He was a member of the Travis Baptist Church, and a Veteran of World War I. He was also a member of the American Legion Simmons Noel Post.



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EDITORIAL Money Shortage!

To the average wage earner in this county, anyone bringing up the subject of money shortage would bring either tears or laughter in the day of inflation and rapidly increasing prices, but apparently money is getting in shorter and shorter supply throughout every phase of the U. S. Economy.

U. S. Senator Lloyd Bentsen of Texas predicts, "If action is not taken to prevent it, our country will face a money shortage as severe as the energy shortage within four or five years. As much as energy, capital forms the foundation of our economic system. Without money, industry and business can't operate,

The Senator points to these signs. Stock prices are lower today than in 1968, although most other ecomic statistics are at all-time peakks. The number of individual stockholders, after growing steadily for many years, is declining alarmingly.

For some time, individuals have been selling more stocks than they have been buying. And new issues of equity stock have become very difficult to sell. MacDonald's hamburger chain is doing well with the market value of MacDonald's stock was about \$2.1 billion at the end of 1972 while the company's book value was \$200 million. At the same time, though, the book value of U. S. Steel Corporation was about \$3.6 billion, but the market value of its stock was only \$2.2 billion. Something is wrong with our economy when the stock market is long on hamburgers and short on steel. There is a serious economic distortion when we can raise money to raise sert a "right-to-work" clause in hamburger stands but not to raise steel plants. 



The right-to-work provision would prevent anyone from hav ng to join a labor union, pay money, to, or perform services for a labor union in order to get a job in Texas.

The state has no such provision n the present constitution. However, Texas is one of the states with a right-to-work law which has been under attack in every session of the legislature for many

It would appear that it would mions point out that it was through their efforts that the pay scale has risen and working conditions improved, and that a rightto-work law merely allows workers outside a union to take a free ride and enjoy the benefits secur-

The West Texas Chamber of Commerce is the latest organization to call for a right-to-work provision in the constitution. chairman of the WTCC state affairs committee, says that during the past decade the 19 right-to work states created 59.6 per cent of the nation's new manufacturng jobs even though these states contain less than 30 per cent of the nation's total population. He says that Texas recorded a gain of 225,700 jobs in the decade, best among the 19 right-to-work

The right-to-work law we have upholds the right of unions to organize and also provides for collective bargaining as well as prohibiting the firing of employees who refuse to join labor unions.

It would appear that labor unions are doing very well under this type law and don't really need legal compulsion to increase their membership and dues income.

Tips Given On Social Security

By Travis C. Briggs

Q. Did the 1972 social security amendments provide any changes to help the survivors of a dis-abled person who died before filing an application for disability benefits?

A. The 1972 amendments modified the application required for the group reported 7 visits to the disability benefits to provide that sick an effective application may be the month of death.

Q. My husband had worked under covered social security for Billie Potts, Celeste Ward, Roxie 30 years. He became ill and had Orcutt and Earlene Trapp. to quit work on October 15, 1972. He died in August 1972, at age 55, never having filed for dis-ability benefits. Would there be any disability beneifts due after his death?

A. Possibly, but you must have filed an application within months after the month of your husband's death. A 5-month waiting period is required for benefits effective January 1973 on Assuming a period of disability was established beginning 10-15-72, disability benefits would be payable on his record for April 1973 through July 1973.

Q. If I enroll for Fart B during a general enrollment period, would it take effect immediately A. No. It would not take effect until July 1, of the year in which you enroll.

Q. How much will I have to pay for Part B?

A. You will pay the same premium as enrollees who are 65 and older. At the present time, this monthly premium is \$6.30 for those who enroll at their first opportunity. Enrollment during the later periods means an increase in the premium amount.


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




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
