The Memphis Little League Tigers have continued their winning ways, pulling out to take close victories in several games, and are enjoying a five-game lead over second place Giants at this point.

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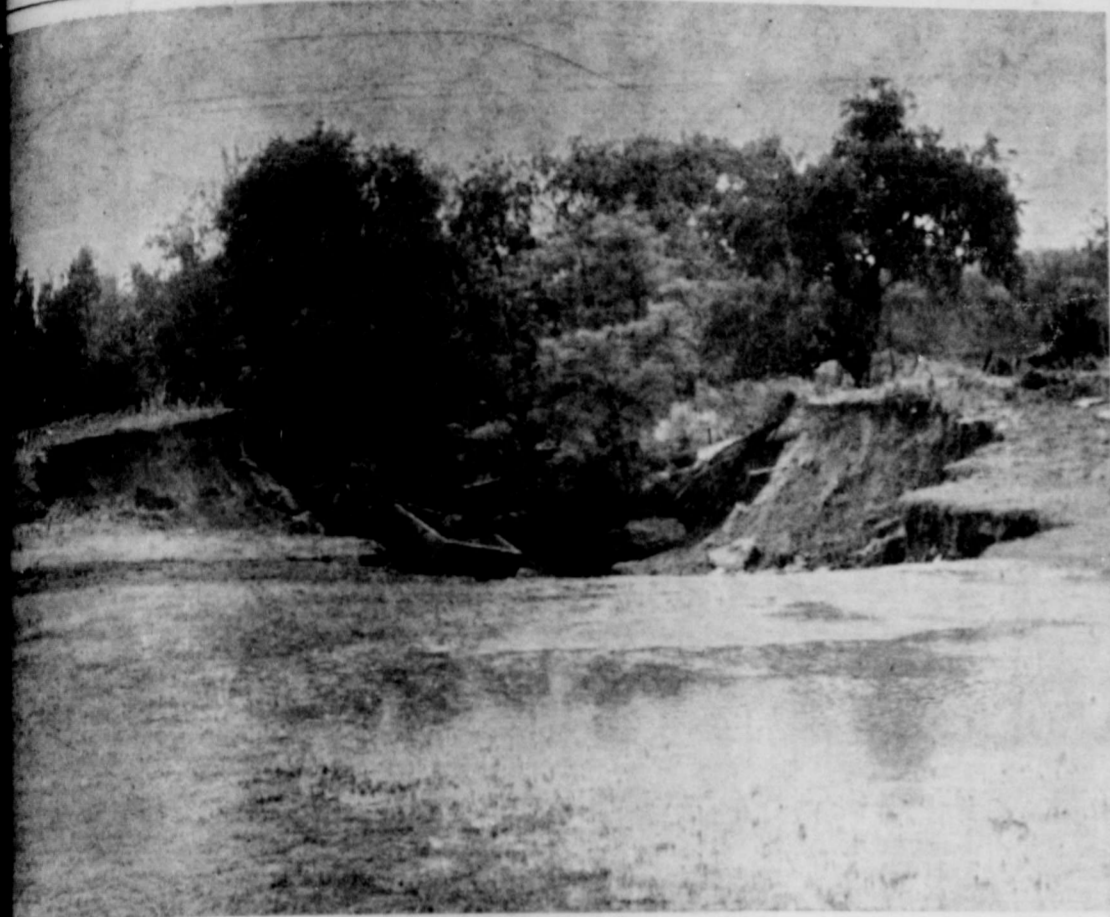

Federal Budget Cutting Hits Libraries!

Last month, Public Libraries across the nation began a campaign to develop public awareness of the effect of zero federal funding. The campaign was called "dimming the lights on the public's right to know."

What brought the whole thing on was the announcement, that the 1974 federal budget would have zero funding for library service. The American Library Association has embarked on a program designed to increase the public awareness of libraries and their services. "Dimming the Lights on the Public's Right to Know" is ALA's theme for a special campaign designed to help libraries acquaint users with the possibility of severe cuts in service and, in some areas, closing the libraries.

For local libraries, gone will be the service being enjoyed now under the Interlibrary Loan and Reference Referral system, the program whereby larger libraries loan books and materials to small libraries upon request.

Our modern society has grown to be the envy of the world because of the knowledge and technical advances. No time in the history of mankind has so much knowledge been available to so many people.

The cutting back or curtailing of this nation's library funds at the federal level, will only bring about fewer, less equipped, libraries offering fewer services and possibly out-of-date source and reference material. State and local governments are battling inflation on too many fronts, it is not likely that additional funds for libraries will come from these sources.

Today we live in an age of electronics, where some are even advancing the theory of throwing away text books and teaching students from television sets. Computers are even being made to carry on conversations with humans. These things may be in the future, but for the present, books and the written word are the seat of all learning.

Libraries can be entertaining as well as informative places to visit. An individual with self-determination and self-help, can, if he will, improve his literary abilities and intellect, through a steady diet of reading good books.

We agree with the American Library Association in believing that library service is worth more than the "zero funding" it is receiving in the proposed 1974 federal budget.

This is, however, a continued step in the direction of neglect of domestic programs while billions and billions are being spent in foreign lands, under the excuse that the federal budget must be trimmed to fight inflation.

Postal Service Corporation . . . Will It Survive?

One of President Richard Nixon's first major governmental changes was the shifting of the government owned Postal Service from government control to a postal corporation. It is possible this change may not live throughout President Nixon's second term.

U. S. Rep. Jim Wright of Fort Worth has introduced a bill to abolish the postal corporation and return the postal service to its original status as part of the U. S. government. He is working hard in the House and Senator Lloyd Bentsen of Texas is active along these lines in the Senate.

Rep. Wright this week took another swing at Postal costs since the Postal Corporation took over, and what he is finding out in his probes could generate strong public support for returning to government control of the service.

Rep. Wright said that because of increased postage rates the American people are being "gouged" by having to pay sharply increased prices for publications they buy from the U. S. Government Printing Office (GPO).

In 1972 the Postal Service charged the GPO nearly seven times as much for handling about the same number of publications as had been handled in 1971. The cost went up from \$2 million in 1971 to more than \$15 million in 1972.

Particularly hard hit were subscriptions to government periodicals, many of which are vital to businessmen, farmers and ranchers. Wright began his investigation after an accountant in Fort Worth wrote him to call attention to the increase in the price of yearly subscription to the Internal Revenue Service bulletin.

He found the price boost from \$14.50 in 1972 to \$32 in 1973 was not the fault of the IRS or the GPO but was the result of the vastly increased postal rates.

The printing office, under law, is supposed to be self-sustaining and had to pass on the increased postage costs to the subscriber, Wright explained.

Wright said, "this is just one more example of the adverse effects resulting from reorganization of the postal service. It is high time that this vital function of the government be returned to the control of the people and their elected representatives. Not only are we paying more for poorer service but now it is costing more to get information prepared and published to help our citizens in their everyday lives and businesses."

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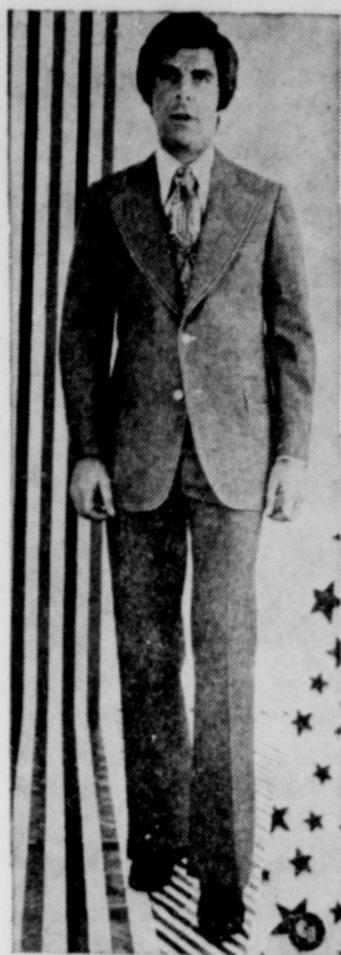

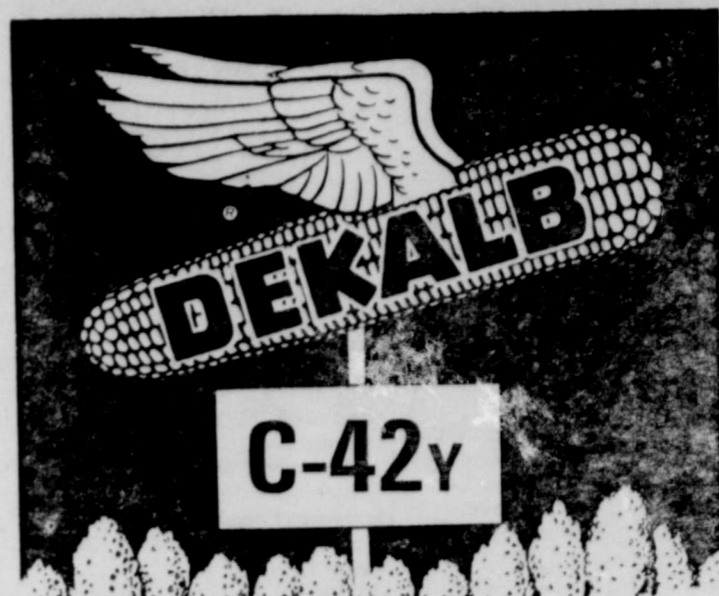

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

Austin, Texas
The 63rd Legislature's failure to agree on even a stopgap aid to education revision set off repeated demands from House members for a special session.

Speaker Price Daniel, Jr. joined in the chorus, calling on the House Education Committee to "prepare, polish and refine" a school finance bill "for legislative action no later than September 15."

Gov. Dolph Briscoe, who holds the key to whether or not there is going to be a special session on anything, made clear—twice in writing—that he doesn't plan to call one.

Daniel said his instructions to

the Education Committee were offered just in case Briscoe reconsiders his position.

The Committee will begin a series of hearings on school finance here June 18. More than 700 of the 1,148 school districts are in financial trouble, according to Committee chairman Rep. Dan Kubiak of Rockdale.

Briscoe set in motion new studies to develop information for specific legislative proposals in 1975 to equalize educational finances and opportunities. A special session at this time would be "premature," said the Governor, since necessary data cannot be assembled for another two

years.

Daniel and others claim the problem of financial inequities among the school districts already has been "studied to death," and that the House had the answer in H. B. 946 last month.

But Briscoe feels proposals before the Legislature this year would "have only added to the present system of programs and budget with no review of current spending or effectiveness." He said he hopes the new study can produce an "educational approach that we can afford (without new taxes), as well as one that will meet the needs of the future."

Petry Honored
The Governor, four former governors, legislators, office holders—who's who in Texas—honored Herbert C. Petry Jr. of Carrizo Springs, last week for serving 18-1/2 years as a State Highway Commissioner.

Petry, who goes off the Highway Commission at the end of this term, has served longer than any other Texas on that important governmental body.

While he was lauded for his public service, speakers encouraged his neighbor at Uvalde, Gov. Dolph Briscoe, to make a place for him in Texas public service—and a "balloon went up" for Petry as Director of Transportation for the United States.

Petry said "thousands of people had better jobs and better incomes in Texas as a result of the state's efforts to build an adequate highway system to attract new industries and encourage expansion of industries."

Several presentations were made by present and former highway commissioners, Highway Department officials and employees, Good Roads Association and the man who appointed him to his first term on the Commission, Gov. Allan Shivers. A film strip was presented on his career, including sections about his worldwide career as the youngest president of Lions International 1951.

Final Reform Measures Passed
Lobby control, code of ethics and campaign finance disclosure

legislation passed in closing hours of the 63rd Legislature's regular session.

While none of the bills were as strict as the original House version, all were viewed by advocates as an improvement over present laws.

All filings and financial disclosure under all three bills will be with the secretary of state.

The new public access to information act is viewed as the best law of its kind in the country. Governor Briscoe earlier signed H. B. 3 to strengthen the open meetings law.

Legislative Output Down
Legislative output was down considerably this year over 1971, although some contended the 63rd Legislature came to grips with more monumental problems than the last.

A total of 888 bills was passed by the 63rd, compared with 1,067 by the 62nd in their 140-day regular session.

A total of 2,746 bills was introduced, together with 97 proposed constitutional amendments. Three hundred Senate bills and 888 House bills were passed, as were two proposed amendments to the constitution introduced in the House and seven introduced in the Senate.

Courts Speak
The State Supreme Court re-

used to back Gulf Oil Corporation's claim that its 45,771-acre lease in Crane County of the Permian Basin should be extended 4,661 days due to lost production resulting from Railroad Commission prorations orders. The lease will expire July 14, 1975.

In other recent action, the Court held:

A common law wife can't collect insurance benefits when she isn't using a man's name.

An intermediate court was correct in concluding a car cannot be confiscated by the state for drug transportation unless the state can prove the charge beyond a reasonable doubt.

An Air Force Village retirement home for officers and their dependents is not entitled to a property tax exemption since tenants were not taken in as charity cases exclusively.

An off-duty cafeteria worker who breaks her arm while welcoming other workers on pay day is eligible for job injury benefits.

The owner of a \$65,000 home in Denton must spend \$1,500 to add brick, stone or stucco to conform with neighborhood requirements.

The Court of Criminal Appeals held requiring movie patrons to have membership cards is no defense for showing obscene films.

A district court hearing here

ended in an oil company's agreeing to give priority to local consumers of liquefied petroleum gas products.

Ag Opinions
Atty. Gen. John Hill declined to term state tuition equalization grants to private colleges unconstitutional, but advised caution in view of cases before the U. S. Supreme Court.

In other recent opinions, Hill concluded:

Non-protein sources of nitrogen may be included in the total percentage of crude protein in the guaranteed analysis of feeds required by Commercial Feed Control Act of 1957.

An attempt by the legislature to appropriate funds for a longer term than two years is inoperative.

E. J. (Dick) Lindley Jr. of Houston was named to the board of directors of Texas Turnpike Authority, succeeding Cyril J. Smith of Houston.

Carroll Sullivant of Gainesville was reappointed to the North Texas State University Board of Regents.

Garland F. Smith of Weslaco was appointed to the board of directors of Rio Grande Valley Pollution Control Authority.

Justo L. Cisneros of Brown and Richard Martinez Jr. Allen were reappointed same authority board.

Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby announced he will not be permanent chairman of the Convention next January.

R. L. Phinney of Austin, former Director of State Services, announced he will retire this month.
