## Cotton Is Theme For 54th Annual Chamber Banquet

"Cotton" is the theme for the 54th Annual Memphis Chamber of Commerce Banquet set for 7:30 p. m. Tuesday, Feb. 26, in the Memphis Community Center with Earle Younts, Asst. Manager of Cotton Board, Inc., Memphis, Tenn., the principal speaker.

Mr. Younts, formerly director of information for the Cotton Board, will direct his address on cotton and the decoration theme for the banquet will feature all phases of production and use of the fiber.

The selection of a "cotton" theme for the Chamber Banquet this year was natural at the conclusion of the largest and most profitable cotton crop in the history of Hall County.

The 12 county gins will handle 100,000 bales, a figure so close to that amount it would take only a few bales more, surpassing the 1949 crop by 11,000 bales in setting a new all-time record.

Memphis Compress Co., Memphis and Turkey plants, have received 167,000 bales, surpassing the 1949 total when 153,000 was handled by the county.

The USDA Cotton Classing office closed last Friday, and the most important announcement made by Officer in Charge Wiley Cain, was that the office-classed a new record high of 277,600 samples for the season from the 12-county area the office serves.

In dollar figures, the 1973 cotton crop could conservatively be worth \$25 million to this county, and this figure crushes any other for a cotton season.

Chamber President Larry Parks will serve as Toastmaster for the affair, and special music will be provided by J. B. Rapp and V. C. "Zipp" Durrett.

Incoming President John Kehr will introduce guests.

Rev. Tommy Nelson of the First United Methodist Church will give the invocation and Min. Arthur W. Smith of the Church of Christ will give the benediction.

A feature of the banquet this year will be the presentation of 10 Community Service awards handled by Rev. C. H. Murphy, Jr., of the First Baptist Church and Min. Tom Posey of the First Christian Church.

The speaker, Earle Younts, has recently been promoted from supervisor of information to assistant manager of Cotton Board, Inc.

Prior to joining the Cotton Board staff in 1971, he served as South Texas field representative for the National Cotton Council in 1954 and became Southwest area field supervisor with headquarters in Lubbock in 1964.

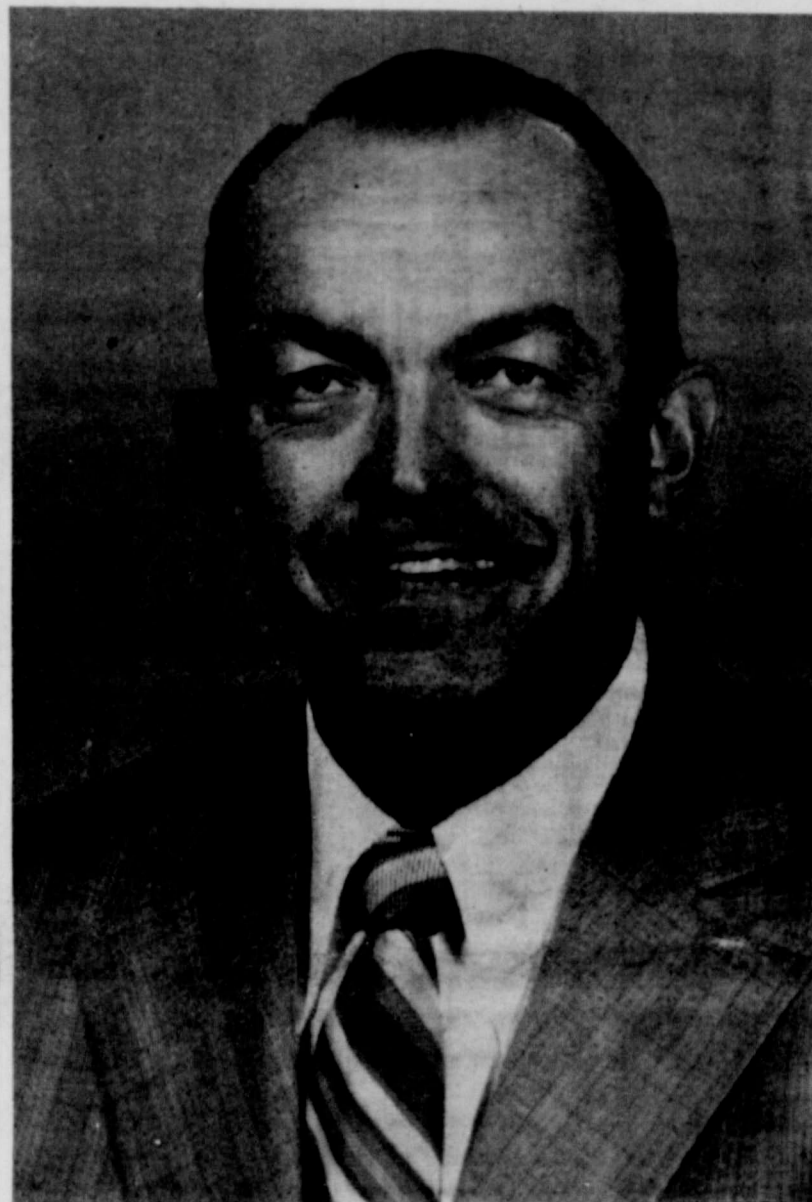
Born in Corpus Christi, Mr. Younts received his degree in agriculture from Texas A&I College.

Cotton Board and Cotton Incorporated carry out cotton's research and promotion program. Cotton Board is the administrative agency for the program and is comprised of 20 persons nominated by cotton producer organizations and appointed by the Secretary of Agriculture.

Cotton Incorporated, governed by a 40-member board of directors made up entirely of cotton producers, is responsible for developing and implementing the research and promotion program with a budget of \$17 million for the fiscal year 1974. Of the total \$14 million of research and promotion activities will be financed by cotton producers' contributions of \$1 per bale authorized by the Cotton Research and Promotion Act of 1966.

Directors of the chamber will serve as table hosts and introduce all out-of-town guests again this year.

The Welcoming Committee of the Chamber is preparing the decorations for the banquet and a cotton theme will be used.

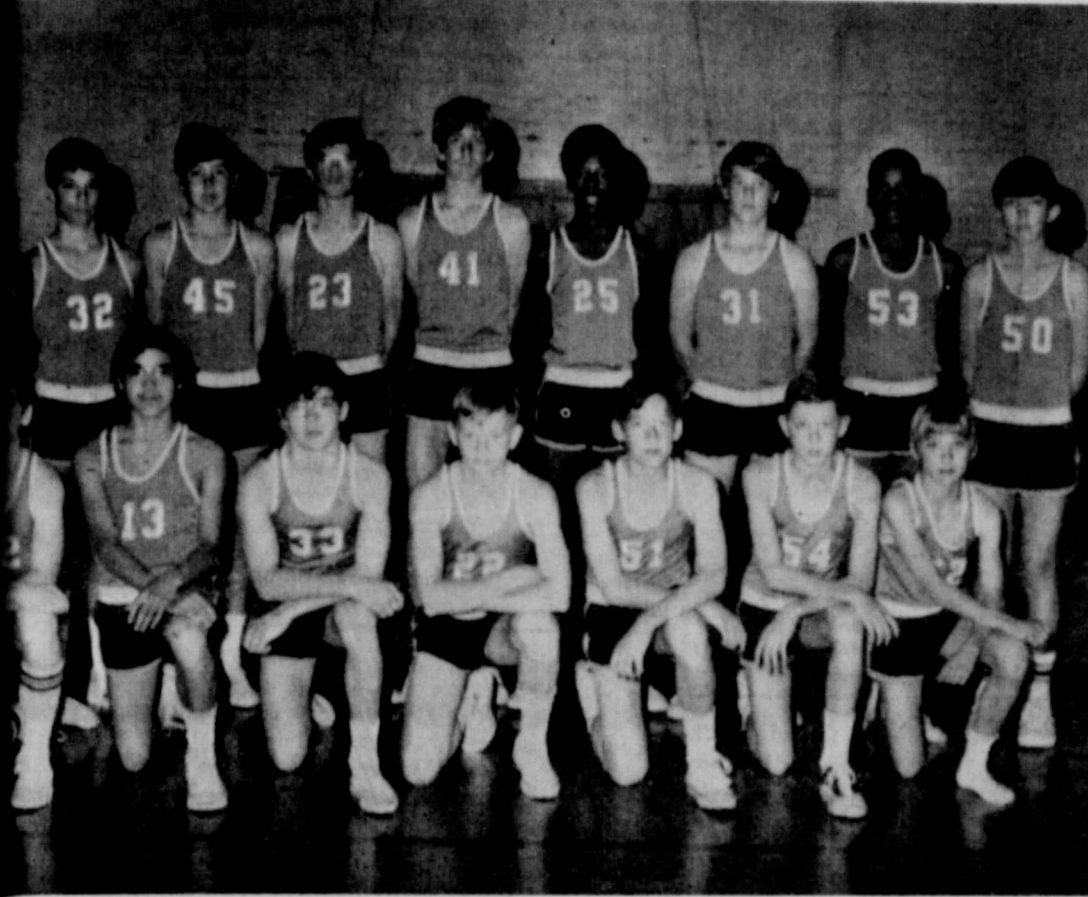
Items taken from Lakeview High School from the Superintendent's Office.

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## EDITORIAL

### On Shortages and Rising Prices!

Americans are being told daily about shortages and increased prices on almost every electronic news cast and on every page of their newspaper. The economic situation is chief among items of conversation in this nation.

Headlines like, "Food Prices, Now Much Higher," "Truckers' Strike," "Service Stations Close in Protest," "Business Slump," "Unemployment Climbing," are just a few of the things being read today, and no one can predict the effect the situation will have on Americans.

One thing is clear. Businessmen, home owners, workers, and just about everybody, fearful of being caught short of needed supplies are clamoring for more of the essential items.

Newspapermen fearful of not having enough newspaper to publish their newspapers are trying to stock their warehouses as full as possible. Businesses using paper sacks order larger quantities hoping to get a least a partial shipment which would be about what they need.

Multiply this in every phase of the economy and you have major shortages developing very quickly.

One service station operator said, "motorists don't pull in and say, 'Give me a \$1 worth,' anymore. They always say 'Fill'er up.'" Stations who used to pump about 600 gallons per day being open from 6 a. m. to 10 p. m. now pump as much as 1,200 gallons a day and close far earlier.

Johnny Carson on the "Late Show" jokingly mentioned a toilet paper shortage and within a week, a shortage developed in six states. Panic buying at this stage is more dangerous than mild shortages it seems to us.

People hoarded meat when it looked like meat prices would go up. Some are installing home gasoline tanks to hoard gasoline.

Economists agree that personal income is rising very little now in most sectors of the economy, while prices are climbing rapidly. But consumers spending is not expected to be a great stimulus to the economy as families will be cautious about spending.

One economist thinks that family spending is not likely to cushion a business downturn this year. He thinks that people are cutting back on purchases—not so much because of the energy squeeze but because of inflation. The typical pay check does not buy as much as before.

In almost everything, one economist said, "Consumer spending will be no great stimulus to our economy. Personal income is rising very little now. Consumer debt is very high. The energy crisis has been handled skillfully for industry, admirably for the consumer."

Most private economists disagree with the Administration's thinking on one point. They feel a recession will come. The recession will be full-fledged and require a drawn-out recovery period similar to the 1970-71 recovery.

Americans shudder when they hear that the nation's annual inflation rate is 15 per cent. If a recession comes, it would curb this a bit, unless government rushes in and stimulated the economy with large governmental spending.

The Administration is taking off all wage and price controls in April and higher prices are expected during the first half of this year.

To the little man, higher prices means inflation. It's hard to understand how, with prices rising and rising, the nation could go into a recession, and prices continue to rise. What is being predicted is a period of continued inflation plus recession. No one foresees anything getting cheaper.

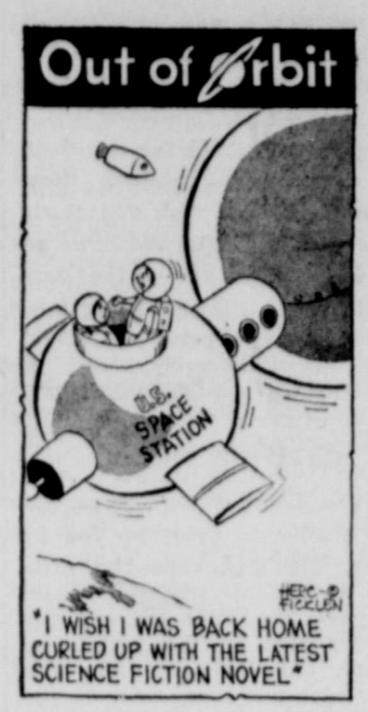

## New Federal Business Loans Are Available

A new federal program to finance local businesses or industrial development will help improve the economic climate in rural areas of Texas, according to Mr. J. Lynn Futch, State Director of Farmers Home Administration, Temple.

Already letters of pre-application are being received, Mr. Futch said, requesting financial assistance to develop businesses under provisions of the 1972 Rural Development Act. The Farmers Home Administration, a rural credit service of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, oversees the program.

"Submitting a letter of pre-application is the first step in this program," Mr. Futch explained. "Any individual or group that needs financing for industry or business in Texas should summarize his idea in a proposal and submit it to the FHA county office in the area, or to a private lender. Priority will be given to projects that strengthen rural communities in improving economic and employment conditions as outlined in the Rural Development Act."

If the prospective business meets eligibility requirements, Mr. Futch said, the applicant will be requested to submit a formal application. Major projects will be cleared with appropriate local and state officials to assure compliance with development plans

for the area.

In addition to individuals, eligible applicants may include partnerships, cooperatives, and corporations.

Most borrows will receive loans advanced by private lenders guaranteed up to 90 percent by FHA on rural areas and cities of over 50,000 population. Loan funds may be used to purchase machinery and equipment, to buy land, buildings and permanent fixtures, and for working capital.

### Local Residents Spend \$294,000 On Cigarettes

NEW YORK, Feb. 20.—In what recent years Hall County residents changed their smoking habits, if at all, in the 30 years that have passed since the Surgeon General's warning that cigarette smoking was harmful to health?

How much are local people smoking today, compared with people in other parts of the country?

Judging from the latest statistics, many in the area have quit smoking entirely and many others have cut down on their consumption.

However, there has been a steady influx of new smokers, mostly teen-agers, offsetting these reductions.

The trend has been noted generally throughout the United States. A report issued by the National Clearing House for Smoking and Health shows that the number of cigarettes smoked last year was 500 billion, as compared with 400 billion when the anti-smoking campaign began, a decade ago.

Figures compiled by the Department of Agriculture, the Tobacco Tax Council and others give the rate of consumption in each section of the country.

In Hall County according to a breakdown of these figures, an estimated 616,000 packs were sold last year.

This was at the rate of 150 packs for every local resident over the age of 18.

It was less than in some other sections and more than in others. Nationally the average rate of consumption among people over age 18 was 290 packs. In the West South Central States it was 190.

The government's figures show that there are 30 million cigarette smokers in the United States now, or 2 million more than in 1964, when the warning was issued.

However, public health officials claim, the warning and the subsequent publicity that it generated over the years helped to reverse a trend that would have resulted in 70 million smokers today.

Even though the cost of smoking has been rising, chiefly due to higher taxes imposed upon cigarettes by various levels of government, it has had little effect on sales. Americans are spending to less than \$12 billion a year in that direction.

In Hall County, the overall output last year was approximately \$294,000, or about \$48.30 per resident.

### Most Men At 65 Can Collect SS Checks Now

Most men who reach age 65 in 1974 can collect monthly social security checks if they have worked as little as 5-8 years in jobs covered by social security, according to Travis C. Briggs, Social Security District Manager in Amarillo. Women who reach 65 in 1974 generally can get monthly retirement checks after only 1 year or more of work.

Eligible workers can begin collecting their full social security retirement benefits at 65 or reduced benefits at 62. The maximum payable for a man who becomes age 65 in 1974 is \$274.60 per month. Women, young children, and dependent husbands can also get monthly social security payments based on the worker's benefit, Briggs said.

"Quarter of work credit help to determine your eligibility for social security retirement benefits—but they do not affect the amount of your monthly check," Briggs said. "The benefit amount is based on your average earnings in work covered by social security over a set period of time."

Social security work credit is measured in calendar quarters—January-March, April-June, July-September, or October-December.

Most employees get credit for a quarter of work if they are paid \$20 or more anytime in that quarter for work covered by social security, Briggs said. Most self-employed people get social security credit for a quarter in any year their annual self-employment net income is \$400 or more.

Today, more than nine out of 10 jobs in paid employment and self-employment are covered or eligible for coverage under social security.

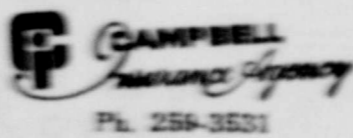

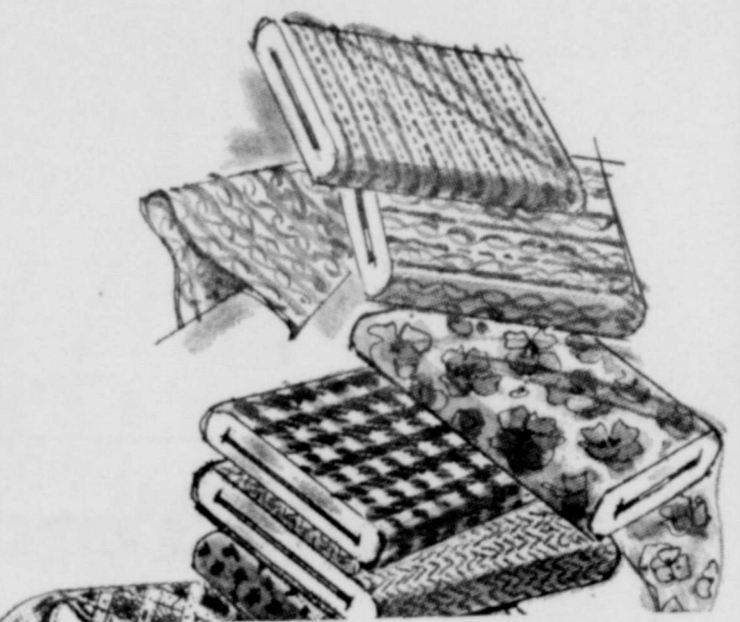

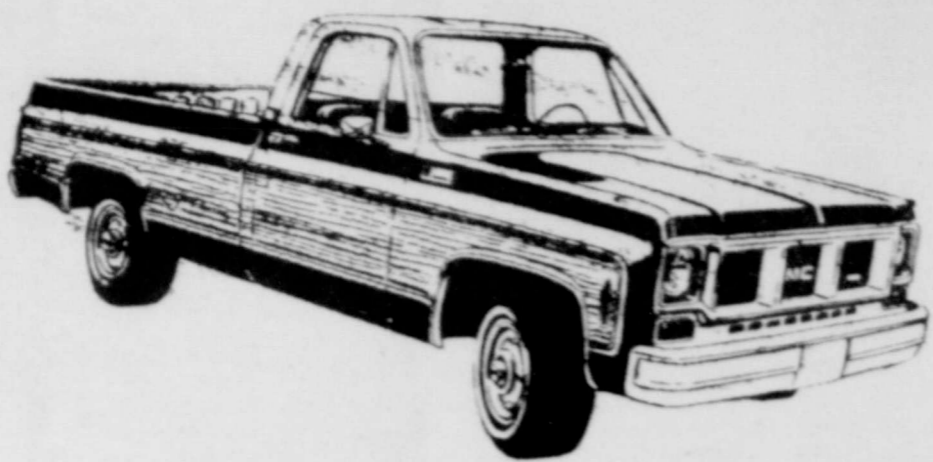

### B. B. Shots

was surprised a few days ago that the Odom Hospital building was being demolished. Looking back over the years I realized that this quarter block of land had made a great deal of money. I can remember when it was used in the summer months as a tabernacle, and all churches would cooperate and have an old-fashioned revival with out of town Evangelists and song leaders.

These meetings were usually scheduled for 3 weeks, but with the interest shown at the end of the 3 weeks the time would be prolonged a week or 10 days.

The town was all out for the services with most of the business places closing for the morning hours. Choirs from all the churches really put out the singing of the old-time gospel songs. There were a lot of "Amen's" which were in style then.

In the early days our finest entertainment was furnished by various Chautauquas, and some of the greatest men in our nation gave us lectures. Season tickets were bought for this high class entertainment. A tent was on this plot of ground for shelter.

The next thing I remember of the plot of ground was that it was home of Grandpa and Sis Mackie (she was called). Mr. Murry was the father of R. and J. S.

Sister Mackie had chickens for sale, and she could make them understand her language. While Mr. Murry was living there he gave them a price of 10 cents a pound for this plot of ground and let them keep the house which was moved to West Main street where it is now located.

I thought we were about to have a real boom when that deal was made. At that time this was one of the best locations in Memphis for a filling station. The company built a metal building on this site and one of the men who operated the station over the years was A. Pressley.

### Diseases Caused by Clostridium Increase

County Agent, Warren Mitchell, warns cattlemen that the incidence of cattle deaths from diseases caused by the genus Clostridium seems to be on the increase in this area.

Diseases caused by this genus include: blackleg, malignant edema, black disease, overeating disease, botulism, tetanus and water disease.

The organisms produce toxins which are excreted into the surrounding environment. These toxins are taken up by cattle either from the outside as in hay, or are absorbed if they are internally such as from the milk or liver.

Blackleg is the most common cause of death but several cases of black disease have been reported by the Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Lab.

Calves should be vaccinated at 4 months of age for protection and then revaccinated as 1-yearlings to maintain an immunity. In some areas it may be necessary to vaccinate baby calves to prevent Clostridium infections.

Since the incidence of Clostridium infections is high veterinarians are recommending an annual 7-way shot for mature cattle.

was when the late Dr. J. A. Odom built his clinic.

In about 1945, Dr. Odom added on to his clinic by building a hospital which he operated for years.

To sum up the many useful things this plot of ground was used for: I can remember there were many conversions and rededications, many gasoline tanks were filled. Many suffering from different ailments were relieved by medication, many babies began life here, and many people deceased here on this plot of ground.

After all these years I wonder what its use will be next; My guess would be a parking lot.

We received a letter from Byron Powell (3841 Nerdona Lane, Redding, Calif.). He will be remembered as the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. A. G. Powell, who were early day residents here. Mr. Powell was known to most of the old timers as "Uncle Jimmy". He was an early day merchant here.

Byron is the only one of this family whose address I have. I remember Byron. When about 12 years of age we were in the same Sunday School Class and our teacher was the wife of the late W. B. Scott.
