Deductions For Income Tax Given For Hall County
NEW YORK-How much did I contribute to charity during the
past year? How much did I pay in local taxes? What did my medical and dental expenses amount
to? These are some of the questions
that Hall County residents are asking themselves these days while getting together their 1971
come and expense figures come and expense figures for
that upcoming confrontation with Uncle Sam.
Local taxpayers who itemize
such deductible expenditures on such deductible expenditures on
their income tax reports would like to know how their deductions compare with those taken
generally by people with incomes generally by people
similar to their own. Some guidance, in answer to
these questions, comes from the Commerce Clearing House, an authority on business and tax law,
using data compiled by the Inusing data compiled by
ternal Revenue Service. It has prepared a chart, based upon earlier tax reports, detail-
ing just how much the ing just how much the average
taxpayer in each income catetaxpayer in each income cate-
gory has been deducting for contributions, interest, taxes and
medical costs. medical costs.
It shows that among families throughout the country with in-
comes equal to the Hall County coverage, approximately 81,670 ,
aver equivalent to 20 per cent of gross
income, is the normal deduction. income, is the normaileduction.
Although local families with incomes that are higher than this average have a larger amount to deduct, it represents a smal
proportion of their earnings. proportion of their earnings.
For those in the 825,000 to $\$ 30,000$ class, for example, de-
ductions amount to $\$ 4,250$, equivalent to about 15 per cent of ad-
justed gross income whereas the

Do you agree with this? If you do, why not insist that schools be given enough money to teach driver education . . . to teach Texas children how to survive in traffic.
