





# Mr. and Mrs. Leon Helm Enjoy Vacation in Mexico

Note: Mr. and Mrs. Helm recently enjoyed a tour of Mexico. An excerpt of their trip was written and is as follows:

Mexico for us was a new experience and new experiences should go to the first time by city. There are many experiences across the country that when flying. We crossed Laredo and on Mateo, Saltillo, Queretaro, Luis Potosi, Queretaro City are the major cities. The highways but two lane most of you don't see many cars trucks and buses which driving time. The country in Mexico live about years in the past with city or water and they land which in most rocky and barren. They have small herds of goats, sheep and pigs. Each day with their dogs and all days as along side the road. The small boys 5 to 10 will be tending a herd of goats on a highway. Can you imagine 10 to 20 head of goats on a hilltop. Paul and John Paul between the age of 5 and to a herd of cattle on a major highway? They are so gentle over there as a herd of cattle or a few feet of the 50 miles per hour and make a move. Their transportation in the foot, bicycle, motorbikes, Monday and Tuesday their market days. Many taking their produce to the nearest village or they might see them on their goods or waiting on bicycles with milk cans balanced on 2 men on a bicycle in their arms. Once a boy loading a live pig on a bus. You see many horses. The donkeys and still pull carts or wagons. A donkey may be loaded with firewood for the week. It is against the law to cut and gather the limbs of trees. There are small corn patches scattered out in the places in the country you see a few horse drawn wagons carrying their small corn. All of the small villages the people have their homes on the front part of their colorful and homes behind. All yards have beautiful growing and they are cleaning up around their every village small or you will see some of the modern schools and hospitals. People are very friendly and go out of their way to

Real De Catorce you climb to an altitude of 9,043 along steep narrow mountain ledges then enter a tunnel to the main street. The first silver mine was discovered in 1773 but was closed in 1910 during the revolution and in their idleness the shafts became flooded with 300 feet of water and have never been reopened. Also located here is the church of La Purisima Concepcion and the Casa Moneda. Inside the Casa Moneda are the original scales, molds and the vault used in the mining of silver.

Our next stop was San Luis Potosi which was once the capital of Texas before Texas won her independence. To this day when old land titles are in dispute, Texans go there to consult Spanish records to authenticate claims and land deeds. A lovely plaza, Calle Hidalgo, is a product of pre-automobile and for pedestrians only. It contains some of the city's finest shops and is paved with smooth polished tile.

Next we arrived in Queretaro which is known as a "rockhounds" paradise. I could have stopped here as Leon can testify I am a rockhound. The entire Queretaro area is so rich in opaliferous deposits that traces of the mineral can be seen in stone buildings.

Next day we reached our destination, Mexico City. There are so many things to see and do we hardly knew where to begin so we hired a guide and started in the Zocalo Zone which contains the National Palace, the Metropolitan Cathedral which took 250 years to build and has 16 altars with beautiful treasured paintings and the Federal buildings. The Alameda Park includes the Palace of Fine Arts with its magnificent glass mosaic curtain by Tiffany and permanent e-

hibits of murals by Mexican Masters. The Palace of Fine Arts is built of solid marble and is slowly sinking into the spongy soil as many of their other old Cathedrals and much of Mexico City is doing. Another interesting church is the Basilea of Guadalupe, where Mexico's patron saint is worshiped. The Virgin, is said to have appeared to Juan Diego, requesting that a temple be erected there in her honor. The original Chapel still stands on the hillside above the present church which was completed in 1709.

Monuments of impressive proportions adorn the spacious Paseo de la Reforma. El Caballito, Christopher Columbus, Cuauhtemoc (last Aztec emperor), the graceful column of the Independence Monument (topped by a golden angel weighing nearly 8 tons and the tomb of Miguel Hidalgo and a number of other heroes of the Independence struggle) a bronze sculpture of Diana the Huntress crowns the Diana Fountain at the entrance to Chapultepec Park. Chapultepec Castle begun in 1783 stands on a hilltop. Maximilian and Carlotta made the castle their official residence. The Castle now houses the National Museum of History. Chapultepec Park also includes the National Museum of Anthropology, the Museum of Modern Art where the works of Mexico's master painters and sculptors are permanently displayed, the Museum of National History and the National Auditorium complex. Northeast of the city is the archaeological zone of Teotihuacan, built between 200 B. C. and 650 A. D. by a highly cultured people known only as

the Teotihuacanos. The enormous pile of the pyramid of the sun and the smaller Pyramid of the moon are the largest structures in the center, but excavations in the past 10 years have revealed the true majesty and extent of the zone. Mexico City offers beauty, variety and novelty to intrigue visitors; the murals, marketplaces, colorful merchandise, sports, flower-lined boulevards, parks, plazas, fountains, and statues; Spanish, Colonial, French and modern architecture. Proof that Mexico City has plunged into the modern world is provided by its modern subway system. The traffic is unbelievable in Mexico City. There are 8.5 million people living there so you can imagine what the traffic is like. When we arrived at our hotel we didn't take our car out again until we were ready to leave. There are about 24,000 Taxi cabs in Mexico City and they are certainly used by the local people as well as tourists.

While in Mexico City we witnessed a demonstration of approximately 50,000 students protesting the overthrow of Pres. Allende of Chile. Also Mexico City had started their Independence celebration and the city was decorated more lavishly with lights and tinsel than we use dur-

ing our Christmas holidays. There were approximately five pictures, or the images of pictures, of their heroes and their President outlined in lights at intersections and in the Zocalo Zone. It was a very enjoyable tour, the country and towns have much to offer in history and art and the people are delightful.

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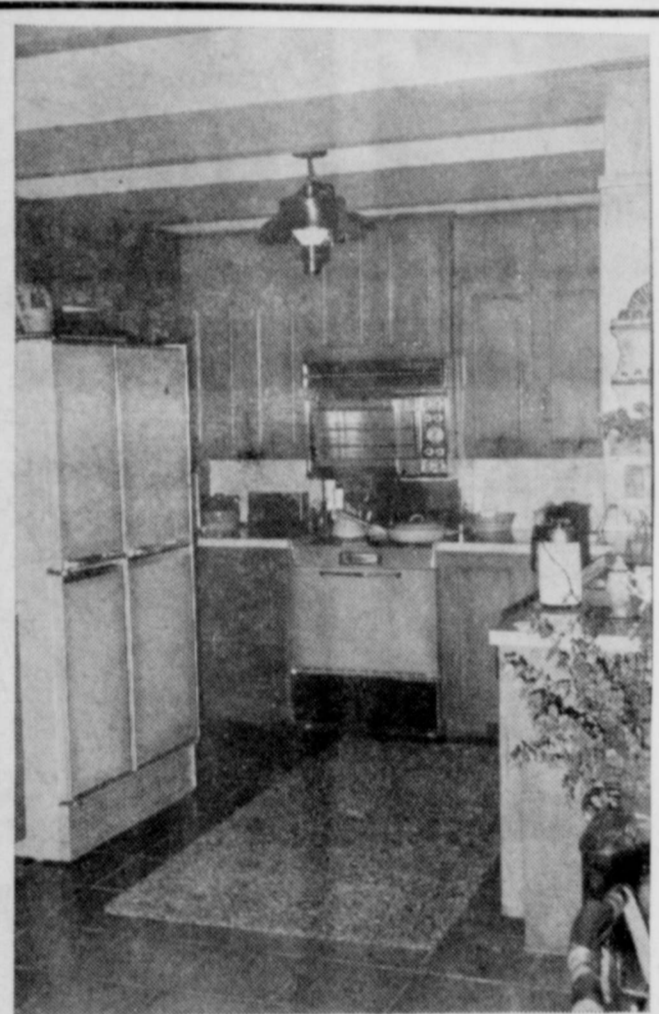
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# McQueen Family Reunion Is Held Here During Hall County Picnic Weekend

The descendants of Mr. and Mrs. L. McQueen, who arrived in Hall County on December 6, 1895, from Ellis County, Texas, met for their annual reunion in the Memphis Community building on Sunday, Sept. 16.

About 50 members of the family also enjoyed a little "get together" in the home of Mrs. John McQueen on Saturday night.

The McQueen family got off the train at old Salisbury, which was about 3 1/2 miles southeast of Memphis. At that time, a Mr. Holmes ran a store and the post office at Salisbury. It was a flag stop at that time as the depot had been moved to Memphis.

The McQueen family settled on the W. X. Hazard farm about 7 miles southeast of Memphis in the Gammage Community. Mr. Hazard, whose granddaughter, Ruby K. Thornton, lives in Memphis, was a brother of Mrs. L. McQueen. Two years later Mr. McQueen paid \$8.00 an acre for a section of land one mile east into Childress County and moved his family over there.

Mr. McQueen lived there until his death in 1904. Mrs. Sarah Hazard McQueen lived there until her death in January, 1918. Children of this family were as follows: Lydia (Mrs. E. R. Barnes); Maggie (Mrs. E. J. Rawlins); Kattie (Mrs. W. E. Gammage); Eddie; John; Will; and Lon McQueen, all deceased. 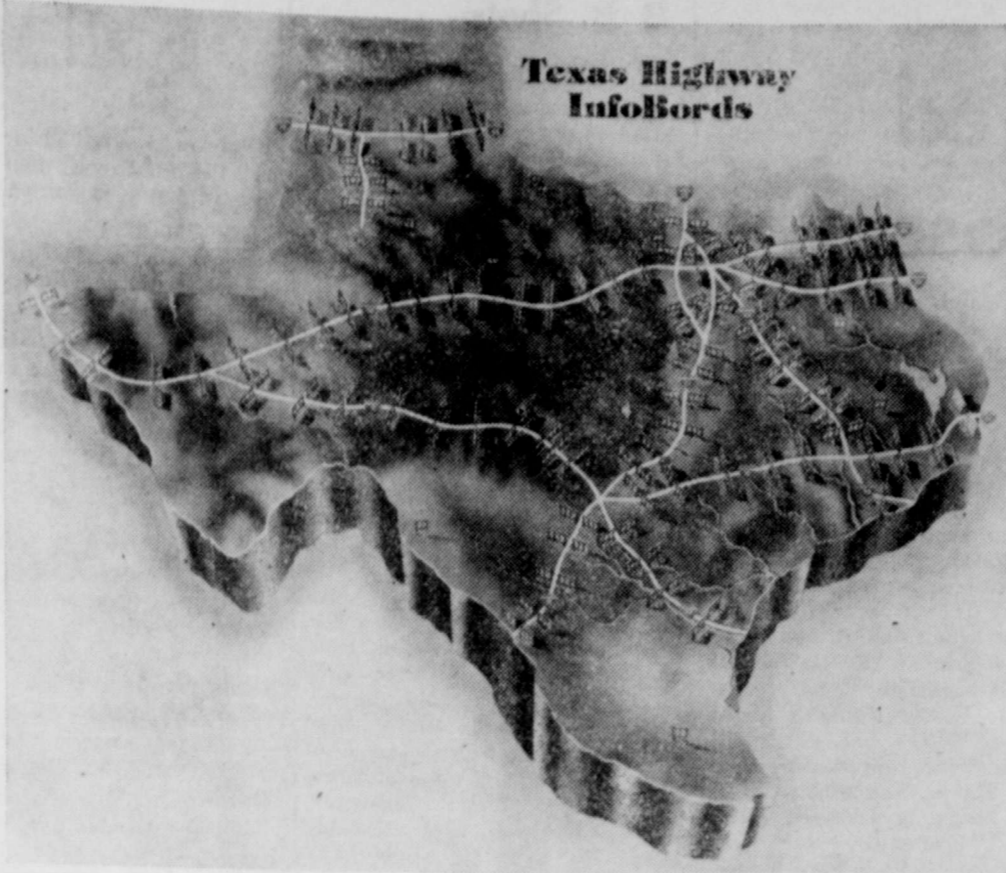

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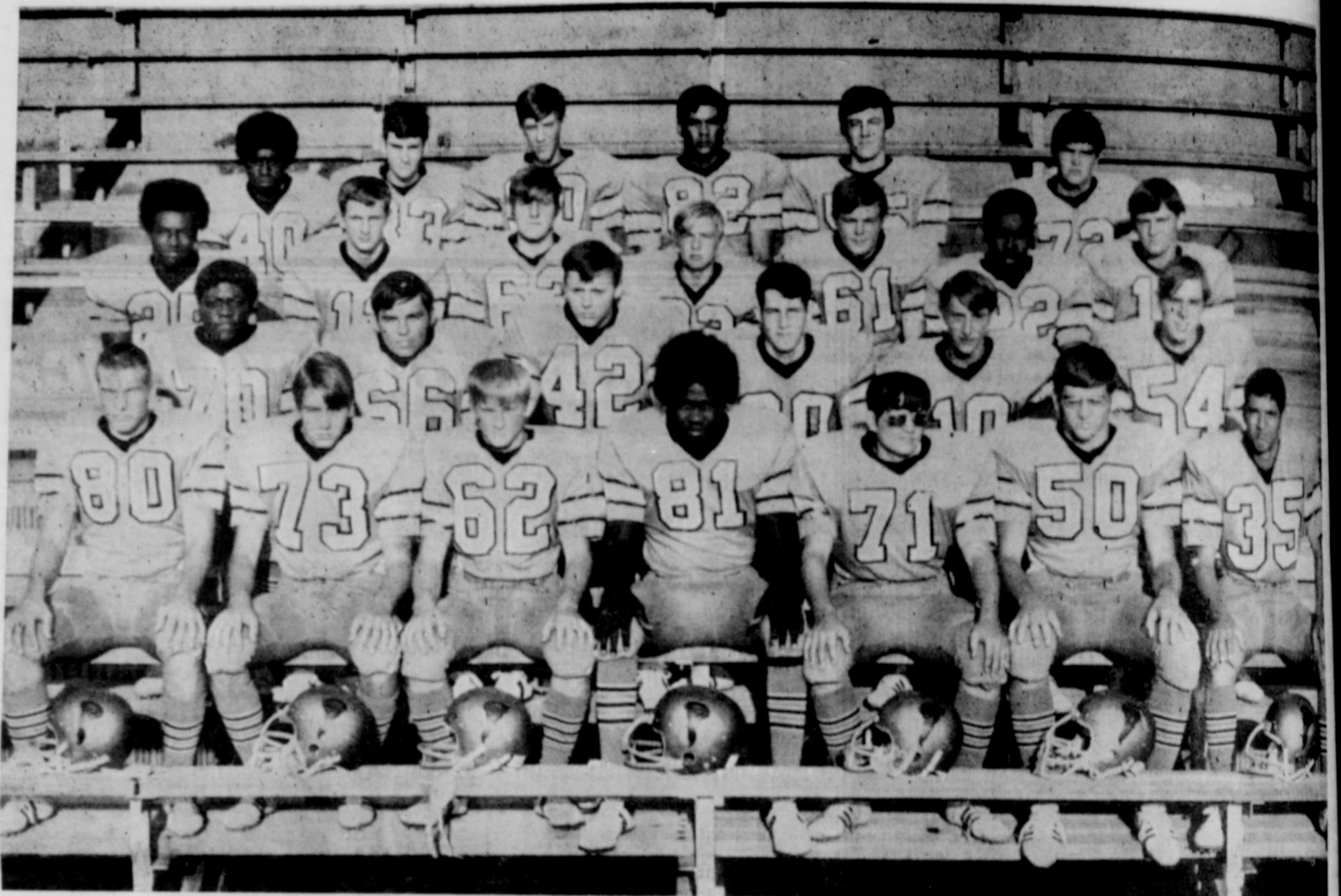
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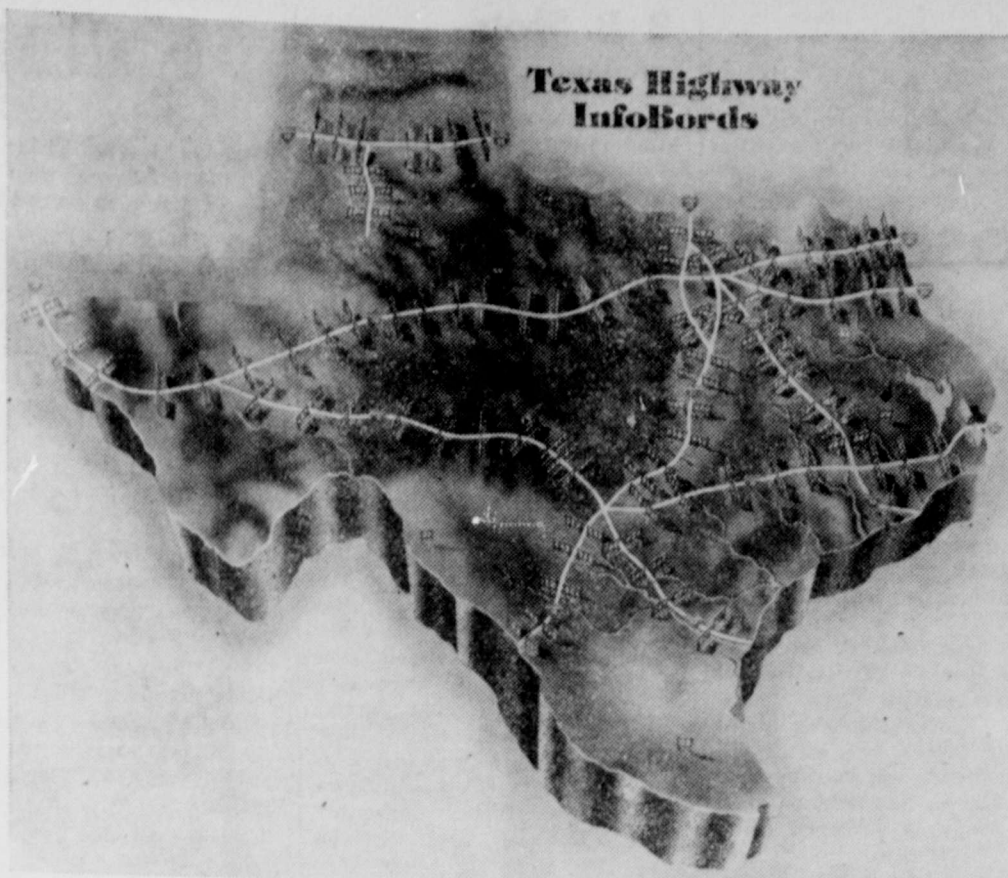

### Hall County Lists 914 With Limited Schooling

NEW YORK, Sept. 24 - How many Hall County residents are unable to earn an adequate income because of insufficient education?

How many lack the basic reading, writing and arithmetic skills that are needed in better-paying jobs?

Most local people have no such problem. Their educational background has been relatively good and has been rising steadily. It has reached the point where the median amount of schooling being acquired is now 10.3 years, a gain over 1960, when the median was 9.5 years.

For those with little or no education, however, making a living is much more difficult.

The problem is national in scope but is more pronounced in some sections of the country than in others. According to the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, almost 19 million adult Americans are totally or functionally illiterate.

By functionally illiterate is

meant those who do not read and write well enough to understand a help-wanted ad, to fill out a job application form or to apply for unemployment insurance.

In Hall County, according to the latest figures from the Department of Commerce, there are 55 adults who have failed to complete at least one year of school.

Another 261 completed from one to four years and 598 from five to seven years.

The total who have not gone beyond that point is 914 in Hall County.

The illiteracy problem is brought into focus at this time because of the announcement of "Right to Read" grants to various states by HEW's Office of Education. They are intended to help in the national effort aimed at eliminating illiteracy. Funds for the grants have been authorized under the Cooperative Research Act. Thus far, they have gone to 31 states.

The target for the aid is the 19 million adult Americans who are totally or functionally illiterate and another 7 million elementary and secondary school students who have severe reading difficulties.

### Claudia Corley Is On Crusade In Japan, Korea

Miss Claudia Corley, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Gene Corley, is among a group of Baptist Youth from Amarillo and Denver, Colo., who left last week for Japan and Korea where they will conduct a

religious crusade.

There are 169 people in the Crusade tour group with 55 going from the Amarillo Baptist Churches. They will spend two and one-half week in Korea and Japan.

Miss Corley is a senior student at West Texas State University and is active in church work serving as pianist for youth choir at San Juanito Baptist Church.
