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## Lady Coyotes Outdistance Marathon For AREA Title

Borden's Lady Coyotes came out of the starting blocks slow in Tuesday night's Area Playoff game with Marathon, but what a race they ran after that in their 62-30 win. Falling behind 4-2 early in the first quarter, Borden reeled off 20 unanswered points to take a 22-4 lead, and was off to the races. The defense had much to do with the Gail girls' success, as they held Marathon without a field goal for 10½ minutes during that time and only two free throws. A 12-4 first quarter lead erupted into a 30-10 half-time lead and, after a brief shining moment by the Lady Mustangs, where they tied Borden 8-8 in the third quarter, the onslaught continued. Borden bombed the baskets for 24 fourth quarter points for their 32 point win. Borden was especially deadly at the free throw line where they hit 10 of 11 in the last quarter and 15 of 20 for the game.

Lisha Sternadel led a balanced scoring

attack with 15 points followed closely behind by Amy Lewis with 14 and Randi Woodward with 11. Shara Dee Woodward hit two three point goals for 6 points, Kristi Adcock made 5, Amanda Anderson hit 4, Leslie made a three point shot, and Julie Harris and Shayne Hess made 2. Julie led in field goal percentage hitting her only attempt for 100% followed by Shara Dee with 67% and Amy Lewis with 55%. Randi hit 3 of 3 free throws for 100%. Amy and Amanda also hit 100%, each making 2 of 2. Lisha followed with 88%, making 7 of 8. Amanda led in steals with 4 ahead of Lisha and Shara Dee with 3 each. Lisha led in rebounds with 12 and Kristi had 9 and Randi had 7. Rachel Romero and Shara Dee tied for honors in assists with 4 each.

The win moved the Lady Coyotes record to 26-3 on the year and earned them a berth in the regional tournament for the fourth straight year.

## Lady Coyotes Fall In Regional Tournament

The Borden County Lady Coyotes' season came to an end in Levelland Friday night as the Lorenzo Hornets defeated the Gail girls 48-44 in an exciting regional quarter-final March. Borden started out in full stride as Lisha Sternadel hit all four of her field goal attempts to give Borden a 12 to 8 first quarter lead. The bad news was that the Lady Coyotes found themselves in early foul trouble as Lorenzo connected on 8 of 12 free throws for all their points in the initial stanza. Borden did not shoot any free throws in the opening quarter but still held the Lady Hornets scoreless from the field to hold the four point margin. With three of Borden's starters saddled with excessive fouls, Lorenzo came storming back and took a 28-21 lead by intermission. Borden fell further behind by the end of the third quarter, 40-29, before making a

dramatic comeback in the last stanza, and Lisha hit 7 in the period to account for Borden's 15 points. Lorenzo connected on two free throws with 20 seconds to go to seal the victory for the Lady Hornets. Free throws proved to be the difference in the game as Lorenzo connected with 20 of 30 attempts compared to Borden's 4 of 10. Still, the Lady Coyotes made a gallant effort in their comeback but just fell short.

Lisha led in scoring with 25 points followed by Amy with 10. Amanda Anderson scored 4 followed by Rachel Romero and Shara Dee with 2 each. Kristi Adcock added a free throw to the total. Lisha led in field goal percentage with 73%, making 11 of 15. Amy followed with 42%. Kristi led in free throw percentage with 50% making 1 of 2. Kristi and Shara led in steals with 2 each. Amy and Amanda tied for honors in rebounds

with 8 each. Amanda had 5 assists and Shara Dee had 4.

Lorenzo advanced to the semi-finals where they were defeated by Happy by a score of 62-42. Nazareth then defeated Happy in the finals 48-41 to claim their 13th regional title in 15 years. They will be seeking their 11th State Championship as they face Zavala in the State semi-finals. The other semi final has Moulton facing Munday. Borden ended their season at 26-4.

## J.V. Season Ending Stats

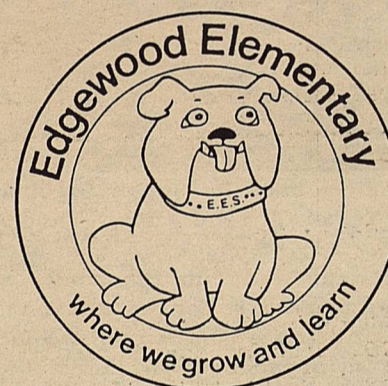
The J.V. Lady Coyotes had another successful season finishing with an 11-2 record. They were undefeated at 10-0 against other J.V. teams, with one win and two losses coming to Varsity teams in the Borden County Tournament. Seven girls started out the season on the J.V., with Leslie Fryar moving up to Varsity after the second game. The remaining six girls played an excellent season, outscoring their opponents 573-390

or a game average of 44.1 to 30.0. Their best offensive performance came in the last game of the season where they hit 52 points. Their best defensive effort came

against Grady, limiting the Lady Wildcats to 14 points and Sands, who scored 15.

Shayne Hess led this year's team in scoring with 189 points for a 14.5 average per game. She was followed by Kristin Kilmer with 145 points for an 11.2 average. They were followed by Kristin Monger with 126 points, Kelly Jo Ogden with 71, Leslie Fryar with 20 in the two games, Jacquelyn McPhaul with 19, and Heather Armstrong with 3. All will be playing Varsity ball next year, as Leslie and Jacquelyn are freshmen and the remaining players are sophomores.

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# Hooray For Peanut Butter: 100 And Still Going Strong

*Peanut butter (is) the paté of childhood.*

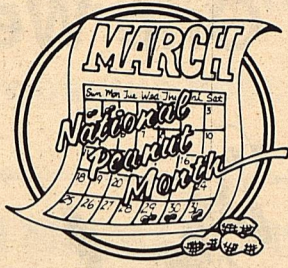
(AUSTIN)--Mothers should regularly give thanks to the unknown St. Louis physician who invented peanut butter. Their children eat about two-thirds of the 800 million pounds consumed every year in the United States, most of it between two slices of bread. Not only do youngsters like peanut butter, it's good for them. The combination of peanuts and the grain in bread provides the same complete protein found in animal products.

This March will mark 100 years since the doctor, whose name is yet to be uncovered, ground peanuts to make a paste. Ironically, he was aiming for a high-protein food source for the elderly, probably never thinking it would become the food of choice for millions of children.

The event will be marked at a press conference in St. Louis March 1, also the start of National Peanut Month. City officials, members of the Missouri Historical Society and representatives of peanut producer boards in the eight major peanut-growing states, including Texas, will attend.

The Texas Peanut Producers Board and the Texas Department of Agriculture will acknowledge the doctor's contribution to American food during a 12-city peanut media tour April 16-27. Marketing specialists will visit Midland, Odessa, Lubbock, Abilene, Waco, Temple, Killeen, San Antonio, Austin, Dallas, Fort Worth and Sherman. An out-of-state tour to Denver, Colorado Springs, Portland, Seattle and Spokane will take place May 14-25.

The physician probably was not the first person to grind peanuts. The nutritious legumes have been around since 750 B.C. and centuries ago "somebody is sure to have put them between two rocks," said Mary Webb, executive director of the Texas Peanut Producers Board in Gorman.



The doctor, however, added oil to his product so it would spread easily on bread. The resultant texture was grainier than most of today's commercial preparations, and the oil in the butter separated and rose to the top.

Most modern-day peanut butter is homogenized for smoothness and contains sugar and salt for flavoring. Consumers who want only peanuts in their butter may want to look in health food stores or the health food sections located in some supermarkets. Old fashioned peanut butter can also be made at home. Anyone with a food processor or blender, two cups of roasted peanuts and a tablespoon of peanut oil can do it. Salt is optional. One-fourth teaspoon is enough.

When using a food processor, process the ingredients continuously for two to three minutes. The ground peanuts will form a ball, which gradually softens to a spreadable consistency. Stop the machine and scrape the container's sides as necessary. Continue processing until the butter has a uniform, grainy-smooth texture. If using a blender, do half the recipe at a time, blending three to four minutes and scraping as necessary.

Storing old-style peanut butter in the refrigerator will delay oil separation but makes it harder to spread. Oil will rise to the top when peanut butter is left at room temperature. In this case, stir before serving.

Peanuts contain no cholesterol and are a good source of fiber. They are high in unsaturated fats, which give peanut butter its rich flavor. The richness makes peanut butter a wonderful

ingredient in desserts, probably one use the doctor never thought of. These recipes for Peanut Butter Pie and Peanut Butter Fudge Cake will make kids and adults want to celebrate the anniversary of peanut butter all year long.

## PRIZE PEANUT BUTTER PIE

1 (3 oz.) pkg. cream cheese  
1 C. sifted powdered sugar  
1/3 C. creamy peanut butter  
1/2 C. milk  
1 (9 oz.) carton whipped topping  
1 (9-in.) graham cracker crust  
1/2 C. finely chopped roasted peanuts

Whip cream cheese until soft and fluffy. Add sugar and peanut butter and blend into cheese. Slowly add milk, blending well. Fold whipped topping into mixture. Pour into baked pie shell and garnish with chopped peanuts. Freeze until firm before serving.

## PEANUT BUTTER FUDGE CAKE

**Cake:**  
2 eggs  
1 C. butter or margarine  
1 C. water  
1/2 C. buttermilk  
1/4 C. unsweetened cocoa  
1 tsp. vanilla  
2 C. sugar  
2 C. all-purpose flour  
1 tsp. baking soda

**Topping:**  
1 (12 oz.) jar creamy peanut butter  
1 tsp. peanut oil

**Frosting:**  
1/4 C. butter or margarine  
3 T. buttermilk  
2 T. unsweetened cocoa  
1 1/2 C. sifted powdered sugar  
1/2 tsp. vanilla

Grease and flour a 13-inch baking pan; set aside. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. To make cake, lightly beat eggs in small

saucepan. Add butter, water, buttermilk, cocoa and vanilla. Cook over medium heat stirring occasionally, just until mixture begins to boil. Meanwhile, in medium bowl, combine sugar, flour and baking soda. Pour hot mixture over sugar mixture; stir until well mixed. Pour into prepared pan, spreading evenly. Bake 25 minutes, or until wooden toothpick inserted in center of cake comes out clean. Cool in pan on wire rack 15 minutes.

To make topping, stir peanut butter with oil in small bowl. Spread evenly

over top of cooled cake.

To make frosting, combine butter, buttermilk and cocoa in small saucepan. Bring to boil over medium heat. Remove from heat, stir in powdered sugar and vanilla until smooth. With teaspoon, drop frosting on peanut topping in three crosswise and five lengthwise rows. Working quickly before frosting sets, draw edge through frosting crosswise, then lengthwise with a metal spatula, to make decorative design, if desired.

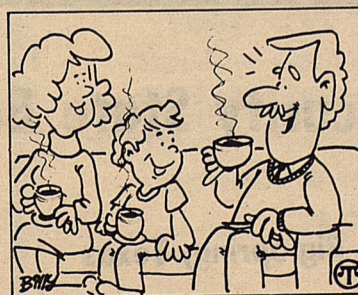

# Allergic To Bee Stings? Avoid 'Africanized' Bees

Perhaps as early as March, the first arrivals of the so-called "killer" bees are expected to cross the Rio Grande into Texas. But according to the Texas Department of Health (TDH), their migration to the U.S. will probably be much less dramatic than some media and fiction writers have depicted.

Bobby Davis, an entomologist and director of the TDH General Sanitation Division, explained that the insects may pose an increased danger to individuals who are highly allergic to bee stings, but should not be considered a hazard to most people.

"We want the public to know what makes the AHB (Africanized honeybee) different from other bees. We also want to caution people who are allergic to insect stings that bee stings can be fatal," Davis said. Two or three Texans, stung by common honeybees, die each year.

Davis explained that the AHB is a hybrid species, a cross-breed between common European honeybees and a more aggressive African species. The African bees were accidentally released in Brazil about 30 years ago. Even to scientists,

the hybrids look almost identical to common honeybees, but their behavior can be drastically different. "What concerns us most about AHB is that it is more likely than other bees to attack and sting in large numbers if anyone threatens its colony or swarm. Although the venom of Africanized bees is no more toxic than that of other honeybees, the number of stings a person might suffer may be much greater. If the person is already allergic to bee stings, or if he is stung by large numbers of bees in a swarm, it can be fatal." Hence the name, "killer" bees.

Davis said he thinks the name "killer" bees is a misnomer. "They are hard-working honeybees, and if you don't disturb their colonies, chances are they won't bother you."

As many as 10 deaths in Mexico may have resulted from AHB stings in the past four years. Other Central and South American countries have recorded increased bee sting deaths as the AHB swarms have spread northward from Brazil.

Another characteristic of AHB is its tendency to abscond--to separate into new

swarms to start new colonies. "Whereas most common honeybees are content in beekeepers hives, the AHB swarms sometimes seek more unlikely places to hide, such as old barrels, vacant buildings--nearly anything that offers shelter. That creates the danger that someone might stumble upon them," Davis said.

Davis said that the most likely persons to have serious problems with the Africanized bees are beekeepers and farmers, particularly in the Valley, where nearly all crops are dependent upon bee pollination. "Beekeepers are going to have to be wary of having their hives taken over by AHB, and some of them who may be lax in wearing protective clothing are going to have to be more careful. Farmworkers are going to have to watch for wild swarms, and take care not to provoke them."

Davis adds that young children and the elderly, who might not be able to move quickly, especially should avoid these bees. "We advise that anyone who finds a wild bee colony should contact the local health authority or an experienced beekeeper to make sure they are removed or destroyed safely."

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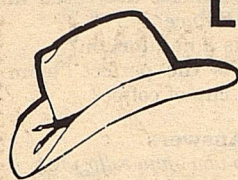

**Farmers Should Maintain IRS, Social Security Records On Workers**

Farmers, starting on Jan. 1 of this year, were required to start withholding federal income tax from wages of employees.

Employers must keep on file a completed W-4 form for each employee. This W-4 form determines the correct amount to withhold from each paycheck, based on how many exemptions an employee may claim, including dependents and disabilities.

Farmers also will have to provide W-2 forms to workers each January, starting this year. These forms will provide details on how much the worker earned and the amount that was paid to Social Security and federal income tax accounts.

Regarding seasonal migrant workers who don't live in the area where the farmer resides, the employers will have to be able to show they have made a good-faith effort to locate the workers so

that the W-2 forms could be sent to them.

This means that the employers should obtain and put the permanent addresses of their workers on file for reference.

Workers who do not earn the minimum taxable wage base of \$4,400 will be eligible to recover all federal taxes that have been deducted. Farmers may want to offer assistance to their workers in obtaining such refunds when warranted.

Farmers should use the IRS Circular E to determine correct withholding rates. They can call IRS toll-free at 800-424-FORM to obtain this circular and other forms.

In addition, farmers are reminded that the Social Security tax rate for 1990 also increased from 7.51 percent to 7.65 percent for employers and employees and to 15.3 percent for those who are self-employed.

**Annual Ram Performance Test Field Day And Sale Set**

The Annual Ram Performance Test Field Day and Sale is set for March 15 at the Sonora Experiment Station. The formal program will begin about 1:00 pm, followed by the sale of performance tested animals at around 2:30 pm.

Dr. Maurice Shelton, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station (TAES) researcher based at San Angelo said about 400 rams were placed on the test this year including some TAES owned rams which were fed on pasture.

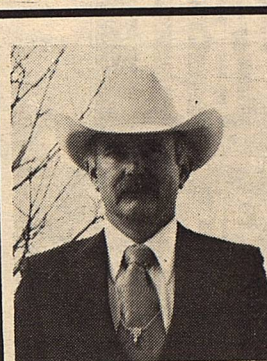
"One new aspect of this year's test is that two groups of Australian Merino-Rambouillet rams are included," said Shelton. "There are literally hundreds of good Rambouillet rams on the test. A few of these, not to exceed 75 head, will be offered at public auction."

Shelton said those rams potentially eligible for the sale will be those which performed above average on the test and which pass a visual inspection and meet certain minimal production criterion.

Events during the day include an informal inspection of the rams and their performance records during the morning followed by a Barbecue lunch catered by the Sutton County 4-H Club. A brief educational program will then be held from about 1:00 p.m. to 2:30 p.m.

The program will feature a discussion of the new initiatives in wool and mohair marketing, comments on the lamb markets, and Australian Merino evaluation program and an update on ram epididymitis. Also included will be comments on this

year's ram test and the awarding of "Certified Ram" certificates as a part of the American Rambouillet Sheep Breeders Registry of Merit Program. The day will conclude with the sale of the eligible performance tested rams.

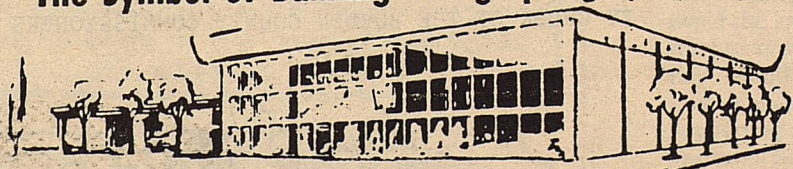

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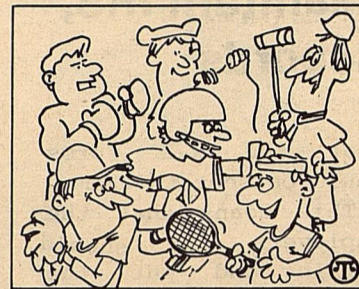

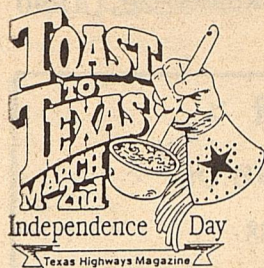
