

### **Memphis Firemen Still Seeking Truck Donations**



Senator Hightower selected Memphis, his home town, as the site to make his official announcement and Tuesday, Dec. 11, has been selected as the date. The Official Announcement Party will get underway at 7 p. m. and continue through 9 p. m.

Senator Hightower's friends from all over the Panhandle Area invited to be present for the affair which wil be simply a coffee and cookie affair as the Senator has requested.

Dick Fowler is the local chairman planning for the Announcement Party.

Although it is well known over the 13th Congressional District that Senator Hightower would be in the race for U.S. Representative, facing Democrat opponent Ray Ruffin of Amarillo in the Democratic Party primary, and the winner would take on Republican Incumbent Bob Price of Pampa. Tuesday night will be the first time Senator Hightower has officially "thrown his hat into the ring."

seven years. Her Body was carried to Buringame, Kans., the family homeplace, for burial on Thursday merning.


Mrs. Anna B. Finch was born June 28, 1883 in Burlingame. She was united in marriage to Howard A Finch June 18, 1907 at Burlin-
