

## THREE FILE FOR SCHOOL BOARD




#### JACK MCPHAUL


Amanda Anderson, Kelly Jo Ogden, Shayne Hess, Shara Dee Woodward, and freshman Leslie Fryar.




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## How Many Texans Does It Take To Answer The Census?

Texas needs a complete and accurate count of its Census to get its fair share of representation Washington, D.C., as to which residents are entitled. If Texas is percent of the total undercounted, it won't have the opportunity to get its fair share for ten years as the next Census will not occur until the year 2000.

The U.S. Census is taken at the beginning each decade and provides national, state and city demographics which are used in numerous ways by government, the private sector and the general Informatiaon public. from census questionnaires is combined and only for reported geographic areas, and none of the date identifies any single individual. Answers provided by each house hold are confidential.

ranging from highway construction to the nutrition programs--are allocated using census data. The \$38 billion averages out to about \$150 per person per year. The 500,000 to 600,000 Texans who may



Research at the farm will include conservaeffects tion tillage, cotton, of wind on environmentally sound practices, management sustainable agriculture, use and management of plant residue cover, water and precise fertilizer apaplication, optimal varietal reinsect intersponse, action, optimal varietal response, insect interaction within farming systems, weed management, computer and economic modeling, and alternate crops.

Initial plantings at the farm will include cotton, wheat, grain and other sorghum crops, such as sesame.

#### It's Not Just Pizza Crust Anymore

A good pizza crust mix is great to have on hand for all kinds of easy pizza and snack making. One Italian favorite made easy with the mix is a "calzone" which is like a "pizza turnover."

To make a calzone, simply prepare and roll out the pizza crust mix, top one half with your favorite pizza toppings like green pepper strips, onions, mushrooms, cheeses, pepperoni or cooked sausage, fold the dough over, seal and bake. Often the calzone is served with a spicy tomato sauce poured over top.

The following Pepperoni Bread recipe is an appetizer/snack calzone filled with picy pepperoni, melted Swiss cheese and savory Italian seasoning. Serve hot or cold in thin slices for a great party snack. Be sure to make plenty to go around because Pepperoni Bread can be habit forming.

Pepperoni Bread

1 package (8 ounces) Martha White Deep Pan Pizza Crust Mix, prepared according to package directions

1 package (3½ to 4 ounces) sliced pepperoni

2 cups (8 ounces) grated Swiss cheese 2 tablespoons grated Parmesan cheese 1 egg, beaten

1 teaspoon Italian seasoning

Preheat oven to 375°F. Grease a large baking sheet. Roll pizza crust dough as thin as possible into an oval shape (see step 1). Cover one half of crust with pepperoni, almost to the edge (see step 2). Sprinkle cheeses over pepperoni; drizzle with beaten egg. (This keeps the crust moist and chewy.) Sprinkle with Italian seasoning. Fold plain half of dough over covered half (see step 3). Moisten edges with water and press to seal. Place

on prepared baking sheet and bake 20 to 25 minutes. Cool about 10 minutes. Slice into 1-inch strips with pizza cutter. Makes about 12 servings.

# Traditional History Anything But Reality

COLLEGE STATION — Which history questions tell us more: "What caused George Washington's death?" or "What was the average life expectancy of American men at the time of George Washington's death?"

To a new breed of scholars who study history "from the bottom up," the answer is obvious says a Texas A&M University researcher who specializes in "social history."

"Social history in recent times has focused on ordinary people, not so much on the elite, the big name or the major events," says Dr. Dale Knobel, whose own studies focus on American ethnic and race relations and on common stereotypes of immigrants.

"Because social history avoids biog-

raphy and narrative, some historians think it is not as colorful as traditional history, and that it may not read as well," he says. "Others accuse social historians of being trendy and only su

studying a subject, such as women or blacks, because it is on the current political or social agenda."

It is a mistake, Knobel explains, to as-

It is a mistake, Knobel explains, to assume traditional history — the history of the elite — reflects the real world.
