Many city people may not understand the work of controlling weeds and brush. But a 1964 survey showed that 82 per cent of Texas grasslands were infested with brush which consumed 38 per cent of the state's annual

The amount consumed by brush and weeds is nearly 20 times as much water as is used by all the city dwellers, industries and irrigation farmers in Texas, the Under Secretary said.

He said that every effort is being made to keep brush control appropriations in the current financing for the Rural Environmental Action program through ASCS programs.

EDITORIAL

Enforce The Law

An immediate reaction to the news that Gov. George Wallace had been gunned down by an assailant while campaigning in Maryland was a clamor among piliticians and news commentators for laws which would take away the guns.

Another gun control law is not what this country needs to stop the senseless shootings like this one.

What this country needs is court reform. It needs a return to a system wherepunishment is swift, sure and painful to those who break the laws.

The man that shot George Wallace bought a gun in February, 1970. He was the legal owner of it. He would have still secured a gun even if he couldn't get one legally.

The man that shot Robert Kennedy used a stolen gun. The man that shot John F. Kennedy used a mail order rifle.

Crimes are committed every day with guns that are not registered, with knives and other weapons that are not registered. A gun law serves only to make it illegal for responsible citizens to own guns while continuing to let criminals use

I t is harder to stop the flow of guns in this country than it is of marijuana and the government admits that is just about a hopeless task to stop drug traffic. Even if somehow the movement of guns could be stopped completely, the lawless element of this countwy would find other reasons with which to itimidate helpless citizens.

The answer to crime is punishment. We have suffered through more than a decade of court decisions, principally Supreme Court decisions, which stack cards heavily in favor of the criminals. An obsession with civil rights has distorted the entire idea of arrest, conviction and prompt punishment of those who break the laws.

No wonder a large percentage of the crimes in this country are committed by persons already awaiting trial on previous crimes. They are out on bail and commit crimes again while for a re-check in Dallas County waiting.

Court delays are notorius. Sirhan Sirhan, the man who killed Sen. Robert Kennedy before a hundred wintnesses, hasn't first primary and voted for him, even come to trial yet.
