

Food and Fiber Appreciation Month

What with all the information about fuel shortages, and problems throughout the nation on shortages of many kinds, Texas is observing November as "Food and Fiber Appreciation Month", and we feel the observance is very timely in our

Governor Dolph Briscoe has officially proclaimed November as a special month to honor Texas agriculture and the Governor has asked for a vast expanded rural development program and launched a campaign to make Texas No. 1 in agricultural production.

We will make every possible resource available to help people in rural areas achieve maximum support for a more abundant life," Briscoe said in a keynote address on "Planning for a Rural-Urban Balance.

Briscoe emphasized that loss of people from rural areas has created many dilemmas in the cities, and said that high priority must be given to rural development and job opportunities, orderly development of natural resources, improvements of services and facilities, better rural labor market service, more emphasis on vocational training, improved health service and

Dr. John E. Hutchinson, director, Texas Agricultural Extension Service concludes that Texas appears to have the necessary resources to achieve the goal of becoming No. 1 in agriculture.

'Among the state's advantages are available land resources plus the technological and knowledge reserve from agricultural research for expanding production of all phases of the livestock industry, food and feed grains for domestic and export; cotton and other natural fibers; fresh and processed vegetables, fruits and nuts, soybeans and sunflowers; sugarcane; mariculture, and expanding processing industries near production areas," Dr. Hutchinson said.

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

Nixon himself has often been his own worst enemy. Throughout the year his spokesman issucd sweeping or inane denials that later became "inoperative." The President's speeches and press conferences about Watergate have been unconvincing and riddled with contradictions.



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

W. B. (Nookie) Wiggins is the manager of the gin. From 2500 pounds of seed cotton, Eppars received a 690 pound bale of cotton and 900 pounds of cotton seed.

The bale was sold under the contracted price of 55 cent per cotton seed was sold to the gin for \$95.00 a ton, brings \$42.75. The bonus paid for the first blae f 1973 cotton by the Hedley Lions Club was \$75. The total amount received by Mr. Eppars for this bale of cotton was \$442. 25. This was by far the most money ever received for a bale of cotton in Donley County.
