Inflation . . . Shortages!

Inflation has been gnawing at the economic roots o fthe free world, at such a fast pace during the past four years that Americans are concerned to such an extent that it is considered this nation's No. 1 problem today.

But we read reports which stagger the imagination. Like this one, "Secretary of Commerce Frederick Dent said recently that the causes of the inflation now bedeviling the U. S. and most of the world are 'impersonal' and 'natural'.

A rather frightening thought-that inflation and all the woes it brings are beyond human control. If so, then why are Americans paying billions of dollars to the Government to protect our economy from the perils of booms and depressions?

We are no authority on inflation causes or anything else but it appears to us that causes of the present inflation seem, in fact, to be a lot less' "natural" than Mr. Dent's remarks in-
