Cotton's Future Appears Brighter!

Cotton farmers in this area have been buzzing about prospects of market prices for their 1973 cotton, and several firms have been approaching farmers seeking contracts for cotton in this area.

Some farmers are contracting and some are not, depending on circumstances and situations. All in all, it has been the major subject of cotton farmers hereabouts.

Cotton farmers have long dreamed of a more stable market for upland variety of cotton, grown in this area, and according to Ray Joe Riley of Hart, President of Plains Cotton Growers. this dream may be closer to reality than we may all think.

The dream: Textile plants on the High Plains consuming a significant percentage of each year's cotton crop grown in the High and Rolling Plains.

This pag of the state has little textile manufacturing, with the exception of Postex Plant at Post which uses long staple cotton making sheeting, but now open end spinning and other new spinning and weaving systems appear to be just around the corner.

High Plains Cotton Growers have new optimism for the immediate future built around open end spinning and its potential for efficient use of Plains-type cottons in the manufacture of quality yarns in the coarser counts, for which there is a substantion market.

Pleminiary tests by the Textile Research Center at Texas Tech University, since confirmed by others, indicate that low micronaire cottons on the open end system produce yarns to or superior to other cottons.

Several textile companies have been approached by PCG, Riley says and have shown interest in open end spinning on the Plains. A Japanese company is known to be considering eight Plains locations and one in Louisana as the site of a \$22 mil- fun, be ambassadors of goodwill hard we work, there isn't as much lion open end plant. Riley is also encouraged by the results of a recent textile feasibility study, based primarily on open end spinning, by the USDA and two national consulting companies. Data from this study released July 26, showed ample market opportunities, available labor, water and other utilities.


