## Wiley Davis Is Honored For Perfect Attendance

George Wiley Davis, son of Mr. W. M. Davis, Jr., of Memphis, was on time for his graduation Friday night, but that possibly to be expected, since he completed 2,110 regular days of school without being absent or late.

This perfect attendance record, according to Principal C. E. Voyles, who presented him with a special plaque for 12 years of perfect attendance, brought a reaction to what would be considered by some as an impossible feat.

"This young man had a dream, and to many it would be an impossible dream, but to him, it became a reality," Voyles told the audience on hand for the 72 graduation exercises.

Wiley now has 12 perfect attendance certificates, and two diplomas, and the coveted title of being the first student in the history of Memphis School to attend 12 years without an absence.

Mrs. Davis says that Wiley told her after he had received his perfect attendance certificate that he wanted to get all of them. "He hasn't been sick during school days," she said. "He had a few days he didn't feel well, but by noon he was always feeling better," she said.

She said that he was sick with malaria during the Easter holidays when he was in the fifth grade and was sick during the Christmas holidays during his seventh grade year with sore throat and ear infection.

Wiley did receive a knee injury during football season his senior year, but lost no schooling, even though he was on crutches.

A "B" student throughout most of his schooling, Wiley made the honor roll his senior year, and was elected to MHS Who's Who Monday night, May 15, Wiley was awarded the Eagle Scout badge, along with three other

Memphis Scouts, and joins that coveted fraternity of top ranked scouts.

Wiley's hobby is woodworking, and since he has been an employee of Memphis Lumber Co. for the past year, his job and hobby go together. He has sold six gun cases he has designed and constructed.

Motorcycle owner, Wiley and his bike were the featured subject of the picture on the front cover of the Cyclone Annual this year.

Wiley Davis' 12 years perfect attendance in the Memphis Schools may set a record which will last for many years to come. It did not come about without

dedication and continuing effort. It almost goes without saying, in Memphis schools, whenever perfect attendances are mentioned, Wiley Davis will lead the list, and youngsters for years to come will know of it. At the 8th grade graduation last Friday, the speaker told the perfect attendance students, "four years ago a student here, Wiley Davis, received his 8th perfect attendance award, and tonight he will be given recognition for his twelve years of perfect attendance."

Some records are made, and can be broken, but the perfect attendance can only be matched. Wiley had a lot of people pulling for him, his parents, teachers, friends, and especially his classmates.

## Memphis Pool Opens For Season Monday

The Memphis Swimming Pool, located in the City Park, officially opened for the season Monday, May 22.

Phillip Lillard has again been named pool manager. Bobby Hall will serve as life guard.

During past months a new low diving board, approximately three feet off the water, has been installed. The filtering system, which was installed last year, is described as one of the finest to be found anywhere, and provides safe water for swimmers.

Manager Lillard announced that swimming classes will start June 15, and will continue all summer. Classes will be held according to demand of those wishing to take lessons. Other special events will be announced later.

Starting in June, every other Saturday night will feature swimming from 7 to 9:30 p. m.

The regular hours are as follows: weekdays, 1 to 6 p. m.; Saturdays, 1 to 7 p. m.; Sundays, 1 to 5 p. m. Swimming for ladies only will be scheduled if enough are interested to add this to the schedule.

Admission for adults is 50 cents; children under 12 years of age, 25 cents. Season tickets are \$10 each.

## Region's Top Golfers Are Expected For Tour. Here

The Memphis Country Club's annual Invitational Golf Tournament will be held over the Memorial Day weekend, with play Saturday, Sunday and Monday, and qualifying Friday. Some of the top amateur golfers in this region are expected.

Entry deadline is set for 5 p. m. Friday, with entry fee of \$20 per player. Golfers will be playing in 16-man flights, with winners receiving a set of irons for first, a set of woods for second, and a new golf bag for consolation.

The championship flight is expected to be a tough field this year, early commitments indicate. The defending champion, Ken Bailey of Amarillo, will be back to defend his 1971 title.

Bailey will face a tough field, with Amarillo's John Zett, Ken Hicks, Joe Tubbs, and possibly several other Amarillo golfers entering.

The club's tournament committee has received word that three top golfers from Tulsa, Okla., will be here, along with Plainview's Dick Weston, Pampa's Max Hickey, David Parker and John Goodwin.

Other possibilities in the championship flight are Danny Neece of Amarillo, Jerry Rosen of Amarillo, Bill Holsted of Wichita Falls, Miles Childers of Amarillo, and also top amateur John Ferguson of Amarillo has indicated an interest.

Two currently listed pro golfers, Marvin Dick of Amarillo and Jim Herron of Borger, who are scheduled to be released from pro ranks June 1, have asked to be released a few days early so they can enter the tournament. They will not enter unless they receive word that they have been officially released from pro standing.

Not only will the golfers in all flights enjoy three full days of play, but a full schedule of activities is planned for each night during the tournament, including a free barbecue on Sunday evening.

## Water System Lines Contracts Awarded

Contracts totaling more than \$700,000 were let Tuesday for 185 additional lines to the Thirsty Water System that serves a five-county area.

The contracts were let Tuesday in Quanah, and phase one construction will be in Hall County, including an area north of Memphis, the Harold Chapel area, and the Estelline to Turkey construction.

The Worthy Construction Company of Bokchito, Okla., received Contract A with a low bid of \$251,427.14.

The low bidder for Contracts B and C was the Rhode Pipe Company of Silverton with a bid of \$450,365.60.

More than 125 persons attended the first phase of bid letting, including U. S. Rep. Graham Purcell. Purcell was instrumental in obtaining funding for the initial lines in 1965 and played a key

role in securing the grant and loans totaling \$805,000 for the first phase of the second installation.

The Thirsty Water System, a subsidiary of the Red River Water Authority of Texas, serves six counties including Hall, Childress, Cottle, Hardeman, Foard and Wilbarger.

The Red River Authority buys water for the Thirsty Water System from the Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority.

The Thirsty Water System will serve 1,000 rural water users when the new lines are completed.

The second phase of the project is due to be funded when the government fiscal year starts July 1, with work scheduled to begin in January, 1973. Over 500 miles of pipeline is planned in the two phases.

It was explained that the first phase, will begin as soon as the contractors are ready.

## Trinidad Missionary Visits Here This Week

David McFalls, Sr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Tim McFalls of Memphis, and his family are here visiting this week, after he has served over two years as a missionary on the Isles of Trinidad and Tobago, under sponsorship of the Grand Street Church of Christ in Plainview.

These islands are located off the coast of Venezuela, South America. Both islands are under government and there is a population of about one million.

Trinidad is by far the larger of the two islands and measures approximately 1,800 square miles, while Tobago is 22 miles away, measures about 16 square miles.

"When my family and I left the States in April, 1970, little did we know that we would arrive on the crest of a wave of revolution

on these lovely isles," McFalls said.

He and his wife, Carol, and children, David, Jr., Timothy, Elisabeth and Judith, are visiting his family here, and he has preached at both Memphis Church of Christ congregations.

Tuesday, David was the speaker at the Memphis Rotary Club, for the program chairman, Byron Baldwin. He told local Rotarians of life in Trinidad, the population composition, religion on the island, and some of the history and political developments.

David McFalls attended Southern Christian College at Terrell, a junior college, for two years, and then did associate work in Phoenix, Ariz. He moved to Vernon and served as a preacher for three years, then was with the Coronado Children Home in Lubbock. He entered Sunset School of Preaching in 1968, and after two years there, he worked with the Plainview congregation before going to Trinidad.

"Since Trinidad was under British rule for many years, the common language there is English," McFalls told local Rotarians. He said his family will be returning to Trinidad on June 25.

David reports that he will spend much of his time while in the states, working with the Plainview congregation. Two elders of this congregation, J. W. Hamby and Dr. Landria Smith, visited in Trinidad with the McFalls family earlier this spring, and reported in the church's newsletter, "we have a much greater appreciation for the efforts that have been put forth by the McFalls family since we have seen first-hand the results of their two years of labor."

## Positive Rabies Report Received On Skunk Head

Dr. H. R. Stevenson, county health officer, is urging citizens to have their pets vaccinated against rabies and to be especially careful to report any incidents concerning possible contact with rabid animals.

Veterinarian Jack Fowler received Monday a positive report on a rabid skunk head he sent to the State Department of Health. Dr. Fowler said the skunk was killed in Hall County southwest of Memphis several miles. He said that he had killed a dog which was involved in this particular incident but no humans were affected.

"I feel we had a real good vaccination program last summer, especially in the Memphis and Lakeview areas," Dr. Fowler said, "but pets need to have these shots renewed every year."

Dr. Fowler said this is the first known and reported case of a rabid animal in Hall County in many years.

## Deskins Wells Is New Member Of Compact Comm.

H. Deskins Wells, long-time publisher of The Wellington Leader has been named Interstate Compact Commissioner for Red River by Gov. Preston Smith, according to an announcement Tuesday. He will serve a two-year term, and will take office June 1. He replaces W. R. Elliott of Sherman whose term has expired.

The veteran Panhandle newspaperman has been interested in soil and water conservation for many years, and will now become the state's prime negotiator of agreements with other states on use, control and disposition of the waters of Red River and its tributaries.

He is a native of Collingsworth and became publisher of The Leader in 1924, shortly after earning his Bachelor of Journalism degree from the University of Texas.

He is past president of the Texas Press Association and the Panhandle Press Association and served as executive secretary of the state organization from 1941 until 1942 and editor of the Texas Press Messenger from 1942 until 1948.

In addition he has served as president of the Wellington Chamber of Commerce in 1930 and 1970, is a past president of the Kiwanis Club and past mayor of Wellington.

In 1950 he received an award for "unselfish service" on behalf of "unselfish service" on behalf of Soil Conservation Society of America.

## Gas Rate Increases Asked By Lone Star For Estelline, Lakeview

Lone Star Gas Company has asked the cities of Estelline and Lakeview to increase local residential and commercial natural gas rates by approximately 10 percent to enable the company to earn a reasonable rate of return on the fair market value of properties used to serve the public.

The applications for rate increase listed increased cost of buying gas, higher property and equipment costs, increased cost for employee compensation, higher interest rates on borrowed money and increased taxes as primary reasons for the income deficiency.

"In addition," stated Coy L. Miller, manager of the Memphis distribution office, "Lone Star has a commitment to its customers to vigorously compete for supplies of natural gas to keep its reserves in a favorable position. While other sections of the country are experiencing some shortages of natural gas, Lone Star has maintained favorable supplies. The gas cost adjustment portion of the applications placed before the City Councils, will help Lone Star maintain its favorable gas supply position and assure our customers of natural gas service for the future."

Approval of the company's applications would increase the average monthly residential gas bill by approximately 73 cents in Estelline, where more than 142 customers are served; and by approximately 92 cents in Lakeview, where more than 106 customers are served.

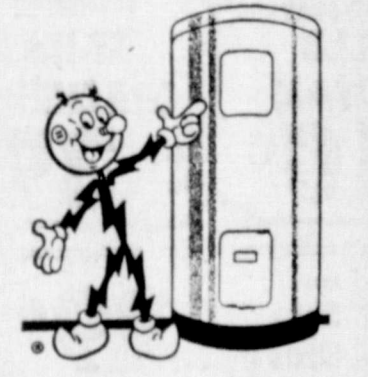

Rep. Angly, a 31-year-old Austin attorney who is the senior Republican member of the Texas House of Representatives, discussed the role of State Treasurer Jesse James in the Stock Fraud Scandal.

"While it was Mutscher, Shannon and McGinty who were found guilty of bribery conspiracy charges arising from the political loans of Frank Sharp, it was State Treasurer Jesse James who provided Sharp with the lendable funds," Angly said.

"Almost the entire increase in total deposits at the Sharpstown State Bank as shown by that bank's Statement of Condition during the period preceding these political loans was attributable to the blatantly preferential treatment given Sharp by State Treasurer Jesse James," he said.

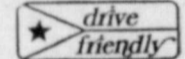
Angly pointed out that these deposits, \$10,034,875.00, amounted to approximately one-seventh of the total deposits at the now defunct Sharpstown State Bank.

He pointed out that the state lost over one million dollars in interest by these deposits. "James deposited \$6,000,000 in Sharpstown State Bank at 5 per cent interest, but the balance, \$4,034,875, was left for well over two years sitting parked in a checking account earning no interest whatsoever."

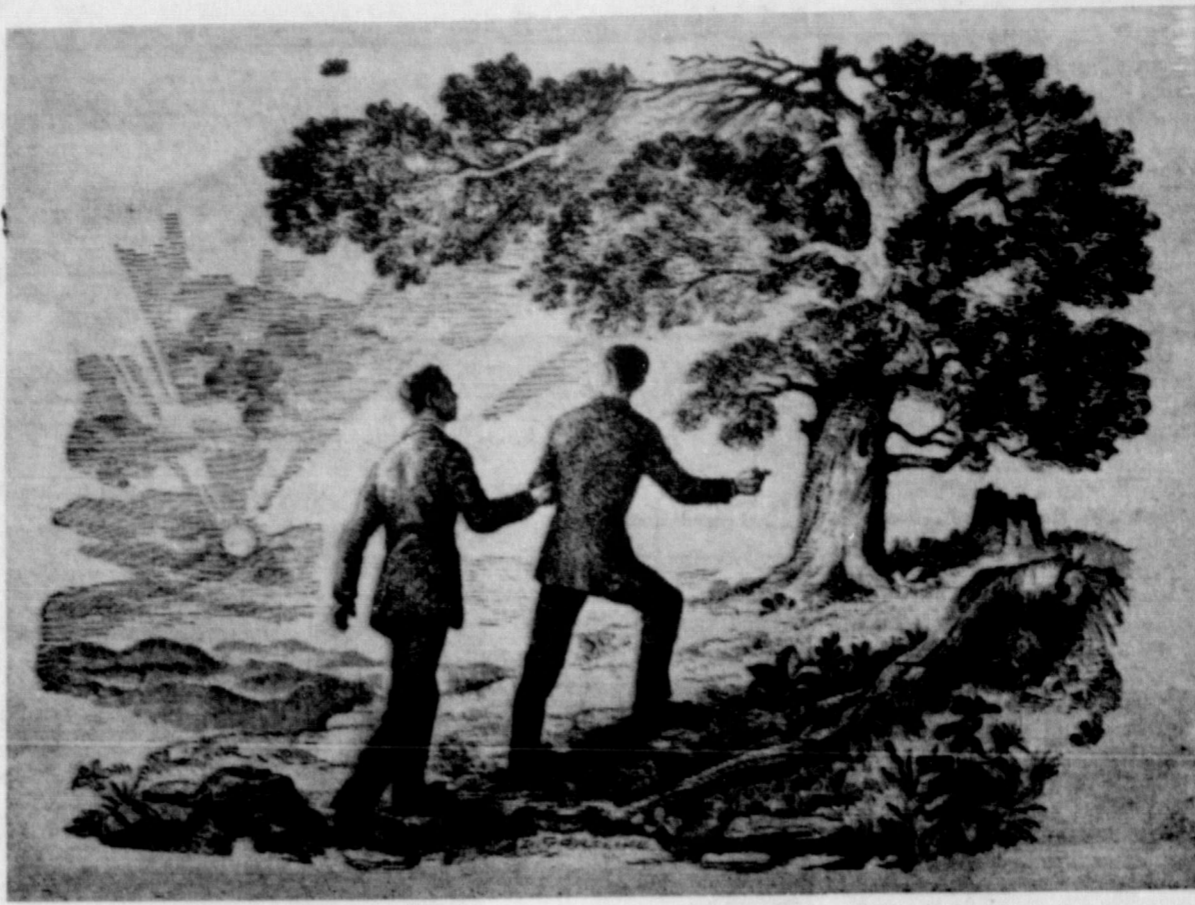

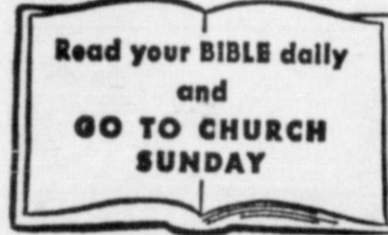

July 1 Deadline For Registering By Egg Handlers

Egg handlers in Texas must register under the Egg Products Inspection Act July 1 of this year. The act is being implemented by the USDA's Agricultural-Marketing Service.

All egg handlers should have received the proper registration forms in the mail, according to County Agricultural Agent W. B. Hooser.

Those who did not receive registration forms should contact J. Alfred Bybee, Federal-State Poultry Grading Supervisor, Room 5F27, 1100 Commence St., Dallas, Texas 75202.

Businesses required to register, under regulations of the Act, include all plants grading shell eggs for the ultimate consumer. These include retail stores, restaurants, institutions, bakeries, food manufacturers, producer-packers with more than 3,000 hens who pack eggs for the same outlets, and all hatcheries.

After July 1 the shell egg phase of the Egg Products Inspection Act becomes effective. This entails the disposition of "restricted eggs" defined under the Act as "checks, dirties, leakers, incubator rejects, inedibles and loss eggs." Another part of the Act, which went in effect July 1, 1971, requires that all egg processing plants producing frozen, dried or liquid egg products operate under continuous USDA inspection.

Beginning July 1, state and federal officials will check shell egg packers at least every three months to see that they are complying with the law. Persons who transport, ship or receive eggs may be checked periodically.

To comply with the law, shell egg packing plants must denature or destroy all restricted eggs except checks and dirties at the plant, says Hooser. Properly identified checks and dirties may be sent only to a USDA-inspected egg breaking plant where they will be properly handled under government supervision.

have maintenance costs gone up drastically in the last 10 years. The increase has also been huge for those who are living in the 625 rental units in the local area.

According to figures obtained from the latest Census of Housing, contract rents in Hall County rose from the \$33 per month median recorded in 1960 to no less than \$41 today. This does not include utility and fuel costs.

Half of the families living in rented quarters paid more than this amount and half paid less. The 10-year rise in median rents locally came to 24 per cent, the official figures show.

By way of comparison, the rise in the United States as a whole was 55 per cent. In the West South Central States it was 49 per cent and, in the State of Texas, approximately 51 per cent.

Nationally, while rents were sweeping upward rapidly, the purchase price of homes was also rising. The Census Bureau's figures show that the median cost of homes went up 43 per cent between 1960 and 1970. In the local area the rise was 50 per cent.

Back of it all was inflation in general and the steady erosion in the value of the dollar. It affected the price of land, materials, equipment, services and construction costs.

A major upward pressure has been in land values, especially in urban and suburban areas. The supply of available land that is close to where the jobs are has been shrinking rapidly. The cost has been rising proportionately.

As a result, in many areas, the trend has been toward apartment house construction rather than one-family units.

However, the continuing urge in most families is for homes of their own, according to soundings made by the Survey Research Center of the University of Michigan. Locally, 15,556 of them are home owners.

In Hall County, despite the higher costs, most people have been able to keep comfortably abreast financially, thanks to rising incomes.

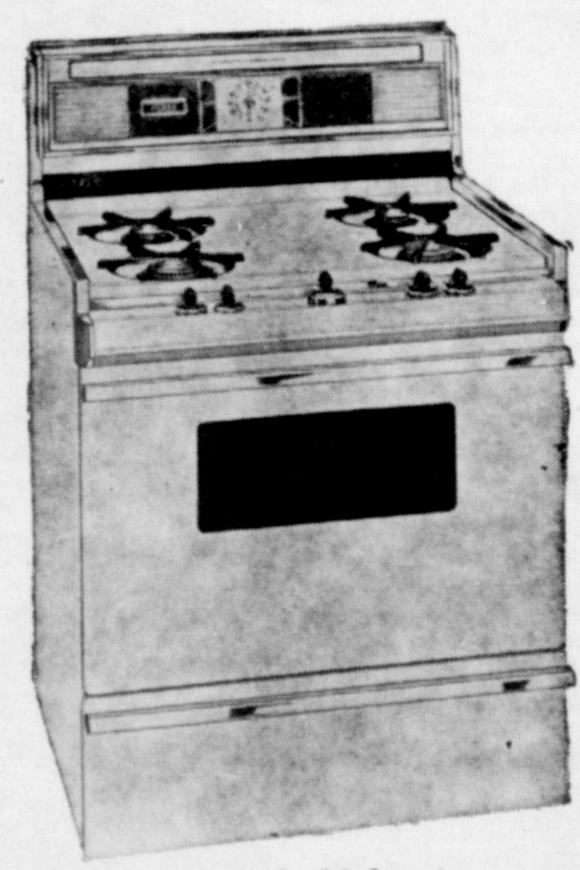
