## Watershed Bid To Be Re-Advertised

According to written notification received here by sponsors of the Lakeview Watershed Project, the bid is to be re-advertised on July 4 in the watershed.

Malcolm E. Cunningham, area supervisor, said in letters to the city, "We have been advised by the state office that the low bid for Site 4 of the Lakeview Creek Watershed was not acceptable because of discrepancies in the bid. The second low bid was too far above the engineer's estimate to be acceptable."

The city has been assured by the state office that we plan to re-advertise this site next month and we can get construction going August," the letter stated. Receiving letters were Chairman Paul Montgomery of Hall County Water Conservation and Improvement District No. 1, Chairman Lee Scrivner and Hermesmyer of Hall-Childers and Donley S&WCD, County Engineers of Hall and Donley and the mayor of the City of Lakeview.

The Lakeview Watershed Project will enter the construction phase as soon as an acceptable bid is obtained. Survey crews from the U. S. have moved back into the area to continue further de-

tailed survey of sites in the Watershed.

## Malcum Steptoe Is Fined On Three Charges

Malcum Paul Steptoe, 19, this morning, went before County Judge E. (Gip) McMurry, on a charge of aggravated assault on a peace officer.

Steptoe had originally pleaded not guilty to the charge, and a petit jury had been called for this morning to try the case. Steptoe indicated that he wanted to change his plea and have the case tried before the judge.

Steptoe pled guilty to the charge this morning before Judge McMurry and was given a sentence of \$1000 fine and two years in jail.

The assault charge came when city police were investigating a disturbance complaint.

Malcolm Steptoe was also taken before Justice of Peace Roy Coleman this morning on charges of disregarding a peace officer, two counts, and was fined \$200 each.

The impact overturned the pickup, and both vehicles came to a stop upon the northeast corner of the intersection. Both were heavily damaged.

The wreck occurred only minutes after local residents were warned of a potentially damaging thunderstorm approaching Memphis from the northwest.

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## EDITORIAL

### "Everything Else eBing Equal . . ."

When we were in school and studying mathematics, (the old math that is), we remember our teachers explaining problems, and after listening to all the principles, used the expression, "and with everything else being equal . . .", we students were to come up with the answer.

It has been a few years since this thought has been brought to mind but in reading the circumstances concerning the debates in the U. S. Congress, Senate and House, concerning revenue sharing, the phrase just came to mind.

Whenever legislation is drafted in Washington, D. C., it appears that there many bills, programs, etc., set up with the idea of making everything equal and demanding that all states meet this standard in all things.

However, when this same "equality" principle is applied to revenue sharing of federal funds with states and cities, things seem to get all tangled up, and Texas Senators and Representatives are definitely shaken up over the possible outcome of the whole thing.

In news releases from U. S. Senator Lloyd Bentsen and U. S. Representative Graham Purcell which this newspaper received this week, both bluntly stated that Texas is being discriminated against if proposed revenue sharing bills pass through Congress in their present form.

Texas is one of seven states that does not have state income taxes, a situation which should make Texans very happy and proud. However, one section of the federal revenue-share bill provides that a portion of each state's federal revenue-share is based on income derived from state income taxes. The section is designed to compel the seven states that do not have state income taxes—such as Texas—to enact such taxes. Otherwise, they would receive only a minimum allowance.

Senator Bentsen is a co-sponsor of an amendment to the Senate bill that would abolish the "state income tax inducement and replace it with a new revenue sharing formula. The new formula would be based only on federal income tax liabilities within each state. If this amendment is approved, the amount of revenue sharing funds for Texas would be increased by \$26.5 million.

Sen. Bentsen states that although he believes the principle behind revenue sharing is sound, he feels it is being introduced at a poor time, for the U. S. Government is in deficit spending at this time, and any revenue sharing would just increase this deficit.

The whole principle is that the federal government would use its taxing abilities to raise taxes for states and cities. Now, if the Federal Government had surplus revenue, this would be fine, but with deficit revenue a fact today, it seems logical to us that the federal tax level would have to be increased before the states and cities could share in it.

Rep. Purcell said, "The proposal to take over \$30 billion from the Federal Government, and give it to the states creates problem number one: The Federal government doesn't really have \$30 billion to give away nor will it have within the next five years, unless it decides to tax people to get it. As a matter of fact, what the Federal government presently has is a whopping \$430 billion deficit.

Point number two is that Texas, which ranks seventh in the nation in total amount of income tax paid annually to the Federal Treasury, will actually be next to last in the U. S. in receiving benefits on a per capita basis. For their hard earned tax money, Texans will get back \$4.02 per person in revenue sharing funds—compared with New York, where the revenue sharing hand-out will equal \$17.23 a person, or Hawaii with \$16.86. Only Tennessee will receive less—by 49 cents."

Rep. Purcell goes on to object to the entire concept of revenue sharing, as written. It is simply not good government to separate the taxing authority from the spending authority.

It appears to us that everything is not equal in revenue sharing. Will our elected senators and representatives in Washington have the influence to engineer a fair shake for Texas?

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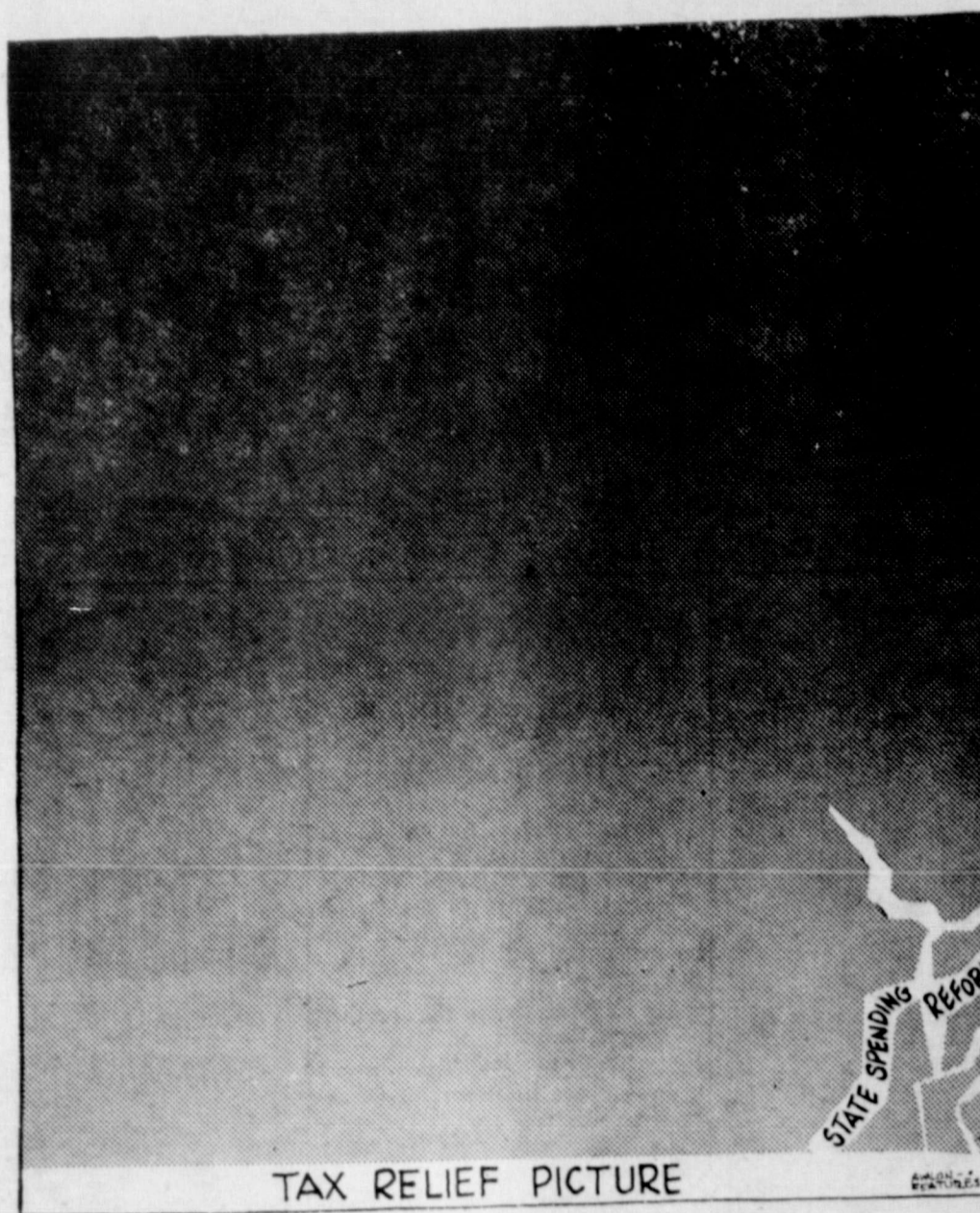

### The Small Town Is Vanishing?

Max Lerner, in his book "America As A Civilization," wasn't quite sure where to draw the line between the small town and the city. But he made this memorable observation: "One might say that a small town ceases to be one as someone who has lived in it a number of years finds unfamiliar faces as he walks down the street and is not moved to discover who they are and how they got there."

That's a good way to suggest what a small town is not.

An old story that used to make the rounds made unquestionably clear what a small town is.

A merchant who ordered some merchandise through a traveling salesman felt he was gyped when the goods arrived in Centerville. So he sent the stuff back to the wholesaler house. The wholesaler insisted on payment and drew a sight draft on the merchant at the local bank. When the bank refused to honor the draft, the wholesaler wrote the postmaster asking if the merchant's financial standing was sound. Informed by the PM that it was, the wholesaler sent the account to the town's leading lawyer for collection.

If that city wholesaler hadn't previously known what a small town is, the lawyer's reply straightened him out.

The reply went something like this:

"As your lawyer, I should tell you I'm the merchant you tried to cheat. I also happen to be president of our only local bank. As for the postmaster, I'm it. Now if I weren't also the preacher at the local church I'd tell you where to go."

**Farmers must live too**  
Food prices have risen, but before condemning farmers and ranchers and threatening them with a wave of controls, a few facts must be considered if the nation wishes to continue eating in the style to which it has become accustomed.

Foremost among these facts is that farm prices still remain at preinflation low levels. Food prices have risen because of inflationary increases in handling costs. The plight of the farmer is well expressed in an article appearing on the editorial page of a major daily paper. It is pointed out that, "Farmers and ranchers are expected to stay on the land rather than join the job-seekers in the city . . . On the other hand, farmers and ranchers are not expected to make more money ever because if they do the cost of food will go up. When beef prices rise to levels of 20 years ago, the protest is loud and clear . . . Bear in mind that farmers and ranchers are consumers, too,

and as consumers their expenses have gone up more than 100 percent during the same period that prices they receive for their products have remained stable."

The conclusion reached in the article quoted above is much to the point—the food we buy today is one of the best bargains in the marketplace, ". . . even if beef prices have climbed up to 19-52 levels."

The Observer of Newberry, South Carolina, quoted the National Wildlife Federation Conservation News as saying: "Although your next camping trip might be without any mosquitoes, if two researchers from Indiana are right, it will also be without any friends! Two biology researchers from Bombay have reported that garlic (that's right folks—garlic!) may provide a deadly diet for mosquitoes, houseflies, and certain other major insect pests while posing none of the hazards of DDT. The researchers reported that, particularly considering its nontoxic nature, 'garlic oil could be used as a pesticide.' So the next time you get out in those woods, just rub a little garlic all over and relax pest-free. Another good point: if you don't have a lot of wilderness around you. You soon will have!"

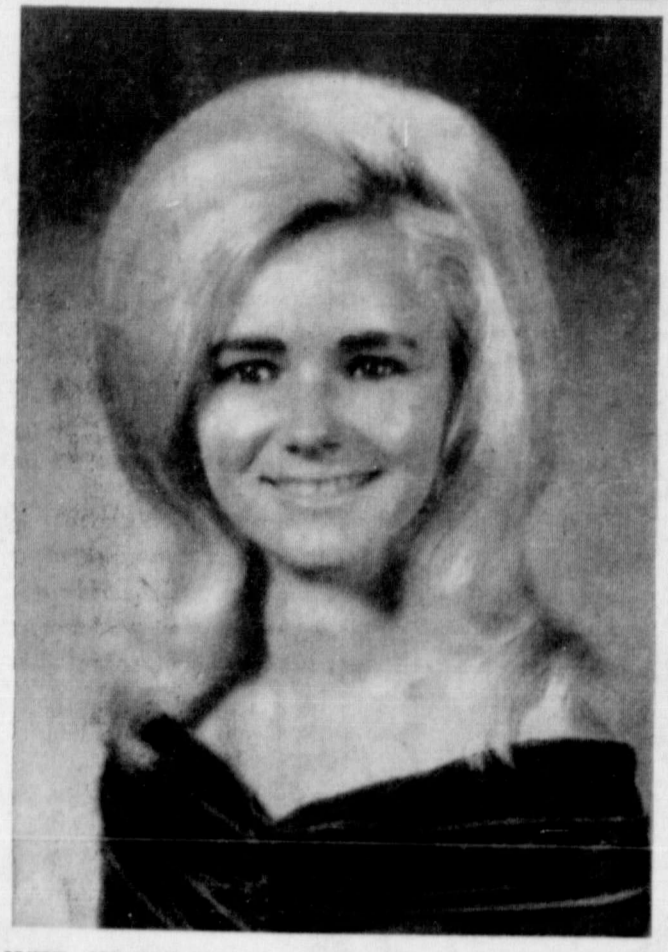

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## FHA Expands Eligibility On Rural Housing

Many additional families in Texas are now eligible for rural housing loans from the Farmers Home Administration, FHA State Director J. Lynn Futch announced today.

"In families where both husband and wife are employed," Futch explained, "the new policy permits half of the wife's gross income to be excluded in determining whether the total family income is within the maximum limit for loan eligibility."

For example, the husband is the principal source of income with \$6,000. His wife earns \$4,000. His entire income, plus half of his wife's, or \$2,000, totals \$8,000. This is within Texas' moderate income level of \$8,000, so the family may be eligible for a Farmers Home Administration loan.

James V. Smith, National Administrator of Farmers Home Administration emphasized that newly-eligible families must demonstrate that they otherwise merit FHA financing, and that credit is not available from regular commercial sources.

"The new policy will assist families in which the wife's income is needed to improve the standard of living. Note that if the wife is the principal breadwinner, the rule does not apply. This change will in no way affect our expanding service to low-income families," Mr. Smith said.

Loans may be made to families that will buy or build homes in open country or towns of up to 10,000 population, and who are not able to secure credit from regular commercial sources. Complete information is available from the agency's 143 county offices located in county seat towns throughout Texas.

### Don't Learn The Hard Way

At this time of the year many high school seniors are considering their futures and the part that additional education may play therein. Many, of course, will elect to go on to a college or university of their choice. But many will elect to attend a vocational or trade school.

Both are excellent choices provided the students carefully select the school which they plan to attend.

To those seniors deciding to continue their education in a trade school or vocational school, and to other persons deciding to go back to school, my Consumer Protection Division offers these words of advice:

Most vocational and trade schools conducted in Texas are reputable honest establishments. While this has been true for some time, an Act known as the Proprietary School Act passed by the Texas Legislature at its last session and administered by the Texas Education Agency has greatly improved the situation. This Act provides for licensing, bonding, and regulation of trade schools, but prospective students should not rely solely on state regulation of such institutions. They should make a thorough investigation before they decide on a school.

We have reports where some of these schools have closed their doors after receiving tuition payments from prospective students. They have either gone broke or moved from the State and there

is no way the student can recover the money.

We have received complaints of substandard instruction offered by some schools.

One of the prime rules for interested persons to follow when thinking of enrolling in a school is to avoid high pressure tactics requiring immediate enrollment. Some salesmen will state that failure to enroll immediately will result in the inability of the prospective student ever to enter their school. Remember—legitimate schools always allow sufficient time for investigation of their facilities, training programs, and the quality of their instruction.

Prospective students should carefully check the terms of the enrollment contract prior to signing. These terms should be thoroughly understood. What provisions are made for cancellation by the student? Is he able to receive his tuition back and if so, what amount and under what conditions?

You should remember that the written provisions of the con-

tract control over the oral representations made by the salesman. If there is ambiguity in the contract or doubt on the part of the student as to the meaning of the language of the contract, this should be resolved in writing prior to signing the contract.

In some instances we have found that unscrupulous salesmen make exaggerated promises concerning job opportunities either while attending school or after graduation. Prospective students should be aware of the fact that a placement service does not guarantee them a job.

Finally, the trade school's general reputation is of utmost importance. If there is a Better Business Bureau in the town in which the school is located, you should check with them prior to signing any contract. If there is no such bureau, ask for the names of several former students. You should then contact these people and get their opinion of the school.

While this takes extra time, the caution is well worth the delay involved. If the school is

# Gene Miller Attends Bluebonnet State In Progress In Seguin

Gene Miller of Memphis High School, a citizen of the American Legion Auxiliary Bluebonnet State, now in progress in Seguin, Texas, was elected Precinct No. 1, and is elected Precinct No. 1, Nationalist Party, Ride man. Manning, Houston, Assistant Principal at Clear Creek High School, League City. Miss Greatchen Killinger, government teacher, Clear Lake High School is Education Coordinator. Chairman of the Auxiliary Girls State Committee is Mrs. J. B. Martin of Trinity.

Retired Associate Justice Meade Griffin of the Texas Supreme Court administered the oath of office to the elected state officials of Bluebonnet Girls State Monday, June 19, in the rotunda of the State Capitol.

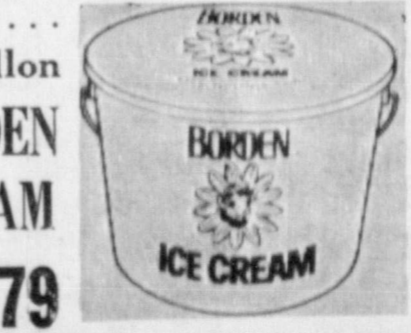

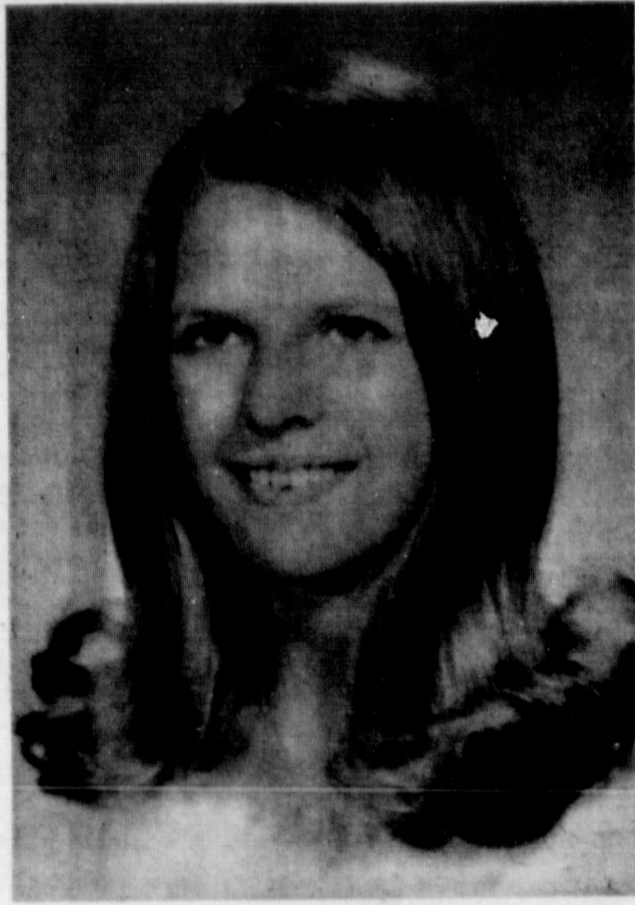

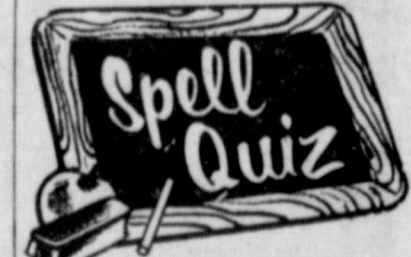
