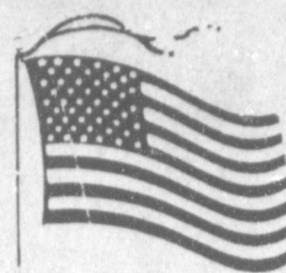

"Bailey County 4-H members will be selling fruit for Christmas, with delivery before school gets out for the holidays," says Kandy K. McWhorter, County Extension Agent-Home Economics. "Funds received from this project will help support the 4-H and youth programs in Bailey County."

The assortment of fruit will be good, she said, and will include red delicious apples, golden delicious apples, navel oranges and Texas ruby red grapefruit.

The fruit can be ordered in the following arrangements:

- mixed box of apples, oranges and grapefruit (18 pounds) \$12.50.
- mixed box of apples, oranges and grapefruit (30 pounds) \$17.
- 1/2 box Texas ruby red grapefruit (20 pounds) \$9.
- full box Texas ruby red grapefruit (40 pounds) \$16.
- 1/2 box navel oranges (20 pounds) \$10.
- full box navel oranges (40 pounds) \$18.
- 1/2 box red delicious apples (20 apples) \$7.
- full box red delicious apples (40 apples) \$13.
- 1/2 box golden delicious apples (20 apples) \$7.

Mullettes Win First Game With Slaton

For season openers, the Muleshoe Mullettes waltzed away with a 49-38 victory against Slaton.

In the first quarter, it was 8-6, Mullettes and by halftime, the score was still favoring the Mullettes, 18-15.

In the third, it was still close, with a 30-27 score.

Four players had nine points, including Wendy Green, Amber Green, Brenna Matthews and Monica Swint. Heather Hutton had eight points. Amy Harrison dropped in three points and Tory Matthews had two points.

Leading rebounder was Wendy Green, with 20.

Muleshoe was hitting at 62 percent from the charity line, while Slaton was only 11 percent at the free throw line.

Mulette Coach Bob Davis said, "They did a good job of pressing Slaton throughout the game, as well as Slaton adding pressure to the Mullettes, but less."

According to the coach, "The Mullettes handled the pressure better than Slaton did."

The second team girls coming off the bench did a good job as they took over for the starters. The second team included Amber Green, Heidi Bohler, Tory Matthews, Lori Cuevas and Melissa Finch.

As close as the Mullettes came to foul trouble were Amy Harrison and Heather Hutton, each with three.

They played the Nazareth varsity Saturday afternoon.

In the JV girls' game, they won by 47-32 over the Slaton JV.

It was very close at the end of the first, at 9-8. In the second, the Mullettes went into halftime as 21-16 leaders.

By the end of the third, they had widened the score by 10 points, as it was a 30-20 game.

The JV girls were playing Nazareth Saturday morning, at Nazareth.

Most of those present, attended the meeting to ask questions about a proposed rate increase for private pay patients in the Muleshoe Area Health Care Center (formerly the Muleshoe Nursing Home).

Interspersing their questions with praise for the work the MAHD board is doing to try to stabilize both the hospital and nursing home, the family members of the private pay patients in the hospital still objected to the amount of the proposed pay rate increase.

Citing the need for more staff, and an update in nursing and other services at the nursing home, the people still objected, even after being told of state-mandated requirements to upgrade the facility.

The visitors were assured by the board that a number of area nursing homes were checked, and found they were comparable in their charges, and in their proposed charges for the patients in the local facility.

Although several insisted on a 'break down' in expenses for the nursing home and the hospital, they were informed that both came under the MAHD, and all the monies received went to take care of both facilities.

And, despite some people's claim that the nursing home made a profit while the hospital was closed, it was shown quickly that the nursing home, on its own, certainly did not make a profit while the former West Plains Medical Center was closed.

Board members cited unpaid taxes, including FICA and Withholding, maintenance that was never done, forcing the MAHD to undergo a massive renovation, repair and renewal of maintenance, at a huge expense since taking over the facilities in June.

Rachel Snider, administrator of the nursing home, told the group of mandated changes in operations of every nursing home in the state.

Tim Campbell, president of the MAHD asked the people, "You ask for more staff, you ask for more maintenance. Do you want a falling down, old building?"

And Bob Finney, secretary of the board, commented, "The rates are not 'dried in concrete.' We have to look at tomorrow, and 50 years from now."

MICROWAVE TIPS

With Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays not too far distant, one begins to think of turkey. Many have attempted to microwave turkeys, and geese, in the microwave.

That's probably a mistake if you have a conventional oven, and almost certainly a mistake if you're cooking for a large number of guests. It's all right to microwave a boneless turkey for a small group but bigger birds do best in a conventional oven.

However, one does microwave the side dishes--while the turkey, or goose, cooks in the conventional oven; the dressing is much more easily done in the microwave.

While Cornish game hens can easily be microwaved, they offer little meat for almost the same amount of preparation.

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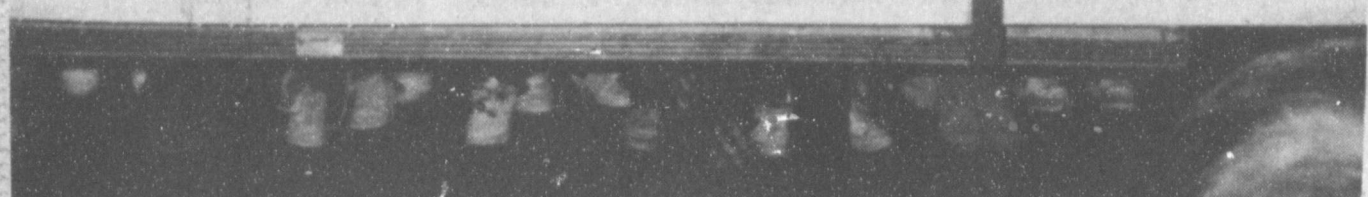

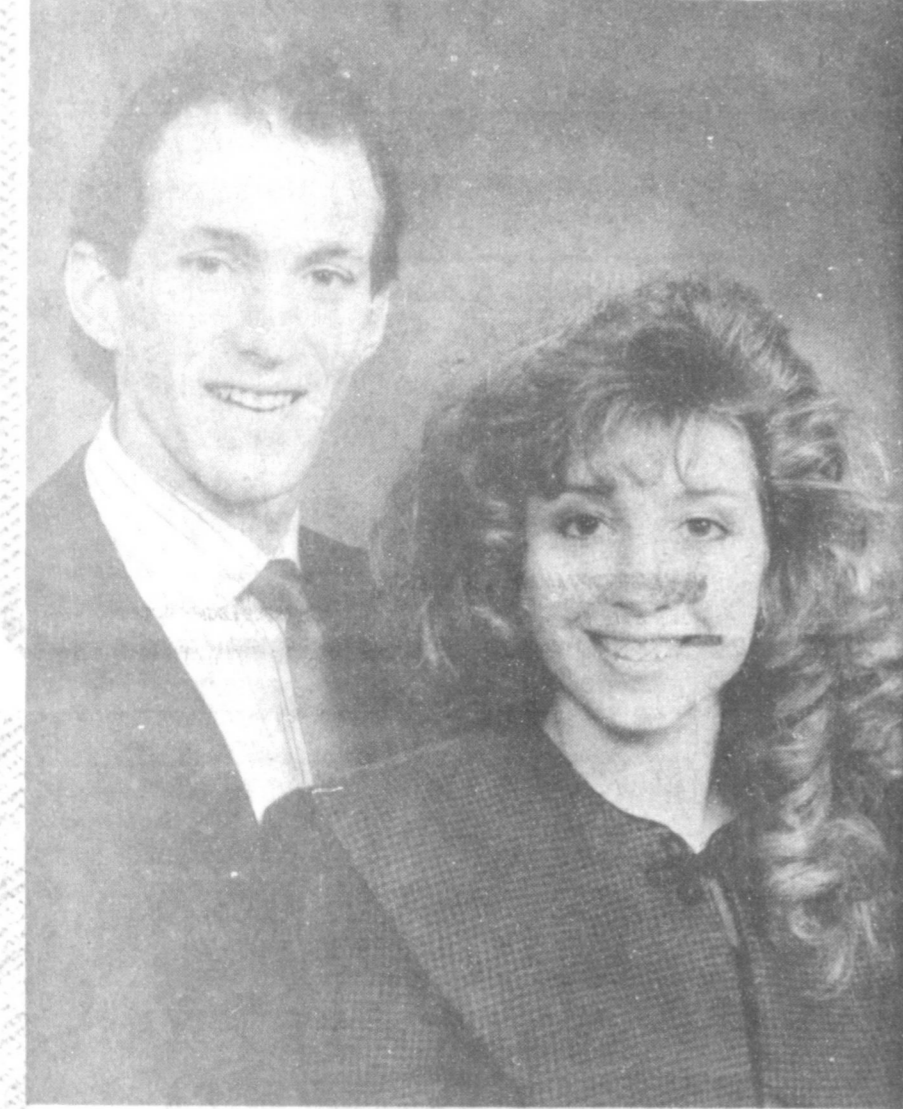

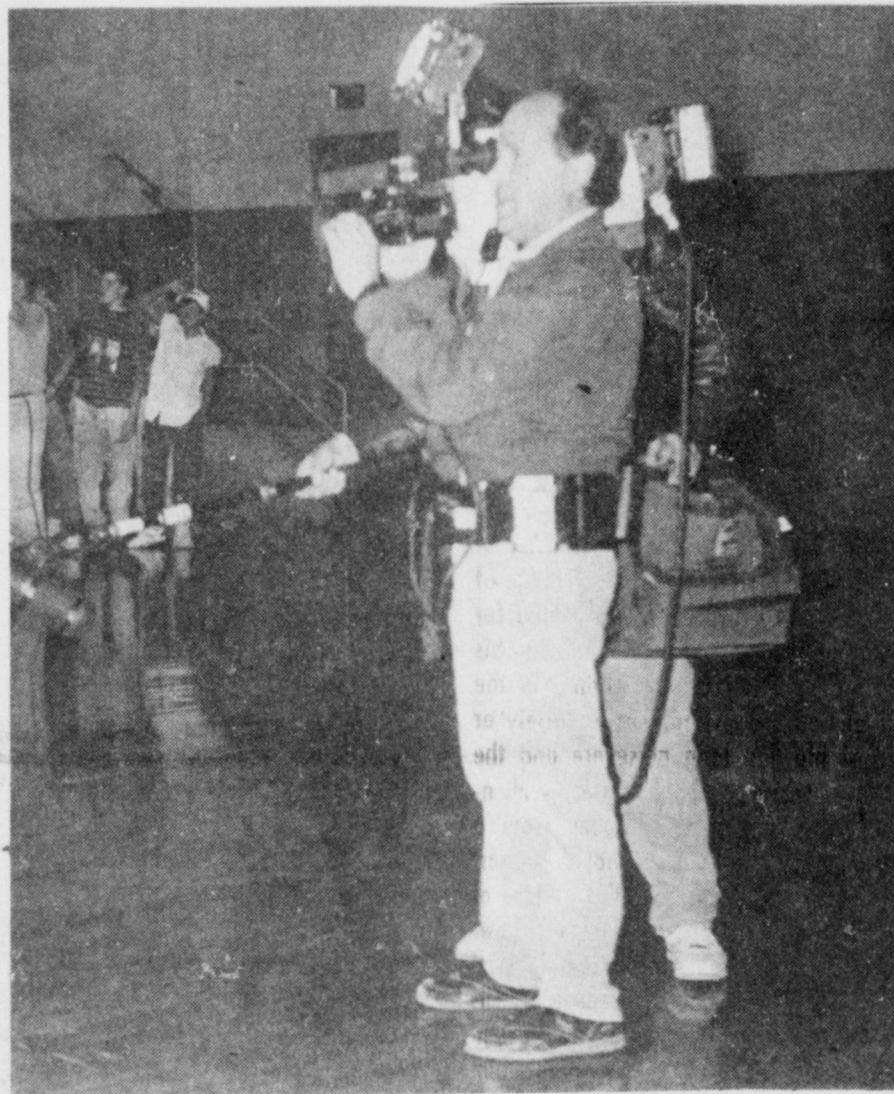

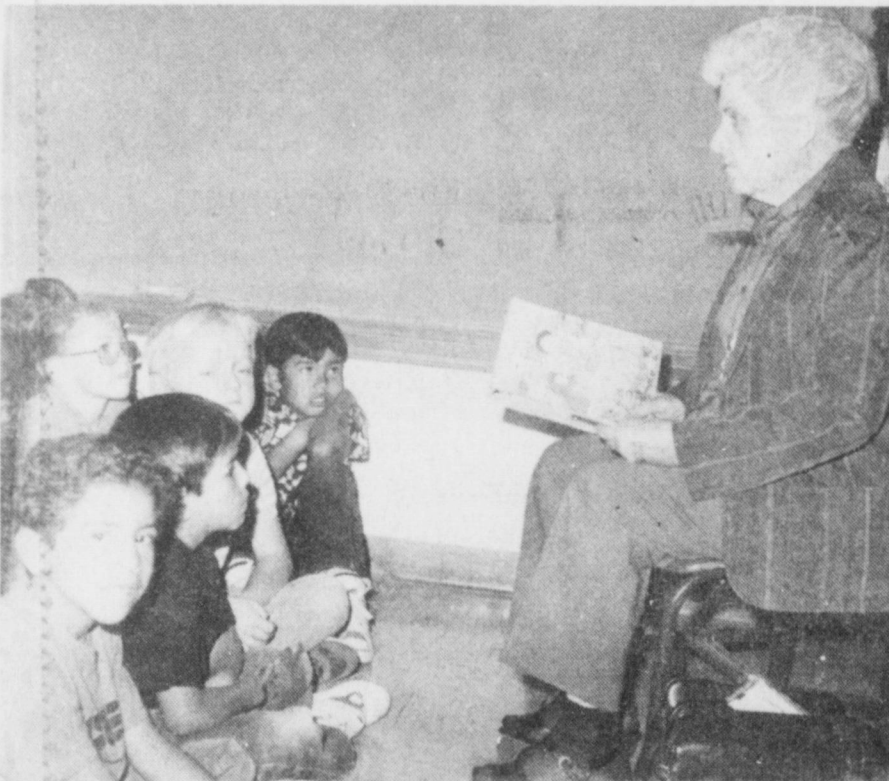

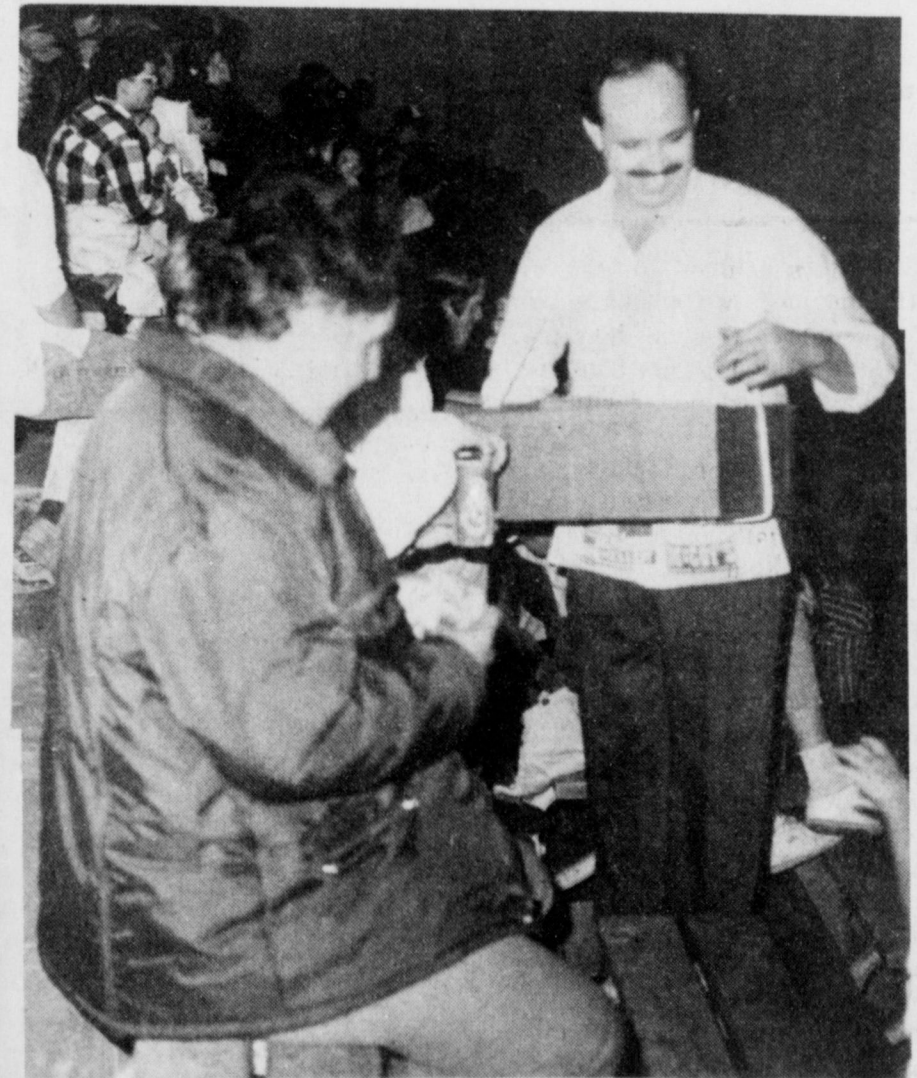

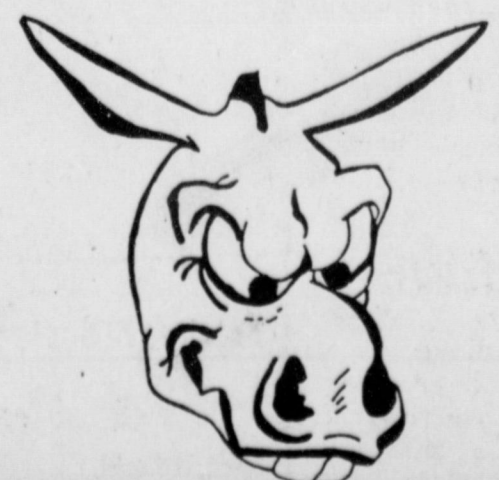

In an effort to help the students at Muleshoe High School attain the necessary skills for a high technology society, the science department offers a wide variety of courses. Science classes include physical science, Biology I and II, chemistry, anatomy, and physics.

Micheal C. Summers is the department chairman of the science department at MHS; he teaches both honors and regular Biology I. A graduate of the high school in Logan, New Mexico, Summers received his B.A. degree from Wayland Baptist University in 1986 and will finish his M. Ed. from WBU in the spring of 1990. He has completed three years of teaching in Muleshoe. He stated that during the coming year, he hopes to modify and update his teaching methods to the most effective styles and to help students become responsible young adults. He also desires to grow personally and professionally. She feels the need to stay current in her teaching field and to learn information and techniques which will improve her teaching and will benefit her students. In her first teaching assignment, she teaches introduction to physical science, introduction to biology, physical science, and physics. Miss Chastain is from Clovis, New Mexico, and her future plans include marriage in the summer

of 1990. As hobbies, she finds pleasure in reading, aerobics, and sewing. This young lady sums her feelings about her teaching field by commenting, "Because I am a scientist, I feel that science is a very important

part of our educational system. Although we cannot all be Einsteins, science is for everyone. Because science is about life, it helps to prepare our young people for life, and that is why we are here."

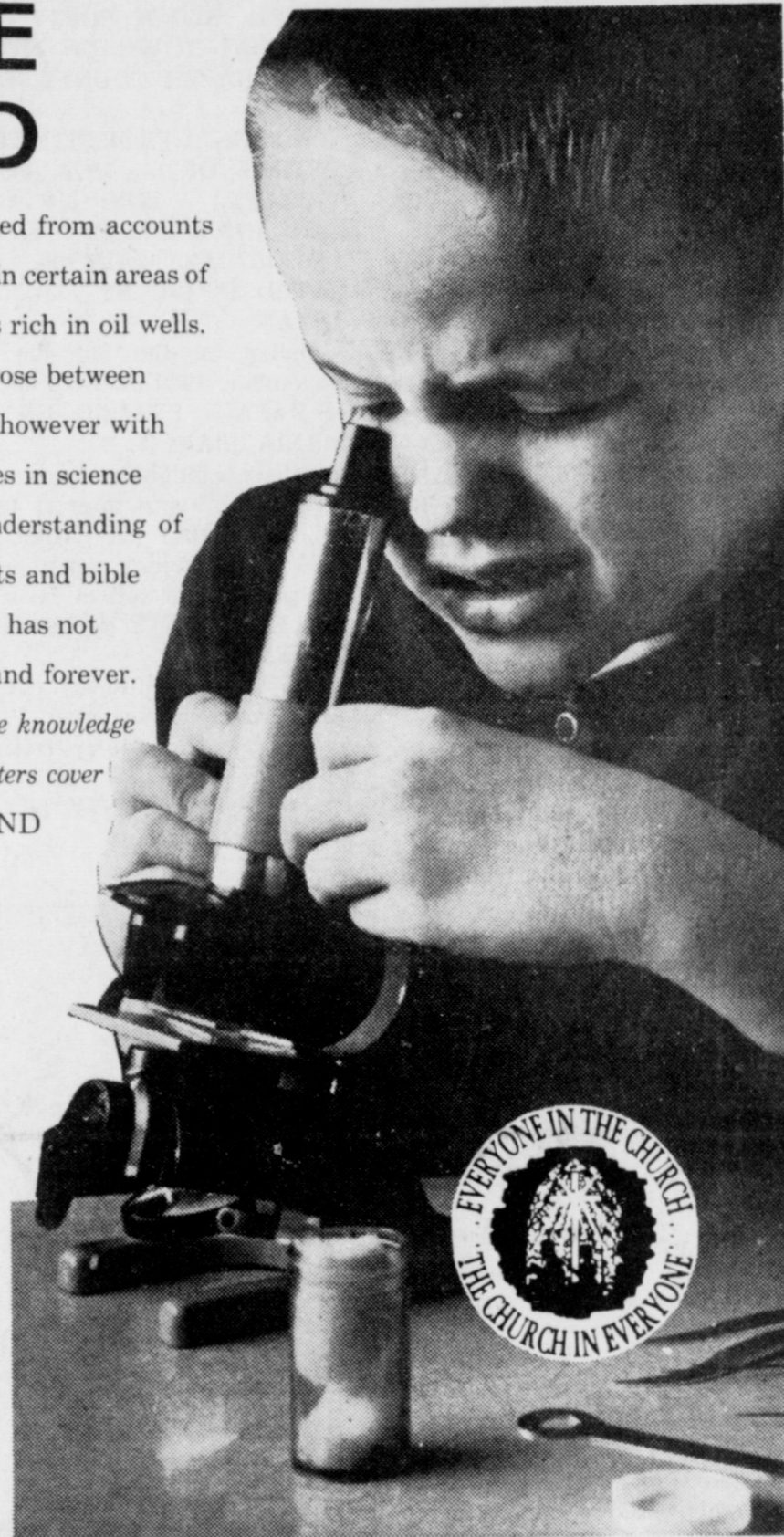

Keith Turner had the program and showed a video from the American Cancer Society about "Eating Smart" to help prevent cancer.

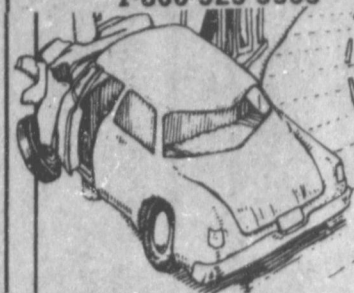

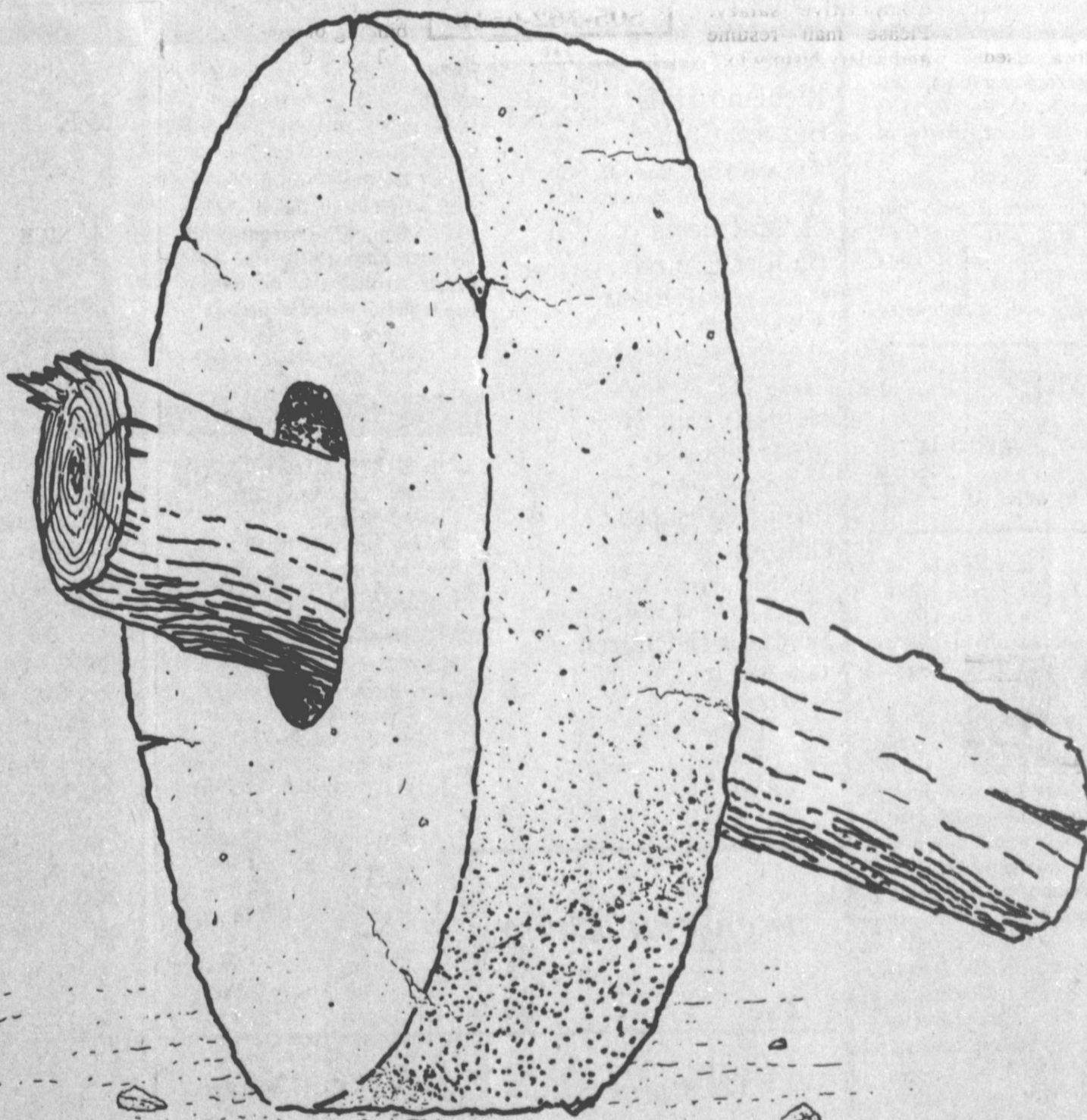

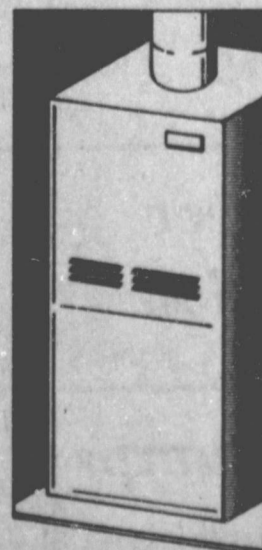
