unanimously.

Visitors

There were no visitors present.

Bills

The Superintendent presented the December bills for payment. A motion was made and seconded to approve the bills for payment. Motion carried unanimously.

Superintendent's Report

A year-to-date financial report was given by the Superintendent. Also a budget amendment was recommended.

Attendance Report

The attendance was reported as 198.

Personnel Report

It was reported that Pat Murphy had been placed in the 6th grade due to Mrs. Wolf's illness. The Superintendent recommended that Pat Murphy be hired as a teacher in the Borden County Schools for the remainder of the 1989-1990 school year. A motion was made and seconded to accept the Superintendent's recommendation to hire Pat Murphy as a teacher. Motion carried unanimously.

Career Ladder

The Superintendent recommended that the district adopt the state minimum criteria for entry and maintenance at level two, three and four. Policy will reflect the same as State Board of Education interpretations. A motion was made and seconded to accept the Superintendent's recommendations. Motion carried unanimously.

Superintendent's Annual Evaluation

The annual evaluation of the Superintendent was made by the Board. The evaluation was based on the following domains:

- I. Personal Competence
- II. Professional Competence
- III. Board - Superintendent Relations
- IV. Personnel Management
- V. Business and Financial Matters
- VI. Community Relations

Thirty criteria was used within the five domains. The Board could have ranked within any of the five (5) categories:

- CO - Clearly Outstanding
- EE - Exceeding Expectations
- S - Satisfactory
- BE - Below Expectations
- U - Unsatisfactory

After a discussion, a motion was made and seconded to give the Superintendent a ranking of Clearly Outstanding (CO) in all domains. Motion carried unanimously.

Taxation of Freeport Goods

The Board discussed the feasibility of taking official action to preserve it's power to tax such property as Proposition 5, the constitutional amendment proposed by the 71st Regular Session of the Texas Legislature, exempts. The new constitutional amendment and its enabling legislation provides a very broad definition of freeport goods, more commonly known as "goods in transit."

After a discussion, a motion was made and seconded to accept the following resolution.

Motion carried unanimously.

RESOLUTION

The Board of Trustees of the Borden County Independent School District passed the following resolution at a regular Board Meeting on December 14, 1989.

WHEREAS, the 71st Regular Session of the Texas Legislature has passed legislation granting a conditional exemption from property taxation for certain freeport goods, commercial aircraft, and other goods in transit, as found in Sections 11.251 and 21.05 of the Texas Tax Code;

WHEREAS, on November 7, 1989, the voters of the State of Texas passed Proposition 5, The Freeport Exemption, which New Article VIII, Section 1-j to the Texas Constitution, thereby effectively validating Sections 11.251 and 21.05 of the Texas Tax Code;

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the Borden County Independent School District desires to maintain and preserve the quality of education throughout the district

in the face of ever-increasing state mandates without adequate funding; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the Borden County Independent School District hereby desires to both prevent the erosion of its tax base and preserve the district's right to continue to tax freeport goods and all other goods or property covered by new Article VIII, Section 1-j of the Texas Constitution;

NOW, THEREFORE,

BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Trustees of the Borden County Independent School District hereby states and declares its intention to continue to tax to the maximum extent authorized by law all property covered by Article VIII, Section 1-j of the Texas Constitution, as well as all property covered by Sections 11.251 and 21.05 of the Texas Tax Code, for tax year 1990 and every year thereafter.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Board of Trustees hereby directs that a copy of this Resolution shall be made available for inspection by the public during normal business hours at the district's central administrative offices from this date forward.

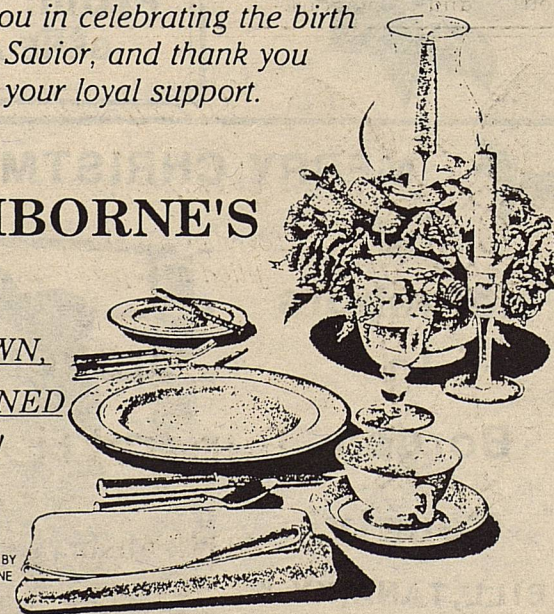

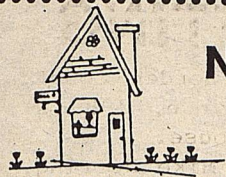

Check Gift Foods For Safety

Arrival of a Christmas gift package may generate excitement for family members, but if it contains food, check it out carefully.

If it is marked "perishable," and you are not certain of the treatment it has received, you may have to discard it for safety's sake. Whether the food is safe will depend on what it is, how cold it is, and how it was packaged.

Gift food companies typically freeze perishable food solid so that overnight delivery in cold weather guarantees it will arrive still cold. But what can't be guaranteed is having someone at home to receive the food and refrigerate it.

You can't count on cold weather either, and perishables that sit in a delivery truck, mail box or on the front porch on a warm December afternoon may quickly thaw and become hazardous.

Calls received by the U.S. Department of Agriculture's national Meat and Poultry Hotline in the 1987 Holiday season showed that the greatest number of calls about mail-order foods concerned smoked or smoked and vacuum-

packed hams and turkeys.

Many consumers don't understand that just because meat has been smoked, doesn't automatically mean it's cooked. In addition, all meat -- cooked or uncooked -- should be shipped with an ice source to keep it at or below 40°, just like a refrigerator.

Consumers also should check the label to see if the product contains preservatives. In a cured product, such as a ham, the preservatives will aid in protecting against spoilage if it is left out for a short time.

Thorough re-heating before serving is an added safeguard, but no guarantee against the bacteria that cause food-borne illness. If you have any doubt about a fresh or a cured food, better discard it.

Consumers should look for the following before eating mail-order food products:

°Fresh or cooked meat, poultry or fish should arrive frozen or still hard in the middle. If never frozen, it should be cold to the touch.

°With the exception of dry-cured hams, baked hams and most

canned hams need refrigeration and should arrive cold.

°Hard, dry sausages, such as pepperoni and hard salamis don't require refrigeration. Thuringer, summer sausage and others do. If the label says "keep refrigerated," the sausage should be cold.

°Cheese should not contain mold, unless the mold is part of the product, such as blue cheese.

°Cheesecake should be frozen solid. If the food product requires refrigeration and isn't frozen or cold, don't serve it. The food could give your family the unwanted 'gift' of the flu-like symptoms that come from a food-borne illness.

According to USDA figures, the mail-order food business is a \$1 billion a year industry.

For consumers problems and complaints, contact the nearest office of the Food and Drug Administration.

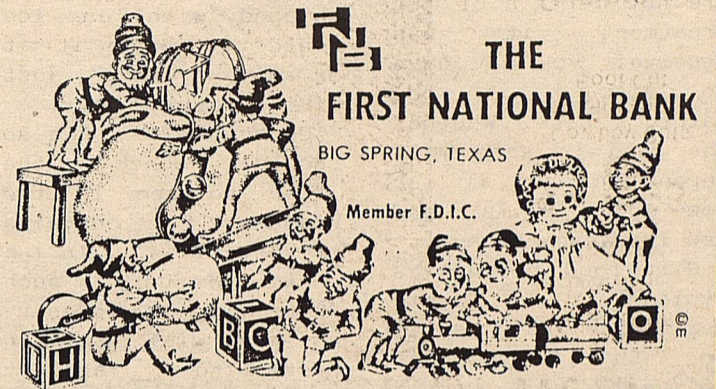

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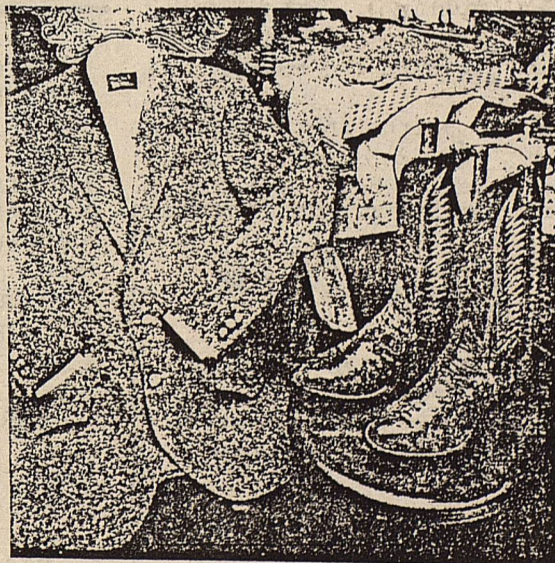
