Hall County voters will join with other Texas voters to cast ballots in the Democratic party's second primary election on Saturday, June 3, with polls opening at 8 a. m., and closing at 7 p. m.

Several key nominations will be decided in the election, as the ballot will contain five races for voters to decide upon.

Of key area interest is the District Attorney's race as incumbent Jack Boone of Memphis, or John M. Deaver of Memphis will be selected by voters in Hall, Donley, Collingsworth, Childress and Carson counties.

Polling places will be open at four places in the county. Boxes No. 1 and No. 13, Memphis, have been combined, and voters will cast ballots in the court house.

Democratic party officials will again receive results from each voting precinct at The Memphis Democrat office. Election judges are asked to report their totals as soon as possible, and call 259-2441, collect.

There were 90 absentee ballots cast with the county clerk by the closing deadline this week. This is slightly over one-half as many as voted absentee in the first primary in May.

Voters will select party nominees for the U. S. Senator, between Barefoot Sanders and Ralph Yarborough for Governor; between Ralph Briscoe and Frances Farenthold, for Lieutenant Governor; between Wayne W. Connally and Bill Hobby; for Comptroller, between Robert S. Calvert and James (Jim) Wilson; and for District Attorney, between Jack Boone and John M. Deaver.

# Ag. Center Dedication Attracts 100 May 19

A dedication ceremony of the agricultural center in Memphis attracted 100 persons, the man in the U. S. Department of Agriculture, and both in U. S. Representatives, with the newly appointed Conservationist of S. C. S. in first official occasion after appointment.

Scrivner, chairman of the Childrens SWCD, served as emcee of the ceremonies for the dedication of the 4,400 square foot center which cost \$50,000 and financed by Memphis institutions.

Secretary of Agriculture Phil Campbell praised the conservation district for setting the example for other districts in a new and unique way of operating revenue for district. The Undersecretary referring to the rentals paid USDA for the three office locations for FHA, SCS units, and ASCS county

Secretary Campbell said that the general public needs to become better informed about the work of conservation districts.

Many city people may not understand the work of controlling weeds and brush. But a 1964 survey showed that 82 per cent of Texas grasslands were infested with brush which consumed 38 per cent of the state's annual rainfall.

The amount consumed by brush and weeds is nearly 20 times as much water as is used by all the city dwellers, industries and irrigation farmers in Texas, the Under Secretary said.

He said that every effort is being made to keep brush control appropriations in the current financing for the Rural Environmental Action program through ASCS programs.

Other speakers on the program were State Conservationist Edward E. Thomas, and Representatives Bob Price of Pampa and Graham Purcell of Wichita Falls.

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## EDITORIAL

### Enforce The Law

An immediate reaction to the news that Gov. George Wallace had been gunned down by an assailant while campaigning in Maryland was a clamor among politicians and news commentators for laws which would take away the guns.

Another gun control law is not what this country needs to stop the senseless shootings like this one.

What this country needs is court reform. It needs a return to a system where punishment is swift, sure and painful to those who break the laws.

The man that shot George Wallace bought a gun in February, 1960. He was the legal owner of it. He would have still secured a gun even if he couldn't get one legally.

The man that shot Robert Kennedy used a stolen gun. The man that shot John F. Kennedy used a mail order rifle.

Crimes are committed every day with guns that are not registered, with knives and other weapons that are not registered. A gun law serves only to make it illegal for responsible citizens to own guns while continuing to let criminals use them.

It is harder to stop the flow of guns in this country than it is of marijuana and the government admits that is just about a hopeless task to stop drug traffic. Even if somehow the movement of guns could be stopped completely, the lawless element of this country would find other reasons with which to intimidate helpless citizens.

The answer to crime is punishment. We have suffered through more than a decade of court decisions, principally Supreme Court decisions, which stack cards heavily in favor of the criminals. An obsession with civil rights has distorted the entire idea of arrest, conviction and prompt punishment of those who break the laws.

No wonder a large percentage of the crimes in this country are committed by persons already awaiting trial on previous crimes. They are out on bail and commit crimes again while waiting.

Court delays are notorious. Sirhan Sirhan, the man who killed Sen. Robert Kennedy before a hundred witnesses, hasn't even come to trial yet. When he does, most of these witnesses will have dispersed or their account of what happened will have become foggy.

Most of the armed hijackers who take over planes and extract money from the airlines are not even caught, much less punished.

Bank robbery is approaching epidemic proportions in this country. Shootings and stabbings and stealing are common.

What we need is an overhaul of our system of justice, not a simple little law designed to take an honest man's weapons away from him.

# SPORTS CORNER

 You saw a lot of red faces in around Memphis Tuesday and Wednesday, either playing in or watching the Memphis Invitational tournament.

The local Country Club had an outstanding tournament, not only for the golfers, but entertaining all. What makes a tournament an outstanding one at a club like the one here, is the interest of the local people to attend and being good hosts, that's exactly what the Memphis Club has that a lot of other clubs don't have.

With many of the outstanding golfers, some in the championship flight, some in lower flights, they all expressed warm appreciation and approval of the friendly reception they received.

of the Panhandle's top golfers always place high in the championship flight, even went so far to say that the Memphis tournament is the best run and most enjoyable tournament of all that they have attended all year long. Now that these men play in tournaments almost every year, they have played in tournaments after year, are clothed with their home, and many of the courses are longer, more elaborate.

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borately maintained, plush even, these statements bring up several questions.

I asked which hole on the local course they felt was the toughest, and the championship golfers said it was No. 1, 219-yard par 3. No. 5, because of the row of thick American elm trees across the center raise much discussion, and No. 6, the out-of-bounds dog-leg hole also was named, and it was also the feeling that the trees really make the local course the challenging course it is.

A lot of the credit for the success of the local tournament must go to Dennis and Barry Ward and the members of the club's tournament committee, Danny Scarbrough and Don Cockrell, and Gayle Monzingo. Also the ladies of the club worked real hard, arriving early to set up coffee, lemonade and tea stands, and running the circle ball pool on No. 8, which gives the golfers a chance of winning a new golf ball. I don't want to list the names of all the ladies for there was a large number of them who worked.

The local tournament attracts many outstanding golfers, but it is a rare occurrence when par is broken on the course during three days of medal play. Dick Weston of Plainview was one under par, 135, for 36 holes, but slipped to a two over 70 on the final day to finish with a 205, one over par. Ken Bailey last year finished in par, 204.

Max Hickey, who finds the local course much to his liking, finished second with a 205, and Danny Scarbrough finished third with a 209. Danny had a sub-par, 66 on his second day, the best round of tournament golf he has ever shot, and for mid-way in the final round, Danny was tied with Weston and Hickey for the tournament lead. All the local fans were real proud of Danny for he is the first local golfer to make such a fine showing. Mickey Daugherty, who learned the game here, played a good tournament two years ago.

I followed the final threesome, Weston, Hickey and Scarbrough much of the final round, was real proud of the gallery. With continuous pressure riding on the players, disturbances can get-out-of-hand and cost valuable strokes at times. Professionals, playing with galleries all the time,

get more accustomed to these disturbances, but most amateurs aren't fortunate enough to find themselves with a gallery, especially one of 100 persons or so, very often. Golfers generally agree that there is no pressure like tournaments, pressure. Even routine golf shots become tricky at times. Dick Weston said after he made an excellent wedge approach to the last green "before I hit that shot, I was trying to decide how you spelled blade and scoop as one word." He was referring to the names of the two worst missed shots a golfer can make with a club.

The local course, blessed with spring rains, with the greens lush with grass, and the fairways with a green cover, made the tournament most enjoyable. Golfers even had casual water along the creek to contend with this year.

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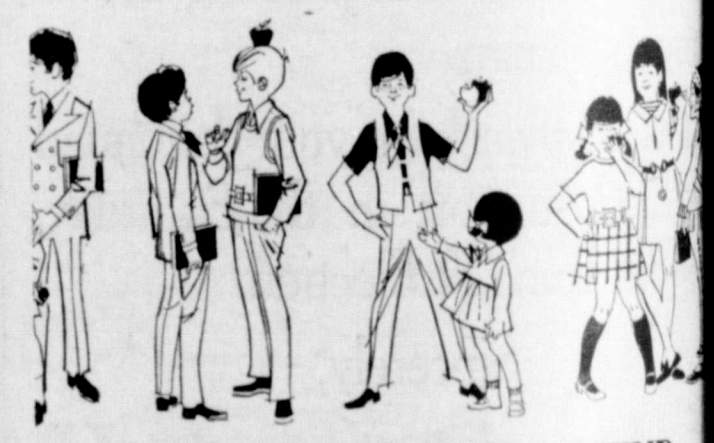

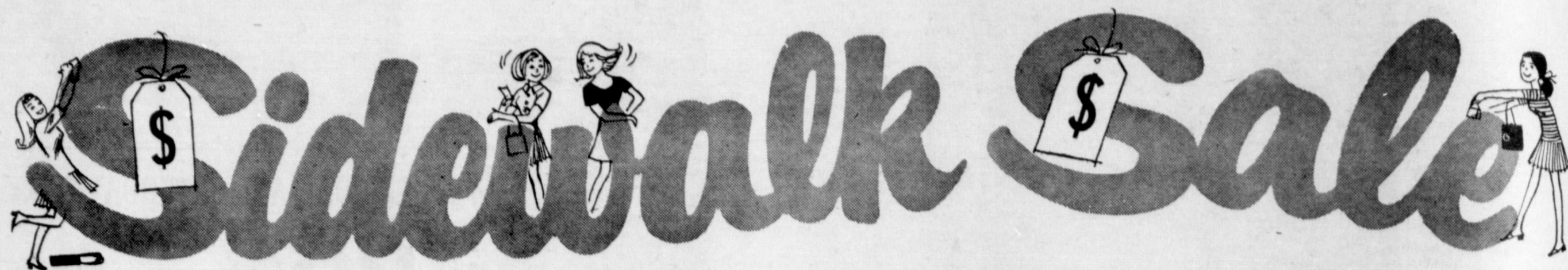

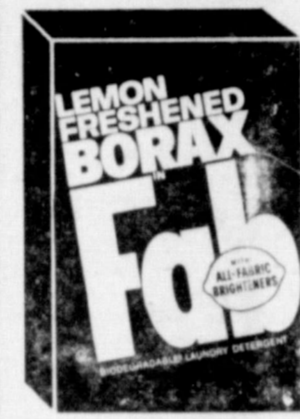
