Dr. H. R. Stevenson, county health officer, is urging citizens to have their pets vaccinated against rabies and to be especially careful to report any incidents concerning possible contact with

Veterinarian Jack Fowler received Monday a positive report on a rabid skunk head he sent to the State Department of Health. Dr. Fowler said the skunk was killed in Hall County southwest of Memthis several miles. He said that he had killed a dog which was involved in this particular incident but no humans were affected.

"I feel we had a real good vaccination program last summer, especially in the Memphis and Lakeview areas," Dr. Fowler said, but pets need to have these shots renewed every year."

Dr. Fowler said this is the first rabid animal in Hall County in many years.

Our Approach To Tornado Warning!

We would be the last to minimize the danger involved where tornadoes have struck, nor would we suggest that citizesn adopt a fatalistic attidude about watching for tornadoes when threatening clouds are approaching.

People react different ways to the dangers of tornadoes. Some go sof ar as to move into their cellars on evenings when a storm might threaten, while others tend to ignore the danger and play the odds that noting will happen to them.

As far as the city of Memphis is concerned, citizens need to know that the volunteer firemen, and along with law enforcement officers, others with C. B. radios, serve as official weather watchers and will alert citizens with a long blast on the siren and emergency warnings on the cable system if a tornado is sighted. New comers here need to be told of this public service and what the long, continuous steady blast on the siren means.

The Amarillo newspaper last week in an editorial, pleaded for a more reasonable approach to storm alerts by newsmen of radio and television. With the coming storm season each year, the voice news media gears itself with all the latest electronic means to give viewers and listeners an up to the minute report on every cloud that might possibly drop a .10 of an inch or more rain, with admonishments to be on the alert for possible

Once an area has been placed in a storm alert, the whole pattern of activitiesc changes. Citizens are afraid to go about their regular duties, traffic becomes light on the streets, restaurants, and after hours stores see a decided drop in their

To quote the editorial of the Amarillo newspaper: "Meanwhile, what of the impending weather? Tornadoes strike infrequently. The reports buzzing on your television screen are their parents . . . everywhere: nine times out of ten momentary viewings of a funnel by the public. Sure, there's hail and yes, there's wind, and glory be, there's often rain. Rep. Angly, a 31-year-old Austin attorney who is the senior Republican member of the Texas House of Representatives, discussed the role of State Treasurer Jesse James in the Stock Fraud

"While is was Mutscher, Shannon and McGinty who were found guilty of bribery conspiracy charges arising from the political loans of Frank Sharp, it was State Treasurer Jesse James who provided Sharp with the lendable funds," Angly said.
