Primary Election Results!

If one thing was clear in the 1972 primary elections, voters in this state in the majority went for candidates with successful business reputations more so than those with political

The election of Dolph Briscoe as Democratic nominee for Governor, who almost carried Hall County by a four to one margin, and the nomination of Bill Hobby, publisher of the Houston Post, as Lieutenant Governor, are examples of this preference for businessmen candidates.

For Dolph Briscoe, the Uvalde rancher and banker, the big step to Democratic Party nomination for Governor came after he had unsuccessfully run for the office in past years.

He took his place as a reformer while serving in the legislature in the '50s. He introduced the resolution demanding an investigation of the Veterans Land Board. As a result, a major scandal was unearthed, one state official went to prison. Although Dolph Briscoe was unsuccessful in past races, he was able to build his successful organization for the 1972 race. Briscoe led the Hall County balloting in the first primary by an impressive margin.

Although Hall County voters gave a 9.5 to 5 margin to Wayne Connally in the Lt. Governor's race, it is interesting to note that the vote was as close as it was since neither candidate campaigned in this area or had any local "organization" working in their behalf during the campaign. Hobby pulled most of his support from North Texas and the Hous-


Another interesting race was seen in this county as Barefoot Sanders led Ralph Yarborough 830 to 641. Most political news writers are referring to a conservative victory in this race over the state.

Barefoot Sanders is a former State legislator, U. S. District Attorney for North Texas, assistant attorney general and legislative advisor to LBJ, and got his campaign rolling toward the end of the period before the first primary. Several of the state's largest newspapers came out for Barefoot Sanders and bluntly stated that he is well qualified to step up the U. S. Senate. These newspapers also pointed out that Ralph Yarborough would be 74 years old at the end of the massive advertising campaigns in term if he was elected.
