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### EDITORIAL

#### Thanksgiving, 1973!

Today is Thangsgiving Day, 1973, and in this area the observance will be pretty much as it has been for several years, good food, parades and football games on TV, with several hearty souls taking advantage of this holiday to go bird hunting, and possibly farmers working in their fields to get out their valuable cotton crop.

With agricultural prices being at high points this year, the economic picture looks bright, especially on a short range forecast, and we all have plenty for which to be thankful.

Considering the effect the fuel shortage could, and possibly will, have upon this nation in years to come, we may all look back on these days as a wonderful time in which we should all be thankful for having lived.

Consider these grim facts, views given by energy experts of the Treasury Department, recognized as the best in the nation, and probably the most realistic.

If the oil embargo imposed by Saudi Arabia does not lift, the United States can look forward to a bleak winter of electric power blackouts, chilly homes, restricted driving and factory shutdowns. A prolonged embargo will bring a serious recession perhaps even a depression.

For the immediate situation of farmers desperately needing fuel to harvest the 1973 crop, both the Texas Railroad Commission and the Interior Department of the Federal Government are giving farmers priorities in getting fuel for agriculture purposes.

It is well that improved vac cines are available for effective prevention, drastically reducing rabies cases. Because there still is no known cure for this disease.

Most people are not well informed about it. Perhaps because of misleading words cropping up like "mad dog" and "dog days." Veterinarians tell us these facts:

#### Facts About Rabies

- All warm blooded animals and humans are susceptible to rabies.

- The disease is worldwide. - Thousands of cases are reported annually in the U.S. - These cases occur in every

month of the year.

- Vaccination, plus periodic boosters, is the surest protecttion.

How rabies is spread: The rabies virus is present in the saliva of an infected animal. It is spread to other animals or to people by a bite serious enough to break the skin. However, not every animal or person thus bitten develops the disease. But if the rabies virus should develop, there are no recoveries and the outcome is inevitable.

Warning signs: Medical authorities say symptoms begin to appear after a varying incubation period ranging from two weeks or longer. There is usually a change from normal behavior. Friendly animals can become aggressive; timid pets may become bold or vice versa. In some cases, but not all, they then enter a "furious" form, tending to snap and bite. But these signs do not necessarily prove rabies: only a veterinarian can make a diagnosis.

What To Do If Bitten Don't panie: just see a doc tor as soon as possible. This is good advice even when there is no reason to suspect rabies. It is equally sensible that the animal be taken to a veterinary hospital or a public health officer so it can be confined for the necessary observation per-Upon the doctor's advice, the bitten person can be treated with a series of injections which usually prevents the disease if started in time.

Community programs: There is a need for all communities to require compulsary rabies vaccination. ALPO Pet Foods urges your support of such programs. It would help speed the day when rabies no longer exists in the U.S. See your veterinarian about
