## Cotton Yield Breaks All Records

### Play-Off Game Possible As Cyclone Drops Game

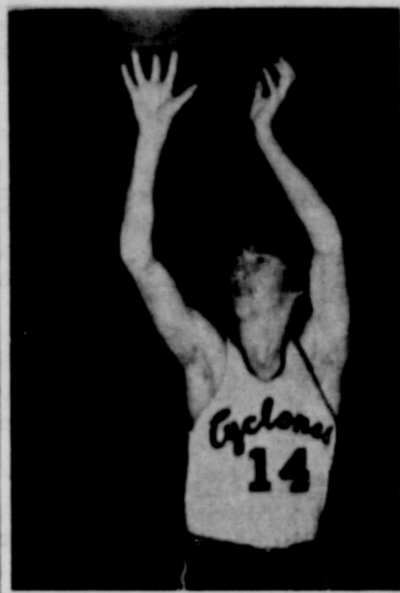

The 1973 cotton harvest is now over the all time record mark of bale production, hitting the 91,337-bale mark this morning, a telephone survey of the 12 ginning points in Hall County revealed.

Ideal harvesting conditions persist and indications are that in another two weeks the harvest could be about wrapped up as more and more farmers report a completion of their harvesting.

However, there are still fields with cotton remaining to be stripped and a few fields have cotton piled in neat piles waiting to be hauled to the gin. How much of this is remaining is anyone's guess at this point.

Question has also been asked how much Out-of-County cotton is included in the ginning totals. That is another question which is settled each year when the official census bureau total is released.

In past years this newspaper has stopped publishing ginning totals when about 5,000 bales remain in the final wrap up stages. That way the last report and the official report (which accredits each county with their production) are near the same. However, sometimes the official is over, it has never been under the last report compiled by our newspaper survey.

There were only three cotton guessers in the annual ginning contest which guessed 100,000 or better, and only 34 guessers in the 90,000 figures.

**Cotton Classing**  
Ideal cotton harvesting weather has prevailed over the area, according to W.E. Cain, in charge of the USDA, AMS, Cotton Classing Office at Memphis, Texas. "Estimates indicate the crop is about 80 percent harvested, by Jan. 18," said Cain.

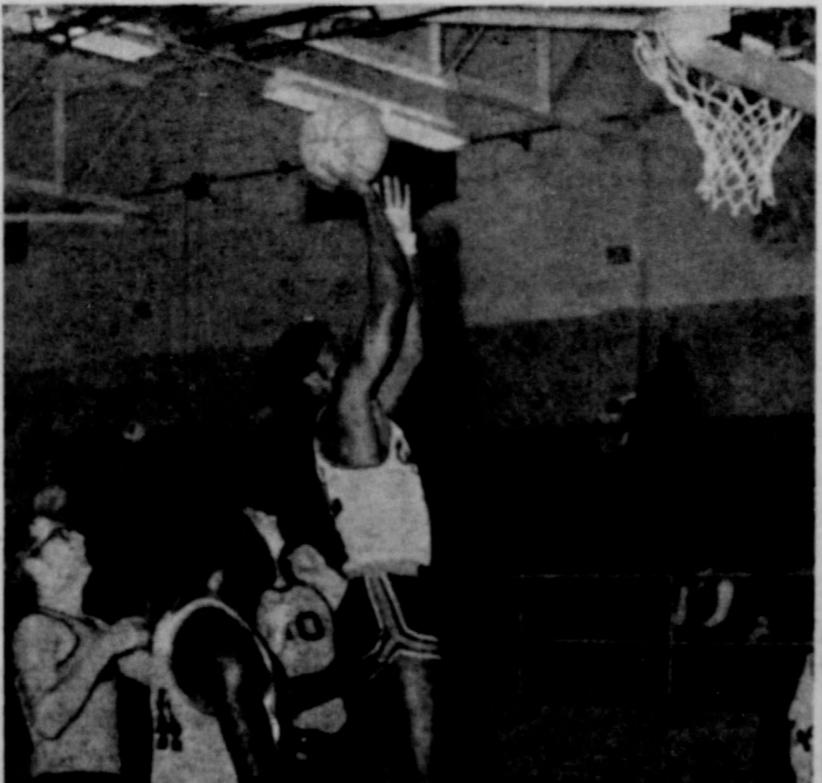
## Cub Pack To Have Re-Charter Night

## ASCS Office To Administer New 1974 RECP

Hall County ASCS Office will be responsible for administering the new 1974 Rural Environmental Program. The new program, which replaces and modifies the old REAP, has several new aspects of interest to Hall County residents.

According to Larry B. Rogers, ASCS County Executive Director, the new cost-sharing phase of the program could be extremely beneficial to Hall County farmers. It provides for a minimum of 50 percent and maximum of 75 percent return to the user for all expenses he incurs while establishing conservation practices on his land, including labor costs. An applicant can either elect to apply for a single one-year program of conservation improvement, or select a three to ten year continuing program. The extended period of time now allowed will be most beneficial to those wishing rather extensive conservation improvements on their land, but preferring to spread them out over a period of years. Under long-term agreements, essential practices & practice cost-sharing will be scheduled over a period of 3 to 10 years. These agreements with farmers will be based on whole farm conservation plans which have been approved by appropriate officials. Requests for long-term agreements will be accepted only in cases where the farmer has an approved plan and has indicated he is ready to carry out a scheduled practice during the current program year.

Practices to be offered under the 1974 RECP for annual or long-term agreements, include: establishing permanent vegetative cover; improving permanent vegetative cover planting; trees; improving a stand of forest trees; water impoundment reservoirs; stripcropping; constructing terrace systems; diversions; stream-bank stabilization; permanent (Continued on Page 8)

### S. S. I. Program To Aid Blind And Disabled

The year 1974 will be an important one in the lives of many Americans as the Supplemental Security Income (SSI) program became operative January 1. SSI is administered by the Social Security Administration, according to Travis C. Briggs, Social Security District Manager in Amarillo.

The aim of the new program is to provide a basic cash income to people in need who are 65 or older or who are blind or disabled. Assets of up to \$1,500 for an individual or \$2,250 for a couple excluding a home of reasonable value can be owned without making one ineligible. The actual amount of the SSI payment will depend on how much income a person has.

The new Federal program is not the same as Social Security, even though SSI will be handled by Social Security Offices. The money to make SSI payments will come from general revenues and not from the Social Security trust funds from which monthly social security benefits are paid.

SSI replaces the present Federal State public assistance payments made to the aged, blind, and disabled. Under SSI, it's estimated there will be millions of additional people eligible. Applications for SSI are being accepted in Social Security Offices across the country at present.

If a person wants additional information about SSI, they should contact the Social Security Office.

### Hall Co. Hospital Receives \$1,954.20 From Antitrust Suit

AUSTIN—The \$1,954.20 check Attorney General John Hill mailed to Hall County Hospital was that hospital's share of a total of \$1,707,084.80 Hill distributed to administrators of 145 Texas hospitals as their individual settlements in the State of Texas' antitrust suit against manufacturers of broad spectrum antibiotics.

The payment of the \$1,707,084.80 by the Chas. Pfizer & Co. to the hospitals was the 3rd phase of payment to Texas health and hospital facilities as a result of the settlement of the Pfizer segment of the antitrust suit by Texas and the other 49 states in the Federal District Court, Southern District of New York.

The Attorney General's office already has distributed \$1.9 million in checks to individual consumers, as well as \$487,602 to State health centers and eleemosynary institutions. Settlement of the antitrust suit as it relates to other manufacturers of broad spectrum antibiotics is still pending.

### Four Important Tax Deadlines Face Taxpayers

Amarillo, Texas—Four important tax deadlines face taxpayers and employers in Texas during January, Elton W. Davidson, Administrative Officer of Internal Revenue Service (IRS) for the Amarillo area, said today.

Employers are reminded that the deadline to give employees their 1973 W12 forms is Thursday, January 31, 1974. The form should show earnings, income tax withheld and Social Security information, January 31, is also the deadline for reporting Social Security information, January 31, is also the deadline for reporting Social Security and withheld income taxes for the calendar quarter ended December 31, 1973. If employers make timely deposits of the full amount of the tax due, ten additional days are allowed to file the return. Davidson said that employers who received a pre-addressed Form 941, "Em-

ployer's Quarterly Federal Tax Return", should use this form to report their tax liability. Other employers can obtain black copies from their local IRS office.

The last day of January is also the last day to report and pay any balance of Federal Unemployment Tax not over \$100.00 for 1973, using Form 940. If the balance of tax due is over \$100.00 the employer must make a deposit with FTD Form 508. If the full amount of the tax is deposited on time, employers may then file the return no later than February 11, 1974.

Texas farmers and fishermen who have not filed their 1973 de-

claration of estimated Federal Income tax must file and pay that tax by Tuesday, January 15. The sole exception to this rule is if they file their income tax return and pay the total tax due by March 1.

"Rural communities, particularly those below 2,500 people, are at a real crucial point," warns a state development expert. "They've got to decide right now whether they're going to plan for growth or whether they're going to sit back and slowly die."

Admittedly, reversal of urban migration has been a tough trend to buck. Nationally, communities between 2,500 and 5,000 population grew a mere 7.9 percent from 1960 to 1970 . . . compared to 13.3 percent for the country as a whole. Population of towns between 200 and 500 people declined 4 percent.

Declining farm population in general gets most of the blame. Then also, good roads and fast cars are luring remaining rural consumers to city shopping centers for their Saturday afternoon shopping spree.

That may be changing though. "Our surveys show about 32 percent of the people live in rural America and about 52 percent of the people want to," states William Erwin, USDA assistant secretary for rural development. "And any number of companies have told me it's their policy to locate new plants in rural America."

Reasons—city people are fed up with the high taxes and tail biting of confinement living. Industries are finding rural labor less expensive and more productive . . . and a lot easier to get along with.

Land one of these industries, even a light industry if you're off main line transportation routes, and the pay-off can be big. U. S. Chamber of Commerce research shows 100 new factory workers in an area adds:

- . . . One more retail establishment.
