Cyclones Lose Bi-District To Sanford-Fritch Tues.

The Memphis Cyclone made a strong concerted bid for the Bi-District championship Tuesday night in West Texas State Field House before an almost capacity crowd, of 1,300 only to lose out in the final 20 minutes of play to Sanford-Fritch, 76 to 66.

Memphis Coach Jimmy Pope summed up the feeling of fans and school officials after the game when he said, "I was just real proud of our team for their tremendous effort they gave against Fritch."

"I felt before the game, and I still do, that the winner of this game would go to the state tournament," Coach Pope said.

The 10-point victory score in favor of Fritch is slightly misleading and not indicative of how close the game really was. With 2:18 left in the final stanza, the score was 66 to 63. At this point, Memphis had three scoring opportunities when play resumed and the momentum of the game was definitely in Memphis' favor.

But Fritch regrouped forces, forced two turnovers and made it 68 to 63 with 1:28 left on the clock. Coach Pope indicated that in the final moments all his team could hope for was force the turnovers with full court pressure and hope for accurate shooting. Fritch, however, was able to break the pressure with keen passing and won the contest by 10 points.

The Cyclone staged a second half rally described as "furious" by an area sportswriter to make up a 15 point deficit.

Actually, to analyze the game, it would have to be divided into two halves. The first half saw Fritch capture a 45 to 30 margin. Fritch hit 17 field goals to Memphis' 15 but made 11 of 14 free shots, while Memphis did not make a free shot in the first half.

The second half saw Memphis make 8 of 14 free shots while Fritch made 7 of 12.

For the game, both teams hit 29 field goals apiece. Memphis shot 72 times and Sanford-Fritch 76 times. Memphis turned the ball over 26 times and the Eagles lost it 20 times. Memphis was called for fouling 20 times and Fritch 14 times.

Individual efforts on both squads kept fans on their feet and left most emotionally drained. One of these matches was between the Cyclone's Ronnie Browning and Fritch's Mike Dunham, both lads making up for smaller sizes by exceptional quickness and neither one being able to out-best the other. Ronnie scored nine points for Memphis and Dunham had 8 for Fritch.

Another top notch pairing was Memphis' Larry Don Johnson who probably had one of the best nights of his career, scoring 34 points to be the games leading scorer and earning praise and respect for his play.

Johnson was matched with Compton, one of Fritch's finest inside men and rebounders. Compton was only able to manage 12 points.

Bob Dennis scored 32 points for Fritch, many shots of which were outside, but inside this lad was able to draw fouls. His play contributed greatly to Fritch's victory.

North Rolling Plains RC&D Executive Committee Meets In Shamrock Feb. 14

A meeting of the executive committee of the North Rolling Plains Rural Conservation and Development district was well attended last Wednesday, Feb. 14, by all eight county representatives in Shamrock.

Counties participating include: Hall, Donley, Briscoe, Wheeler, Collingsworth, Lipscomb, Gray and Hemphill.

Progress reports from each county were made in keeping with the project proposals set out in 1968 when the North Rolling Plains R. C. & D. was formed. Development of sanitary landfills, medical facilities water projects, and local city parks seemed to be common projects of all 8 counties.

Hall County reported several projects that include: new city park at Turkey; proposed improvement of the city park at Memphis; rural water lines to the Brice-Lesley area and proposed rural water lines to Estelline and Turkey; sewage disposal system to be updated for Turkey; and the low rent housing units developed in Memphis.

Special guests at the meeting included: W. S. Goodlett, Jr.,

Assistant State Conservationist, from Temple; A. W. Dalrymple, director of the State Conservation Board, from Lubbock; and Grady Hollifield, representative of the Panhandle Regional Planning Committee, from Amarillo. Each of these men expressed praise for the work of the local R. C. & D. district.

However, Mr. Goodlett expressed the opinion that funding for the North Rolling Plains District could not be foreseen in the near future. After returning from Washington recently, Mr. Goodlett stated, "The feeling of Congress is wait-and-see. Although programs like REAP have been cut from the budget, other similar programs are expected to be formed."

Mr. Hollifield asked for each county representative to encourage interest on a local basis. He pointed out the sole purpose of the North Rolling Plains district is to "improve life in general and especially in the economic community."

Any citizen of Hall County interested in working with the local county committee should contact Henry Gregory of Memphis.

Coach Pope said, "Fritch put one of their best defenders on Mike and covered him like a blanket all night. Beck got into foul trouble, and played the entire fourth quarter with four fouls and did a great job."

Coach Bill Schneider of Fritch, who cited poise as making the difference, said, "Johnson is the best boy we've played against. He did a great job and I thought our defense did a great job on him. I don't think we could have defended him any better. Memphis showed their poise by coming back. They're a real quality ball club."

The Cyclone, the season ends, with hopes of returning next year with half the club back, including two starters and the No. 6 man back, and promising sophomores anxiously waiting their chances, and a quality freshman squad.

The play at Canyon left no one disappointed. Fritch went to state last year and had all their boys back this year.

Memphis fans have a District trophy in the school's show case to remember the 1972-73 team, one of the few in the school's history.

In neighborhood wars, Memphis fans enjoyed the Cyclone's 58-57 victory over Childress last Friday night in a "warm-up" game, possibly because it was one of the few times in recent history a Memphis team won a basketball game from Childress.

Mayor Kenneth Dale and Aldermen Troy Phillips, Ward 1; Dub Parker, Ward 2; Olton Pate, Ward 3; and Ed Foxhall, Ward 4, have filed with City Secretary A. L. Gailey for re-election. Deadline for filing for City position is March 8.

Absentee balloting will begin 20 days prior to the date of the election.

Some widows who started receiving benefits after age 60 and before age 65 would receive a smaller increase. The nearer age 65 the greater the increase, Curtis explained.

Mr. Wesley D. Mabry farmed in Hall County for many years. He became insured and entitled to retirement payments based on his farm income after he was age 65. He drew retirement payments from April, 1956 until his death in July, 1971.

From the time of his death until Jan., Mrs. Mabry was receiving 82%, the maximum any widow could receive, of Mr. Mabry's retirement payment. Since Mrs. Mabry was past 65 when she began receiving widows payments she is now entitled to the full 100 per cent of what Mr. Mabry would now be receiving if he were living and retired.

Mrs. Mabry was born in Fayette County, near La Grange, Texas, Feb. 5, 1884. She came to Hall County in 1903 with her parents, W. D. and Betty Fisher. She met and married Wesley D. Mabry on Jan. 13, 1907 in Memphis, Texas, where they lived until his death.

Mrs. Mabry still lives in her home at 704 S. Street. She still keeps house and enjoys the company of her poodle, Mamselle. She did enjoy sewing until her eyesight failed her, but keeps busy at other home chores.

She says her social security has been a great help in providing for her household expenses.

Mrs. Hattie Mabry Is One Of Several County Widows Receiving SS Boost

Mrs. Hattie Mabry, long time resident of Hall County and Curtis Watts, Field Representative from the Amarillo Social Security District Office, recently examined the social security check Mrs. Mabry received which included a substantial increase because of a recent change in the social security law. Curtis explained that social security records are confidential, and Mrs. Mabry has given her permission to the Social Security

Administration to release the facts in her case, hoping to be help to others who need social security information.

Some, but not all, aged widows and dependent widows received an increase in social security payments on Feb. 3, 1973 which was for the month of Jan. 1973.

The new change applies to widows who did not start receiving widows payment until age 65 or later and whose hus-

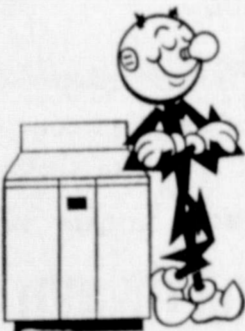

Average Tax Deductions Listed At \$2,640 Locally

NEW YORK, Feb. 17—Broadcast upon the waters during the past year by Hall County residents in the form of charitable donations are now returning as blessings.

So are various other expenditures made by them, such as for local and state taxes, for doctors' bills and the like.

To people who are going over their financial figures, preliminary to working up their income tax returns, the outlays of yesterday are the tax deductions of today.

How much do these deductions amount to normally? What have other people who itemize their deductions and are in similar income brackets been listing for charities, medical expenses and such?

Answers to these questions, based upon information provided by the Internal Revenue Service, have been prepared by the Commerce Clearing House, specialist in tax law.

They show that most families in the United States that have earnings of the size reported by the average family living in Hall County list deductions of \$2,640, equal to 18 per cent of their income.

In general, it is found, it ranges from 16 to 25 per cent of adjusted gross income. The percentage is higher among those in the lower brackets and lower for those with large incomes.

Local families with an income of \$7,000 to \$8,000, for example, would have a deduction of 23 per cent if they conformed to the average, whereas those at the \$15,000 to \$20,000 level would be taking 17 per cent.

Nationally, for those earnings equal to the average prevailing in Hall County, the amount normally listed for charitable deductions is \$350, for interest paid on loans and installment debt, \$880, for local and state taxes, \$990, and, for medical and dental costs, \$420.

If a family's deductions run higher than those taken by most others, it does not mean that they will be disallowed. Nor does conforming mean that they will be automatically approved, it is pointed out.

The IRS requires that all items listed as deductions be properly documented and that records be available to back up the claims.

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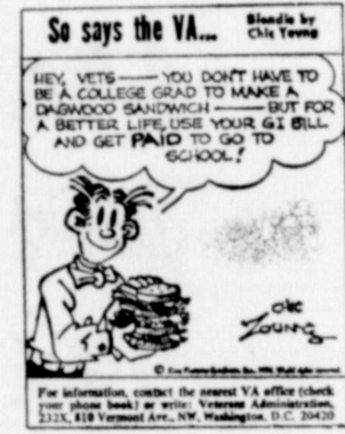

I noticed in our daily paper a few days ago that the women of all political parties met in Houston to study women's right in the political world. Geographically, New Zealand is an Asian country, proud of its Maori inheritance. However, its cultural heritage is largely European, and its traditional, economic and political ties have been with Great Britain.
